WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MARCH 2, 1936 and MARCH 9, 1936

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

To John J. Buchanan, Constable, or any other suitable person of the Town of Chelmsford:

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid you are hereby requested to notify and warn the legal voters of said Chelmsford to meet in their several Polling Places, viz:

Precinct One-Town Hall, Chelmsford Centre.

Precinct Two-Town Hall, North Chelmsford.

Precinct Three—Fire House, West Chelmsford.

Precinct Four-School House, East Chelmsford.

Precinct Five-Liberty Hall, South Chelmsford.

Precinct Six-Golden Cove School House, Westlands.

on Monday, the second day of March, 1936, being the first Monday in said month at 12 o'clock noon, for the following purposes:

To bring in their votes for the following officers:

Moderator for one year.

Town Clerk for three years.

One Selectman for three years.

One Member of the Board of Public Welfare for three years.

Treasurer and Tax Collector for one year.

One Assessor for three years.

Tree Warden for one year.

One Member of the Board of Health for three years.

One Park Commissioner for three years.

One Cemetery Commissioner for three years.

Two Trustees for Adams Library for three years.

One Sinking Fund Commissioner for three years.

One Constable for one year.

One School Committee Member for three years.

All on one ballot.

The polls will be open from 12 noon to 8 P. M. and to meet in the Town Hall at Chelmsford Centre on the following Monday the ninth day of March 1936, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon then and there to act upon the following articles, viz:

- ARTICLE ONE: To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWO: To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray Town charges for the current year.
- ARTICLE THREE: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year; also in such other matters as may arise requiring in their judgment the action of such agent, and to employ counsel therefor; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE FOUR: To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE FIVE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding Two Thousand Dollars to be used as a Reserve Fund at the descretion of the Finance Committee as provided in General Laws, Chapt. 40, Section 6; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE SIX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum with which to meet unpaid bills of 1935; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE SEVEN: To see if the Town will vote to accept Hildreth Street as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE EIGHT: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Hildreth Street; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE NINE: To see if the Town will vote to accept an extension of Jordan Road as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Jordan Road; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE ELEVEN: 'To see if the Town will vote to change the name of Jordan road in that part of Chelmsford known as West Chelmsford to Strawberry Hill Road; or act in relation thereto.

- ARTICLE TWELVE: To see if the Town will vote to accept Sixth Avenue as laid out by the Selectmen as shown in their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE THIRTEEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Sixth Avenue; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE FOURTEEN: To see if the Town will vote to accept and extension to Ledge Road as laid out by the Selectmen as shown in their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE FIFTEEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Ledge Road; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE SIXTEEN: To see if the Town will vote to accept Elliot Street as laid out by the Selectmen as shown in their report and plan duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE SEVENTEEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Elliot Street; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE EIGHTEEN: To see if the Town will vote to change the name of Crosby Street, to Crosby Lane; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE NINETEEN: To see if the Town will vote to accept Gilwood Street as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of reconstructing Gilwood Street; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY-ONE: To see if the Town will request the Department of Corporations and Taxation, Division of Accounts, to make and audit of the Town of Chelmsford accounts; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY-TWO: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of settling

- claims made against the Town by Minnie E. Johnson and Frank Johnson; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY-THREE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred Thirteen and 66/100 Dollars to pay the County of Middlesex, as required by law, the Town's share of the net cost of the care, maintenance and repairs of the Middlesex County Tuberculosis Hospital, as assessed in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 111 of the General Laws; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY-FOUR: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Six Hundred Fifty Dollars, for the purpose of covering an overdraft in the Welfare Department, said money having been paid to the City of Lowell in settlement of claims against the City of Lowell; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY-FIVE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-four and 21/100 Dollars, to settle the claims of the City of Worcester against the Town of Chelmsford in the matter of Welfare given by the City of Worcester to persons having a settlement in Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY-SIX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety-five and 78/100 Dollars for the purpose of covering a deficit in the North Road account; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY-SEVEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Hundred Dollars for the improvement and reconstruction of the North Road, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which may be alloted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose or take any other action; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY-EIGHT: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint Physicians for the purpose of rendering Medical Service to needy persons; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE TWENTY-NINE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate certain sums of money for the purpose of compensating Physicians appointed under Article 28, provided an affirmative vote is made under Article 28; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE THIRTY: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars or some other sum, for the purpose of purchasing an automobile truck for the Highway Department.

- ARTICLE THIRTY-ONE: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and transfer title to the 1931 International Truck now used in the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE THIRTY-TWO: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of purchasing an automobile for the Police Department.
- ARTICLE THIRTY-THREE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars, or some other sum, for the purpose of carrying out or on Federal and State projects, the cost of Administration and the cost of materials and supplies for the same; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE THIRTY-FOUR: To see if the Town will vote to accept a devise and bequest of certain properties located in Chelmsford, as set forth in the last will and testament of the late Martina Gage of Lowell; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE THIRTY-FIVE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars, or some other sum for the improvement, reconstruction, and relocation of Westford Street; said sum or any portion thereof to be used in conjunction with money which may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE THIRTY-SIX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of settling land damage claims on Billerica Road; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE THIRTY-SEVEN: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars for the purpose of settling claims for damages to property located on Church and Middlesex Streets as the result of blasting during the reconstruction of Middlesex Street; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE THIRTY-EIGHT: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Seventy-eight and 52/100 Dollars to cover an overdraft in the Vocational School Account; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE THIRTY-NINE: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Eighty-five Dollars, to cover an overdraft in the Assessors Abatement Expense Account; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE FORTY: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars or some other sum for the purchase of High School desks, the purchase of seats for the base-

ment of the McFarlin School and for the purpose of adapting the McFarlin School basement for High School use; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE FORTY-ONE: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell, after first giving notice of the time and place of sale by posting such notice of sale in some convenient public place in the Town, fourteen days at least before the sale, property taken by the Town under tax title procedure, provided that the Selectmen or whomever they may authorize to hold such public auction may reject any bid which they deem inadequate; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE FORTY-TWO: To see if the Town will accept Section 48, of Chapter 31 of the General Laws, placing regular or permanent police members under the rules and regulations of the Civil Service; or act in relation thereto. Said Section reads as follows:

Section 48, Application to Police, etc., of certain Towns, A Town which has not accepted this Chapter or the corresponding provisions of earlier laws, may accept this section as to its regular or permanent police and fire forces, or as to either of them. Acceptance to the fire force shall include regular members and may include call members, and a Town which has accepted this section or corresponding provisions of earlier laws as to regular firemen may afterward accept it as to call firemen. In a Town which accepts this section by vote of the Town at a Town meeting, or has accepted corresponding provisions of earlier laws, as to any and all of said forces, the members of the forces to which the acceptance relates shall be subject to the chapter and the rules made hereunder, and shall hold office until their death, resignation or removal, but members in office at the time of such acceptance shall continue in office without examination or reappointment.

ARTICLE FORTY-THREE: To see if the Town will vote to accept Section 49, Chapter 31 of the General Laws, placing the Chief of Police under the rules and regulation of the Civil Service; or act in relation thereto.

Said Section reads as follows:

Section 49. Application to Chiefs of Police, etc., of certain Towns and Cities. This Chapter and the rules made hereunder shall apply to Superintendents, Chiefs of Police and Chief Marshalls in Cities which have accepted Chapter Four Hundred and Sixty-eight of the Acts of Nineteen Hundred and Eleven in the manner herein provided, and in Towns which have a Police force subject to this Chapter and which have accepted said Chapter Four Hundred and Sixty-eight or accept this Section, by vote at an Annual Town Meeting.

AND YOU ARE DIRECTED to serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof at the Post Offices in the Centre of the Town,

South Chelmsford, North Chelmsford and West Chelmsford and at the School House, East Chelmsford, and at the Golden Cove School House, Westlands, seven days at least before the time appointed for holding the first meeting aforesaid.

