### Annual Town Meeting, 1904.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Chelmsford qualified to vote in town affairs, held pursuant to warrant at the Town Hall, Centre Village, Monday, March 28, 1904, at 8 o'clock in the forenoon, the following business was transacted, to wit:—

The meeting was called to order and the warrant read by the Town Clerk pro tem, Edward J. Robbins.

Under Article, 1 to choose a Moderator, J. Adams Bartlett was unanimously elected, the check-list being used and the oath of office was administered by the Town Clerk pro tem.

Under Article 2, relating to the election of town officers by the official ballot, the following Clerks and Tellers previously appointed by the Selectmen were sworn by the Town Clerk pro tem. Ballot Clerks: Arthur E. Reed, John P. Scoboria; Tellers: Howard S. Adams, Leslie R. Davis, J. Arthur Mallalieu, William J. Quigley, Daniel E. Haley, William E. Martin. The ballot box was examined and found to be empty, the register indicating zero. The polls were opened at 8.20 A. M. and balloting proceeded until 1.15 P. M., when the polls were closed the register indicating 645 and the check-lists corresponding. During the counting of the ballots business was transacted as follows:—

Under Article 4, to hear reports of town officers and committees, Henry S. Perham moved that a committee of three be appointed by the chair to draw up resolutions to be spread on the records upon the death of George A. Parkhurst. Henry S. Perham was made chairman of the committee, with Arthur H. Sheldon and George F. Snow to assist him.

It was voted to send a copy of the resolutions to the family Voted to accept the report of the committee on marking graves of Revolutionary soldiers, and that the committee be continued with authority to use the unexpended balance from last year of \$20.49.

Voted to accept the report of the Selectmen on guide posts.

The following report was returned by the committee on resolutions:

Whereas:—By the death on February 3, of George A. Parkhurst, the town has suffered the loss of its Clerk, who has faithfully performed the duties of that office for thirty-three years, it is therefore Resolved: That in his death the town recognizes the loss of a valued public servant whose duties during this long period have been executed with marked ability and fidelity. And we, the voters of Chelmsford, desire to further place on record our tribute to the personal worth of the deceased as a high-minded, modest, patriotic and public-spirited citizen.

Dalton Road:—From Westford Road, near house of the late D. C. Perham, by house of James F. Stearns to Chelmsford Street at Westlands.

Bartlett Street:—From Acton Road by Warren's Grove to Acton Road.

Adams Street:— From Bartlett Street, by Adams Library to Boston Road.

Robins Hill Road:—From High Street, over Robins Hill, crossing Locust Road, to Acton Road at South Chelmsford.

Warren Avenue:—From Boston Road through Homestead lands.

Putnam Avenue:—From Boston Road to and along the south line of Homestead lots.

River Neck Road:—From Billerica Road near Rivermeadow Brook, to East Chelmsford, passing old school-house and terminating at Gorham Street.

Voted to accept the remainder of the town report as printed. Under Article 5, the committee on appropriations reported the sums necessary in their judgment, which, after some discussion, it was voted to raise and appropriate as follows: For schools, including teaching, care and fuel, \$13,000; school books and supplies, \$1,100; school incidentals, \$300; school apparatus, \$100; School Superintendent, \$562.50; transportation, \$1,100; repairs and furniture, \$1,000; highways, \$,6000; support of poor, \$1,500; indigent soldiers and sailors, \$300; repairs of public buildings, \$700; town officers and committees, \$3,000; cattle inspector, \$150; collection and abatement of taxes, \$700; care of village clock, \$30; care of cemeteries, \$400; miscellaneous expenses, \$2,000; street lights, \$1,500; Adams Library, \$800; loans and interest, \$4,255.65; enforcement of liquor law, \$300; tree warden, \$200; deficit, \$2,000; aggregate

Under Article 6, voted that the Treasurer be authorized to borrow, subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen, such sums of money as may be required for the demands upon him in anticipation of the taxes of the current year and payable therefrom.

appropriation, \$40,998.15.

