

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

On Monday, the First day of March, 1945, being the first Monday in said month, at 12 o'clock noon, for the following purposes:

To bring in their votes for the following officers:

Moderator for one year. One Selectman for three years. One Member of the Board of Public Welfare for three years. One Assessor for three years. One Member of the Board of Health for three years. One School Committee member for three years. One Cemetery Commissioner for three years. One Park Commissioner for three years. Two Trustees of Adams Library for three years. One Sinking Fund Commissioner for three years. One Member of the Planning Board for five years. One Constable for one year.

All on one ballot.

The polls will be open from 12 noon to 8 p.m. and to meet in the Town Hall at Cheimsford on the following Monday, the eighth day of March, 1945 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act upon the following articles, viz:

ARTICLE 1.

To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 2.

To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray Town charges for the current year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3.

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town; and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 5.

To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account a sum not exceeding Two Thousand Pollars (\$2000) to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee, as provided in General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 6; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum with which to meet unpaid bills of previous years; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 7.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twentytwo Hundred Seventy-four and 84/100 Dollars (\$2274.84), to pay the County of Middlesex as required by law the Town's share of the net cost of the care, maintenance and repair of the Middlesex County ¹uberculosis Hospital as assessed in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 111 of the General Laws; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 8.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of momey for the purpose of defraying the Town's share of the expense of the Surplus Commodities Division of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the School Committee to sell to the United States Government the typewriters used in the School Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease from Cora M. Kidder the garage located near the intersection of the Littleton and North

Roads and adjacent to the location of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad property under such terms and conditions as their judgment deems best; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to accept a bequest of money bequeathed to the Town for the use of the Varney Playground by the late Emma Gay; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900), or some other sum, for the purpose of purchasing equipment for the Forest Fire Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven and 64/100 Dollars (\$7.54) to defray the Town's share of the expense of the cost of operation of the Newburyport Purification Plant; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14.

To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the fund entitled "Sales of Cemetery Lots and Graves" the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300), or some other sum, for the purpose of defraying the cost of the care and improvement and embellishment of some or all of the cemeteries in the Town, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15.

To see if the ¹own will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to defray the cost of \neg ivilian Defense; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16.

To see if the "own will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of defraying the cost of Vocational education; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 17.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (ϕ 900), or some other sum, for the purpose of foreclosing tax titles; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Assessors to use a sum of money in the amount such as the Commissioner of ^Gorporations and Taxation of the ^Commonwealth of Massachusetts may approve as free cash, said sum of money to be applied in determining the tax rate for the year 1945; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 19.

To see if the Town will vote to transfer and appropriate from the account entitled "Sale of Real Estate", the sum of Six Thousand Six Hundred Fifty-Seven and 5/100 Dollars (\$6,657.05) to an account to be called "Payment of Net Bonded Debt," this money to be expended in accordance with Section 65, Chapter 44 of the General Laws and any amendments thereto.

ARTICLE 20.

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 3 of the Building Laws by Striking out said Section 3 and substituting therefor the following:

> Permits. Before the erection, construction, demolition or alterations of any building or part of any building, structure or part of any structure, coming under the scope of this code, the owner or lessee, or agent of either, shall, except for ordinary repairs, submit to the inspector of Buildings, a detailed work on proper blanks to be provided by the Inspector, and such full and complete copies of the plans of such proposed work, and any structural detailed description of the location, purpose and construction of the proposed structure or drawings as the Inspector may require. Such plans and detailed drawing shall be furnished in duplicate and if approved by the Inspector one set shall be kept at the building during the progress of the work, open to the inspection of the Inspector, and the other shall be kept on file in the office of the Inspector.

> The erection, construction, demolition or alteration of such buildings or structures, as herein provided, shall when proceeded with, be executed in accordance with such approved plans and detailed descriptions, unless amended plans are filed and permit issued therefor. Any permit which may be issued by the Inspector pursuant to the provisions of this section, but under which work is not commended within six months from the time of issuance, or is abandoned before the completion shall expire by limitation.

ARTICLE 21.

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 9 of the Building Laws by striking out said Section 9 and substituting therefor the following:

> Foundations. All dwellings must have foundations at least forty-two inches below the finished grade. Foundation walls if of concrete shall not be less than sixteen inches in thickness for first and second class buildings, and not less than eight inches in thickness for third class buildings, and fourth class buildings. If of stone not less than sixteen inches in thickness. Any other material must be approved by Building Inspector.

Footings. All footings shall bear on undisturbed soil and be designed to distribute sufficiently the superimposed load to the particular type of soil upon which they bear. Where soil conditions prevent sharp cut trenches for footings, side forms shall be used. All footings shall be of poured concrete. The minimum dimensions of footings shall be as follows:

(a) Under foundation walls of all frame dwellings and 1-story masonry dwellings; Thickness 8 inches; projection 4 inches on each side of wall.

(b) Under foundation walls of masonry dwellings more than 1-story in height; Thickness 12 inches; projection 6 inches on each side of wall. Footings may be same as in (a) if reinforced with not less than two 5/8-inch bars continuous in footing and spaced not to exceed 8 inches o.c.

(c) Under masonry piers: Thickness 12 inches; projection each side 6 inches; area 4 square feet.

(d) Under posts and columns: Thickness 12 inches; size 2 by 2 feet.

(e) Under chimneys for 1-story dwellings: Thickness 8 inches; projection on all sides 4 inches.

(f) Under chimneys for dwellings more than 1 story; Thickness 12 inches; projection on all sides 6 inches.

All footings shall be adequately reinforced where they cross and bear on filled trenches or other similar disturbed soil conditions.

Concrete. Poured concrete mixture shall be as follows:
(a) For plain concrete - not leaner than 1 part portland cement, 3 parts sand, 5 parts gravel, crushed stone; or 1 part portland cement, 6 parts clean bank gravel.
(b) For reinforced concrete - not leaner than 1 part portland cement, 2 parts sand, 4 parts gravel, crushed stone. The design, materials, metal reinforcement, limitations, and other requirements for reinforced concrete work shall comply with the recommendations of the Euilding Regulations for Reinforced Concrete (A.C.I. 501-36-T) of the American Concrete Institute Building Code.
(c) All materials shall be clean and free from loam and other for-oign matter.

ARTICLE 22.

