





ARTICLE 2.

To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray Town charges for the current year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3.

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town; and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 5.

To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account a sum not exceeding Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee, as provided in General Laws, Chapter 40. Section 6. or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum with which to meet unpaid bills of previous years; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 7.

To see if the Town will vote to use the following lots of land, now owned by the Town, or any part of them, for the purpose of forest conservation under the Town Forest Act as provided in General Laws; Chapter 132, Section 35 as adopted by the Town at its Annual Meeting February 8, 1926.

The R. Hodgman Lot, off Concord Road, 24 acres; The A. Hodgman Lot, off Concord Road, 14 acres; The Gage Estate Lot, off Mill Road, 60 acres; The Gage Estate Lot, off Mill Road, 10 acres; The Town Farm Wood Lot, Turnpike and Mill Road, 34 acres;

The Town Dump Lot, on Swain Road, 17 acres; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 8.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600), or some other sum, for the purpose of enlarging, remodeling and equipping the kitchen in the Lower Town Hall; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thirty-five and 48/100 Dollars (\$235.48) to complete the Town's share of the cost of the addition to the High School; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Forty-seven Dollars (\$547), or some other sum, to purchase equipment to im-

prove the fire protection at the High School; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of FourHundred Fifty Dollars (\$450), or some other sum, for the purpose of purchasing an automobile for the Police Department, said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12.

In the event of an affirmative vote under Article 11, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer, by a good and sufficient Bill of Sale, title to the Plymouth Automobile now used by the Police Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$450), or some other sum, for the purpose of purchasing a radio to be used in the police car; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of carrying on Federal and State projects, the cost of administration, and the cost of materials and supplies for the same or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of purchasing a flag for use in the Centre Village; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16.

To see if the Town will vote to purchase a certain parcel of land adjacent to the High School, the premises being known as the Donohoe land; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to reimburse the Chief of Police for his liability, while in the pursuance of his duty, on a judgment procured against him in a Court of Law; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18.

. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to defray the expense of the prosecution and defense of certain legal actions against the Town and the Chief of Police; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 19.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800), for the reconstruction of the Lowell Road, contingent upon the State and County contributing to the cost of said reconstruction; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 20.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-five Hundred Dollars (\$3500) for the reconstruction of the Boston Road, contingent upon the State and County contributing towards the cost of said reconstruction; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 21.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-five Hundred Dollars (\$3500) for the reconstruction of the North Road, contingent upon the State and County contributing towards the cost of said reconstruction; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 22.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900), or some other sum, for the purpose of defraying the cost of foreclosing tax titles; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 23.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Assessors to use a sum of money in the amount such as the Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation of the Commonwealth may approve as free cash, said sum of money to be applied in determining the tax rate for the year 1941; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 24.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of purchasing an automobile truck or trucks for the use of the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 25.

In the event of an affirmative vote under Article 24, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer by a good and sufficient Bill of Sale, title to either the Ford Truck, the International Truck, or both that are now used in the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 26.

To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Moderator to appoint a Committee of six persons to confer with the Lowell Electric Light Corporation for the purpose of procuring a decrease in the light and power rates in Chelmsford, and also to investigate the advisability of establishing a Town Power and Light Company; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 27.

To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following By-Law; That the Super-intendent of Streets be elected by a vote for a term of three years; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 28.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200), or some other sum, to be added to the existing fund already created which is to be used for paying claims made against the Town for personal injuries; or act in relation thereto.

Selectmen, as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk.

Under Article 8.

It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for the purpose of reconstructing the extension of Sylvan Ave.

Under Article 9.

It was voted to accept C Street as laid out by the Selectmen, as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk.

Under Article 10.

It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the purpose of reconstructing C Street.

Under Article 11.

It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of 10.00 for the purpose of cleaning up hurricane damage on Town land on Manning Road.

Under Article 12.

It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for the purpose of locating and bounding the precinct lines between precinct six (6) and precinct one (1), as asked for by the Board of Registrars of Voters.