HEREOF FAIL NOT and make return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk, at the time and place of holding this meeting aforesaid.

REPORT OF FOREST WARDEN

December 31, 1936.

Board of Selectmen, Chelmsford, Mass.

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1936.

During the past year we were called to extinguish eighty-eight (88) forest and grass fires. About five hundred (500) acres of land were

burned over; most of this was scrub and grass land of no merchantable value.

Two tracts of valuable white pine were slightly damaged by fires, but our timely arrival prevented a greater loss.

One roof fire was caused by sparks from a brush fire, but the damage was very small.

Most fires were of incendiary origin. People in general are very careful of permit fires, and few got beyond their control.

Several small boys were apprehended for starting fires, but no court action was taken, due to their age. It was deemed advisable to use other methods of punishment.

It was estimated that over fifteen hundred (1500) permits were issued by the department during 1936.

Fine assistance and co-operation were rendered to this town by State District Deputy Forest Warden Stone and Observer Welch, during the past year.

All equipment, both in the care of deputies and in wooded areas outside the water districts, was carefully tested and necessary repairs made. The equipment at the present time is in good condition.

Besides the District Chiefs of the Fire Department, the following Deputy Forest Wardens were appointed: Herbert M. Sturtevant, Herbert A. Sturtevant, Adam Zabierek, Wallace Greig, Walter H. Merrill, Fred W. Merrill, Fred L. Fletcher, Ernest C. Soulis, and Robert Henderson.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation to the Police Department, Fire Department and my Deputy Forest Wardens for the fine co-operation they have extended me, during the past year.

REPORT OF MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

The following is a report of the work of the Middlesex County Extension Service in the town of Chelmsford for the year 1936.

As is generally known, this is a county institution carried on by The Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, appointed by the County Commissioners for the development of agriculture and home-making in Middlesex county. Each town is represented by a director appointed by the Trustees. These services are free to any citizen of the county. Headquarters are maintained at 19 Everett Street, Concord, where a staff of agents trained in their particular field is available upon request.

The agricultural work in Chelmsford this year has been largely a question of meeting the requests for individual farm problems. Over fifty farm visits have been made and assistance rendered, especially to the fruit growers, poultrymen and dairymen. One meeting was held on apple scab control and was attended by thirty-two local growers. Spray warning cards have been sent to all those interested and suggestions given for the material to use and the time of application for the control of the various insect and fungus troubles of the orchardist.

Two groups of homemakers were enrolled in the nutrition course on Building Healthy Children and in the coat making course. The Home Demonstration Agent spoke on school lunches at a meeting of the Council of the Parent-Teachers' Association and on nutrition at a meeting of the South Parent-Teachers' Association meeting. A large mailing list carries home economics information at monthly intervals to mothers of young children and other homemakers.

4-H Club activities were carried on in clothing, food, poultry, handicraft, craft and garden. Work in the town is under the general supervision of the town 4-H committee of which Perley W. Kimball is the chairman. The leaders of these clubs were: Mrs. Herbert Needham, Miss Rita Ferron, Miss Isabelle Hamilton, Miss Genieve Dean, Mrs. Elmer Batchelder, Mrs. Herbert Scobie, Mrs. Jessie Brown, Mrs. R. P. Kidder, Mrs. Percy Beardsley, Miss Mabel Birtwell, Mrs. Bayard Dean, Mrs. Harold Stewart, Ralph House, Harry Hilyard, Thure Bloomgren, John Buckley, Edward Russell and Raymond Boutilier, T. W. Zabierek.

Peter McHugh, George Giras, Earl Boutilier, Stanley Winters, Robert and Marjorie Riley, Stuart Bickford were awarded prizes by the Middlesex North Agricultural Society on their excellent gardens.

A two-day trip to the Massachusetts State College was awarded to Gerald Lantagne, Ethel Strobel, Jennie Borden, Walter House and Frances Fox.

Club members held several exhibits in the spring and took part in the sectional rally held at Liberty Hall in Lowell.

Mrs. L. O. Rodin is leading a clothing club of advanced members in Chelmsford Center. This club was active during the summer and was continued into the winter. Two former club girls are leading clothing clubs: Eva Kelly in the Center and Gertrude Sullivan in North Chelmsford. Mrs. Ernest Ferron is continuing with her club of advanced girls in North Chelmsford and a new leader, Mrs. Raymond Reid, is leading a first year clothing club in South Chelmsford.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

For the Year Ending December 31, 1936

Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford:

I respectfully submit my annual report of the Board of Health of 1936 to all Citizens of Chelmsford. We ask that all the people of the Town co-operate with the Board in making a proper use of the various public dumps, the Westlands dump particularly was a constant source of annoyance to the community because due to many of the people being careless in dumping refuge in the driveway, it had to be cleared several times lately at a considerable expense. We earnestly request that anyone using the Westlands dump deposit the waste over the bank rather than dump it in the roadway. Carelessness in this respect means additional expense to the tax-payers of the Town.

The Board earnestly requests the co-operation of everyone in securing a desirable sanitary condition, and wishes to be notified of any existing nuisance source of filth or cause of sickness within the Town. We quote in part, from the regulations of the Board of Health:

No person shall allow any sink or waste water to be turned into or upon any street, lane, gutter, or sidewalk of the Town. Brooks opens drains and sluceways upon premises within certain defined limits in the Town shall be kept free from such obstructions as permit the accumulation of stagnant water.

No person shall deposit any tin cans or rubbish of any description in any place within the Town, other than in a public dumping ground, or on premises owned or occupied by him, without a permit from the Board of Health.

No person shall suffer any waste or stagnant water which is likely to become a nuisance or offensive or dangerous to public health or remain in any cellar or on any lot of land owned by him. No person shall deposit the contents of any cesspool or privy vault upon the surface of the ground unless the same is plowed under or otherwise covered within twenty-four hours.

No person shall remove the contents of any cesspool, privy vault, or drain from any premises between certain dates if desired without a permit from the Board of Health, and in all cases only in watertight receptacles and at such times and in such a manner as shall not be offensive nor dangerous to the public health.

No person shall establish or construct within the Town any cesspool or privy vault without a written permit from the Board of Health.

However the citizens of Chelmsford has been very fortunate the last year in contagious diseases as the report of the Agent, shows in her annual report.

Mrs. Mae Lewis deserves much credit after years of careful study and consideration most successful in all her undertaking considering the nature of her work and including so great a territory successfully, and covering the entire Town ought to be appreciated by all citizens of Chelmsford, and especially all parents of School and pre-school children of the Town.

The clinics have been held as usual with special care to pre-school children and have been well attended.

The appropriation for "Aid" which is applied principally to those unfortunates of our citizenry, afflicted with "Communicable Diseases" has been over-run by \$1203.24 during the year 1936. This is a situation which your "Board" has no control, nor can we estimate. We can assure you that each case has been thoroughly investigated, by our Agent, by the members of the board, by contact with the Selectmen, and the welfare representative, Mr. MacElroy, before payment was authorized.

The Board is continuously being called for nuisance caused by improper sewage disposal. For the protection of our citizens and for the good of the public health in our several communities. The Board has adopted "Rules and regulations," for the proper disposal of house sewage. Permits are issued for installations of this nature and the regulations may be procured from the Town Clerk. The authority vested in us is taken from Section 3 of the "Rules and Regulations for Plumbing" adopted by the Town and Board of Health in the year 1930.

Section 3, the last sentence reads as follows: If a sewer is not available, the sewage shall be discharged into cesspool or septic tank and cesspool or a subsurface distribution system, THE PLANS OF WHICH MUST BE APPROVED BY THE BOARD OF HEALTH BEFORE CONNECTIONS IS MADE.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH AGENT

Mr. George McNulty Chairman of Board of Health Chelmsford, Massachusetts.