To see if the ¹own will vote to amend Section 10 of the Building Laws by striking out said Section 10 and substituting therefor the following:

Chimney Flues. All masonry chimneys shall be lined throughout with fireclay flue linings. Minimum flue sizes for heating plants $\partial_{\overline{z}} x$ $\partial_{\overline{z}}$ inches, for fireplace $\partial_{\overline{z}} x 1\beta$ inches; or circular flues of equivalent effective area.

Chimney must have foundation of concrete at least 8 inches deep.

ARTICLF 23.

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 11 of the Building Laws by striking out said Section 11 and Substituting therefor the following:

> All wood floor and roof framings shall be kept at least one inch away from the chimney masonry. In no case shall wood framing members bear on the masonry of chimneys except on piers which are built integral with the chimney masonry. Sills to be not less than 4×6 inches or as approved by Inspector. Girders or carrying timbers may be structural steel, solid wood, or built-up wood. Wood girders not to be less than 6×3 inches or as approved by the Building Inspector. All joints of girders shall be made over piers or column supports. The maximum clear span for 6×8 inch wood girder for one story dwellings shall be eight feet; and one and one-half and two story dwellings seven feet. Wood posts when used as columns in basements shall bear on a cement base which shall extend not less than three inches above the finish floor; The base shall bear directly on the post footing.

Where the attic space above ceiling joist is unfinished, but is usable for storage space, or if the space is suitable for finishing into future habitable room, the span for ceiling joists shall be the same as for floor joists.

Rafters must be at least 2×6 inches where length is over eight feet and where length is over fifteen feet, collar beams must be used. Rafters on roofs with slopes less than five to twelve inches shall be the same as floor joists. Rafters not to be spaced more than twenty inches on centers.

All openings in roof construction for dormer windows, which are not supported on partitions shall be framed with double rafters and headers.

The Inspector shall act on such notice within forty eight hours of receipt of same.

Outside Walls. All outside walls of building must be covered with material suitable to that of existing neighborhood or as approved by Building Inspector.

ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING

March 8th 1943

The annual business meeting of the Town of Chelmsford was held in the Upper Town Hall, in Chelmsford Centre on March 8th 1943, at 7:30 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Walter Perham and Town Clerk Harold C. Petterson was requested to read the Warrant. After the Warrant was partly read, on a motion made by Wendell P. Harvey, it was voted to waive the further reading of the Warrant.

Upon the request of Harold C. Fetterson, a personal privilege was granted, Mr. Petterson said:

"We have with us tonight, a man who is retiring from public office in the Town of Chelmsford. This man has served the Town of Chelmsford for eighteen consecutive years. From 1925 to 1930 inclusive he served as a member of the Finance Board, and from 1931 to 1942 inclusive he has served us as a Member of the Board of Selectmen, Member of the Board of Public Welfare and a Member of the Board of Old Age Assistance. He has served us through the hard period of depression. He has served us well. He is and always has been a gentlemen. Mr. Moderator, I move you, that a rising vote of appreciation be given to James Alexander Grant for the efficient service that he has rendered to the Town of Chelmsford in the past eighteen years. And it was so voted.

Under Article One:

On a motion made by Mr. Albert Davis, it was voted to accept the Town report as printed.

The committee to confer with the Eastern Massachusetts Street Railway for better bus service, had no report to make.

The committee on new by-laws had no report to make.

The committee on building an addition to the Westlands School reported that their report was published in the Town Report.

Mr Arnaud Blackadar was elected a member of the Varney Playground Committee for a term of three years.

Under the report of the Finance Committee, Town Treasurer Harold C. Petterson, remarked on the preamble of this report, in so far as the report warned the voters of the tax rate "skyrocketing". Mr Petterson recited the tax rates from 1928 to 1942 inclusive and exclained that the tax rate in that period averaged 32.09. He also explained the amount of free cash used in each particular year. Mr.Petterson also explained that the tax rate for 1942 could have been 45.20 less than the figure set by the Board of Assessors. Claiming that the sum of approximately \$25,000.00 had been taken from the taxpayers in excess of what it actually cost to run the town in the year 1942. Mr Petterson said that he believed that the tax rate for 1942 had been set, reluctantly, at \$33.00 by the Board of Assessors, and that the Tax Commissioner would not approve a rate less than the rate of \$35.00, and he believed that the Board of Assessor's should be the Board to determine the tax rate in the Town of Chelmsford.

So as to get the sentiment of the voters in regard to his comments, Mr Petterson made the following motion:

"That it be the sentiment of this meeting that the Assessors make the tax rate for the Town of Chelmsford for the year 1943, commensurate with the appropriations made in 1943 to be raised by tax levy", and it was so voted.

First----- It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,764.72 for the purpose of paying unpaid bills of previous years, the bills so specified were bills which required only a majority vote.

Second-----It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$428.48 for the purpose of paying unpaid bills of previous years, the bills so specified required a four fifths vote. 125 voted in the affirmative and no one voted in the negative.

Third----It was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,339.90 for the purpose of paying unpaid bills of previous years. The bills so specified required a four fifths vote. 105 voted in the affirmative and nineteen voted in the negative.

The total voted for unpaid bills being \$8,533.10.

Mr. Fred Wiggin and Mr. Leo Williams were appointed Tellers by the Moderator and the Tellers were sworn in by Town Clerk, Harold C. Petterson. A hand vote was taken.

Under Article Seven:

On a motion made by Stewart MacKay, it was voted: To raise and appropriate

the sum of \$2,274.84 to pay the County of Middlesex as required by law the Town's share of the net cost of the oare, maintenance and repair of the Middlesex County Tuberculosis Hospital, as assessed in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 111 of the General Laws.

In regard to the appropriation for the Town's share of Surplus Commodities, it was voted to dismiss this article.

Under Article Nine:

On a motion made by Mr. Wright to authorize the School ^Committee to sell to the United States Government typewriters used at the High School, this motion was defeated.

Under Article Ten:

On a motion made by Stewart MacKay, it was voted: To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purpose of leasing from Cora M. Kidder the garage located near the intersection of the Littleton Road and North ^Koad and adjacent to the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad property, under such terms and conditions as the Selectmen deem best.

Under Article Eleven:

On a motion made by James A. Grant, it was voted: That the Town accept a bequest of money bequeathed to the Town for use of the Varney Playground by the late Emma Gay. It was explained by Mr. Grant that the Board of Selectmen would have full control of such bequest and invest and expend the money in any way that they deemed best.