Under Article 13.

It was voted in accordance with Chapter 41, Section 1, of the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and any amendments thereto, to make the term of office of the Town Treasurer-Collector of Taxes, three years; the same to be effective at the Annual Town election in the year 1942; and in accordance with Chapter 41, Section 1 of said General Laws, as amended by Chapter 3 of the Acts of 1939, to make the term of office of the Tree Warden, three years, the same to be effective at the annual Town election in the year 1942.

Under Article 14.

It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$49,800.00 for constructing and originally equipping and furnishing an addition to the Westland School, and remodeling and repairing said school; \$5,000.00 of said appropriation to be for remodeling and repairing said building; and to meet said appropriation, \$6,800.00 shall be included in the tax levy of the current year, and the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow, \$43,000.00 and to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. Said Bonds or Notes shall be due and payable in not more than eight years.

And that the Committee appointed at the last annual town meeting to secure plans and specifications together with the School Committee be authorized and empowered to secure and let contracts for the completion of the building, and to Have full control and supervision of the same.



REPORT OF THE CHELMSFORD TOWN FOREST COMMITTEE.

The Chelmsford Town Forest Committee since setting aside of lands for this purpose in the Town at the last annual town meeting has met with H.O.Cook, Director of the Division of Forestry in the Department of Conservation for State of Massachusetts and have gone over these lands.

The recommendations of Mr. Cook are as follows:

- 1-There should in some of these lands be made available through opening up old wood roads passage for fire fighting apparatus so that the forest land would be more accessible in case of fire.
- 2-The area which includes the Town Dump should have a strip of ploughed ground surrounding the dump to prevent fire which frequently occurs in this spot from spreading to adjoining lands.
- 3-The Gage lot of some 75 acres would lend itself best to forestry activities inasmuch as there is quite a number of small seedling pines comingup in this area but which are being smothered by the growth of weed trees about them. This condition could be remedied at small expense by freeing these trees of the weed growth around then andthen as these small pines catch on the areas whereseedlings are not present could be spot planted to eventually make a good stand of pine.

With our country using two billion cubic feet of timber each year, more than we are producing ,if any thought is to be given to the needs of succeeding generations, we must try to do our small part by at least conserving with a little help by man that which we already have and which in growth is playing a loosing game among weed trees of little value.

REPORT OF FOREST WARDEN

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen; Chelmsford. Mass.

January 5th 1942.

The annual report of the Forest Warden for 1941 is as follows:

The year just passed produced the most unusual and dangerous fire conditions in our wooded areas, being very dry as well as very windy throughout, from the day of the first fire on March 6th until the last on December 23rd.

Of the 173 fires occuring during the year, all with the exception of a very few, were extinguished before covering any large acreage or causing much damage.

Chelmsford is very fortunate in having an observation tower located in the Town, by means of which fires are dissevered and accurately located at their start.

The new truck purchased last year and put into operation in the summer, is an improvement over the old, being of greater water capacity as well as greater power, and works very nicely.

As expected, a shortage of labor for handling fires developed early in the year, making necessary, many calls for units of the Fire Dept., in order to obtain help enough to prevent fires from getting beyond control.

For this year the outlook seems to be much worse in regard to help, because the men who were formally available, are for the most part, either in the Army or on defense work, including many former Deputy Wardens.

Two changes in the Fire Laws go into effect this year, first the fire permit law has been changed so that permits for fires will not be issued during the months of April and May.

A new law requiring patrols be established in the town on days of extreme

fire danger goes into effect this year.

In conclusion, all citizens are urged to use extreme care with fires this year, and to clean up and burn all brush and refuse before April if possible.

REPORT OF CHELMSFORD W.P.A. FOR 1941.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, Town of Chelmsford, Massachusetts.

January 19, 1942.

Honorable Sirs:

As W.P.A. Sponsor's Agent of the Town of Chelmsford, I herewith submit to you and the citizens of the Town of Chelmsford, Mass; a report on W.P.A. activities for the year of 1941.

