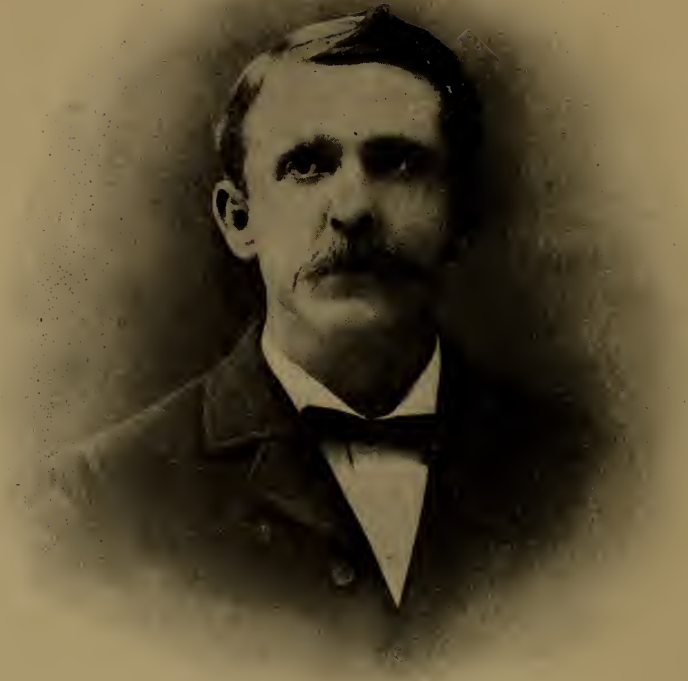

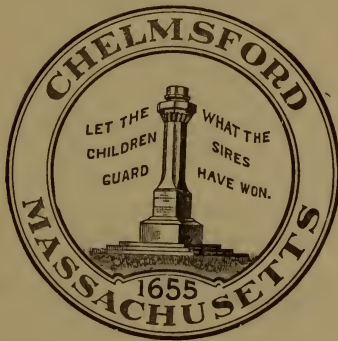

BUSINESS MEETING

FEBRUARY 13, 1922

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Chelmsford, qualified to vote in Town affairs, held pursuant to Warrant at the Town Hall, Center Village, Monday, February 13, 1922, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, the following business was transacted, to wit: The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Walter Perham, and the Warrant read by the Town Clerk, Justin L. Moore.

Under Article 1, voted that all other Town officers and committees, including Finance Committee, be chosen by the Board of Selectmen.

Under Article 2, John J. Monahan reported for the Finance Committee.

Edwin L. Stearns reported for the Building Committee of the Westland school. The report was accepted, the committee continued in office.

E. Ambrose Jenkins reported for memorial for Chelmsford service men of the World War. The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

Joseph E. Warren reported on water supply for the East and South schools. The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

Joseph D. Ryan reported on motor fire apparatus. The report was accepted and the committee continued in office.

Raymond C. Hazeltine reported on fire alarm at the Centre. The report was accepted and the committee continued in office.

The Town Report was accepted as printed.

Under Article 3, voted that the chairman of the Board of Assessors be paid \$4.00 per day for each full day's service and that the remaining members of the Board be paid \$3.50 per day for each full day's service. Upon this vote, 62 voted Yes and 18 voted No.

Voted that of the amount raised for Tree Warden, \$50.00, shall be used for the removal of a tree in front of Frank J. Lupien's house on Westford Street.

Voted that the amount appropriated for cutting brush shall be expended in the month of August, 1922.

Voted that 25 per cent. of the amount appropriated for street signs shall be expended on the East Chelmsford streets.

Voted that the amount appropriated for repairs on Middlesex Street shall be applied between a point near the Riverside Cemetery and the Lowell line. Upon this vote, 47 voted Yes and 21 voted No.

Voted that the amount appropriated for repairs on Dalton Road be applied between the junction of Stedman Street and Dalton Road and Chelmsford Street.

Voted to raise and appropriate the following sums to defray Town charges for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1922:

Construction of Acton Road (under Article 10).....	12,000.00
Fire Station at East Chelmsford (under Article 20).....	2,850.00

Under Article 4, voted that the Selectmen be and they hereby are authorized to act as the agent of the Town in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year; also in such matters as may arise requiring in their judgment the action of such agent, and to employ counsel therefor.

Under Article 5, voted that the Town Treasurer be and he hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time, with the approval of the Selectmen, in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1922, and to issue a note or notes payable within one year; any debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said financial year.

Under Article 6, voted that the Town authorize the Selectmen to contract with the Lowell Electric Light Corporation, at the prevailing price per light, for twelve lights in addition to the number previously contracted for, said lights to be distributed along the following public ways, viz.: Four lights on Carlisle Road, three lights on Parkhurst Road, three lights on Brick Kiln Road, one light on Boston Road between Carlisle Road and Russell's Mills Roads, one light on Holmes Street.

Under Article 7, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125 with which to meet the expense of additional electric lights voted under Article 6.

Under Article 8, voted to appropriate from money already in the hands of the Treasurer the sum of \$997.67 with which to meet unpaid bills of 1921.