Under Article Twelve:

On a motion made by Herber: M. Sturtevant, it was woted: To raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for the purpose of purchasing new equipment for the Forest fire Department. The same to be expended under the direction of the Forest Warden.

MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

This is a report of the work of the Middlesex County Extension Service in the town of Chelmsford for 1943.

Because of war conditions, the Staff of the Extension Service had to devote a great deal of time this year to overhead organization work pertaining to machinery rationing, food distribution orders, farm labor and other regulations, as issued by our Government, and establishing the number of war units on certain farms for Selective Service Boards. An attempt was made to see to it that these regulations were explained and applied to local conditions.

Foultrymen were furnished information on price ceilings, the feed situation and other emergency problems. Also, assistance was given on the improvement of poultry ranges, control of diseases and reducing waste. Many home visits were made to help poultrymen with specific problems.

Information on milk marketing has been given individual farmers. All have been furnished information on control of Bang's disease, through calfhood vaccination; several interested have been urged to sign up under the joint Federal-State Program. Information on control of mastitis infection was given. Individual farmers have been advised on crop planning.

General information was given on victory gardens and a meeting was held with the Alliance at the Unitarian Church, at which time the importance of the home garden in the food program was discussed.

The Extension Service cooperated with the Mothers' Clubs of several of the churches in Chelmsford and supplied special speakers on foods and nutrition for their meetings. Also a foods demonstration on Meat Extenders was given at the Parent-Teacher Association. Two canning demonstrations were given for two different community groups.

There were twenty-six girls enrolled in club work in Chelmsford during the winter, under the leadership of Miss Louise Gill(clothing;) Miss Jeanette Straughan(crafts); and Miss Mary Mulcahy(home furnishing). Mrs. Percy Beardsley was Town Chairman. Eight girls carried on canning club work during the summer, and exhibited at the annual Grange Fair in September. Sixty-three boys and fourteen girls carried on projects in gardening, poultry, dairy, pig and handicraft. In the garden contest sponsored by the Middlesex North Agricultural Society, ribbons were awarded to Robert and Gilbert Riley, William Sherman, James Twohey, Jeannette, Mary, Rita Theresa, John and Joseph Straughan.

As one may note, we have had a mixed group of communicable diseases. People were very cooperative in matters of quarantine, etc., and thus there was no serious epidemic started. It is hoped that the townspeople will cooperate with the Board of Health, being sure that cases of communicable disease are reported. Children absent from school five days or more must have a certificate from the school physician.

In May, 1943 a Diptheria immunization clinic was held. Number of pre-school children immunized 12 Number of school children immunized 86

Parents are urged to have their children immunized against this dread disease either by their own private physician or at our clinic.

Inasmuch as teeth constitute the problem of being the major defect found among school children, parents are advised to take their children to their family dentist for treatment. It is my opinion that a dental clinic would be advisable, if a town appropriation was made to equip a room and carry on this work.

All pupils have been given a physical examination by the school physicians, Dr. Arthur G. Scoboria and Dr. J. Edmund Boucher. The physicals were more extensive in that the pupils feet were examined for deformities and Athlete's Foot. Those students participating in football and basketball were given rigid examinations.

I conducted a Red Cross Home Nursing Course at the high school this year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

To the Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford:

The Board of Health organized for the year with Harry L. Shedd as Chairman and Raymond H. Greenwood as Secretary. Edmund J. Welch, at this time was serving in the Armed Services of our country. He did not resign as a member of the Board because he was able to maintain an active interest by being present at the regular monthly meetings, despite the fact that he was stationed over three hundred miles away. Mr. Welch received an Honorable Medical Discharge from the Army on September 17, 1943, after serving approximately one year.

The usual routine business of the Department was handled throughout the year. Miss Christina N. Simpson, Agent for the Board, Mr.Daniel Haley, Inspector of Milk, Mr. George E. Gagnon, Inspector of Plumbing, and Mr. Arthur Harvey as Inspector of Slaughtering, performed their duties in their usual efficient manner. Mr. Harvey served as Inspector of Slaughtering until November 1. At that time he tendered his resignations because of ill health. The Board regretfully accepted it and named in his place, Mr. Patrick Haley. Mr. Haley comes to this Department with full knowledge and requirements of the position to which he has been named. He was engaged for many years in the retail meat business, and before assuming his new duties he successfully passed all examinations as required by the State Department of Public Health.

The Board learned with regret of the death of Mr. Frederick Merrill during the past year. Mr. Merrill was for many years engaged in the business of slaughtering. A mutual pact of friendship existed between him and this Department. He always cooperated with this Board and complied faithfully with all rules and regulations as set down by the State Department and this Board. We feel that the town has lost a most useful citizen and our deepest sympathy is extended to his wife and family.

In the matter of living within the appropriation of our budget, we have done just that. No additional money was asked for. Several amounts have been turned back into the treasury. The usual receipts for licenses and fees have been collected as well as State subsidy for patients interned in the Middlesex County Sanatorium at Waltham. We have been most fortunate in having not more than three patients hospitalized for T.B. treatment.

Miss Simpson has worked diligently in keeping close check on all persons who have at one time or another been affected with tuberculosis. She has journeyed many times during the year with these people to Waltham for examination and general physical check-up. The State Department of Public Health is making wonderful progress toward elimination of this disease, and it can only be done by the cooperation of Boards of Health; who in turn keep close watch on any person that has had a history of this ailment. Therefore, whenever your Board of Health asks you to present yourself for an examination, kindly cooperate with us. We are willing to do our part. You should be willing to do your share.

At this time we would like to call the attention of the parents of school children in the matter of cooperating with the physicians and school nurse. If a child is sent home by a doctor or nurse for some particular reason, we respectfully ask those parents to carry out the orders as laid down by the doctor or nurse. Of late certain people have been disregarding instructions as to the health of their children and offering nothing but arguments in return. The health of the school children in this town has been placed in capable professional hands, and they have every right to expect parents to work with them and in close harmony to maintain the health of <u>all</u> the children.

The disposition of garbage and rubbish is still a major problem in this Department. We have discussed plans for relieving the situation, and we have come to the conclusion that in the near future this town should purchase a truck and employ a few men for this purpose. We intend to propose this measure shortly for your consideration. In the meantime we ask you to bear with us, and wherever possible to use the town dumps for the disposing of rubbish and whatever means you may employ for the elimination of garbage.