During the year of 1941, the following projects were in operation. Extension of water mains by the Chelmsford Water District for a distance of 73 miles, closed December 4,1941. Our sewing project operated from January 1 1941 to June 18 1941, when it was closed for an indefinite period, and has not as yet been re-opened, 17 women were employed at the time the project was closed. Our Survey Project was also operated from January 1,1941 and was closed in June 25,1941, and

has not as yet been re-opened; 7 men were employed when the project closed.

On December 1, 1941 the Water roject sponsored by the Chelmsford Center Water District was completed. That project was started in July 29 1940. While that project was in operation several Lowell W.P.A. workers were transfered

to Chelmsford to hasten the completion of the work.

In June 9,1941 the Federal Government requested that 25 Chelmsford W.P.A. workers be transferred to Fort Devens on Federal Projects in operation there; and the Town paid their transportation. The Chelmsford men were transfered back to our local water projects on November 12,1941.

On "ecember 4,1941 a water project sponsored and financed by the East Chelmsford Water District was started. It involves the laying of approximately

32 miles of mains, fittings, hydrants, etc.

At the present time there are 36 Chelmsford men employed on the

project and 51 from Lowell.

After our water project is completed, we do not know whether we will be allowed to start any other new projects; or whether the Chelmsford men will be transfered on to defense projects which have priority; such as Fort "evens; Bedford Airport, or somewhere else that the Federal Government may designate.

The following are projects that could either be completed or started

as of to date.

Complete East Chelmsford Water Project. Completion of work on the Varney Playground. Start High School Athletic Field Project.

Start a Road Project including 13 roads in various sections of Town. Start our Moth Project.

The above projects have all been approved in Washington; and money allocated for the same.

Our sewing projects could be re-opened, but at this time it seems rather doubtful that they will.

Due to the present existing emergency, it seems rather doubtful that any new projects, other than defense projects, will be put into operation.

We also have a Surplus Commodity Project which employs 2 men; and a total of 5 Chelmsford W.P.A. workers, are working away from Chelmsford, on defense projects.

I wish to thank at this time the Board of Selectmen, and Highway Department, Water Commissioners, and all others, who in any way contributed towardmaking our W.P.A. activities in the Town of Chelmsford a success.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS

Board of Selectmen, Chelmsford, Mass.

December 31,1941.

Gentlemen:

As Inspector of Animals, I submit the following report of work done for the year ending December 31,1941. Under the direction of Division of Live Stock Disease Control, State Department of Agriculture.

The annual inspection of cattle, sheep and swine is completed and a detail report is being prepared for the above mentioned department.

Seven stables have been reported where the cattle were not underState supervision for the tuberculin test.

There are 185 stables containing 705 Dairy Cows,251 Young cattle,22 bulls and 2 oxen, making a total of 980 head.

This shows an increase of 56 Dairy cows,4 young cattle,6 bulls and 2 oxen, showing a total increase of 66 head.

There are 469 Swine, 110 Goats and 56 Sheep, the swine have decreased 258 but Sheep have shown an increase of 42 and Goats 29 head.

The tuberculin test has been applied to all cattle in Town during the last two months and no cases of tuberculis were found. All tests have been free from reactors since 1939.24 Dairy cows were shipped into Town from without the State, under State permits. All were released after indentification, as all test charts showed that they were free from tuberculosis and Bangs disease.

26 Dog Bite cases were investigated and 21 dogs were quarantined for the required two weeks observation period, then released as no rabies developed although compalints of same were made and investigated there were no rabid dogs in town during the past year.

All investigations ordered by State authorities have been attended to and reported.

All Cattle Owners who raise their own replacements are advised to have their calves vaccinated when they are between 14 and 8 months old. The State charge is 50 cents per head for this work.

Special Plates are now required on all cattle Dealers trucks, and all dealers are required to have a license.

All persons trucking cattle for sale must carry a Bill of Sale of the cattle in the trucks.