Under Article 7, it was voted that the Treasurer be authorized to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet payments on the proposed bridge over the Stony Brook Railroad at North Chelmsford, in case it became necessary for this purpose. At this point it was voted to take up Article 13 out of course, as it was thought to be a very important matter and at that time a greater number would be present to act upon it.

Under Article 13, at the request of John M. Agnew and others, to see if the town will raise and appropriate or borrow the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for the purpose of adding two rooms to the school-house building at West Chelmsford, and making such other additions and alterations in the building as may be required.

(a) To determine the manner in which the above mentioned five thousand dollars shall be raised and appropriated or borrowed.

(b) To determine the manner in which the above five thousand dollars shall be expended.

Capt. John J. Monahan after making some remarks regarding the existing conditions, moved the acceptance of the article, the money to be paid in five annual instalments, the first one to be paid in 1905.

Stewart Mackay, a member of the school committee, gave some figures regarding the increase in attendance at the school.

George F. Snow moved as an amendment that \$10,000 be appropriated for a new four-room building, and this was carried.

The motion as amended was as follows: That the town borrow the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of building a new four-room school-house at West Chelmsford, the amount so borrowed to be payable in five annual instalments, the first to be paid in 1905. This was carried 200 to 1.

Voted that the money be expended under the direction of a committee of seven, including the three members of the school committee. The committee was nominated by the chair as follows: Charles H. Ellis, Stewart Mackay, Alexander J. Park, John J. Monahan, George F. Snow, Arthur H. Sheldon, Albert H. Davis. The disposal of the old building was left in the hands of the same committee.

Under Article 8, voted that a public observance be held in 1905, by the town, of the 250th anniversary of its corporation and that a committee be chosen to take the matter into consideration and report at a future meeting. This committee was appointed, upon nomination of Rev. Wilson Waters, as follows: Henry S. Perham, J. Adams Bartlett, Joseph E. Warren, Harry L. Parkhurst, Arthur H. Sheldon, Hubert Bearce, Daniel P. Byam, George F. Snow, Erastus A. Bartlett.

Under Article 9, voted that the town invite Henry S. Perham to prepare a history of the town and that a committee be chosen to have charge of the publication of the book. The following Trustees of the Adams Library were appointed to have charge of the publication. J Adams Bartlett, Albert H. Davis, Emma J. Gay, Frances Clark, A. Heady Park, and Rev. Wilson Waters.

Under Article 10, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for the care and maintenance of the rifle range under the charge of the Selectmen.

Under Article 11, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the purpose of putting in improved sanitary arrangements at the Centre Town Hall.

Under Article 12, which called for an action upon a new system of street lighting, the article was dismissed.

Under Article 14, voted that \$100 be raised and appropriated to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen for the purpose of locating street lights in North Street, from the present last location to McLarney's Corner and continuing to a point near the residence of Perley P. Perham.

Under Article 15, voted that the town request the Selectmen to replace the old guide post that formerly stood in front of the Centre Town Hall and properly repair all posts of a similar nature.

Under Article 16, the motion of Stewart Mackay that the sum of \$900 be raised and appropriated under the direction of the Selectmen, for the purpose of paving Main Street with granite blocks from the Moore Spinning Company's side track to a point opposite Gay Street, was carried 79 in favor and 73 opposed.

Under Article 17, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Under Article 18, voted that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for the North Chelmsford Library Association, \$200 of the sum may be expended for new books on condition that the books of said library be free to all inhabitants of the town, and that hereafter the appropriation committee be authorized to include in their recommendations a sum for this purpose.

Under Article 20, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, for building a fence to enclose the school-house grounds at East Chelmsford.

Under Article 21, voted that the article which was to allow Francis Day and others who requested permission to use a parcel of land for private burial ground be dismissed.

Under Article 22, voted to accept the gift of \$100 in trust from the heirs of Charles Sweetser, the income of same to be expended in forever keeping in repair the Charles Sweetser burial lot in Forefathers Cemetery.