For the year 1944 we are asking for a sum totaling \$7000.00 in our budget. We are seeking an increase of \$200.00 in the salary of the School Nurse. This would bring her salary up to \$2000.00 per yeara figure that was reached several years ago, and in force for some time, before salary cuts, etc. went into effect. In our opinion this amount is not one penny too much. Her duties are many and varied and seem to be increasing as time passes. All other amounts remain with the exception of "Aid". We have lowered that amount from \$1700.00 to \$1500.00.

Our meetings are open to all citizens of the town and a cordial invitation is extended. We invite your criticism and suggestions.

Greetings:

Although the fire season this year did not start until March 22, a large number of fires in grass and woodlands have occurred (176 to date with some reports outstanding), making a close approach to the peak year of 1939 when about 200 fires were extinguished.

As usual the spring months accounted for the larger proportion, owing to the extremely dry and windy conditions; another dry and windy period was experienced from July 1-20 when a number of bad fires were started, but the most unusual condition of the year is at the present writing.

A number of fires have started this month of December(38 calls to date) and dangerous fire hazards still exist. As many as four fires have been extinguished on some of these calls.

Attention is called to the extreme hazard in the coming spring months, owing to several unusual factors, such as the abnormal growth of last season and many acres of uncut hay, which will provide highly inflamable fuel at that time.

The lack of firemen is another factor to reckon with. The Forest Department is without any help most of the time, and the regular company's department has lost many trained firemen to the Draft and defense work. Therefore, it is very important to use great care when starting any fire anywhere outside and never to do so when there is any wind.

Anyone starting a fire, whether with or without a permit, whether in an incinerator, fireplace, or other device, is entirely responsible both for the cost of extinguishing such fire, if allowed to get beyond control, and any and all damage resulting therefrom.

All fires in the open are banned by State law during the months of April and May. No permits may be issued and no fire can be legally kindled in this period.

Excellent cooperation and assistance has been rendered by both the Police and Fire companies of different districts of the Town this year.

The Police radio has been especially useful in relaying information at the scene of several fires.

Considerable delay in obtaining delivery of the new Centrifugal pump, hose and other equipment, authorized at the last annual Town Meeting, was due partly to having to wait for priority ratings from Washington, and waiting our turn at the factory. However, the pump was finally received late in July, installed and put into service by September 1. In operation this pump exceeds any claims made as to its efficiency and is an excellent addition to the forest fire equipment; also this makes a valuable addition to the Town Fire Department, as it will now be available for emergency apparatus at any fire. The roster of the Department has been depleted this past year due to the drafting of the men for the Armed Services, there being at the present time eight regular men in the Service, two of whom are overseas. The men of the Department and the Board join in wishing these men a safe return.

The equipment of the Department and the signal system have been kept in first class condition despite the extra demands made upon them by the test blackouts and air raids, as conducted during the past year. There is still a great amount of fire equipment that is not available due to restricted manufacture and general war conditions. The Board is pleased to announce, however, the purchase of a portable generator lighting outfit consisting of two 500-watt floodlights, a 250-watt spot light cable, fittings, etc. We believe this will fill a much needed want of the Department by supplying sufficient light at night fires or for any other emergency that may require its services.

We have rendered all assistance possible to the Forest Fire Warden, who has been seriously handicapped in the performance of his duties by the shortage of available man power.

The Department has responded to a total of 89 alarms during the year which are classified as follows: building fires-31; chimney fires-25; brush-12; automobile-7; oil burners-4; false alarms-4; electric light poles-2; tar kettle-1; out-of-town-1; drowning-1; and rescue of dog from well-1.

The Board has cooperated to its fullest extent with the committee named by the Board of Selectmen at the request of the Massachusetts Emergency Public Works Commission regarding post war planning for the Town of Chelmsford.

We regret having to record the resignation of John M. Kemp, Ass't Chief and Clerk for many years. During this time he has served the Town faithfully and his well-kept records are a credit to the Town and an honor to him.

We extend to the Police Department our appreciation for their assistance in summoning additional men and apparatus when needed by means of their two-way radio. Our appreciation is extended to all others who have assisted the Department in the performance of its

REPORT OF MILK INSPECTOR

To the Board of Health:

The following is the Milk Inspector's report for the year ending December 31, 1943:

There were thirty-four wagon licenses granted to milk dealers, thirty-nine licenses to stores and two plants were licensed to pasteurize milk, also ten stores were licensed to sell oleomargarine.

Samples were collected from dealers and stores and analyzed by the Howard Laboratories at Amherst, Mass.

Due to the scarcity of high protein dairy feed, it has been hard for the dairy farmer to keep up the quality of milk, but in no case has any milk been found below the required standard.

All milk dealers' plants and many dairy farms have been inspected and found in good sanitary condition and, in a few cases, improvements were recommended and followed.

The average total solids for milk pasteurized was 12.85%, fats 3.94%. Raw milk solids totaled 12.64%, fats 3.86%.

I would like to thank the members of the Board of Health and all dealers in milk and cream for their cooperation.

Board of Selectmen Gentlemen:

For the fourth successive year no cattle have been found affected with tuberculosis.

Six dairy cows and one bull were shipped into town from other states. All were accompanied by proper permits and test charts and were identified and released from quarantine soon after arrival. Four cows also came into town from outside the state, under permit, for immediate slaughter.

A census of dairy cattle ordered by the Division of Livestock Disease Control, Department of Agriculture showed that there were 635 dairy cows, 285 young cattle and bulls, which is 70 less than the total two years ago and is 100 head less than the average total for the past fourteen years.

Fifteen herds have been reported to the above Department as not being under supervision for the eradication of tuberculosis; they were mostly owned by persons who had recently become owners of one or more cows.

Thirty-five dog bite cases were investigated and twenty-six dogs were quarantined for the required period of observation and later released as no cases of rabies developed. No rabid dogs were found in town during the entire year.

There has been no change in the State and Federal program of Bangs disease eradication.

No cases of hog cholera were reported.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Committee;-

My sixteenth annual report is hereby submitted to you and to the citizens of Chelmsford. Compared with reports of previous years it is somewhat curtailed in form. The statistics are those which we believe should become a part of the Town's permanent printed records. Attention is called to information given and recommendations made in the reports of 1941 and 1942, so far as recommended changes and improvements have not been made.