Changing Tags in the ears of cattle is now illegal except when done by a $^{\mathrm{V}}$ etermarian or a $^{\mathrm{F}}$ ederal Agent.

Calves vaccinated for Bangs Disease, between the ages of 4 and 8 months need not be tetested upon entering this State until they are 18 months old and Cattle from accredited herds, outside the State need not be tested until they have been in the State for 6 months.

The roster has remained practically unchanged thus insuring Town of a Department manned by a group of loyal and efficient firemen.

The equipment and the fire alarm by constant supervision have been kept in first class condition and ready for instant response whenever the demand is made for their use.

The Department has responded to 86 alarms of fire in Town and a number of calls out of Town.

In the latter part of April when serious forest fires raged in our neighboring Towns we had at one time four companies hard at work. We received at the time from the State Fire Marshall, the Commissioner of Conservation and the Selectmen of the Towns, the highest praise for the services rendered.

We have rendered every assistance possible to the Forest Fire Warden,

and have extinguished a number of grass and brush fires.

We are planning for and hope to have in operation some day a tower for the drying of hose which will add greatly to the life of the fire hose.

We regret having to record the resignation of Harry L. Shedd the Chair-

man of the Board and Chief of the Department for many years.

During this time he has diligently and devotedly given his time and labor and due to his rare judgement and foresight has been responsible for the highly efficient condition of the Department at the present time.

His loss will be keenly felt by his associates and the Town officers as well as all the men of the Department and in his administration he has set up

a standard that has brought credit to the Town and honor to himself.

We extend to our Police Department our hearty appreciation for their gererous assistance whenever it was required and to all others who have co-operated when needed.

A great change took place throughout the year 1941 which saw private industry absorbing nearly all employable men as a result of the national defense program, which was later followed by the outbreak of war in December, 1941.

As was to be expected, welfare cost dropped to a very low level which decrease should continue during 1942.

We must expect a large increase in Old Age Assistance for the coming year, due to legislation passed in 1941 by the State legislature, which becomes effective April 30, 1942. In brief it calls for an increase in payments to many of our recipients and also exempts all children from contributing to support, whose incomes fall below a certain standard set up by the State Department, depending upon the number of dependants the son or daughter may have.

I respectfully refer you to my report of last year, wherein I commented on the proposed change in the Old Age Assistance law.

ment be made. The vacancy will be filled as the result of the Election. The Board of Health feels that the town has lost a valuable man in the resignation of Mr. Knapp. He assumed his duties as a member of this department with the specific intent of safeguarding the health of every man, woman and child within the confines of the town, and to this end he did his job extremely well. At this time, we wish Mr Knapp every success and good health in his new field of endeavor.

Early in the month of May a group of citizens from the Westlands section of the town, appeared before us in a special meeting, armed with complaints relative to the Westlands Dump. As a result of this meeting the Board decided to close the dump and to re-locate it elsewhere. This action was no sconer put into effect, when a hue and cry went up from a large number of residents residing in other parts of this section, as well as in the Centre. This necessitated further action by the Board and after conferences with various departments, it was decided that the dump would be enclosed with a high fence of wire, a single entrance made available and an increase in wages to the caretaker, with new duties levied upon him as to the keeping of the dump in a more sanitary condition. We feel at this time that the situation has greatly improved over its former state, and we shall welcome any further complaints, should it lapse to its previous condition.

The North Chelmsford dump which was put into a suitable condition two years ago is not being used for the purpose intended due to the fact that it is located too far away from the thickly settled districts. Instead, rubbish and waste are being strewn along the streets, vacant parcels of land, and most anywhere that is convenient for those who are committing this act. All this is brought to your attention again because it is a serious problem. Yur Board of Health endeavored to correct this situation at the annual meeting of the townspeople held last March, but met with defeat at the hands of the Finance Commission and a few others. But this problem still exists and sooner or later this town will shoulder the expense of collection of rubbish etc. This money will be well and wisely spent and aside from the fact that a service will be rendered to the taxpayers, an unsightly and unhealthful menace will have been corrected. We feel that this matter cannot be taken care of in any other way. We could paper the walls of the lower town hall with written complaints of people asking what they are going to do with their garbage and rubbish. We should refer them to those people who know all the answers, but have yet to come forward with any sensible solution. We are open to suggestions.