Under Article 23, voted to accept the gift of \$100 in trust from the estate of Alvah H. Richardson, the income of same to be annually expended for the perpetual care of the family lot of Elijah and Alvah H. Richardson in Forefathers Cemetery.

Under Article 24, voted to accept the gift of \$100 in trust, from the estate of D. C. Perham, the income of said sum to be annually expended for the perpetual care of the D. C. Perham burial lot in Forefathers Cemetery.

Under Article 25, voted to accept the gift of \$100 in trust from Charles W. Parker, the income of said sum to be annually expended for the perpetual care of the Eli P. Parker lot in Forefathers Cemetery.

Under Article 26, voted to authorize the Treasurer to accept, subject to the approval of the Cemetery Commissioners, trust funds, in sums not less than one hundred dollars (\$100). The income from same to be used for the perpetual care of burial lots in our several cemeteries.

Upon motion of Henry S. Perham, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the purpose of repairing or replacing the flag-pole on the Common at the Centre Village; the money to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen. 110 voted in the affirmative and 1 in the negative.

### Special Town Meeting.

May 21, 1904.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the town of Chelmsford qualified to vote at elections and in town affairs, held pursuant to warrant at the Town Hall, Centre Village, Saturday, May 21, 1904, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, the following business was transacted: The meeting was called to order and the warrant read by the Town Clerk.

Under Article 1, balloted for Moderator, and Albert H. Davis was chosen and sworn by the Town Clerk.

Under Article 2, Capt. John J. Monahan moved that the action of the town at the last annual meeting under Article 13 of the warrant therefor, as certified by the Town Clerk, whereby it was voted that the town borrow the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of building a new four-room school-house at West Chelmsford, the amount so borrowed to be payable in five annual instalments, the first one to be paid in 1905, and that the money be expended under a committee of seven including the three members of the school committee, be and hereby is ratified and confirmed. General discussion of the matter followed this motion, during which a motion to indefinitely postpone was put and lost. A rising vote upon the original motion was taken, 58 voting in favor and 19 opposed.

Under Article 3, Capt. John J. Monahan moved that the Town Treasurer be authorized and directed to borrow the sum of ten thousand dollars at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, and to give therefor promissary note of the town to be payable in five annual instalments of two thousand dollars each, of which the first shall be payable one year from the date thereof, the second two years therefrom, and so following, such note to be countersigned by the Board of Selectmen or a majority of their number.

This was carried unanimously.

Article 4 was indefinitely postponed.

Article 5 was indefinitely postponed.

Under Article 6, Walter Perham, Chairman of the Selectmen, made some remarks regarding the difficulty of obtaining a large enough stick for a new flag-pole, and moved that the action taken at the last annual town meeting be rescinded, and it was so voted.

Under Article 7, it was voted that the sum of \$400 be appropriated for a new flag-pole, the money to be extended under the direction of the Selectmen.

Voted that the meeting be dissolved.

## Report of Tree Warden.

In the performance of the duties of Tree Warden, I caused over two hundred public trees to be trimmed. There have been thirteen trees removed from the residential parts of the town.

There have been several new lines of telephone wires put up in different parts of the town, but in the construction the shade trees have been considered and no serious results have occurred. There is always trimming to be done on the old lines of wire, many of which were built without any consideration of trees, with which in some places they seriously conflict, so much so that in one place I forbade further trimming. The results will be watched with interest.

As is well known, tree pests have made their appearance in this town. The brown-tail moth appeared in such quantities that the Selectmen instructed me to pay a premium for the nests of one cent each for a limited time. The nests which the boys brought in amounted to nineteen thousand one hundred and sixty-seven (19,167), not including those which I removed from public shade trees.

The elm leaf beetle is also present, and will probably need attention the present year. I have not seen any Gypsy moth nests in the precincts of the town.