Under Article 9, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 and elect at this meeting a director of demonstration work in agriculture and home economics, the money to be expended by, and the director to serve in co-operation with, the County Trustees for Aid to Agriculture and Home Economics, under the provisions of Chapter 128, Section 41, of the General Laws and any amendments thereof. Perley W. Kimball was elected director.

Under Article 10, voted that the Town Treasurer be and he hereby is authorized to borrow a sum not exceeding \$12,000 at a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually and to issue therefor five promissory notes, each in the same principal sum, payable at the expiration of one, two, three, four, and five years from the date thereof each note to be signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by a majority of the Board of Selectmen, and that the proceeds be used for the purpose of constructing the Acton Road, two-thirds of the expense to be borne equally by the Commonwealth and the County of Middlesex. 170 voted Yes and one voted No.

Under Article 11, voted to accept and allow Harvard Street at the North Village, as laid out by the Selectmen on January 7, 1922, as described in their report duly filed in the Town Clerk's office and shown on the plans therein referred to.

Under Article 12, voted to leave the matter of repairing and grading Holt Street to the Board of Selectmen.

Under Article 13, voted to dismiss the article.

Under Article 14, voted that \$700 be taken from the appropriation for the General Highway Repairs, for the purpose of repairing and improving Parkhurst Road and Smith Avenue.

Under Article 15, voted that the sum of \$1500 be raised and appropriated, to cover the expense of the trimming and preservation of the public shade trees injured by the recent ice storm.

Under Article 16, voted that the sum of \$1000 be appropriated, from the unexpended balance of the Westland school house appropriation made in 1921, for the purpose of grading the grounds at the new school building at the Westlands, the money to be expended under the supervision of the building committee.

Under Article 17, voted to lay the article on the table. The Selectmen were authorized to lay out Naylor Street, so-called, and report at a future Town meeting.

Under Article 18, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 to continue the grading of the playground at the High school, the money to be expended under the supervision of the Selectmen.

Under Article 19, voted to indefinitely postpone the article.

Under Article 20, voted that the Town borrow the sum of \$2850 with which to purchase a site, on the Frank Loucraft lot, so-called, situated on Gorham Street, East Chelmsford, for and build a fire station at East Chelmsford, at a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, and issue therefor five promissory notes, each for

the principal sum of one-fifth of the total amount borrowed, payable at the expiration of one, two, three, four and five years from the date thereof; such note or notes to be signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by a majority of the Board of Selectmen. 112 voted Yes and one voted No. Building committee chosen were, Henry F. Devine, A. Samuel Gustafson, George A. McNulty, R. Wilson Dix, Birger Peterson, Joseph H. Scobie and Henry G. Quinn.

Under Article 21, voted that the article be indefinitely postponed. 56 voted Yes and 44 voted No.

Under Article 22, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the purchase of fire hose, the same to be expended under the general direction of the Board of Fire Engineers.

Under Article 23, voted that the Board of Fire Engineers be and they hereby are authorized and empowered to sell at public auction or private sale, as they may think advisable, the following property belonging to the Town, viz.: Two hose reels, one harness, two wagons, and a small building located near North Chelmsford Town Hall.

Under Article 24, voted that the Board of Fire Engineers be and they hereby are authorized and empowered to use and store the fire apparatus and other property in their charge from time to time in such part or parts of the Town as they may think advisable.

Under Article 25, voted to indefinitely postpone Article 25.

Under Article 26, voted to indefinitely postpone Article 26.

Under Article 27, voted to rename the West Chelmsford school as a memorial to Corporal George R. Quessy, a World War soldier who lost his life in service; said school to be known as the George R. Quessy school

Under Article 28, voted to rename Stevens Corner, so-called, at the North Village, as a memorial to Private Alberton W. Vinal, a World War soldier who lost his life in the service; said corner to be known as the Alberton W. Vinal Square.

Under Article 29, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3000 for the erection of a granite monument on the Common at North Chelmsford in memory of the men of Chelmsford who gave their lives in the World War, and that the committee be given full power to procure plans and specifications, erect said monument and suitable inscriptions thereon; said inscriptions to contain the names of all who made the supreme sacrifice, including the name of Arthur Ayotte and that any further additional names be left to the committee for their consideration. The following committee was chosen to carry out the purpose of this article: E. Ambrose Jenkins, Mark Ingham, John J. Monahan, Williston Carl and John J. Garvey.

Under Article 30, voted to indefinitely postpone Article 30.

Under Article 31, voted to indefinitely postpone Article 31.

Under Article 32, voted to indefinitely postpone Article 32.

Under Article 33, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$59 to cover deficiency in settlement of land damage case of Dennis J. and Rose McCluskey and expenses.

Under Article 34, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550 for the State Aid.

Under Article 35, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35 to purchase a flag for the Centre Village.

Under Article 36, voted to appropriate from money already in the hands of the Treasurer, the sum of \$50 with which to pay Hector Clough a balance for services rendered building committee of the Westland school during the year, 1921.

Under Article 37, voted to postpone until next Annual Town Meeting.
Voted to dissolve the meeting.

SPECIAL MEETING

May 18, 1922

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Chelmsford, qualified to vote in Town affairs, held pursuant to Warrant at the upper Town Hall at Chelmsford Centre, on Thursday, the 18th day of May current, at 8 o'clock in the evening, the following business was transacted, to wit: The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Walter Perham, and the Warrant read by the Town Clerk, Justin L. Moore.