Dear Sir:

The following is a report for the year ending 1936:

Your Board of Health Agent endeavors to offer to the town a complete program in Public Health service. This includes nursing advice for control of communicable diseases; pre-school and school children, incommunicable disease service. Your agent has assisted the District Health Officer in interpreting and enforcing quarantine regulations for the protection of the general public and has helped families to understand and meet problems in adequate care of the case. Clinic service also has been rendered by your agent-diphtheria immunization and tuberculosis diagnostic clinics. In the past spring we had several typhoid clinics in which 600 children and adults were inoculated against typhoid. Physicians in attendance were Dr. Varney, Dr. Scoboria, and Dr. Latham. I also assisted Dr. Varney at the Southwell Mills in inoculating men from the flood districts who worked nights and were unable to attend the evening clinics. Our immunization clinics against diphtheria are held every spring and fall. In 1935 we gave for the first time in Chelmsford diphtheria toxoid to children under 12 years of age and over 6 months. This group does not require the Schick test, but we had several pupils and two teachers who received the toxin anti-toxin in October, 1935 and were given the test in May, 1936—all were immune from diphtheria. In October, 1936 we gave diphtheria toxoid to 26 children over 6 months and under 5 years of age; 122 under 9 years; 15 under 14 years; 4 under 20 years; and three teachers. All pupils over 12 and the teachers received the toxin anti-toxin and will have the Schick test in the spring, 1937.—Total for toxoid, 148 and toxin anti-toxin, 22. More than ever we urge all mothers who have children over 6 months old to bring them to the clinic in the spring which will be held at the Center town hall A notice will be in the Courier Citizen a week previous and we always announce it in all the schools. In checking up on my pupils in the fall I found only 42 in the elementary schools who were not immunized or Shicked, as some of these children came from other schools. Our State Health Officer says we have one of the best immunized towns in the State. In 1936 we had one case of diphtheria—an adult who was never immunized or Schicked. In October Dr. Martin, who is our school Clinic doctor from the County, gave the tuberculin test to grade seven, nine, and eleven, and contacted new cases in lower grades of children whose parents are either confined to a sanitorium or at home. Report on clinic as follows:

The X-Ray is given in the McFarlin Gym and we transport the pupils from the other schools when necessary. We carry over several pupils, mostly underweights, who have been examined by the State in past years; these are weighed every 3 months and at the end of the year reports are sent in to the State. The children are examined by a State doctor and discharged, with instructions in regards to rest and diet, providing they are up to standard. Just a word about contagious diesases.—When a physician reports a contagious case to the Board of Health, the house is carded by your agent, and instructions given in regards to rules and regulations in the home. A nurse is not allowed to diagnose a case; therefore a diagnosis MUST come from a regular physician. No record attendance is worth the risk of infectious diseases in school! Any child who has a cold, no matter how slight, should remain away from school, be kept in bed for at least two days and should be seen by the family physician. Nearly all so called children's diseases such as measles, whooping cough, scarlet fever, etc., begin with symptoms which suggest the common cold. Colds may be the forerunner of almost any disease and are not to be trifled with. I have taken children home from school with severe colds only to have them returned the following day with a note saying "It's only a cold, I want him or her to stay in school"! The results are that the child has to be excluded and taken home a second time with instructions not to come back until the cold is gone, and a certificate has been obtained from the physician. When a contagious disease breaks out in a school room all the books are fumigated, desks are washed with a disinfectant and all precautions taken. Our school physicians examine pupils in the school, and any child who has been exposed to contagion is excluded from school for at least seven days and must live away from home. To return to school after that period they must have a certificate from their physician or Board of Health.

We must protect our children, please help us! Most parents are very co-operative and some just do not understand. When there is an epidemic in our neighboring city or town please keep the children away from theatres and gatherings of any kind. You will find it will help our problem tremendously. We had a larger number than usual of contagious diseases last year, but this was not peculiar to our town alone, for the entire State had similar difficulties. One physician remarked that it was a wonder we did not have many more cases, as some of our townspeople visited homes where there were contagious diseases. How can we meet this situation?

Since the opening of the school term he has finished the dental work in the Westlands school and at present is working the McFalin school; every Wednesday from 9 A. M. to 3 P. M. finds him busy as usual in some one of our schools. The Center Parent Teachers' Association bought a dental chair which was needed very much and greatly appreciated.

Your agent took a course in Public Health and School nursing, given by Professor Baker of Simmons College in February and March, 1936 at the State House, Boston. I also attended the Institute for Public Health Nursing and Contagious diseases in connection with school children for two days. I always take every opportunity to attend such lectures, for the subject matter proves very helpful and interesting. Dr. Archibald of the Department of Public Health visited many times during the year.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MILK INSPECTION DIVISION

December 31, 1936

Board of Health Chelmsford, Mass.

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to present the report of the Milk Inspection Division for the year ending December 31, 1936.

Forty-seven stores were licensed to sell milk; twenty-four dealers to distribute milk; two plants to pasteurize milk; and eight stores were registered to sell oleomargarine.

There were seven hundred seventeen dairy farms listed by dealers as sources of milk supply. Four hundred thirty-six dairy farm inspections were made and scored; forty-five reinspections were necessary; two dairy farms are not approved as yet.

The average daily consumption of milk for 1936 was: 573 quarts of milk—Raw; 1753 quarts of Milk—Pasteurized; 50 quarts of Grade A Milk; 9 quarts of buttermilk; 23 quarts of cream.

The total solids and fats were determined on seven hundred fortynine samples of milk and the fats on thirty-one samples of cream; three hundred thirty-three samples of milk were examined for the bacterial content; the sediment was determined on three hundred eighty-four samples taken from dealers. One hundred seventy-six samples of milk from producers were tested for total solids, fat, and bacterial content.

Sixty-nine dollars and fifty cents, received from license fees, were paid to the Town Treasurer.

INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS REPORT

Board of Selectmen Gentlemen:

The report of the work done by this department during the year 1936 under the direction of the Division of Livestock Disease Control, State Department of Agriculture, follows:

The annual inspection of cattle, sheep and swine ordered during the latter part of the year is now completed and a detailed report has been submitted to the Director of Livestock Disease Control.

There are 200 stables, the same as last year, in which are kept 796 dairy cows, 152 young cattle and 23 bulls, a total of 971 head which is 35 more than last year. There is an increase of 83 dairy cows but a loss of 54 young cattle and an increase of 6 bulls.

West Chelmsford has only 26 cattle in 8 stables and the Westlands 53 cattle in 10 stables.

All cattle in town are regularly tested by State and Federal inspectors and only one cow reacted to the test for tuberculosis.

There are 17 goats, 80 sheep and 776 swine in town.

75 cows, one bull and two heifers for dairy purposes, 19 beef cattle and 107 calves were shipped into town on permits issued by the State authorities. They were identified and released upon proof of satisfactory test charts and certificates showing that they came from herds free from Bangs disease during the year previous to entry into the State.

There were no cases of rabies during the year although 40 dog bite cases have been investigated. 22 dogs were held in quarantine for a period of two weeks observation and then released, the other cases were reported after the danger period had passed or the dogs could not be found and were not quarantined. The heads of two dogs were taken to Boston for examination one of which had been buried for several days and the other killed by the police with permission of the owner. Fortunately both dogs were not rabid although they had savagely attacked and bitten persons.

It appears quite probable that steps will soon be taken by the State and Federal authorities for better control of mastitis and Bangs disease.

Permits are required to bring cattle into Mass. from other states.

The Equipment has been kept in excellent condition and no major replacements or renewals have been needed this year.

A blanket policy of accident insurance covering all the men has given them a great feeling of security and protected the town. Frequent drills have been held and the activities of the different districts coordinated so that the Department might work effectively as a whole.

The Department has responded to 68 alarms of fire and in addition has rendered aid at brush fires and assistance to neighboring cities and towns.

Some repairs are necessary at the Fire Stations located at the East and South villages and arrangements are under way to have these accomplished through the agency of the W. P. A. the cost of material being paid for out of our current appropriation.

Our appreciation is extended to them for the whole hearted cooperation given by the excellent Police Department of our town as well as that of the Lowell Motor Cycle Officer and State Troopers.