## Report of the School Committee.

The work in the schools the past year has been very satisfactory. Unavoidable delay in beginning the year at the North and an epidemic of diphtheria at the West have hindered a little, but the schools at present are in good condition and doing good work. We have a corps of good teachers who are doing faithful duty. It is unfortunate for a school to lose a tried and true teacher. But situated as Chelmsford is so conveniently near to towns and cities that can pay better salaries to their teachers, it is not surprising that we have to give up some of our good teachers. The year has seen several changes in the teaching force.

With the magnificent new building at the West village, the town is fairly well provided, for the present, with good school facilities. While this new building has bettered school conditions in that part of the town, it means increased cost for maintenance. Attention must be given at once to the grounds about the building, and a considerable sum will be required to put them in good condition, and the sanitary conditions there must also be improved.

At the North Village a new heating plant must be put into the old school building before another school year begins. The old furnaces cannot furnish sufficient heat for a cold day and are beyond repairing. One part of the roof of the building ought to be shingled. These will require extra considerations.

The committee desire to draw the attention of the citizens of the town to the amount of valuable school property

the town possesses with the idea of having the matter of providing for such in case of loss by fire considered.

We believe the town is deeply interested in the educational question, and will do all it can to make Chelmsford stand where it should in the educational column.

#### TEACHERS.

The number of teachers employed by the town now is twenty-five, an increase of two since my report of a year ago. This increase was brought about by the employment of an additional teacher in the West school and also in the North school, making a total of nine teachers in the latter.

Four teachers, Misses Godfrey, Blakely, Parker, and Mr. Parsons, resigned in the summer to accept more lucrative positions elsewhere. Thus it became necessary to begin the year with nearly one-fourth of the teachers new to the work. Besides this, Miss Douglass was transferred by her own request from the North to the Centre school, and, in the Cen-

tre school, Miss Litchfield was assigned to the first grade room, and Miss Bliss to the second and third grade room, although the work of these grades was new to both. During the spring term, Miss Bliss gave up teaching on account of ill health. Miss Nellie L. Wyman, of Meriden, New Hampshire, was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Mrs. W. W. Garvin, who took charge of the sixth and seventh grade room in the North school last September, was obliged to resign her position late in February on account of changes at her home. Mrs. Garvin was well prepared for teaching, having had the advantages of both a college and a normal school training, besides having spent a year in France and Germany. Therefore it was with regret that her resignation was accepted. Her successor, Miss Katherine C. Farley, is a graduate of the Salem Normal School, and has had a number of years successful experience in the schools of Lowell.

At the present time, Miss E. Belle Adams of the South Row school is out on leave of absence. Miss Ethel M. Wright is acting as substitute.

From the foregoing, it will be seen that it has been necessary to secure a large number of new teachers during the year which has just closed.

In the selection of these teachers, it has been the aim to secure the best talent available from whatever source it might be obtained.

While it is very desirable that a large proportion of the teaching force should remain with us from year to year, and that many of these should be identified with the interests of the town in ways outside of their profession, yet, I believe that it is worth much to engage now and then some whose training and experience have been secured under entirely different circumstances.

In speaking upon this point before the National Educational Association, Professor Samuel P. Dutton of the Teachers' College, Columbia University, said, in part, concerning the imported teacher: "He is likely to be selected for his good qualities and the promise he gives, rather than because

of local influence. He enters his work with a presumption of ability and character which is not always accorded to a person who has grown up in the community. Working in a new field it is easier to cultivate singleness of purpose, and to shun those obligations of a social and churchly nature which it is so easy for a teacher to incur to excess. It is easier for a body of teachers to recognize and emulate the excellences of a stranger than one in their own circle. Finally: No slight advantage lies in the fact that if the imported teacher is unsuccessful and has to surrender his position, it becomes easier for him and the school board than if he were an old inhabitant."

#### HIGH SCHOOLS.

The town has provided high school instruction for its young people for more than thirty years, although we read in the report of 1874-1875 that the committee regrets that the town has decided to abolish its high schools. The change brought about by that vote, however, was more in name than in fact according to one who was deeply interested in high school work at that time. In the report of 1888, we read that "we now have two high schools", a condition which still exists. It is only within a few years, though, that a sufficient number of studies have been included in the curriculum to prepare pupils for the entrance examinations of the various colleges.