Under Article 1, voted to appropriate from money in the hands of the Treasurer, the sum of \$183.26 with which to pay bills of the School Department for the year ending Dec. 31, 1921.

Under Article 2, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200 as an additional appropriation for the Vocational school.

Under Article 3, voted to raise and appropriate from money in the hands of the Treasurer, the sum of \$36.83 with which to pay outstanding bills of the Fire Department for the year ending Dec. 31, 1921.

Under Article 4, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 with which to purchase arsenate of lead for the Moth Department.

Under Article 5, voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200 for the purpose of furnishing gravel with which to raise the grade of the electric car tracks at West Chelmsford.

Under Article 6, voted in order to meet the indebtedness to be incurred by the Town in bearing its proportionate part of the proposed specific repairs on the Groton Road, extending from Princeton Street at North Chelmsford on the east, to the Westford Town Line, on the west. The Town Treasurer be and he hereby is authorized, empowered and directed to borrow a sum of money not exceeding \$5000 at a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent. per annum payable semi-annually and to issue therefor five promissory notes, each in the same principal sum, severally payable at the expiration of one, two, three, four and five years, from the date thereof, and each to be signed by the Treasurer and countersigned by a majority of the Board of Selectmen. Upon this question 171 voted Yes, and 34 voted No.

C. Wesley Lyons and Fred I. Vinal were appointed and sworn tellers.

Under Article 7, 101 voted Yes and 51 voted No and the article was defeated by one-third of a vote.

Under Article 8, voted that a committee consisting of Herbert E. Ellis, Chelmsford Centre, John J. Monahan, West Chelmsford, John J. Kelley, East

Chelmsford, Wilbur E. Lapham, South Chelmsford and James P. Dunigan, North Chelmsford, be appointed to investigate fully the best and proper means of establishing a water supply for the Town of Chelmsford, this Committee to act as a joint committee with the Finance Committee and Selectmen and to report at any future Town Meeting.

Under Article 9, voted to dismiss the article.

Under Article 10, voted to dismiss the article.

Under Article 11, voted to dismiss the article.

Under Article 12, voted to dismiss the article.

Under Article 13, voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$75 with which to install electric lights in the East Chelmsford school house.

Under Article 14, voted to dismiss the article.

Under Article 15, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 with which to pay transportation charges of the Board of Assessors.

Under Article 17, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50 for the purpose of raising the grade and constructing a suitable walk at the rear of the South Row school house, the money to be expended under the supervision of the Selectmen.

Under Article 18, voted to dismiss the article.

Under Article 19, a motion to raise and appropriate \$200 was defeated and the article was dismissed.

SPECIAL MEETING

July 27, 1922

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of Chelmsford, qualified to vote in Town affairs held pursuant to Warrant at the upper Town Hall at Chelmsford Centre, on Thursday, the 27th day of July, current, at 8 o'clock in the evening, the following business was transacted, to wit: The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Walter Perham, and the Warrant read by the Town Clerk, Justin L. Moore.

Under Article 1, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 with which to build a retaining wall at the George R. Quessy School House at West Chelmsford.

Under Article 2, voted to refer back to the Selectmen the matter of making a contract with the Lowell Electric Light Corporation for street lighting and to report at a future meeting.

Under Article 10, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300, in addition to the amount already raised for Soldiers' Aid.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FIRE ENGINEERS

To the Selectmen of Chelmsford.

Greeting :

In accordance with the usual custom, we submit our report for the year ending December 31, 1922.

This department is under the authority of a Board of Fire Engineers, consisting of three men, appointed annually by the Selectmen. This year, like last, it is organized with A. C. Perham, as chief of the department, L. J. Ellinwood as first assistant engineer, and J. E. Hogan as second assistant engineer and clerk of the board.

Last year, the Board of Engineers divided the territory of the Town into five districts and placed the motorized apparatus furnished by the Town, one piece of apparatus in each district. This arrangement has been continued this year. The location and description of each piece of apparatus was explained in our annual report of 1921.

This arrangement provides each district with motorized equipment and an organized company to suppress a fire in its early stage, or to check a fire until additional aid can arrive from other districts each or all of which is always subject to call if needed by any district threatened by fire.

Each company is organized with proper officers and each company has its own social organization and is provided with an apartment for its social activities.

The district chiefs are appointed annually by your Board of Engineers. The district chiefs in authority are as follows :

District No. 1. Wilhelm T. Johnson

District No. 2. Joseph D. Ryan.

District No. 3. Archibald Cooke

District No. 4. Henry Quinn.

District No. 5. William E. Belleville.

Emergency cards giving instruction what to do to notify each local company in case of fire have been printed and distributed in each district to each and every family.

During the year the Board has purchased 1300 ft. of new standard size fire hose to replace the hose inherited from a previous organization which hose had become useless because of age and service.

For the better protection, care and economy of handling the costly apparatus in District No. 1, the apparatus in that district has been removed from the old fire house in the rear of the Town Hall and is now stationed in the new, modern Chelmsford garage at the Centre Village.