REPORT OF WELFARE AGENT

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen:

I respectfully submit my report for the year 1936.

The total cost of Outside Relief and Old Age Assistance expended from our Town appropriation was \$40,693.25. There remained a balance of \$6,068.54 at the end of the fiscal year. These figures do not include administration cost, but are the actual amounts spent on the two divisions of aid.

It is my firm opinion that Outside Relief will gradually decrease from now on, but on the other hand Old Age Assistance is sure to increase.

The citizens of Chelmsford must relaize that the Board of Public Welfare or its agent are powerless to prevent an increase on Old Age Assistance when Federal and State legislation have lessened the eligibility requirements in every respect.

The reimbursements for Outside Relief and Old Age Assistance were \$16,524.88 for the year 1936, and this does not include a State reimbursement of approximately \$6400.00 which for some unknown reason was held up at the State House after the close of the fiscal year.

There were six Towns and Cities on which our Town Counsel instigated suit for welfare aid during the last year and I am glad to report that they have all paid with the exception of one.

During the past year the local Board of Public Welfare was designated as the certifying agency for employment on the Works Progress Administration. This entails a tremendous amount of extra work in keeping records of applications and the sending of notices to the Boston office but there is some satisfaction in being able to place some needy member of a family in employment.

I wish to stress the fact that all parents of needy families should take advantage of the opportunity of placing some son between the ages of seventeen and twenty-eight in the many vacancies there will be in CCC enlistments throughout the year 1937. Each boy who is selected will receive \$30.00 a month of which \$25.00 must be sent home to his parents. The enlistment lasts for six months and the Government clothes, houses, and feeds the enrolled boy during his enlistment. There is no military training at the camp whatsoever.

In viewing the outlook for the present year I would say that all signs point to a reduction in straight relief. In so far as Old Age Assistance is concerned I would like to impress on the minds of our citizens that this is the start of the first year under the set up whereby the Federal Government contributes one-half the total amount up to \$30 monthly and the State two-thirds of the remainder. This means that the Town must carry the State's share (which is approximately two-thirds of the appropriation for Old Age Assistance at our next annual Town meeting) one year in advance.

The net cost of Old Age Assistance is one sixth of the total amount of cash aid rendered but in view of the fact there were 115 cases receiving Old Age Assistance at the end of December, 1936 the financing of this case load must necessarily be heavy for the year 1937.

I take this opportunity to thank the various Town officials for their whole-hearted co-operation, and I wish to especially commend the Board of Welfare for the extra time and effort given during the year 1936.

REPORT OF THE CHELMSFORD W. P. A. FOR 1936

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen Town of Chelmsford, Massachusetts

Honorable Sirs:

As Sponsors Agent for the Town of Chelmsford I hereby submit my report to you and the citizens of Chelmsford showing projects undertaken by the W. P. A. during 1936.

Most important as projects were the drainage of the Westlands section, further improvements at the Varney Playground, and various rescue and reconstruction work made necessary because of the flood of the Merrimack River.

PROJECTS CARRIED ON UNDER W. P. A.

1. DRAINAGE OF WESTLANDS:

Approximately 1500 lineal feet of concrete drain pipe, and 14 catch basins were laid on Woodbine St., Westland Ave., Sunset Ave., Francis St., and Dalton Rd. to carry off surface water which has been a nuisance for years. In reality this drainage work will serve as a trunk system for future extension since the pipe is mostly of 12" and 15" diameter.

Included in the same project and completed at the same time were 1150 feet of 12" pipe and 10 catch basins on Locke Rd. beginning at a point opposite the dwelling of Harry D. Leighton, and ending at a brook which crosses the road near the residence of Frank Garvey.

2. WESTLANDS SCHOOL BALL FIELD:

By cutting trees and brush and pulling stumps this field was enlarged by about 36000 sq. ft. in the rear of the property, and was brought to grade. A supplementary project has been approved by the WPA to build a standard baseball diamond.

3. VARNEY PLAYGROUND:

A muck bank along the shore of Crystal Lake was excavated for a distance of 300 feet, trees were cut, and sand trucked on and spread to make one of the finest bathing beaches in town.

One tennis court was completed with clay surface and wire backstop set on pipe frames. Additional work is to be done on a later project to complete a second tennis court, and loam and seed a part of the baseball field.

4. LOCUST ROAD RECONSTRUCTION:

Now nearing completion this road has been widened from 12 ft., to 18 ft., regraveled to 6" thickness from Byam Road to High Street, a distance

of about ½ mile. Through the gift of Arthur Dutton, and Mrs. Dutton who released a strip of land about 100 feet long by five feet wide, a safer intersection with High Street was provided by moving back a stone wall to widen and straighten Locust Road.

5. FARM TO MARKET ROADS:

During 1936 the widening, graveling and oiling of Dunstable Road was completed for ¾ of a mile; Riverneck Road was given similar treatment for 1½ miles, and is completed except for a short stretch held up for the building of a culvert for Hale's Brook. Any delay encountered on this project has been out of the control of the local people, for the reason that the State Dept. of Public Works is the sponsor.

6. FLOOD EMERGENCY:

On March 20, 1936, the flood of the Merrimack River created a problem for immediate action. The whole force of WPA workers was taken from regular projects and put to work to rescue persons and property as follows: One group was assigned to the police department to guard abandoned homes and assist in rerouting traffic. When the waters subsided, another group was assigned to pump out cellars of which there were 54 flooded. These homes were disinfected, and made habitable.

The City of Lowell being without water called upon Chelmsford for help and the Center Water District, with the aid of WPA workers, connected hose lines on Chelmsford St. from the last hydrant in Town to the first one in Lowell. Through this means two million cubic feet of pure water were supplied to Lowell.

For further repair of damages from the flood, 1½ miles of water mains of the North Chelmsford Fire District had to be repaired, Riverside Cemetery had to be cleaned of driftwood and debris, and the homeless fed 3 meals daily at the North Chelmsford Town Hall. About 140 persons were fed for 11 days.

All of this work was done by the WPA at a cost of \$3247, to the Federal Government.

7. RECONSTRUCTION OF FLOOD DAMAGED ROADS:

Without cost to the Town of Chelmsford for either materials or labor, the WPA made permanent repairs to various Town roads damaged by flood waters or broken up by rerouting traffic. Washed out areas were filled with gravel, and all roads reoiled as follows: Sleeper Street, Cross Street, Wood Street, Old Tyngsboro Road, Holmes Street, School St., Westford St., Granitville Rd., and Richardson Rd. Federal labor and materials used on this project were valued at \$3447.86.

MISCELLANEOUS PROJECTS

ROAD BEAUTIFICATION AND SIDEWALKS:

The State Dept. of Public Works sponsored these projects which were conducted on routes 110 and 3, state roads in Chelmsford.Costs

and supervision of these projects were not under local sponsorship, but our WPA men were given work on these projects as far as possible.

TOWN SURVEY:

This project was completed in December, and the blue print map of the Town of Chelmsford is now available for public distribution with a directory of streets and roads.

INDEXING TOWN RECORDS:

Two persons are still at work to complete an index of Town meetings to prepare transcripts of deeds for the assessors.

WOMEN'S SEWING PROJECT:

An average of 25 women have been given steady employment on this project during 1936 in the making of garments for the needy.

GOVERNMENT COMMISSARY:

In the Center Town Hall the Government has provided a commissary which has been operated during the year, and stocked with surplus commodities of food and clothing which were distributed free. About one-third was given to welfare persons and two-thirds to workers on the WPA.

MOTH PROJECT:

The South section of the Town of about 400 acres bordering along Carlisle and Westford were cleaned of Brown Tail and Gypsy moths. However there is one section in this vicinity of Baptist Pond where stripping of trees of foliage by moths has occurred, and this project should be reopened and this area of about 4 acres sprayed.