Although high school instruction has been provided for so many years, it was not until 1879 that any regular graduating exercises were held or diplomas given. In June of that year a class of three was graduated from the North High School, Mr. Benjamin F. Harmon being principal.

Nine years later, in 1888, a class of thirteen was graduated from the Centre High School. This class was the first to receive diplomas from that school.

Since the time of the first graduations, diplomas have been given nearly every year to pupils who have completed the course of study, and graduating exercises have been held whenever the size of the class seemed to warrant such an undertaking.

Last June, a class of five was graduated from the North High School, and a class of thirteen from the Centre High School.

Of the Centre graduates, Miss Florence L. Feindel returned this year to take further studies, Misses G. Goldie Hunt and Eva G. Macnutt are attending the Lowell Normal School, and Miss Ethel R. Hagerman is a student in a kindergarten normal school in Boston.

A complete list of those who were graduated last June, as well as of the earlier graduates, may be found later in this report.

A short time before the beginning of the fall term, Mr. Percy F. Parsons tendered his resignation as principal of the North school, after having held the position for four years, during which time the school increased in numbers, and steadily improved in the quality of its work. His successor, Mr. Elmer C. Royce, a graduate of Allegheny College, took charge of the school in September.

At the Centre, Miss Zelma L. Swift has succeeded Miss Lena E. Bliss as teacher of algebra and the first and second year classes in English.

#### MUSIC.

Acting upon the suggestion of your Superintendent, the Supervisor of Music investigated the Individual Sight Singing Method last spring and reported so favorably that necessary material for carrying on the work is now in the lower grade rooms.

A few songs in sheet form have been purchased for use in the high schools. After consideration, this seemed a better way in which to furnish music for the use of these schools than to purchase song books.

In carrying out the plan of teaching music in all the schools, some puzzling questions have arisen in connec-

tion with the work in the high schools. This has been due in part, at least, to the fact that many of the pupils have had but few musical advantages, and, in part, to the lack of an appreciation of music, or to the inability, real or assumed, to sound the different notes with any degree of certainty.

Those who for any good reason are unable to sing have been excused from singing, but all have been required to do the written work. This, sometimes, has been done almost under protest by some who could see no good reason for doing such work. To relieve this class from doing an irksome, and possibly an unprofitable task, I would recommend that after this year credit be given for work in music as for any other study, and that the number of credits necessary to secure a diploma be increased by the number of credits assigned to music, and further, that pupils who have no natural musical ability and no taste for music be permitted to secure credits by taking other studies.

#### SCHOOLHOUSES.

The excellent new four-room building in the West village, which has been in use since the first of January, will doubtless furnish ample accommodations for the children of that part of the town for some time to come. Considerable money will need to be expended yet, though, before the grounds and sanitary arrangements will be in a condition at all satisfactory.

All the rooms in the two buildings at the North are now in use. Should there be a number of new tenements built in that village, the question of more room for school purposes would become so vital as to demand early consideration. Happily, the new building is so constructed that four rooms could easily be added to the rear of the present structure, thus making of it an eight-room building.

More blackboards should be placed in the East building, and fresh paint should be applied to the South Row building, both inside and out, if it is to be continued in use.

#### INSTRUCTION.

There is usually, I believe, but little danger of dwelling too long upon the fundamental facts and processes. To prevent weariness, however, they should be presented in a great variety of ways, and in ways which should appeal to the interests of the child. An ill-timed and poorly considered presentation of the truth is often worse than no presentation at all.

When choosing the subjects to be taught, the teacher must consider the child, and must judge carefully regarding his ability to grasp the subject to be presented, whether he is sufficiently developed in intellect to receive the instruction with profit. Then, when this is decided, let her present the truth with all the love and skill she possesses.