The nucleus of a Gamewell system of fire alarm with its striking hammer attached to the bell of the Unitarian Church in the Centre village has been installed in that District by a special committee appointed at Town Meeting in 1922. We hope to see this system gradually and economically extended.

Your Board of Engineers has endeavored to conduct the affairs of the department with financial prudence for the tax payers, and to create the efficiency of each district company in the spirit of loyal co-operation, to teach that membership in each company is an obligation of citizenship duty to be met for the welfare of all, even if at some personal sacrifice. This standard of citizenship in the department has helped produce a spirit of service that has saved much valuable property for the tax payers during the year. Our department is essentially a volunteer organization.

Vice-President Calvin Coolidge, while Governor of this Commonwealth, said, "Work worth while comes from the soul of the people." The loyalty, courage and service of the members of the Chelmsford Fire Department fighting fires during the past year are a splendid vindication of that principle. We give them deserved praise.

The campaign against fire is a never ending fight and calls for as careful preparation as for the suppression of an enemy of civilization. The protection must come not merely from better fire departments and building laws, but from educating every family and every member of every family to recognize causes of danger, and to practice habits of consideration and carefulness. If this could be done, fire would almost cease to be a public peril.

With this need in mind we have been seeking wisdom from sources of wider experience than ours. As there is not space in this report to furnish you the valuable information that we have secured, we earnestly advise each family in Chelmsford to send 10 cents to Frederic J. Haskins, Director of the U. S. Information Bureau, Washington, D. C., and procure a publication entitled, "Safeguarding the Home Against Fire." We also earnestly advise every farmer in Chelmsford to send to same address and procure Bulletin No. 904, entitled, "Fire Protection on the Farm."

A study of the publications issued by our Government at Washington is an education both to the adult and the child and should serve to make better citizenship and prevent much loss of property by fires.

The owners of property located away from water pressure service, and the farmer, can help this department to protect their property in time of fire on said property, by excavating a good size pocket in the brook near their buildings, thus making a reservoir of water accessible to our pumping apparatus so we can have a supply of water to force a stream on fire endangered

property. When such reservoir is completed, each owner should notify the Board of Fire Engineers of its exact location.

For months we have been working to get lower fire insurance rates for the property owners of Chelmsford because of the Town having installed motorized fire fighting apparatus. The result is lower fire insurance rates now in effect as follows:

Property insured in the water districts of Chelmsford Centre and North Chelmsford is now in class C (raised from class D) giving lower rates.

Also, property located within one mile of the fire stations of East Chelmsford, South Chelmsford and West Chelmsford is now insured in class E (raised from class F) giving lower rates.

During the year your department has responded to 32 calls for building fires within the Town limits, and 4 fire calls from adjoining towns, and 4 automobile fires on the highways, and 17 grass and brush fires within the Town to assist your Forest Warden Department.

The total estimated value of building property in the Town directly endangered by fires amounted to \$110,631.00. The total loss caused by these fires amounted to \$10,317.50.

The best test of a system is what it accomplishes. The Chelmsford Fire Department has saved more taxable property from destruction by fire during the year than the cost of all the apparatus.

Have faith in your Fire Department. It is saving you fire insurance money each year now, and with its motorized apparatus and organization is protecting your property from the fire hazard.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS

January 1, 1923.

To the Selectmen of Chelmsford:

At the annual inspection early in the year 1922, I found there were in Town 202 stables containing 916 dairy cows, 212 young cattle, 23 bulls, 180 swine, 1 sheep and 5 goats, also 1 pair of oxen.

Nineteen cows were quarantined, one died in quarantine, one was released and seventeen were condemned and killed because affected with tuberculosis.

Twelve dogs were quarantined during the year, each dog was held under observation for two weeks, and all were afterward released as none of them developed rabies, although all had bitten one or more persons.

It seems rather strange that this Town has not a single accredited herd of cattle, that is herds tuberculin tested by the government under stated conditions and all reacting or diseased animals removed. Why not investigate this a little?

There have been no cases of glanders or hog cholera reported or found.

Quite a noticeable improvement has been made in the stabling conditions for cattle during the last few years.

REPORT OF WATER COMMITTEE

APPOINTED AT A TOWN MEETING HELD MAY 18, 1922

At a Town meeting held May 18, 1922, a committee was appointed consisting of the Board of Selectmen, the Finance Committee, and five members, one from each village, to investigate the matter of a Town water system.

The first problem taken up was the feasibility from an engineering standpoint of extending the water system to those parts of the Town which at present have no water supply. This work was done by John C. and Walter T. Monahan, they doing a vast amount of work getting levels, etc., of the entire proposed extensions without expense to the Town. Had it not been for their willingness to do this, your committee would have been practically helpless for no money was voted for our use. It was found that the Chelmsford Centre system could be extended to serve South Chelmsford at an estimated cost of \$46,000 and to serve East Chelmsford at an estimated cost of \$73,000; and that the North Chelmsford system could be extended to include West Chelmsford at an estimated cost of \$43,000, making a total cost of \$162,000. These amounts were based on present day costs and were arrived at after a careful investigation. The entire distance was measured, the cost of different size of pipe, hydrants, fittings, trenching, filling, etc., was obtained. The only uncertainty is in the digging, namely the amount of rock encountered, and a liberal allowance was made for that. The above amounts may be increased or decreased as the market varies.