Teachers

At this time we record the bare facts regarding two valued and beloved teachers who have given their lives in the present war, and leave to some future date the establishment of suitable memorials.

George Rollins Knightly came to Chelmsford High School in September 1930 as a teacher-coach. He had been active in athletics in Johnson High School, North Andover, and in Aurora College, from which he graduated in 1930. He taught history and related subjects. At first he was coach of all three major sports, but after 1939 of baseball alone. He turned out winning teams, and- much more important - he impressed his strong personality on every boy who worked under him. He volunteered in the Navy in the spring of 1942, was commissioned an ensign, and was assigned to active duty as an Armed Guard on September 10, 1942. On February 20, 1943 the Navy reported him missing in action, and later stated that the ship on which he served was sunk January 8, 1943 in the Atlantic area.

Donald Herbert Fogg began work in Chelmsford High School in 1940, teaching English, having charge of debating, and acting as class adviser. He had had military training in the University of Maine, from which he received degrees in 1931 and 1934; was an officer in the R.O.T.C. and had commanded a CCC camp for two years. At the beginning of the War the Army called him into active service with rank of First Lieutenant. He was promoted to Captain in May, 1942, and went to North Africa in command of Co. L, 18th Infantry, First Division. On April 5, 1943 he was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action at El Guettar. He was killed in action April 23,1943, and posthumously was awarded the Purple Heart.

In the High School Blanche E. Robinson resigned to take up work with International Red Cross, Barbara Grant Clough resigned, and Earl J. Watt was given leave of absence when he volunteered and began his training for the Navy. In the McFarlin School Mabelle Birtwell was given leave of absence when she joined the women's branch In August V. John Rikkola of the Westof the Marines. lands School was elected to a position at Salem Teachers College, for which he had qualified in a competitive examination, and resigned early in September. In Novem-ber M. Weldon Haire, on leave of absence for military duty, resigned in order to take a position in Connecticut, and also Lena Genetti Haire. For the history position in the High School, David Hamblen, a graduate of Boston University with both teaching and business experience, was engaged, but he resigned in December to return to his former business. John J. Shannon, a graduate of Clark University with both A.B. and A.M. degrees and a teacher of two years experience, has been engaged for the history position. The list of teachers published at the beginning of this report shows how the other positions have been filled. One position in the High School was abolished, owing to the smaller enrollment.

In September M. Marion Adams asked for a few weeks leave because of ill health, but she has been unable to resume her work as supervisor of music. Barnard P. Larkin has taken over the work in the High School, both vocal and instrumental, as a substitute.

Salaries.

The 1941 report discussed teachers' salaries. Towns and cities generally were granting increases at that time, and Chelmsford voted an increase of \$200 for each teacher to date from January 1, 1942. This was about the usual increase given in towns of our size and wealth. Some of these towns have given a second increase, due to the still growing cost of living, and in practically all others the teachers are making requests for action. The matter is complicated by an act of the last Legislature, which established the minimum salary of teachers in elementary schools at \$1200, which is \$100 more than we have been paying beginners. This upset the balance of salary schedules. Teachers take the position, reasonably, that the Legislature in fixing the minimum salary of the lowest paid group expected towns to make adjustments all along the line.

Our teachers have made an exhaustive study of the salaries paid in Chelmsford for the last ten or fifteen years, and of salary schedules in other towns, and have indicated what they regard as inequities in our present scale. They ask for immediate increases of varying amounts for those teachers who have not reached the maximum and for an increase in the maximum for all groups, the full adjustment to be effected not later than September 1945. We are confining our recommendations to the current year. Economic conditions in 1945 and later will determine what should be done then.

We are indebted to Fred E. Pitkin, Superintendent of Schools in North Andover, for a recent study of the <u>maximum</u> salaries paid in 44 towns which have populations from 5000 to 12,000. The towns named, and the report shows the <u>Median</u> maximum; that is, half the towns pay more, half pay less. Chelmsford is on the low side for all groups, elementary, high school women, high school men, etc. An increase of \$100 in the maximum for each group would in most cases bring our salaries to the median as it stands in January, 1944. When our salaries were raised \$200 in 1942 we remained in about the same relative position with other towns since they also were granting increases. No increases were given in Chelmsford in 1943, although prices were rising and the cost of living consequently increasing. Our budget as proposed to the Finance Committee and recommended to the Town provides for an increase dating from January 1, 1944, for all teachers, of \$100, excepting for teachers without experience who began last September at the new state minimum; and for the ususual step-rate increase in September of \$100 for teachers who have not reached the maximum.

The janitors also ask for consideration, and in our proposed budget we have made provision for an increase of 10% It would be impossible to replace these men at the salaries now paid.

Long Range Planning

Many towns find themselves at a disadvantage when improvements on public property are necessary or desirable, because earlier building did not make adequate provision for the future needs. School buildings should always be designed so that additions can be readily made when need arises, and they should be solidly constructed since they are to be subjected to hard usage for many years. The site should be chosen with care, with a view to providing adequate playground and to avoiding so far as possible heavily traveled streets. In Chelmsford attention should be given to the problem of sewage disposal. See last year's report, page 124, relating to the sewage problem at the McFarlin School. The appointing of a Post-War Projects Planning Committee on the suggestion of the Governor, which has taken over the work of the Town Planning Committee, makes this a fitting time to list improvements on our school plant which are clearly in order. Not all of these are urged for action at the present time- some may wait ten or twenty years-but all may well be under present consideration. 1. The providing of a complete athletic field back of the High School, to include grading and fencing of all the grounds. The long range view requires enlarging the present field.

2. Providing playgrounds at the two schools which do not have them, Quessy and South Chelmsford. It would be necessary to acquire land at both schools as the field immediately back of the Quessy School is not owned by the Town.

3. Enlarging the so-called New Building at Princeton St., which was built in 1899, so that the use of the Old Building, the front half of which antedates the Civil War, can be terminated; or, preferably, provide a new building adjacent to, or near, Varney Playground large enough to accomodate all the pupils in the North Chelmsford area. In either case provide a hall designed for playing basketball, with a large seating capacity, and having the necessary shower and dressing rooms. Such a building might well provide rooms for other community purposes.