The department handles its finances well during the year. We were forced to ask for an additional few hundred dollars for dump care. The number of cases in the various state sanatoriums have been greatly reduced, thereby effecting a large saving in our aid account. We received the usual amounts of money from the granting of licenses, etc.

The Board has been called on numberless times during the year on complaints, etc. and we feel that we have settled differences and difficulties to everyones satisfaction where concerned.

We would call your attention to the report of our agent on further matters pertaining to this department.

During the course of the year, we were informed by an act of the State Legislature, the Office of Inspector of Plumbing would be placed under Civil Service. The Board of Health insisted that any applicant for this position must have his domicile within the confines of the town. Heretofore this office has been filled by an out of town resident.

We have held several conferences with state and County officials, pertaining to matters of Public Health in this town, and we again extend an invitation to any resident to attend our meetings, or to offer suggestions whereby we may serve you

better as members of your Board of Health.

To those officials of other departments for their co-operation with us during the year, we extend our thanks.

At this time I would like to refer the parents to the laws relating to Public Health. "A householder who knows or has cause to believe that a person in his family or house, is infected with a disease dangerous to the public health, should give notice thereof to the board of health of the town where such householded dwells, unless a physician is in attendance. This is necessary in order to-prevent the spread of communicable diseases, and cooperation in this matter is requested. Every sick child should be thought of as suffering from a communicable disease until it is proved otherwise. The parents should not permit their children, if sick, to attend school and play with others until it is certain there is no danger of spreading a disease.

Children who have been absent five days or more must have a certificate from the school physician.

In May, 1941 diphtheria immunization clinics were held at the Center Town Hall with the school physicians Dr. Arthur G. Scoboria and Dr. George E. Carriel in charge.

I hope that parents will plan to have their children immunized against diphtheria if they have not already done so. Latest statistics show that one of every seven children under five years of age taken sick with Diphtheria dies.

A dental clinic has been held at some school on each Wednesday of the school year, until May 31, 1941 when Dr. Charles Farrington resigned his position as school dentist.

All pupils have been given a physical examination by the school physicians, Dr. Arthur 7. Scoboria and Dr. J. E. Boucher. The boys in the football team and the boys and girls joining the basketball teams were given rigid examinations.

A Meeting of a temporary health council was held in the lower town hall in regards to the continuing of Well Child Conferences in the town. Dr. Robert Archibald and Miss Gertrude Martin from the state department were present at this meeting. It was decided, however, not to continue them for the present.

ANNUAL REPORT

Milk Inspection Division

To the Honorable Board of Health Chelmsford, Mass.

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to present the report of the Milk Inspection Division for the year ending December 31, 1941.

624 samples of milk were examined for Total Solids and Fats; 581 for Bacteriel content; 564 for Sediment; 486 by the Phosphatase Test. The average Total Solids for Milk-Pasteurized was 12.87%; Fat 3.96%; Grade A Pasteurized, Total Solids 13.44%; Fat 4.27%; Milk-Raw, Total Solids 12.66%; Fat 3.86%. The median bacterial average was 7000 colonies per cubic centimeter. 93.62% of the Phosphatase tests were negative, 6.36% were positive. Of the Sediments exemined, 81.09% were good; 12.34% were fair; 6.57% were unsatisfactory.

166 samples of cream were examined. The average percent fat was, Light Cream 21.33%; Heavy Cream 37.68%. The median bacterial average was 20,000 colonies per cubic contineter. 151 samples were negative, 15 were positive when tested by the Phosphatase Test.