The Committee next investigated methods of financing, and the effect upon the tax rates. It was assumed that the Town would take over the two existing water systems from the districts in their present condition, assuming all assets and liabilities, and it was also assumed that the revenue and expenses of these present systems under Town management would remain constant. No provision was made for the payment of any fixed sum to the members of either water district for they are members of the water district and citizens of the Town, both at the same time, and in fact have no individual equity in either district. The new work was to be financed by the issue of thirty year bonds, with the establishment of a fund for retiring a certain number of these each year, partly from revenue, and partly from taxes. Taking into account the interest on the principal invested, the fund for retirement of the new bonds and the liabilities of the present districts, all expenses such as salaries, service extensions, maintenance, etc., and figuring the revenue from the present districts plus an estimated revenue from the extensions, the Committee estimates that the extension of the water systems to supply the entire Town would cost at the rate of \$3.25 per thousand. This rate will grow less each year as the outstanding bonds are retired, as the interest charges decrease and as the revenue increases.

We believe this rate to be high rather than low from the fact we took an expenditure of \$200,000 and the present valuation of the Town as a basis of these calculations.

Although our estimated cost is \$162,000 we used \$200,000 in estimating the tax rate well knowing that many extra expenditures may arise in an undertaking of this magnitude.

Report of the Trustees of the Adams Library

On February 25th the Board met at the Library and elected officers for the ensuing year as follows: Chairman, Albert H. Davis; Secretary, Mrs. E. R. Clark; Treasurer, Rev. Wilson Waters; Librarians, Misses Katherine and Margaret Hall; Purchasing Agent, Mrs. E. R. Clark; Committee to Approve Bills, A. H. Davis and A. H. Park; Prudential Committee, Rev. Wilson Waters and Otis P. Wheeler; Committee on Periodicals, A. H. Davis, Miss Frances Clark and Rev. Wilson Waters.

On May 9th, the Rev. Wilson Waters having been appointed by the Trustees as their agent in the matter of the bequest of the late Mrs. Orra A. George Flint, he, in company with Messrs. George Rigby, representing the selectmen, and Mr. E. R. Clark, went to Worcester and received a check for \$20,000.00, with the books and portraits, from the executors of the will. In accordance with the advice of the Town counsel, the check was given over to the Town Treasurer, as were also all Trust funds in the hands of the Treasurer of the Adams Library. The Trustees authorized their Treasurer to obtain a bond of \$1000, which he has done, in order to conform with the requirements of the law.

The library has continued the policy of placing on its shelves a good per cent. of solid works of history, biography and science along with the lighter literature. People who read the former class of books borrow fewer and keep them longer, which may account for a decrease in circulation. A person may take out one volume and keep it two weeks or more, whereas, in the case of the lighter class of reading, one may borrow half a dozen books in the same length of time. Also the young people and others use the reading room more than formerly, having access to the books themselves, and do not borrow so many to use at home. Except to individuals coming to the library, fewer books have been supplied to East and West Chelmsford.

North Chelmsford Library Corporation

REPORT OF TRUSTEES

Under a revision of the by-laws of the Corporation, the annual meeting was held on December 20, 1922, at the Library Rooms, with a large membership present.

Reports were heard from the various officers and committees, and were approved, and placed upon the records. Officers were elected for the ensuing year.

The librarian's report was satisfactory, showing that our usual average circulation had been maintained during the year, that a considerable number of new subscribers had been listed, that new books had been purchased within the means of the Corporation.

Reference books were in increased demand by the students of the High school, and we were able to satisfy all requirements to a very marked extent.

As a result of having organized a house-to-house delivery and collection of books in the West Village, our circulation was considerably increased, and we likewise gained a number of new subscribers. We have been assured that our method of distributing and collecting the books is most satisfactory to that part of the Town, and we naturally feel that the arrangement was a good one.

As we have been advising the voters and taxpayers for some time, the Town appropriation for the purpose of conducting our library is inadequate, and we express the hope that the time will come in the near future when we may receive a material addition to our annual allotment.

Cursory examination of the reports of this Corporation, filed during the last few years, will demonstrate to anyone, that, in comparison to the work done by other libraries in towns throughout the State, our work has been done at a ridiculously low cost to the taxpayer.

A request was made last year to the Finance Committee for their approval of an increase in the appropriation, and in addition, the matter was personally presented to them for their consideration, but for reasons that seemed sufficient to them at that time, no recommendation was forthcoming for any increase; but with the knowledge of the educational value of our institution, and the further pleasure that the reading of good books may give to several hundreds of our citizens, we hope that the committee will see their way to more favorable decision this year.

No property improvements were possible under present conditions, although there are some matters that must receive attention in the near future.

REPORT OF DEMONSTRATION WORK IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS, TOWN OF CHELMSFORD

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1922

An appropriation of \$250 was made at the Annual Town Meeting for demonstration work under the direction of the Middlesex County Bureau of Agriculture and Home Economics. Following is a report of the work done by this organization in Chelmsford:

Agents of the Bureau made 132 farm and home visits during the year. The County Agricultural Agent held a program meeting, gave a poultry-culling demonstration and a pruning demonstration and held a fertilizer meeting during the year. He also organized a poultry automobile tour to study some of the successful poultry plants in the northern part of the County. The Home Demonstration Agent attended the program meeting, gave a dress-form demonstration, a jelly and jam demonstration and held a two-day Fall millinery class at which forty women learned how to make hats.