4. Providing a new building, with community hall, at East Chelmsford. In recent years the present building has been badly over-crowded, but just now grades are small. When more classrooms are needed, an entirely new building located on the farther side of the playground would be a wiser solution than an attempt to enlarge the old building.

5. Facing the remaining wooden buildings with brick, both to make them warmer and to obviate the recurrent cost of painting.

Repairs and Improvements.

No painting of buildings has been done for several years. When conditions return to normal as regards material and labor all the buildings except the High School and the Westlands will.need attnetion. We are asking for an additional \$2000 for repairs with this in mind.

At the McF₈rlin School the cesspools were cleaned at a cost of \$70. The boys' toilet in the basement is a source of constant trouble. It will be necessary to overhaul this completely in order to avoid almost monthly bills for service and repairs. This is on our list for attention next summer, or before.

At East Chelmsford a part of the roofing was replaced at a cost of \$196, patching plastering in classrooms and hall cost \$88, and covering the poor plaster in the girls' toilet, all about to fall, with celotex cost \$95.

Lightning struck the chimney of the Highland Ave. School the afternoon of Aug. 3d. Leander Marion. builder of the additions at the High School and the Westlands, was called upon to protect the building against further damage. He and the insurance adjuster fixed the cost of repairs at \$1590. Mr. Marion finished this work, chimney, slate, plaster, wood-work, etc., just as school opened in September. The sheet metal ventilator on the roof, which was not damaged by the lightning, was painted and repaired while the staging was up, and the foundation walls pointed up, at an additional cost of \$199.

At South Chelmsford, instead of replacing bulkhead doors in the rear, a covered entrance was built at a cost of \$70.

In the extremely cold weather of last winter we had bad freeze-ups in places where such trouble had never been experienced before, just as many house-holders had. In three buildings, Princeton St., Highland Ave., and Quessy, the janitors were provided with insulating board with which they covered basement windows for the winter. At Quessy where the hall in the rear is difficult to heat, the hall windows and doors have been weatherstripped at a cost of \$159. At the Westlands the ceiling of the addition and the north-west corner of the building were insulated at a cost of \$435. The resultant saving in fuel will pay for all these improvements within a few years, to say nothing of the saving in plumbing bills. Only the unceasing vigilance of the janitor in cold weather saves the toilet room plumbing in the Old Building at Princeton St. Water has to be drawn out of all piping and fixtures if the temperature is down to 15 above zero. We got figures for insulating, but decided that a less expensive way might be devised if the building is to be continued in use for many years.

In cold weather, especially when there is high wind, the janitors have been staying in the High School at night. Without doubt they have saved repair bills by so doing. I repeat an earlier recommendation, that the Town employ a night man for the two schools at the Center, who would serve as a watchman for property valued at over \$400,000 and who would maintain fires at night when needed. There is work enough in the two schools and on the grounds for an ad ditional man the year around.

Enrollment

There was a drop in the October 1st enrollment of 145. The smaller attendance is especially noticeable in grades I and II and in the last three years of the High School, 42 in the primary grades and 66 in the High School. The first is explained by reference to the birth records of six and seven years ago. For the twenty years ending in 1941 the average number of births recorded in Chelmsford was 113. In 1936 it was 85 and in 1937 the number dropped to 77. In 1942 the number was 149, and in 1943 it was 145. In the High School the drop is a normal one, explained by the number who have left school either to enter the armed services or to take jobs on reaching the age of sixteen. For the entire state the loss in high school enrollment from October 1942 was nearly 15%. Ours was just over 16%.

The table below shows enrollment by grades and by buildings on October 1, 1943. A comparison with the similar tables in earlier reports will show where the school population is falling.

The number of pupils transported dropped from 628 on October 1, 1942 to 538 last October: 162 to McF_rlin, 67 to Princeton St., 58 to Quessy, 32 to South, and 219 to the High School.

School transportation suffered in gnother way. The rules of 0.D.T. absolutely forbade the use of school busses to carry pupils except to attend school. Mr. M_rinel could not aarry athletic teams without forfeiting his right to buy gas and tires. We are indebted to parents organized by the Civic Committee for carrying teams to football and basketball games in their own cars. Such help will be needed as long as present restrictions prevail, and we express our thanks for the assistance given.

It will be impossible to restore our system of handling athletics under teacher-coaches until after the War. Solution A. J. Lupien was engaged last fall for football coach, Mr. Schulte is handling basketball, and will coach baseball. The program in all sports is necessarily curtailed. The trend in such towns as Chelmsford, not located on a railroad or having good bus service to a number of other towns, is to give up inter-school contests and substitute intramural. The latter program makes it possible for many more students to participate.

School Courses

Your committee report of last year mentioned the course in English as needing attention. New textbooks are now in use in the 7th and 8th grades, the lower books of the series used in the High School. For twenty or thirty years emphasis on English teaching in the elementary schools has been on "language", correct usage as a habit of speech, rather than as observance of rules. Teacher training institutions led this movement away from grammar, and also away from the use of phonics in teaching beginners to read, until a whole generation of young teachers came into the schools with little knowledge of either. The pendulum is now swinging the other way. The new books contain real grammar, and the new reading methods do not ignor phonics. Teachers generally approve the new trend, just as former teachers and many parents, brought up on the older methods, will applaud the change. It still remains true, in English as in all subjects, that the teacher herself is far more important than either textbook or method. The impact of the $W_{B}r$ on school life is seen in more ways than in lessened attendance. To quote from last year's report: "These trying times have inspired some students to more earnest effort; others have seemed content to drift while awaiting their country's call". Doubtless there is a feeling on the part of some that our courses are not fitted to these stirring days, and certainly courses will be modified in the future to meet new needs. But what will those needs be? No one is wise enough to give a complete answer now.

One thing however is certain. True education consists not in information gleaned from books and lessons and filed away on shelves in one's mind, but rather in the mental and personality traits developed in the individual through the learning process. Determingtion to do the task assigned, whether it is pleasing or distasteful; pride in its completion; readiness to undertake uninteresting and even unmeaning work; joy in doing one's best regardless of the rewards received - these are some of the characteristics of real and effective education. In these days when the cream of America's youth is giving all in poorly paid, but glorious service on the World's battle fronts, it is a cause of regret that slackers are still found in classrooms.