There were approximately 2338 quarts of milk; 170 quarts of cream; 20 quarts of skimmed milk; 20 quarts of buttermilk consumed daily. 85.75% of the milk was sold as pasteurized; 14.25% as raw; 22.49% at wholesale; 77.51% at retail; 21.01% as wholesale pasteurized; 1.45% as wholesale raw; 64.71% retail pasteurized; 12.80% retail raw; 1.21% Grade A Pasteurized.

342 Dairy Farms were listed as supplying the Town with milk. 326 were inspected and scored; 16 were not approved on the first visit, one was excluded. 678 Samples of milk from Producers were examined for total solids, fat, bacterial content, and sediment, prior to pasteurization. 160 milk plant inspections were made.

32 wagon licenses were issued to milk Dealers. 8 stores were registered to sell Oleomargarine, and 39 licensed to sell milk. 3 Milk Plants were licensed to Pasteurize milk.

Sixty mine dollars and fifty cents, received from license fees, were paid to the Town Treasurer.

MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE REPORT

The following is a report of some of the activities of the Middlesex County Extension Service in the town of Chelmsford during the year 1941:

Dairy farmers within the town were assisted during the year with pasture improvement, liming and reseeding meetings, better methods for growing legumes and with general milk marketing problems. Andrew Boumil, Theodore Emerson and Edwin Warren are members of the County Herd Improvement Association. Many of the local fruit growers participated in the twilight meetings held at various farms through out the county. Through farm visits and with correspondence, farmers were helped with their general orchard problems. A pruning demonstration was held at the farm of Fred Russell.Mr. Russell has also been very prominent among the beekeepers of the county and has done some excellent work toward developing pollen and nectar producing plents.

Minety-six boys and girls were enrolled in club work during the year. Mr. and Mrs. Percy Beardsley headed up the club work for the town along with the following leaders: Miss Barbara Noon, Miss Pearl Koulas, Mrs. William Fontefract, Mrs. Henry Pratt, Miss Julia Koulas, Mr. Kenneth Keid, Mr. T.W. Fmerson, Mr. W.G. Hammon, Mr. V. John Rilkola, Mr. Robert Riley. In the spring a fine exhibit was held and a program given at the Town Hall and in the fall another exhibit was put on at the Grange Fair. Pearl Koulas was awarded fourth prize in the garden contest conducted by the Middlesex North Agricultural Society. Others receiving prizes were Robert Riley, Marjorie Riley and William Helleur.

Chelmsford took an active part in financing the establishment of the 4-H camp at Ashby.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford:

We herewith submit the report of your School Committee for the year ending December 31, 1941.

The conditions due to the present world war are such that many changes have taken place and undoubtedly many more will occur.

These conditions are already reflected in the teaching personnel. Due to resignations and retirement we have lost several of our teachers. The insistence of the State Department of Education has resulted in the establishment of a special class for mentally retarded children. The replacements and appointments to fill the positions thus created are dealt with in detail in the report of the Superintendent of Schools and for this and other information we recommend that you read his report.

With the addition to the High School and the Westlands School our fuel consumption will necessarily be greater. The addition of new classes will mean more books and supplies. These additional-items, together with increased cost of fuel and supplies, has necessarily been reflected in our budget.

The appropriations for repairs and maintenance have for the past several years been so small that the buildings have suffered as a result. All the wooden buildings require painting and some require expensive repairs before this can be done. Rather than spending money to have these buildings repaired and painted, it would probably be more economical to have all these buildings brick veneered. Over a period of years the savings on fuel and painting would more than pay the initial cost of this work.

We have had requests from both the teachers and janitors for pay increases. Our teachers' salaries are below the average paid to teachers in other cities and towns. Our janitors' salaries are below the average paid to unskilled laborers. We have given these requests much thought and study. After comparing the salaries paid by the Town of Chelmsford with those paid elsewhere and having in mind the rising cost of living, it is our recommendation that the salaries of both the teachers and janitors be increased.