Bureau moving pictures were shown six times before a total audience of 1,210.

Boys' and girls' club work, organized in the Town for the first time, created much interest and resulted in some fine work. Fourteen meetings have been held with boys' and girls' clubs by agents of the Bureau. Matthew Ochinski and Stacy Krasnecki were awarded two-day trips to M. A. C. for excellent work in gardening and canning. During the summer there were three Canning Clubs, one Pig Club, and two Garden Clubs with a total enrollment of 53. At present there are three Home Economics Clubs and a Poultry Club with a total enrollment of 68.

Middlesex County continues to lead all others in the United States in the number of boys and girls enrolled in club projects. There were 2,965 enrolled in various projects and they produced \$75,475 worth of products during the year. All of these young people were under the leadership of agents of the County Bureau and 184 paid and volunteer local leaders.

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from money already in the hands of the Treasurer a sum not exceeding Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee, as provided in General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 6; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from money already in the hands of the Treasurer the sum of Seventy-eight and 55/100 Dollars (\$78.55) with which to reimburse the North Chelmsford Fire District for accidental damage on or about September 19, 1922 to a hydrant at North Chelmsford by an automobile driven by a special officer of the Town while in the performance of his official duties; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from money already in the hands of the Treasurer the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200) with which to build a retaining wall at the West Chelmsford School grounds; or act in relation thereto.

To see if the Town will vote to borrow a sum not exceeding Seventy-five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500), or what other sum, for the purpose of continuing construction of the Boston Road, two-thirds of the expense to be borne equally by the Commonwealth and the County of Middlesex; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to borrow a sum not exceeding Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000), or what other sum, for the purpose of continuing construction of the Groton Road, two-thirds of the expense to be borne equally by the Commonwealth and the County of Middlesex; or act in relation thereto.

To see if the Town will appoint a committee to consider and report at a special Town meeting to be held not later than April 16, 1923, as to the advisability of applying to the Legislature for a special act authorizing limited town meetings, so-called, and the election of town meeting members in Chelmsford, along the lines provided in Chapter 36 of the Acts of 1921 relating to the Town of Brookline; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 17. To see what action the Town will take relative to a new contract with the Lowell Electric Light Corporation for street lighting; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract with the Lowell Electric Light Corporation at the then prevailing price per light for the following additional lights, viz.: One light at the corner of Sylvan Avenue and Subway Extension; nine lights on the road leading from Chelmsford Centre to West Chelmsford, same to be located between the Pine Hill Road and the residence of Patrick Flynn; and any, and if any, how many lights on Smith Street; or act in relation thereto.

- ARTICLE 19. In the event of affirmative action under the preceding article, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money for additional electric lights; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any, and if any, what sum for the purpose of widening the travelled part of Smith Street; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to accept Section 6 of Chapter 148 of the General Laws relating to fire prevention; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to give Chelmsford Post No. 212, American Legion, permission to use the Town Hall at North Chelmsford for the purpose of playing basket ball; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,400), or any and what other sum, for the purpose of constructing a concrete walk along the street lines of the Princeton Street School Houses and the Town Hall at North Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500), or any and what other sum, for the purpose of establishing and maintaining sidewalks in the Town; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the School Committee to sell or exchange one of the two school barges now belonging to the Town; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 26. In the event of affirmative action under the preceding article, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the School Committee to purchase a new school barge, and will raise and appropriate a sufficient sum for that purpose; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) with which to complete the grading of the Baseball Field at the High School, Chelmsford Centre; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) with which to grade the Playground at the Highland Avenue School, North Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.

Report of School Committee

January 12, 1923

The School Committee herewith submit their annual report for the year ending December 31, 1922.

The School Committee have adopted a policy of making permanent repairs to the extent which their appropriation is available. Temporary work is done only as may be necessary to save the property until the whole building may receive attention. Under this policy it is believed that in a few years all the school buildings will be put in good condition and a considerable saving made.

Last year the South School received the greater part of the permanent work. The foundation was relaid, the building painted and new gutters installed.

At the High School the lawn was graded and seeded down after a covering of loam was placed over the filling.

The excellent work of the school nurse is limited by lack of transportation. More than half her time should be spent in the homes in follow-up work. Her time spent in walking from one place to another is not profitable to the Town. As a remedy the committee propose to pay a salary which will enable the nurse to provide her own transportation.

The Committee feel that better transportation for the school children can be provided at less cost by Town-owned trucks than would be obtained from private contracts. In the interest of safety and economy one truck should be replaced this year. For this reason the committee ask for a special appropriation to cover the cost of a new truck.

The Committee ask for two special appropriations for grading of playgrounds. Highland Avenue school yard should be graded to take care of the surface water, and at the same time a ball field could be provided. The other is for the completion of the ball field at the Center High School.

We wish to express our appreciation of the work done by the teachers of our schools. Their devotion and loyalty to their work is highly commended.