Indeed, so important are these qualities, that Superintendent Maxwell of New York City has said: "Immeasurably more effective, however, than money,—vital though money is,—to uplift the school, are the love and skill of the devoted teacher. Love for children and teaching skill are the greatest things in the school."

## Course of Study.

#### ALL GRADES.

Physiology and Hygiene.—Once a week during the winter term.

Nature Study.—Once a week during the fall and spring terms.

Drawing.—Sixty minutes a week.

Music.—From sixty to eighty minutes a week.

Morals.—Fulfil the requirements of the law.

Insist upon neatness, order, and politeness at all times.

#### GRADE I.

Reading.—Follow the instructions in the Ward Manual. The Ward Primer and other primers.

Writing.—The Letters and short sentences from the blackboard and from slips.

Language.—Oral reproduction of stories read or told by the teacher. Short pieces memorized. Teach pupils to write their name, the name of the town, etc. Spelling.

Arithmetic.—Combinations of numbers to ten, with and without objects. Winter and spring terms.

#### GRADE II.

Reading.—Follow the instructions in the Ward Manual. The Ward First Reader and other readers.

Writing.—Use copy books in this grade and in following grades until the eighth.

Language.—Oral and written reproductions. Dictation exercises. Memory gems copied and learned. The use of the period or question mark at the end of the sentence and of capitals at the beginning. Spelling.

Arithmetic.—Numbers to twenty. Multiplication tables to and including the fives. Prince, Book I.

#### GRADE III.

Reading.—See course in reading.

Language.—Frequent composition and dictation exercises. Give attention to abbreviations, punctuation, capitals, choice of words, forms of words, spelling. Continue memory work.

Arithmetic.—Numbers to one hundred. Multiplication tables to and including tens. Prince, Book II.

#### GRADE IV.

Reading.—See Course in Reading.

Language.—Frequent composition or dictation exercises. Give attention to punctuation, capitals, spelling, modifying words, choice and form of words, clearness and conciseness of expression. Continue memory work.

Arithmetic.—Integers to 1,000,000. Fractional parts of numbers, U. S. money, common weights and measures, multiplication tables to and including twelves. Prince, Book III.

Geography.—Local geography.

History.—Local history.

#### GRADE - V.

Reading.—See Course in Reading.

Language.—Continue the work outlined for the fourth grade. Metcalf's Elementary English to page 102.

Arithmetic.—Whole numbers unlimited, common fracsions to twelfths, decimal fractions to thousandths, measurements, business transactions, denominate numbers. Rapid oral drills. Prince, Book IV.

Geography.—Land, water, the earth and its surface, heat, wind, rain, people. North America, the United States.

History.—Montgomery's Beginners read carefully and discussed.

### GRADE VI.

Reading.—See Course in Reading.

Language. -Continue the work outlined for the fourth grade. Metcalf's Elementary English completed.

Grammar.—Teach the pupils to recognize the parts of speech.

Arithmetic.—Common and decimal fractions, denominate numbers, business transactions, mensuration. Prince, Book V.

Geography.—South America, Asia, Europe, Africa, Australasia. Plants and animals. United States by groups of states. Foreign countries.

History.—Guerber's First Thirteen Colonies read carefully and discussed.

#### GRADE VII.

Reading.—See Course in Reading.

Language.—Continue the work outlined for the fourth grade.

Grammar.—The sentence. Kinds of sentences. Phrases and clauses. Analysis of simple sentences. Metcalf's Grammar, Part I.

Arithmetic.—Denominate numbers, the metric system, percentage and simple applications, business transactions and accounts, mensuration. Prince, Book VI.

Geography.—The earth's form and size, directions, land, water, surface of continents, climate, races of men, zones of plant and animal life, minerals, commerce. People, surface, climate, and products of the United States. Special study of the New England, Middle Atlantic, and Southern States.

History.—From the early discoveries to Washington's administration.

#### GRADE VIII.

Reading.—See Course in Reading.

Language.—Continue the work outlined for the fourth grade.