I sumbit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the Town of Chelmsford for the period from June 17, 1934, to June 25, 1936, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Herman B. Dine, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the accounts of the town of Chelmsford for the period from June 17, 1934, the date of the previous audit, to June 25, 1936, the following report being submitted thereon:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing town funds or committing bills for collection, were examined and reconciled with the books and records of the town accountant.

The books and accounts of the town accountant were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were checked with the treasurer's books and departmental records, while the recorded payments were compared with the treasury warrants and the treasurer's books.

The appropriation accounts were examined and all appropriations and transfers as recorded were checked with the town clerk's record of town meetings.

The ledger was analyzed, the necessary adjustments resulting from the audit were made, a trial balance was drawn off, proving the ledger to be in balance, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of June 25, 1936.

In checking the payments against the appropriations, several over-drawn accounts were noted. To incur liabilities in excess of appropriations voted by the town is contrary to the provisions of Section 31, Chapter 44, General Laws.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the records in the several departments collecting money for the town, with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, and with the records of the town accountant. The payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds and with the accountant's ledger accounts.

The cash book additions were verified and the cash balance on June 25, 1936, was verified by actual count of cash in the office and by a reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit.

The payments on account of debt and interest matured during the period audited were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities and coupons on file.

The savings bank books representing the investment of the several trust funds in the custody of the town treasurer, the treasurer of the library trustees, and the treasurer of the insurance fund commissioners, were personally examined. The income was proved and the disbursements were verified.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked in detail. The commitments were verified and compared with the assessors' warrants for their collection, the recorded collections were checked with the payments to the treasurer as shown by the treasurer's and accountant's books, the recorded abatements were proved with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the taxes transferred to the tax title account were compared with the treasurer's and the accountant's records, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the accountant's ledger.

The accounts of the tax collector, as collector for the North Chelmsford Fire District and the East Chelmsford Water District, were examined and checked in detail, and the payments to the treasurer were checked with the amounts entered on the treasurer's cash book.

Verification of the outstanding tax accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as

owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that the outstanding accounts, as listed, are correct.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined and checked with the tax books and the deeds on file.

The town clerk's records of town meeting votes were examined and the appropriations and transfers as recorded were checked with the accountant's ledger.

The town clerk's records of dog and sporting licenses issued were examined, and the payments to the town treasurer and to the Division of Fisheries and Game were verified.

The surety bonds on file for the town officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the accounts of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined and checked to the treasurer's and the accountant's books.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, together with schedules showing the condition and transactions of the several trust funds.

For the co-operation extended by the various town officials during the progress of the aduit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Chelmsford:

In order that you may be kept informed of the condition of your public schools and of the best methods of securing their efficiency and improvement, this committee annually makes a report of the conduct of the town schools. This report consists of a statement by this committee; a detailed report by the superintendent of schools; a report by the principal of the high school; a report by the supervisor of music and a report by the school nurse. Some subjects have been reported in greater detail in other annual reports of this committee and we suggest that the school reports of recent years be considered in connection with this report.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

There follows a statement of the amount appropriated by the Town and expended for school purposes in the year 1936:

Each year there is paid to the Town of Chelmsford by the State Treasurer, out of the proceeds of the tax on incomes, an amount of money which is determined in part by the number of teachers the Town employs and the salaries paid to them. The Town receives \$200 for each teacher in full service for the entire school year who receives a salary of not less than \$950.00; \$150.00 for each teacher so employed who receives a salary of not less than \$850.00; and \$100.00 for each teacher not included in either of the foregoing classes. The balance of the sum so paid to the Town out of the tax on incomes is determined by the ratio between our proportionate part of the state tax and the number of pupils in the Chelmsford schools.

This year the Town received from the state income tax, as cash or credit on the school account, the sum of \$15,575.00. The Town also received on the school account \$3,722.06 for tuition of state wards; the Town received on the school account for tuition from other towns, the amount of \$938.08. After these three items are deducted from the whole amount of school expenditures for 1936, the balance will represent the net cost of the schools to the Town of Chelmsford; or stated another

way, the net amount of money which was paid from local taxes in 1936 for school purposes. These figures may be summarized as follows:

ENROLLMENT

On October 1, 1936, the school enrollment was as follows:

G., 1; making a total of 1193 pupils in the grades and 434 in the high school, 1627 pupils in all. This total is twelve less that the total enrollment for 1935 when we had 1639 pupils; in 1934 the total enrollment was 1650; in 1933, 1647; in 1932, 1634; in 1931, 1572; in 1930, 1487.

The cost of educating each pupil in our schools may be determined by dividing the whole amount of school expenditures by the number of pupils in the schools.

The Massachusetts department of education does this same thing in a more complicated and exact way by figuring absences, resignations and withdrawals to get what they call the number of pupils in net average membership. On such a basis for the year ending June 30, 1936, the state department of education determines the cost per pupil in net average membership in Chelmsford to be \$64.85.

In making its survey, the department places Chelmsford in a group of 82 towns in the Commonwealth. Chelmsford ranks No. 78 in that group. That is, there are 77 Massachusetts town in group II that have a higher cost per pupil than Chelmsford and four towns that have a lower cost per pupil. The figures range from \$149.71 for Brookline to \$62.33 for Saugus which is the lowest cost per pupil of any town in group II. The cost per pupil in some of our neighboring towns is as follows:

The credit for the thrifty administration of schools in Chelmsford goes to all the committees and superintendents who have served the town over a long period of years.

OUR RESPONSIBILITY

The great trust which is reposed in this committee is not a financial one, but is rather the obligation and responsibility of developing to worthy maturity the children of this town. This trust the committee cannot fulfill alone, it is rather carried out by our superintendent and teachers who labor daily in training the minds and developing the characters of all the pupils of our schools. But all of these together, executives, administrators and teachers, would make little headway without the constant cooperation of the parents. Parents, teachers, superintendent and committee members together are responsible for the education of thse boys and girls of Chelmsford. This is no idle task but is a heavy responsibility, to be carried out in the knowledge that we are preparing these boys and girls for life in a world that moves and changes rapidly. It is our duty to train them to live and to work; to lead orderly, efficient and happy lives. Most of these children will complete their scholastic training in Chelmsford. Most of them depend entirely on us for their training, and it is our responsibility to give them the training they need and of which they are most worthy.

APPRECIATION

We wish to add a word of thanks in grateful appreciation of the efforts of all who had a part, large or small, in the operation of our schools last year. We need and welcome every assistance from every source, and we ask for your continued kindness and cooperation.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Committee:

This is my ninth report to you and to the citizens of Chelmsford. Each year the attempt is made to avoid repeating the substance of earlier reports. Readers who desire a detailed study of school costs in Chelmsford are referred to the reports of 1930, 1934, and 1935. Except in showing the cost of material for W. P. A. work in the schools and the use of the \$2000 special appropriation, this report will not deal with school finances.

There is little change in our expenditures from year to year. The cost per pupil in net average membership, as reported in the last report of the Department of Education, is \$64.85. Very few towns in the state have so low a cost. The state average is \$96.41, and the average in the 83 towns of group II (over 5000 population) is \$86.78.

TEACHERS

In December 1934 Miss Louise Cummings, Miss Gladys G. Mooney, and Miss Hazel R. Young, who had been on the list of permanent substitutes in Lowell for several years, were notified that they would be assigned to positions in Lowell in January. Miss Esther M. Thayer, a graduate of Keene Normal School, who had had three years of experience in junior high school grades, was chosen for the 7th and 8th grade position in the McFarlin School. Miss Veronica McTeague, a graduate of Lowell Teachers College, was given the 1st and 2nd grade position in South Chelmsford. Miss Jane McEnaney was transferred from the Quessy school to East Chelmsford, and Miss Alice P. McEnaney, a graduate of Lowell Teachers College, was elected to the 1st and 2nd grades at Quessy.