Report of the Superintendent

Chairman, School Committee,
Chelmsford, Mass.
Gentlemen :

I have the honor to submit this, my second report to you and through you to the citizens of the Town.

The points in a school system of vital interest to the community are the cost and the service. This usually is in the order named, although more and more each year place their emphasis on efficiency and the good to the public welfare. The public schools of this country constitute the first line of defense against anarchy. As the science of government grows more complex each year, so must the citizens, who, in the final analysis, constitute the government be mentally equipped to meet each issue intelligently, and to make a decision which is for the advantage of the majority. Education in its broad sense does just this. The sum total of the materials of education is the accumulation of a human experience during its life history. For the individual this becomes a selective process, becoming more broad and general in contact with society. Education does not end when the school door closes behind a child at the end of its school life. The school has had as its purpose the establishment of certain fundamental facts, which in daily life are necessary as a part of the automatic or sub-conscious mind of the individual, and the formation of the habit of clear and independent thought. In this function the public school has a great advantage over the private school for the reason that in the public school the individual child comes in social contact with others in the same way that they will meet later in life, while in the private school the child is at once placed within an artificial barrier made up of a specially selected group, which in life does not exist. There is no artificial caste or class in this country. There is, however, a community or group interest which binds more or less closely together individuals who have a common ground of contact. The limits of these groups are entirely flexible, and individuals move from one group to another group with the greatest freedom. One person may belong to several groups at the same time. It is best illustrated by the trade guild, although in the complex organization of society of the present day, its original significance has been lost. Education in itself is purely social, and is for life. Without use and application it is of no value. When a person is able to observe his duties as a citizen, earn a living, and make worthy use of his leisure time, his life is of value not only to himself but to others. No community can set their own standards and say that they are sufficient for their local needs. A person who has no children in school cannot argue that they are paying for what they

do not receive. The life of each individual touches more persons than is realized at the time, both directly and indirectly. Individual liberty ceases to be liberty when it becomes an offense to our neighbors. Any community containing a large number of illiterates, or where the standards of education are low, is at once a menace to the whole country.

Money saved on the public schools is worse than wasted. It may help to lower the tax rate for a short time, but in the end there comes an accumulation of needs for which a much larger amount must be provided.

The building needs of the school department are urgent. The Highland Avenue and Princeton Street Schools are overcrowded, especially in the lower rooms. The Centre Grammar is almost to the limit of its capacity and far beyond the limit for efficient work. In a few years, the new Westland School, if the present rate of growth continues, will need extra room.

In the North there seems to be a strong sentiment in favor of a High school to be located in that end of the town. Local pride is a good thing, but in this case, for the Town to maintain two High schools would undo all the good which was accomplished when the two schools were consolidated. The Town is not large enough to maintain, either efficiently or economically, two High schools. One school of this grade is enough. Where it is located is for the School Committee and a majority of the voters of the Town to determine. At present the North and West furnish a few more pupils than the Centre, South and East. Few realize that to maintain two High schools would cut the efficiency in half and double the cost. With the small classes the competitive value would be lost, variety of program limited, the equipment for two small schools would be almost doubled. High class teachers would cost more, as teachers do not, as a rule care to work in a small school. The maintenance cost would be increased. The chief advantage claimed by its proponents, that transportation would be abolished, would be a fact only for those pupils who live near the new school. Transportation is required by law for all pupils who live at a distance of two or more miles from the school which they are entitled to attend. It has been the policy of the committee to furnish transportation for all who lived a mile or more from the school, this, especially in the case of young children. With this in view, it is easy to see that transportation is not a vital factor in the situation.

The Centre Grammar building in its present location and condition is not fit to be used for school purposes. That no child has been injured in the street has been due in a large measure to the care of the teachers and the caution of a majority of those driving cars past the school. It is unfortunate that the Common, naturally a beautiful place, must be used as a playground. The actual school yard is not large enough to contain all of the children to stand in at one time. If the present location is to be continued, additional land should be secured at the side and rear. The interior needs refinishing, and it is hard to say where it should begin, as the whole thing now is largely a matter of patch-work. The basement, including the toilets and heating plant, should be entirely rebuilt. If the patrons of the school would visit the building and inspect the equipment for themselves it is almost certain that a remedy would be provided. It is impossible to teach children habits of health and right living under such conditions.

While the matter has been brought to the attention of the citizens in previous years, it may be well to speak again of one of the larger needs at the High school. The work is seriously restricted by the lack of an assembly hall. One should be provided, not only for the use of the school but for the benefit of the Town. With an adequate building there would be no need of its remaining idle more than half the time.

Taking into consideration modern educational practice, it would seem that the best solution of the building needs of the Town would be met by the adoption of the Junior High plan, on the basis of the six-three-three plan. This would call for two new buildings, one at North and one at the Centre, to house grades seven, eight and nine. The advantages of this would be as follows: Congestions of both grammar schools would be relieved; school work would be organized more closely to the natural points of transition; pupils would be separated into age groups conforming to the natural segregation of age interest; transportation problems would be reduced and pupils would be a year older before they would have to put in a full day away from home; cost per pupil of High School age would be reduced as specialized instruction could be concentrated on the last three years of the work.