In behalf of teachers and pupils appreciation is expressed to all who have been of assistance in the work of the schools, and especially to you, the members of the School Committee.

I am pleased to submit, herewith, my fourteenth annual report as principal of Chelmsford High School.

The total enrollment up to January 1, 1944 is as follows:

The enrollment reached a peak of 532 on January 1, 1941. Since that time the enrollment has decreased each year. The enrollment as of January 1, 1944 is over 31 per cent less than it was on January 1, 1941. The boys' enrollment has dropped over 39 per cent since January 1, 1941, while the enrollment of the girls has dropped over 22 per cent.

It is increasingly difficult to keep students, especially boys, in school during war, and periods of high wages. This was a fact during the first World War. We feel that after this war is over the boys and girls who left school because of the high wages will realize the serious mistakes they made. There has never been a time when the need of a good education has been as great as it is today. This need will be still greater when this war is over. Children always suffer more during war times than adults. Therefore, every effort should be made by every one to see that the education of our youth suffers as little as possible.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen, and To the Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford:

At the request of the Massachusetts Emergency Public Works Commission, appointed by Governor Saltonstall, to prepare and maintain current progress information on the design of post-war projects by municipalities of the Commonwealth, the Board of Selectmen has appointed a local Committee to outline a program of worthwhile public works in this Community.

The objective of the Committee is to have complete plans and specifications ready to advertise for bids, for a substantial program of public works, to bridge the gap between the close of the war and the time needed for private industry to re-tool for peace-time production, a period of time estimated to be about one year.

This committee is one of 243 committees throughout the State working towards the one objective---to provide useful work for those released from the armed forces and from War Industry.

A program of useful public works that may be constructed immediately after the war should be planned now to insure against the development of a critical unemployment situation. This is especially true since these works not only provide employment but are actually needed for the daily use of everyone. Unless preparation for such a program of useful construction is made now, there may arise in the post-war period a demand for a made work program primarily social in its objectives. Such a program would not add materially to the wealth of the Town and large sums of money would be expended on these projects with little of permanent value to show for our efforts.

A post-war public works program of this character has double virtue; (1) The projects are needed now, are useful in themselves and will add to the local wealth; (2) they afford a practicable means of generating useful jobs at the proper time. It is not enough to catalogue or list these projects with approximate estimates of their costs and indications of how they may be financed. The real need is that means be provided for complete preparation NOW of actual plans and specifications and other preliminary work such as selection of sites for improvements to the end that, with the return of peace, construction contracts may be awarded and the work promptly started.

Since October 1943, your Committee has been meeting weekly with department heads and from the list of projects submitted, it soon became apparent that instead of a one year program a five to ten year program was being developed. This condition was true throughout the Commonwealth according to State officials. Any department head worthy of the name should have a long range program. However since the Post-War Committee was concerned principally with the year following the close of the war, it was suggested that only the most worthwhile of the long range programs be brought to the top for consideration. The balance of the projects submitted could be taken from the long range program by the voters at some future time or as the immediate need became apparent.

The following is a list of the projects submitted to the Post*War Public Works Committee and tabulated in the order of their importance to the community by Department heads. The projects were outlined of course in a more detailed report to the Committee but are condensed herewith for publication:

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT:

The Post War Committee was unanimous in placing the recommendations of the Highway Department at the head of the list and recommends that the sum of \$34,450.00 be raised and appropriated in this years tax levy to be used as needed in the amounts and for the purposes and locations specified by the Superintendent of Streets in his program submitted to the Committee.Much of this work would be done in the ordinary course of events.The ohief advantage of its inclusion in this program is---it is planned work.The streets and locations have been selected and the projects can be started overnight, if necessary, with no confusion, waste or lost motion.

The Committee is informed that the State and County are setting aside funds to assist cities and towns on highways where such funds may be expended legally and to this extent any appropriations made by the town for these highways will be increased.

FIRE DEPARTMENT:

It is recommended that a sum sufficient to draw plans and specifications for two fire houses be appropriated to be located in the Centre and the North.It is also suggested that the matter of sites for these buildings be given further study.

Other projects submitted by this department as worthwhile for Post War long range program but no appropriation recommended for this year.

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT:

It is recommended that the top project submitted by the School Department namely:"An athletic field at the High School"be approved, and a sum sufficient to make a boundary survey and topographical map of the property and proposed additions be appropriated. The above appropriation should be large enough to include plans and specifications to complete the work.

Other projects submitted by the School Department recommended as worthwhile for Post War long range program but no appropriation recommended for this year.

BOARD OF HEALTH:

Other Communities have placed public health programs such as submitted by this Board at the top of the list.Signed petitions were presented a few years ago to clean up some of these danger spots.However it is not recommended that an appropriation be made this year in view of the expenditure contemplated in other departments.This program would provide considerable work, if, later on, the town was in need of more worth while projects.

CEMETERY DEPARTMENT:

It is recommended that the sum of 1,500.00 be appropriated this year for improvements listed by the Commissioners as being needed at the Pine Ridge Cemetery.

Other projects submitted by the Cemetery Department recommended as worthwhile for post-war long range program but no appropriation recommended this year.

PARK DEPARTMENT:

Sidewalks requested around parks in the Centre and North referred to the Highway Department, otherwise no detailed program submitted by the Board. "This Committee suggests that edgestone be placed around both parks and grass walks be substituted for the present.

The project listed as a playground by the School Department, if constructed, is probably as much as the town could afford as a Post-War project.

ASSESSORS DEPARTMENT:

Inasmuch as the project submitted by this department would employ only engineers, it was the opinion of the Committee that there will be a great demand for the services of engineers in the immediate post-war period, therefor it is recommended this project be deferred and made part of the long range program.

PLANNING BOARD:

The Planning Board made several valuable suggestions that were acted upon favorably by the Committee. These suggestions however were projects that would properly come under other departments.

SULMARY:

If all of the recommendations of this Committee are approved by the voters \$35,980.00 will be raised and appropriated by tax levy, plus approximately \$2,000.00 more for plans and specifications making a grand total of \$37,980.00.

At the writing of this report, figures are not available from the Town Accountant's office, therefor it is impossible to determine just what effect the raising of this money will have on the tax rate, however it is our opinion that with the free cash on hand together with a certain grant from the Commonwealth that the tax rate will not be materially changed from last year.