In August Mr. Harry J. Kane, principal of the Highland Ave. School since 1929, submitted his resignation in order to accept a position in a junior high school in Natick. Mr. Gerald A. Ivers was transferred from the 8th grade at Princeton St. to the Highland Ave. position, and Miss Isabell M. Doyle, a graduate of Boston University, was elected to the Princeton St. 8th grade.

In connection with these changes it should be noted that each one of these four teachers had served the schools of Chelmsford successfully for several years. Their resignations were received with regret. In each case the new position offered paid a substantially higher salary.

A study of the registration for the High School showed conclusively that the commercial department would require the services of

a third teacher, and also that a larger room would be required for typewriting. Miss Catherine W. Mooney, a graduate of Salem Teachers College, was secured for the additional teacher. The report of Mr. Burns shows the growth of this department.

One other resignation was received in 1936 which merits more than passing notice. Miss Bertha H. Long began service in West Chelmsford in the upper grades of the two-room school which stood in front of the present building. This was in April 1896. In January 1905 the school moved into the present building, and became a three-teacher school. Miss Long had the upper grades. Later a fourth teacher was added to the school, and Miss Long was made principal. At various times she had grades from the 5th through the 9th. About 1925 the school committee began engaging young men for grammar school principalships, since which time Miss Long has had the 5th and 6th grades. Her retirement for reasons of health brings a deep feeling of regret to the families whom she has served so long and so faithfully. Such teachers cannot immediately be replaced; they have grown into the very warp and woof of the community. Chelmsford has been fortunate in the number of teachers of this type who have given their full time of active life to her children. All honor to them while in service, and all happiness and peace during their years of well-earned rest.

REPAIRS BY W. P. A. IN 1936

Full advantage was taken in 1936 of the offer of W. P. A. labor for repairs on school buildings, both interior and exterior work being done. Interior work necessitates some loss of school time. In the Old Building at Princeton St. this averaged four and one-half days to the room. In this building all stair treads were renewed, one weak floor was strengthened by pulling floor timbers back into place with tie-rods, two storage closets for books and supplies were provided, the belfry was repaired and bell-frame rebuilt, many clapboards were replaced, doors either rebuilt or replaced, and bulletin boards placed over the blackboards. Plastering was repaired, and then the building inside and out was given two coats of paint. Considering its age, this building is now in very good condition. It can never be brought up to accepted standards. For one thing the rooms have windows on opposite sides, producing the injurious effect of cross-lighting. The floors are in bad condition, due to long years of use. Taking up desks and relaying floors could hardly be done except in the summer vacation.

The New Building at Princeton St. was in better condition so far as the interior was concerned. Some stair treads were renewed, window sash repaired or replaced, the plastering was patched as necessary and the ceilings calcimined. On the outside many clapboards were replaced, and new doors hung at both ends of the building. In the rear the entrances to the boys' and the girls' basements were enclosed and covered. These had previously been both cold and dangerous. The front steps and entrance were repaired to keep water out of the coal pocket underneath. For several years every workman who had had

occasion to go onto the roof had reported the ornamental cupola to be in a very weak condition, being held in place only by the rods which tied it to the rafters. There was possibility of a high wind ripping it off the building, with danger to both life and property. It seemed wise to remove this altogether, instead of repairing it, and to close up the roof opening smoothly except for a new skylight. This building was also given two coats of paint on the outside. The interior is in fair condition.

At South Chelmsford the wood work was repaired and sheathing put on in halls and stairways. Then the plastering was repaired and the interior painted one coat.

At the Westlands the ceilings were calcimined. The walls and woodwork generally are in excellent condition.

At East Chelmsford the attic had never been cleaned up thoroughly after the fire of 1928. At one end the rafters and roof boards were badly charred, constituting in the opinion of insurance inspectors a fire hazard. A lower rate was offered if the rafters and boards were scraped and treated, and if the cupola were screened to prevent sparks entering. This was done, and with the P. W. A. work of the previous year that building is now in good condition.

The labor cost of these repairs was handled by the W. P. A. Material cost as follows: paint, varnish, etc., \$566.44; lumber, \$791.24; hardware, \$88.93; slate, \$26.64; a total of \$1,473.25. Of this amount \$825 was paid in 1935.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS

A few facts taken from the History of Chelmsford may be an interesting introduction to a description of the present buildings. The first school master was appointed in 1696. His work was probably with older boys who wished to prepare for Harvard. There was no school house, this first "grammar school" being held in rotation in homes in different parts of the town. The first school house was built in 1718 on ground furnished by the town, but the cost of the building was met by private subscription. Later this building was replaced by the brick building in Forefathers Cemetery now used as a tool house. The first appropriation of public funds for building school houses was in 1794, when the sum of 250 pounds was voted. This amount, perhaps increased by private subscription, provided in 1800 twelve district schools, two of which were in the present limits of Lowell and one probably in Carlisle. A little later the "grammar school" was discontinued. In 1825 the Chelmsford Classical School was established in the Center, held in a house which is a part of the Baptist parsonage on Academy St. It had a brief existence, but names of men eminent in the literary and political life of the XIXth century are associated with it.

The town report for 1877-78 shows a two-room school at the Cen-

ter, a three-room at North Chelmsford, a two-room at the West, with six one-room schools. There were 430 pupils in attendance in the fall of 1877. The present Old Building at Princeton St. housed the three schools of 1877. It was a two-room building at first, to which the two rear rooms were added at some time previous to 1877. The two front rooms measure 31 ft. by 36 ft.; the two rear rooms 28 ft. by 29 ft.

In the forty years from 1850 to 1890 the population of the town increased from 2,097 to 2,695. The next twenty years are the period of the most rapid growth, from 2,695 to 5,010, almost 86%. Naturally school accomodations were increased during these years. In 1899 \$3,550 was appropriated for the site of a new building in North Chelmsford, and \$10,700 for the building. This is the so-called New Building on Princeton St. It has four classrooms, approximately 28 ft. by 31 ft.

In 1903 an appropriation of \$5000 was made for a site and a new two-room building in East Chelmsford. From the record the building itself seems to have cost \$6,248. It consisted of the two rear rooms of the present building, 28 ft. by 32 ft. in size.

On May 21, 1904, \$10,000 was appropriated for the construction of the school we know as the Corp. George R. Quessy School in West Chelmsford. It was built in the rear of the older two-room school, and was occupied in January 1905, when three rooms were used. The building has four rooms, approximately 26 ft. by 30 ft.

The needs of South Chelmsford were met next, by an appropriation of \$6,500 in 1908. The building has two rooms, 24 ft. by 28 ft.

From 1908 on the school reports emphasize the urgent need of increased school accomodations both at North Chelmsford and at the Center. In both villages the high school departments were using rooms in the lower town halls, and enrollements were growing each year. After considerable delay an appropriation of \$1650 was made in 1910 for the lot on which the Highland Ave. School stands, and \$13,500 for the building. It has four rooms, 24 ft. by 30 ft.

The disadvantages, financial and otherwise, of the town's maintaining two high schools are discussed in the reports from about 1910. An appropriation of \$4,500 was made for a site of a new High School in the Center on Sept. 29, 1913, and on Feb. 7, 1916 one of \$65,000 was made for the building. The building was first used in the fall of 1917, when the enrollment was 161. The building has on the first floor two rooms approximately 24 ft. by 29 ft., three rooms 20 ft. by 24 ft., a small principal's office and a small teachers' room; on the second floor are two rooms 24 ft. by 29 ft., two rooms 20 ft. by 24 ft., and one room, used as a study hall, 20 ft. by 59 ft. In the basement are two rooms 20 ft. by 26 ft., used for classrooms, and two rooms 26 ft. by 29 ft., used as locker rooms. The heating and ventilating is by forced draft system several fans being used. The toilet rooms are on the first and second floors.

An appropriation of \$3000 was made for the site of a new school in the Westlands on June 11, 1920, and the town voted \$50,000 for the building on Feb. 14, 1921. There was an unexpended balance of \$4,679.19. The building has four rooms measuring 21 ft. by 28 ft.