As fast as the school population in the East and South warrant it, additional room should be provided so that eight grades may receive instruction with not over two grades to a room.

There are many repairs which must be made to the school buildings this year. Among the larger jobs may be mentioned, paint for the trimmings of the High school and shingles at East. Many of the buildings need interior paint and finish and there are a number of instances of ceilings in poor condition. The yard at Highland Avenue should be graded and drainage away from the building provided. Under the present conditions the surface water comes into the basement.

During the past summer the repairs at South Chelmsford proved to be more extensive than when the work was undertaken. This was required by the character of the work when the building was built, certainly not an advertisement of excellence for the contractor.

Your superintendent wishes to thank the School Committee, teachers, parents and citizens of the Town, who by their co-operation and assistance have made the work of the past year very pleasant.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Mr. Roscoe G. Frame,
Superintendent of Schools.

Dear Sir:

In accordance with your request I herewith hand you a report containing a few features of the High school work.

The number of pupils enrolled in the school during the fall term is as follows:

Seniors	24
Juniors	46
Sophomores	68
Freshmen	65
Total	203

This is an enrollment of 22 more than last year. We shall have, this year, the largest graduating class in the history of the school.

The school was organized in September with a seven period day instead of six, as formerly. One of these periods I have called the organization period. During this period all assembly talks to the pupils are given. Class meetings and all club meetings are held, and the work of the glee clubs and orchestra is done during this period. I find the introduction of this period to be a great help to the work of the school. No time is lost from the other work for assembly; the interest in the club work has increased, and the enrollment in the glee clubs has more than doubled. Having this work done in school time is a matter of great convenience to the pupils, especially those pupils going to and from school on the barges.

I have adopted the Major and Minor system of electives. The rules and regulations follow:

All pupils in the Chelmsford High school must arrange their curriculum of studies so that by the time they are ready to graduate they will have received credit for work done in one Major and two Minors. English will not be considered in satisfying this requirement.

A Major is a subject pursued for 3 years.

A Minor is a subject pursued for 2 years.

Majors and Minors must be in separate groups of studies.

Groups of studies:

Latin

Foreign Languages

Social Studies

Mathematics, including Bookkeeping

Science

Stenography—Office Practice

The pursuance of this regime throughout a period of years will result in benefits to the school and to the pupils. It tends to keep the number of classes in the various subjects uniform. The pupils are discouraged from

scattering their efforts over a variety of fields. A pupil who goes through High school should have mastered one field of thought in so far as the High school courses offer the opportunity.

The class of 1921 graduated 16 pupils. The honor students, the first four in order of scholarship, were Ethel Carlson, Lewis Felch, Gerald Miller, and Ida Paignon. Twelve of the class are continuing their education in other institutions of learning. The class gift assumed a somewhat unusual but pleasing and very acceptable form. A silk flag was presented by the class. The school very much needed such a flag for public and patriotic occasions.

There is a very healthy interest manifested on the part of the pupils in the various extra school activities. A radio club of some 70 members is doing a very active work among the boys and girls under the supervision of Mr. Coates. Buzzer classes are in daily session; programs of value concerning radio apparatus and concerts by the broadcasting agencies furnish real educational worth to the pupils.

Miss Harmon and Miss Swain have supervised the organization of a very efficient commercial club. The daily work of the pupils in type writing, stenography, bookkeeping, etc., has benefited greatly by the increased interest in the work among the pupils enrolled in the club.

The affairs of the Athletic Association are in good condition. Regular officers and a baseball manager have been chosen. The members of the association intend to place in the field as good a baseball team as can be produced from the members of the school.

A team of pupils from the commercial department won the interurban contest in typewriting held at the Kimball school last spring. The cup won at that time is now in our trophy room.

I wish to take this occasion to express most sincere thanks to both parents and pupils for their loyal co-operation and support without which any school cannot maintain its standing. I wish to bespeak the interest and co-operation of all the citizens of Chelmsford, especially all who in any way come in personal contact with the school and its work.

I desire to express my appreciation of the loyal support I have received from the teachers and I wish to thank you and the School Committee for the hearty co-operation and constant aid which I have received in behalf of the school.

REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

Dear Sir:

One of the great aims in teaching school music is to train the pupil to read at sight, and marked improvement is shown along this line. Special attention has been given this year to song reading and even in some of the third grades the pupils have read songs surprisingly well.

In grade one, more time than usual has been given to rote song singing, leaving notation until later in the year.

The enrollment in the Boys' Glee club is 35 and in the Girls' Glee club it is 70.

The instrumentation of the High School orchestra is four violins, one clarinet, four cornets, piano and drums. With the proceeds of the High School Concerts, we purchased a bass drum, snare drum and a set of bells.

The second annual High School Concert was given last April. A choral fantasia from the opera "Faust" was sung by the High School chorus. The orchestra and glee clubs gave several numbers. Another concert is to be given this spring.

The chorus work at High School is greatly handicapped and the only solution to the problem is an assembly hall.

Last April, I attended the eastern supervisors' conference which was held in Springfield. This was very inspiring and instructive.

I wish to thank all for their kind co-operation.

For the work accomplished a great deal of credit is due the teachers, who have never failed to give their heartiest co-operation.