By the time this report is published the addition to the Westlands School will have been completed. We have added four classrooms, an assembly hall, four toilet rooms for pupils, two toilets with outside entrances for those using the playgrounds, a teachers' room and an office for the principal. A new heating plant has been installed which heats the entire building. The old hot air ventilating system has been removed and we now have in each classroom a unit heater which draws and heats fresh air directly from outside. This air, after circulating in the classroom, is removed by a ventilating duct from the building. The entire building has an outside wall of brick veneer which is not only pleasing to the eye but has the added advantages of making the building much

easier to heat and much cheaper to maintain. This new addition, including the changes and improvements to the old building, was completed at a cost lower than the cost of the original four-room building.

Your Committee has spent a lot of time and thought to maintain the high standards of the Chelmsford School System and we hope that our accomplishments and recommendations will meet with your approval.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Committee:

My fourteenth annual report is hereby submitted to you and to the citizens of Chelmsford.

TEACHERS

In the High School Catherince W. Mooney applied for leave of absence on May 1st and later resigned, and on June 9th Donald H. Fogg was given leave of absence when he was called into military service. Morris L. Budnick resigned in the summer. At Princeton St. Mrs. Lilla B. McPherson retired at the end of the year. At Quessy Josephine M. Quigley resigned February 1st, and at the Westlands Vera G. Rafuse at the close of school.

For the positions in the High School Blanche E. Robinson, a graduate of Boston University, who had been teaching for a year in Brewster Academy, and Mary E. Pollard, a graduate of Lowell Teachers College with a master's degree from Boston University, who had been teaching for a year in Hardwick High School, were engaged. For the science and mathematics position Gerald A. Ivers was transferred from Highland Ave.

For the Highland Ave. principalship M. Weldon Haire, a graduate of Bowdoin, who had been teaching in the Fairfield, Maine, High School, was chosen. At Princeton St. Sally T. Conlon was transferred to the 4th grade, and Ebba A. Peterson was given the 8th grade, a position she had held previously. M. Pauline Sullivan, a graduate of Lowell Teachers College, was given the 3d and 4th grade room at Quessy.

At the Westlands School seven teachers are now employed. The 1st grade holds its sessions in the Community Building, the 3d and the 5th grades use two rooms in the old part of the building for a morning session, and the 4th and 6th grades use the same rooms for an afternoon session. The 2nd grade, and the 7th and 8th, use the other two rooms for the customary two sessions. B. Muriel Bridges was transferred from the McFarlin School to the 7th grade in the Westlands, and Josephine F. Brennan and Eleanor Gray were engaged for the 3d and 5th grades, and Hope Fielding for the McFarlin position. All are graduates of Lowell Teachers College.

The Department of Education has been demanding for a number of years that Chelmsford comply with the law which requires that a special class be maintained for children who cannot profit by the usual methods of instruction. The teacher of such a class must hold a certificate granted by the Supervisor of Special Classes. Doris E. Hevey, a graduate of Lowell, with five years of teaching experience, was certified conditional on her taking further courses

and was elected to the position. The class uses a room in the McFarlin School, wich is provided with special material for hand work. Pupils who would profit by this special class work may be brought in from other schools. They are designated for this course by the travelling state clinic conducted by Dr. Wellington.

In any group of first grade pupils there are some for whom learning to read is extremely difficult. Such pupils fall behind their mates, become discouraged, and as they go on in the grades fail in other subjects. They need individual attention outside the regular classroom.

Margaret D. Sousa, a graduate of Lowell, who had had special training in remedial reading, was engaged to do such work, and has classes numbering 66 in all in the McFarlin School, Princeton St., and East Chelmsford. There pupils are now interested in the reading program and are making progress. Some of them are showing improvement in other work and will probably make their grades this year.