In 1923 the twenty-year-old building in East Chelmsford was overcrowded, and on July 2nd \$20,000 was voted for converting the one and one-half story building into a two and one-half story building with two additional rooms. This plan was found not feasible, and on August 13, 1923, a request was made for \$35,000 additional, with which to construct an addition of four rooms. This request was denied, but on Feb. 11, 1924 \$10,000 additional was voted. Two rooms were added in front of the former building, with new toilet rooms. These rooms are 28 ft. by 31 ft., and are connected by sliding doors which can be pushed back so as to convert the two classrooms into one large room for community purposes. The school desks are of the movable type.

Finally, on Feb. 9, 1925, it was voted to build a new twelve-room building at the Center and to discontinue use of the old grade building on North Road. For this purpose \$140,000 was voted, to include the cost of the site, \$4,875. Four rooms are 22 ft. by 30 ft., and eight are 21 ft. by 30 ft. There is a play-room in the basement, used as such by the pupils of the McFarlin School in inclement weather, used by the High School as an assembly room and for basket ball (although it has two iron posts in the court), used as a lunch room by both schools, used by both schools for rehearsals and for special purposes of all kinds. There is little of the school day when this room is not occupied, although it is very poorly adapted to many of its uses.

Attention is called to the size of the rooms in our buildings. Old buildings everywhere have large rooms. Aisles are 18 to 24 inches. The rooms will hold 40 desks without seeming to be crowded. About 1920 college departments of education and school authorities began a study of school housing in order to set standards which would tend both to economy in construction and efficiency in school work. One result was to define a "standard classroom" for elementary schools as one 22 ft. by 28 or 30 ft., with positive requirements for lighting, heating, and ventilating. Such a room will hold 35 desks without crowding, with aisles of 16 or 18 inches, and 40 desks can be set in. No elementary classroom should contain more than 40 pupils.

When the number of pupils given a teacher is in excess of 40 a situation is created which is fair neither to the pupils nor to the teacher. We have been tolerating such situations during the last few years, but with the coming of better times we may hope that the voters will provide means by which these crowded rooms may be avoided.

THE SPECIAL APPROPRIATION

The last annual meeting voted \$2000 for the general purpose of fitting a part of the McFarlin School for use by the High School. The 3d and 4th grade rooms were moved from the first floor to the second, so that the High School might have the two rooms most conveniently located, reached by the entrance and stairway in the rear of the Mc-

Farlin School. The walk between the buildings was extended and re paired at a cost of \$276.18. Additional desks of high school size cost \$890.60. Moving desks, putting up blackboards, sound-proofing partition, \$133.83. Enclosing the kitchen in the basement, \$301.90. Building seats in the basement for assembly purposes, \$215.26. Additional tables and benches, \$58.75. Total, \$1876.52

The use of these two rooms in the McFarlin School, together with the additional teacher, has relieved somewhat the over-crowding in the High School classrooms. It has not been necessary this year to use loose chairs in the rooms, but some rooms are still filled above the standard set by state regulations. There are a number of marked disadvantages in the use of McFarlin classrooms by the High School. Perhaps the least of these is the loss of school time and inconvenience caused by classes every forty-five minutes passing from one building to the other, although in bad weather this is a danger to health. A greater detriment to orderly school work is the noise which is unavoidable in the passing of classes, in the use of the basement by either school while the other school is in session, and in the noise about the building during grade recess periods. The teachers, both High School and grade, are working under a tremendous handicap due to unavoidable conditions. We accepted the refusal of the voters to provide the addition to the High School and their readiness to vote the special appropriation asked for as indicating their desire to have full use made of all possible facilities in the McFarlin School. The arrangement, however, is very far from ideal, and in the interests of both elementary pupils and high school students steps should be taken as early as is reasonably possible to provide the High School with all necessary rooms in its own building.

ENROLLMENT

Attention is called to the tables showing enrollment by buildings on October 1, 1936 and the comparative enrollment for the last ten years. Note that the peak of elementary enrollment was reached in 1933, when it was 1265; in high school in 1935, when it was 436; and in all schools in 1934, when it was 1650. Elementary enrollment dropped to 1193 this year, and the High School had on October 1st 434 students. Enrollment in the four upper grades is large, and unless many more than the usual number drop out of High School during the next year or two that school will be somewhat larger. Could we divide the 1193 elementary pupils evenly among the 36 elementary classrooms there would be 33 pupils to a teacher, an ideal number. Obviously such an even division will never be possible. In two schools the situation next year will be difficult.

At East Chelmsford the enrollment has grown from 133 in 1930 to 170 this year. Three of the four rooms have over 40 pupils each. Provided the same families send pupils to that school next September each room will have over 40, and apparently that room enrollment will

exist for several years. This is assuming there is no change in population in that part of the town. But some building is being done, and it seems probable that East Chelmsford will grow, due to several factors. It is on a state road, is near Lowell, and now has a water supply. If there is only a slight increase in pupil enrollment the need of more room will become urgent. Possibly the town would have been wise in 1923 if the four-room addition had been made.

In the Westlands the 7th and 8th grade room next September will apparently have over 40 pupils. It is doubtful whether it will be physically possible to seat in that small room all who will be entitled to be in those grades. A few years ago a similar situation was met by requiring all pupils on Golden Cove Road to attend the McFarlin School, which they continue to do. It is not easy to see how the problem can be solved next year. Provided the population of the town con tinues to increase it would seem that added school accomodations will in time be needed in three places, East Chelmsford, the Westlands and the High School. I would suggest that voters keep these three principls in mind in planning new schools or enlarging old ones.

- 1. Build for permanence. A school building is subjected to hard usage. Re pair bills can be kept down by building solidly at the start.
- 2. Anticipate as wisely as possible future needs. Generally speaking school building have proved too small within ten or fifteen years of use especially in suburban towns.
- 3. Always plan so that additions can easily be made in the future. This will be possible in the case of the McFarlin School, but not easy at East Chelmsford or the Westlands.

The report of 1905 gives the names of the graduates of the two high schools up to that time. The first class to graduate at the North was in 1879 and had three members. There were 108 graduates up to 1904. At the Center the first class was in 1888 and numbered thirteen. The names of 89 graduates are given. The school department does not have a complete list of the graduates of these two schools from 1905 to the opening of the present school. The compiling of such a record, and also the writting up of the old school houses which were discontinued as the present ones were built, would constitute a valuable appendix to the History of Chelmsford.

There are 596 pupils being transported this year, 285 to the High School, 145 to McFarlin, 71 to Princeton St., 63 to Quessy, and 32 to South. The multiple-trip system in use, each bus making three or four trips, provides transportation at low cost compared to what many other towns pay, but has the disadvantage of bringing some pupils to school buildings long before school starts and of keeping others at school till some time after the hour of closing. I refer you to the report of Mr. Burns for our solution of the problem of the safe loading of the high school busses in the afternoon.

Many outside of the school department render valuable service each year. The Parent-Teacher Associations provide equipment we could not buy, arrange and supervise school lunches, etc. Leaders of Boy and Girl Scouts and of 4-H Clubs give training to groups of pupils which is of great worth. Bus drivers give assistance beyond their routine work, the Police Department gives special services. Cadet teachers from the Teachers Colleges aid in some rooms. Students in the commercial department do such clerical work as is possible. To all these and other citizens who have given time and energy, and especially to you, the members of the School Committee, I give in behalf of pupils and teachers our hearty thanks.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

January 22, 1937.

Mr. George S. Wright Superintendent of Schools Chelmsford, Massachusetts

My dear Mr. Wright:

This is my seventh annual report as principal of Chelmsford High School.

There were 201 boys and 215 girls enrolled in September 1936. Since September 15 boys have entered, 15 boys have left, 15 girls have entered and 8 girls have left, making a total enrollment of 446 up to January 1, 1937. This is one less than last year at the same time.

There are 150 pupils enrolled in the classical curriculum, 176 enrolled in the commercial curriculum and 97 enrolled in the general curriculum.