Grammar.—Kinds, forms, and uses of all the parts of speech. Rules of syntax. Analysis of sentences. Metcalf's Grammar, Part II.

Arithmetic.—Profit and loss, commission, insurance, taxes, duties, interest, banking, stocks and bonds, exchange, business accounts, ratio and proportion, measurements.

Geography.—Central and Western States. Possessions of the United States. Other countries of North America. South America, Europe, Asia, Africa, Australia.

History.—From Washington's administration to the present time.

#### GRADE IX.

Reading.—See Course in Reading.

Language.—Frequent composition exercises based upon history, geography, or nature study.

Grammar.—Continue the work outlined for the eighth grade. Metcalf's Grammar, Part III.

Arithmetic.—Involution, square root and its applications, percentage and its applications, and measurements. A half-study for the year.

Algebra.—Addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, factoring, simple equations. A half-study for the year.

Geography.—Review comparatively, using the United States for the basis of comparison. First half of the year.

History.—A general review of American history, giving attention to the development and form of government.

Physiology.—Second half of the year.

#### MR. H. H. EMERSON.

Mr. H. H. Emerson, the efficient janitor of the Centre building, died October 22, 1904.

During the few years that he cared for the building, he took great pride in keeping it in excellent condition, and was frequently at his post when men of less force would have remained at home.

His fidelity to duty, fearlessness of character, and sound judgment were worth much to the town he served.

To all those with whom my official duties have brought me in contact during the past year, I desire to express my thanks for their unfailing courtesy and kindly consideration.



## Report of the Trustees of the Adams Library.

The following report of the Trustees of the Adams Library is herewith submitted:—

The Board was organized by electing Mr. J. Adams Bartlett as Chairman, Albert H. Davis as Secretary and Rev. Wilson Waters as Treasurer. Mr. Chas. H. Greenleaf was elected Librarian. The various committees for carrying on the work of the Library were chosen. The Treasurer's report herewith will show the financial condition of the Library. The Trustees extend their thanks to those persons who have given books and valuable documents to the Library the past year. A list of donors is appended. The thanks of the Trustees and the South Chelmsford patrons are extended to Emerson & Co., of South Chelmsford, for their aid in distributing books at that place.

The circulation for the past year has been 10,572 volumes. The number of borrowers was 425. The character of the circulation was as follows:

Fiction, 66 per cent.; General Works, 15 per cent.; Travel and Description, .04 per cent.; Literature, .03 per cent.; Biography, .02 per cent.; Natural Science, .02 per cent.; Useful Arts, .01 per cent.; Fine Arts, .01 per cent.; Religion and Philosophy, .02 per cent.; Sociology, .01 per cent.; History, .03 per cent.

The Library has been open 208 sessions, or 829 hours. The number of volumes purchased last year was 148, number donated 48. Magazines bound, 30. Only two books were lost during the year. Whole number of volumes now in the Library is 7,109. During the year the Library was again entered by

some one, and a typewriter that belonged to the Librarian, and which was in the use of the Library, was stolen. No trace of it could be found, although every effort was made to do so.

No money was drawn from the Joseph Warren fund, which amounted to \$693.93, or from the Adams-Emerson fund which amounted to \$87.67, at the making up of the quarter of the City Institution for Savings.

Our thanks are due to the Librarian for his excellent work, and especially for the extra work done in and about the building, for which no charges were made.

## Report of North Chelmsford Library Association.

The North Chelmsford Library Association, in its annual statement to the town, has to report that at its annual meeting, held April 6, 1904, the following officers were elected.

President, for one yearArthur H. Sheldon
Vice-President, for one yearPreston L. Piggott
Secretary, for one yearOtis P. Wheeler
Treasurer, for one year
Director, for two years

The Library has been open 144 sessions, with a circulation of 5,815. This is less than the circulation of last year, and the decrease is undoubtedly due to the Library having been open fewer sessions than usual, and to the fact that the teachers in the public schools have made much less use of the Library for school work than has been customary in the past. Fifty-four cards to new borrowers have been isssued, the whole number making use of the Library being 322.