If after plans and specifications are completed it is decided to build the fire houses and playground at the High School the sum of approximately \$46,000.00 more would be needed or a grand total of \$83,980.00.To finance these projects it would of course be possible to borrow money and repay the same over a period of ten years or more, and to use available money on hand, such as the fund created from the sale of real estate which contains approximately \$7,000.00.

Compared with reports submitted to the State Commission by other towns, this amount is small.However, it is all the Committeefelt it could recommend at this time regardless of what is being done in other communities. If the program submitted should prove inadequate, projects can be taken from those listed by department heads at anytime and moved to the top if the voters desire. In the final analysis the voters decide what projects will be acceptable and how much money shall be appropriated.

The projects selected by the Post War Committee in general, was the top project submitted by the Department heads as being the most important to the Town, but also of paramount consideration was the type of labor and the number of man-hours that the project would employ. To balance the program with skilled labor it was the opinion of the committee that the construction program submitted by the Fire Department should take precedence over that submitted by the School Department at this time in the interest of public safety. It was the consensus of opinion that under the present system we have been very fortunate and that one disastrous fire would bring us to a full realization of that fact.

The Committee does not know to what extent the Federal Government will co-operate in post-war public works but it is their considered opinion that help will be extended in the year immediately following the war, to those cities and towns which have a program sufficiently advanced to start as soon as the war ends. There is doubt, because of the cost of the war, that Federal participation will extend beyond this period. Under the best conditions a drastic curtailment is expected.

In conclusion, the Committee would like to take this opportunity to thank the various Department Heads for the constructive andworthwhile programs submitted. At all times they have co-operated with this Committee to the fullest extent.

One School Committee Member for three years. One Cemetery Commissioner for three years. One Park Commissioner for three years. Two Trustees of Adams Library for three years. One Sinking Fund Commissioner for three years. One Member of the Planning Board for five years. One Constable for one year.

All on one ballot.

The polls will be open from 12 noon to 8 p.m. and to meet in the Town Hall at Chelmsford on the following Monday, the 13th day of March, 1944 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act upon the following articles, viz:

- ARTICLE 1. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray Town charges for the current year; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town; and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary; or act in relation thereto.

- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue of the current financial year; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money with which to meet unpaid bills for the year 1943; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Thirty-seven and 12/100 Dollars (\$2437.12) to pay the County of Middlesex, as required by law, the Town's share of the Middlesex County Tuberculosis Hospital as assessed in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 111 of the General Laws; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Hundred (\$1400) Dollars or some other sum to defray the expense of procuring plans and specifications for two proposed fire stations, one in the Center and one in North Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred (SOO) Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of purchasing an automobile for the Police department, said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 9. In the event of an affirmative Vote under Article 5, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer by a good and sufficient Bill of Sale title to an automobile now used by the Police department; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will accept Section 45 of Chapter 31 of the General Laws, placing regular or permanent police members under the rules and regulations of the Civil Service; or act in relation thereto; Said section reads as follows:

"Section 48, Application to Police, etc. of certain Towns. A Town which has not accepted this Chapter or the corresponding provisions of earlier laws, may accept this section as to its regular or permanent police and fire forces, or as to either of them. Acceptance to the fire force shall include regular members and may include call members, and a Town which has accepted this section or corresponding provisions of earlier laws as to regular firemen may afterward accept it as tocall firemen. In a Town which accepts this section by vote of the Town at a Town meeting, or has accepted corresponding provisions of earlier laws, as to any and all of said forces, the members of the forces to which the acceptance relates shall be subject to the chapter and the rules made hereunder, and shall hold office until their death, resignation or removal, but members in office at the time of such acceptance shall continue in office without examination or reappointment.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept Section 49, Chapter 31 of the General Laws, placing the Chief of Police under the rules and regulation of the Civil Service; or act in relation thereto. Said Section reads as follows:

> "Section 49. Application to Chiefs of Police, etc. of certain Towns and Cities. This Chapter and the rules made hereunder shall apply to Superintendents, Chiefs of Police, and Chief Marshalls in Cities which have accepted Chapter Four Hundred and Sixty-eight of the Acts of Nineteen Hundred and Eleven in the manner herein provided, and in Towns which have a Police force subject to this Chapter and which have accepted said Chapter Four Hundred and Sixty-eight or accept this Section, by vote at an Annual Town Meeting."

- ARTICLE 12. If it is voted to place the office of the Chief of Police within the classified Civil Service, shall the Town vote to provide for the continuance in said office of Ralph J. Hulslander, the present incumbent thereof.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of Harding Street as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing Harding Street; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to be used for Post-War Public Works Projects when the Post-War Public Works Committee declares an emergency exists; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of purchasing lands near or adjacent to the High School Buildings to be used for school recreational and athletic purposes; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of defraying civil engineering expenses on land near or abutting the High School; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of Miland Avenue as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

- ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundrad(\$400) Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of repairing the Varney Playground by reason of the damage caused there by fire, wind, and lightning; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and convey by a good and sufficient deed all the lands conveyed to the Town by Roberta Sadler, Mary A. Gamage, and William H. Helleur; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars for the purpose of reimbursing the First Congregational Society(Unitarian) for expenses incurred in priming and painting the rim and gold leafing the hands and numbers of the four clock faces on the clock located in the steeple of the church of said Society; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000) Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of defending tax abatement, cases; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Hundred(\$1500) Dollars to be used as a Post-War Project for the Cemetery Commission, the money so appropriated to be used exclusively in the Pine Ridge Cemetery and under the direction of the Cemetery Commission.
- ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to pay bills presented by the Laycold Pavement Co.; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to request the Department of Corporations and Taxation Division of Accounts to make an audit of all the Town of Chelmsford accounts; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred(\$1200) Dollars for the purpose of foreclosing tax titles held by the Town of Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred (\$300) Dollars for the purpose of paying for group insurance for the firemen; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 26. Tosee if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of settling claims and suits against the Town; or act in relation thereto.

- ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of defraying the salary of the Consultant and Director of the program for the Rehabilitation of Veterans; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account a sum not exceeding Two Thousand (\$2000) Dollars to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee, as provided in General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 6; or act in relation thereto.
- ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Assessors to use a sum of money in the amount such as the Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts may approve as free cash, said sum of money to be applied in determining the tax rate for the year 1944; gract in relation thereto.