SALARIES

Earlier school reports have called attention to the clearly established fact that teachers' salaries in Chelmsford are low as compared with what is paid in towns of the same approximate size and wealth. Last April the maximum for men was increased \$100, for reasons indicated in my report of last year. As was to be expected, the women teachers both in the High School and in the elementary at once began an agitation for increases. When their requests were presented they were given assurance by School Committee and Superintendent that the salary schedule would be studied before the next annual budget was prepared and that an attempt would be made to secure such funds as might be necessary to cover any increases granted. One point was conceded without argument. For many years teachers in the High School and principals of elementary schools have received each year an increase of \$100 until the maximum was reached, while elementary teachers have received only a \$50 increase. The elementary teachers were assured that the present committee would do away with this discrimination.

Since last April conditions have changed very materially. There is no necessity for proving that costs of living have sharply advanced: every householder is conscious of the fact. Estimates of the increase range from about eight per cent to a much higher rate. As a result teachers everywhere are asking for higher salaries. The State Teachers Federation and many local associations have been collecting data. A Federation report of December 6, 1941 states: "There is a growing movement in Massachusetts toward improved salaries." This reports cites thirty-seven towns and cities in which increases had already been granted, such as \$100 from Sept. 1941, a \$200 increase to every teacher to start Jan. 1, 1942, a 10% increase, full restoration of former pay cuts, etc. The Chelmsford

teachers are asking for a flat increase of \$200 a teacher to date from January 1, 1942.

Janitors' salaries are less than the earnings of many unskilled workers of the present time. They are asking for a flat increase of \$260 to date from Jnauary 1st.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

No buildings were painted in 1941. The usual repairs were made to plumbing, heating equipment, and roofs. The old locker room at the High School were converted into lunch rooms by providing tables at a cost of \$270. A new smoke pipe of heavy iron was put into the McFgrlin School, \$263. Window shades cost \$292. A roofed entry was built in the rear of the Quessy School to take the place of the bulkhead and other changes made to keep water out of the basement, about \$100.

When conditions warrant the expenditure, these improvements should be considered:

Painting of the wood buildings. Highland Ave., South, and East are in very poor condition.

An entry in the rear of the South Chelmsford School, grading, and a new cement apron. Water now gets into the basement.

Painting inside of McFarlin School.

Providing a suitable athletic field for the High School and McFarlin, and fencing the field.

My dear Mr. Wright:

I am pleased to submit, herewith, my twelfth annual report as principal of Chelmsford High School.

The total enrollment up to January 1, 1942, is as follows:

This total is 45 less than the all time high record of January, 1940. It is interesting to note that there are still, as in the past few years, more boys than girls. The much smaller eighth grade enrollment of last year is one contributing cause for the drop in the enrollment of the high school this year. The fact that there is not a course in domestic science for girls or any special vocational course for boys is another cause for the drop in the enrollment.

Many high schools of the State provide these vocational courses for those boys and girls who are more interested in the practical arts than they are in the more academic type of education. Where vocational courses are available in the high school, more pupils are interested in the work they have to do and stay in school longer, thereby making the school of greater value to every one in the town.

During these uncertain times when we do not know how long our boys and girls will have the opportunity to get a formal education, I believe that it is the duty of teachers and parents to do everything possible to have each pupil get the maximum benefit for the time he is in school. We do not know how soon our boys or girls will be called to do some kind of defense work. We do know that the more education they can get before they are needed, the better work they can do if they are called.

Parents can help their children a great deal by seeing to it that all homework is done. Each pupil should study at least two hours daily on homework (contrary to what some pupils will say) and more time is often necessary if college certificate grades are maintained. Parents can also help by supporting the school in teaching courtesy, politeness, and the right attitude toward the school and its regulations. The more time that is necessary for a school to use in correcting misconduct, the less time there is to help those pupils who are cooperative and anxious to do their best in whatever they undertake.



On Monday, the Second day of March, 1942, being the first Monday in said month, at 12 o'clock noon, for the following purposes:

The polls will be open from 12 noon to 8 p.m. and to meet in the High School Auditorium in Chelmsford on the following Monday, the 9th day of March, 1942 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act upon the following articles, viz.