There are twenty-four more pupils enrolled in the commercial curriculum this year than last. This, with the steady increase in the growth of the commercial enrollment during recent years makes it advisable to use room five (one of the largest rooms in the building) for the typewriting room. Also, an additional commercial teacher was elected to the high school faculty this year. Three classes of commercial English have been added to the program of studies.

One more room in the McFarlin School is being used by the high school. With practically the same enrollment, one more teacher and the use of this extra room, the classes are a little smaller than last year.

This year a change was made in loading the busses. With the increased traffic over Billerica Road and the greater number of high school pupils being transported, it seemed advisable not to load on Billerica Road. During the fall all busses were loaded on the playground near the McFarlin School. At the present time high school pupils are getting on the busses in the drive in front of the high school building. This arrangement makes it possible for pupils to wait inside. There is no danger from traffic in loading and there is very little opportunity of getting wet or cold while waiting for or getting on the bus.

Each member of the faculty stays for at least two afternoon sessions (from 2:30-3:45) each week to help pupils who for any reason need assistance in their work. Most parents co-operate with the school in having their children present at these afternoon sessions. When this is done there is small chance for failure. Those pupils who fail do so because of lack of effort on their part.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

Dear Sir:

In this trend of modern education where teaching is defined as guidance in learning, we wish to enable the child to adjust himself more sympathetically to his environment. School music today is more than a restricted study of song material through the sight reading approach. Song material must remain the core of the elementry course, but the need of a broader presentation has emerged from the demands of time. Thus the purpose of public music is to help the child find joy in living. It presents to him the spirit of play and opens the imaginative world that he finds so delightful.

The children learn the simple songs, beautiful in melody, with swinging rhythm that appeal to all. In instrumental music as well as in song material, they recognize the rhythms, respond to them, and discover the mood that the music expresses.

Sight reading is started in the second grade and is continued in part throughout the entire course, taking the technicalities as the need arises.

In the Junior High, three part music is sung, and where a piano is available, unison songs are also used. A more extensive study is being made of folk music, dances, and instruments.

In the High School music classes the Gilbert and Sullivan operetta "Pinafore" is being studied. This is a minor classic and should contribute much to the social development of the student. The orchestra meets once a week for rehearsals with two new members this term. They have been faithful, and play selections intended for a much larger orchestra. The girls glee club, consisting of twenty-five members, meets once a week for rehearsal, and has enjoyed social times during the year. Both glee club and orchestra have appeared before the High School assemblies.

The school physicians, Dr. Arthur Scoboria and Dr. Ernest Latham, assisted by the nurse, completed the physical examinations of high school and grammar school pupils in November. Candidates for athletic teams were given thorough physical examinations before the sport season opened. All pupils have been weighed and measured, the underweights checked, and milk suggested or given to those who could not afford to pay for it.

Dr. Bernard Ritter, has done most commendable dental work in town for the past seven and one-half years that he has been with us. He is to be found in some one of our schools from 9 A. M. to 3 P. M. every Wednesday during the school year. The Parent-Teacher Associations in all parts of town give money to pay for necessary dental work for children who cannot afford corrections even at the existing reduced rates.

Our immunization clinics against diphtheria are held every spring and fall. In 1935 for the first time in Chelmsford, diphtheria toxoid was given to children under 12 years and over 6 months of age. This group does not require the Schick test, but we had several pupils and two teachers who received the toxin anti-toxin in October, 1935, and were given the test in May, 1936—all were immune from diphtheria. In October, 1936, we gave the diphtheria toxoid to 26 children over 6 months and under 5 years of age, to 122 under 9 years, to 15 under 14 years, to 4 under twenty years, and to three teachers; all pupils over twelve, and the teachers, received the toxin anti-toxin and will have the Schick test in the spring, 1937. Total receiving toxoid—148; toxin antitoxin—22. More than ever we urge all mothers who have children over 6 months of age to bring their children in the spring to the clinic which is to be held at the Center town hall. A notice will be in the Courier Citizen a week previous and we always announce the date in the schools. In checking up on my pupils in the fall, I found only 42 in the elementary schools who were not immunized and schicked, as some of these children came from other schools.

There are fourteen rooms having 100% immunization; our State

health officer says we have one of the best immunized towns in the State. There was only one case of diphtheria in town this year—an adult who had never been immunized or schicked.

In October, Dr. William Martin, formerly connected with the State

Department of Public Health, at present the County school clinic doctor, gave the tuberculin test to pupils of the seventh, ninth, and eleventh grades with the approval of the School Department and Board of Health. This insures a child of at least three examinations with X-ray of the chest before graduating from high school. Clinics are held in the school buildings, but no child is examined without a written request from the parents or guardian. We contacted new cases in lower grades, of children whose parents are either confined to a sanitorium or at home.

We carry over several pupils, mostly underweights, who have been examined by the State in previous years; these are weighed and measured every three months and at the end of the year reports are sent into the State. The children are then examined by the doctor and discharged with instruction in regard to diet, and rest, providing they are in good physical condition.

A nurse is not allowed to diagnose a case, therefore a diagnosis must come from a physician; no record attendance is worth the risk of infectious diseases in school! Any child who has a cold, no matter how slight, should remain away from school, be kept in bed for at least two days, and should be seen by the family physician. Nearly all children's diseases, such as measles, whooping cough, scarlet fever, begin with symptoms which suggest a common cold. I have had difficulty in making parents realize that not only the health of their own child, but also that of all the other pupils is at stake when a cold is not treated AT HOME. A certificate from the family physician is needed for re-admittance to school after absences of five days or more. When a contagious disease is found in a school the child is excluded at once, taken home and advised to get a physician immediately. The house is carded after the diagnosis by the doctor, instruction given with regards to care of sick patient, room, bed, linen, dishes, etc. Books belonging to the school or library are fumigated and returned to the same; in a severe case, the books are destroyed. Children who have been exposed to contagion are excluded from school for at least seven days and must continue to live away from home to return to school

after an examination by the family physician. The school doctors immediately examine all pupils in a room where a contagious disease has been found, and exclude any child about whom there is a question. When there is an epidemic in the nearby cities or towns please keep the children away from theaters and large gatherings of any kind; you will find that it will be instrumental in solving our problems. We had a large amount of contagious diseases last year, but this was not limited to our town alone, for the entire State had similar difficulties. One physician remarked that it was a wonder we did not have many more cases, as some of our townspeople visited homes where there were contagious diseases. So far as I can see, there is no way to cope with this situation other than by trying to impress upon parents the importance to themselves and the community of helping to curb the spread of disease.

During 1936 free milk, sandwiches, cocoa and soups were served to needy grammar school and high school pupils amounting to \$106.30. Hot lunches, soups, cocoa, and sandwiches are served in all schools except East and the Westlands, for in the latter the children can get home to lunch. I know that parents must realize how splendid it is for the pupils to be able to procure hot lunches at a very little cost in most of the schools. The Parent-Teachers Associations in all parts of town also gave money for milk for needy children to drink at recess. I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who donated in any way at Thanksgiving and Christmas time through me:-baskets from the Girl Scouts, Police Department, Lions' Club, Unitarian Church; sums of money from the Thanksgiving Union Service collection, Unitarian Church candlelight service, and the Garden Club. The Garden Club, Girl Scouts, and Unitarian Church gave many toys which made many youthful hearts more joyful on Christmas day. Besides the baskets the Police Department gave 50 gallons of oil, shoes, stockings, rubbers, and children's underwear.

In February and March I took a course in school nursing and Public Health nursing which was given at the State House by Professor Baker of Simmons College. I also attended a nurses' institute at the Teachers' College, Fitchburg for two days in November, the lectures being on Public Health nursing and contagious diseases in connection with school children. I always take every opportunity to attend such lectures, for the subject matter proves most helpful and interesting. Miss Martin, our State consultant visited many times during the year.

Again, I wish to thank everyone for the sincere co-operation and kind assistance tendered me during the entire year.