There have been, in addition, gifts of unbound magazines from Mrs. Sargent, Miss Bessie Moore, Mrs. Yeoman, Miss Gay and others; and of these, 16 volumes have been bound at the Library's expense and placed on the shelves, making the total addition to the Library 288.

In addition to these 16 volumes of magazines, 53 books have been rebound. The volumes in the Library have been thoroughly inspected and are in remarkably good condition. The accession book numbers 4,786. Of this number 53 have, at various times, been discarded as worn out, sold or lost. Thirty-three have been replaced, leaving the actual number now available for circulation 4,766, 11 of which are duplicates.

Borrowers have been supplied with printed lists of new books, and a few new shelves have been put up, but there is great need of additional room.

Books have been sent semi-weekly to West Chelmsford, and the Library is indebted to Mr. Frank E. Bickford, of that village, from whose store the volumes have been distributed.

## WARRANT.

#### COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

Middlesex ss.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Chelmsford, in said County, GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid you are hereby required to notify the legal voters of said Chelmsford to meet in the Town Hall, at Chelmsford Centre, on Monday, the twenty-seventh day of March, current, being the fourth Monday in said month, at eight o'clock in the forenoon. The polls will be opened at 8.15 A. M. and closed at 1.15 P. M., and they are then and there to act upon the following articles, viz.:—

Article 1. To choose a Moderator.

Article 2. To bring in their votes for five Selectmen, for one year; Town Treasurer and Collector of Taxes, for one year; one School Committee, for three years; two Trustees of Adams Library, for three years; three Auditors, for one year; seven Constables, for one year; one Highway Surveyor, for one year; one Cemetery Commissioner, for three years; one Tree Warden, for one year; also to vote on the following question:—
"Shall license be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?" All on one ballot.

Article 3. To choose all other town officers necessary to be chosen by hand vote, or act in relation to the same.

- Article 4. To hear reports of town officers and committees and act thereon.
- Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray town charges for the current year.
- Article 6. To see if the town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow, subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen, such sums of money as may be required for the demands upon him, in anticipation of the taxes of the current year and payable therefrom.
- Article 7. To act in relation to the list of Jurors prepared by the Board of Selectmen.
- Article 8. At the request of Capt. Edward H. Keyes and others, to see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) to be expended for the care and maintenance of the Rifle Range, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 9. At the request of the School Committee, to see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of grading the grounds and improving the sanitary conditions about the school house at the West Village, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 10. At the request of the Anniversary Committee, to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) to defray the expense of the celebration of the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of its incorporation, which the town voted at its last annual meeting to hold, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 11. At the request of John T. Smith and others, to see what action the town will take in regard to re-opening the school at district number two.

- Article 12. At the request of Herbert C. Sweetser and others to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) to defray the expense of putting in a proper system of drainage for that part of Chelmsford Street, between S. W. Parkhurst's store and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Crossing, the same to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of paving Main Street with granite blocks, from Edwards Avenue to Cottage Street, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 14. At the request of Royal S. Ripley and others to see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of fortynine dollars (\$49.00) for the purpose of putting the driveway and sidewalk of Depot Street in proper condition for public travel, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 15. At the request of the Trustees of the Adams Library to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$77.50) to reimburse Mr. Chas. H. Greenleaf, the Librarian, for his typewriter, which was stolen from the Library on the night of August 30, 1904, the said typewriter having been used by him in the work of the Library, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 16. At the request of the Cemetery Commissioners to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400.00) to re-locate the tomb at Riverside Cemetery, or act in relation thereto.
- Article 17. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for the observance of Memorial Day, or act in relation thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting true and attested copies thereof at the Post Offices in the Centre of the town, South Chelmsford, North Chelmsford, West Chelmsford and at the school house at East Chelmsford, ten days at least before the time appointed for holding said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, at the time and place of

holding the meeting aforesaid.
