



	Westlands

On Monday, the fifth day of March, 1945, being the first Monday in said month, at 12 o'clock noon, for the following purposes:

To bring in their votes for the following officers;

Moderator for one year. One Selectman for three years. One Member of the Board of Public Welfare for three years. Treasurer and Tax Collector for three years. Town Clerk for three years. One Assessor for three years. One Member of the Board of Health for three years. One School Committee Member for three years. One Cemetery Commissioner for three years. One Park Commissioner for three years. Two Trustees of Adams Library for three years. One Sinking Fund Commissioner for three years. One Member of the Planning Board for five years. Tree Warden for three years. One Constable for one year.

All on one ballot.

The Polls will be open from 12 noon to 8 P.M. and to meet in the High School Auditorium at Chelmsford on the following Monday, the 12th day of March, 1945 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act upon the following articles, viz:

ARTICLE 1.

To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees; or act in relation

ARTICLE 2.

To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray Town charges for the current year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3.

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town: and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4.

To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue of the current financial year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 5.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money with which to meet unpaid bills for the year 1944; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the County of Middlesex, as required by law, the Town's share of the Middlesex County Tuberculosis Hospital as assessed in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 111 of the General Laws; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 7.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred (\$1200) Dollars for the purpose of foreclosing tax titles held by the Town of Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 8.

In the event that an appropriation is made for Chapter 90 work for the Highway Department, to see if the Town will vote to transfer a sufficient sum of money from the Excess and Deficiency account to balance the amount of money to be contributed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the County of Middlesex, until such time as the said Commonwealth and County have paid into the Town of Chelmsford treasury their respective grants; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9.

To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of three members, or the purpose of investigating the advisability of purchasing voting machines to be used at elections; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 10.

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning-By-Laws by the addition of the following definition to Article 2 of said By-Law:

Tourists home: A domicile or private residence where rooms are rented to overnight guests;

or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11.

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a Committee of four persons to work with the Board of Fire Engineers for the purpose of obtaining complete plans, specifications, and costs of erecting two new fire stations, one in the Center and one in North Chelmsford; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Hundred (\$1400) Dollars to be expended by this Committee to procure said plans, specifications and costs, said Committee to make a full and complete report at the next Town Meeting; or ast in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred (\$600) Dollars for the purpose of purchasing pipe and other necessary equipment to effect the installation of a hydrant to be located on the dump at the end of Jensen Street; or act in relation thereto. Supervision of this work will be supplied by the Water District and the labor by the Town.

ARTICLE 13.

To see if the Town will vote to close the Westlands Dump and cease to use as a dumping ground the land known as Westlands Dump, which land is more particularly described in a deed from George M. Wright et al to Inhabitants of Chelmsford, dated June 11, 1931 and recorded with Middlesex North District Registry of Deeds, Book 803, Page 238; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14.

In the event of an affirmative vote under Article 13, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Hundred Fifty (\$1250) Dollars, or some other sum, for the purpose of purchasing from Ray. S. Byam a tract of land containing about thirteen (13) acres, more or less, and situated in the easterly part of Chelmsford on the northeasterly side of Riverneck Road near the River Meadow Brook, said property to be used as a dump. This transaction shall be under the supervision of the Board of Health of the Town of Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15.

To see what action if any the Town will take relative to the collection of garbage throughout the town; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16.

In the event of favorable action under Article 15, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money sufficient to carry out the purposes set forth in Article 15; or act in relation thereto.

On a motion made by Karl M. Perham, it was voted, to authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town; and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary.

UNDER ARTICLE 4.

On a motion made by Harold C. Petterson, it was voted, that the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the current financial year, beginning January 1st, 1945, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17 Chapter 44 of the General Laws.

UNDER ARTICLE 5.

On a motion made by Raymond H. Greenwood, it was voted, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$88.96 to meet unpaid bills of the year 1944. 398 voted in the affirmative and no one voted in the negative. This required a 4/5 vote and was carried. The sum of \$2,521.63 was also voted to meet unpaid bills for the year 1944, this required a majority vote and was carried, the sum total of both appropriations to meet unpaid bills for the year 1944, totaled \$2,610.59.

UNDER ARTICLE 6.

On a motion made by Raymond H. Greenwood, it was voted, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,928.02 to pay the County of Middlesex, as required by law, the Town's share of the Middlesex County Tuberculosis Hospital as assessed in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 111 of the General Laws.

UNDER ARTICLE 7.

On a motion made by Harold C. Petterson, it was voted, to raise and

appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the purpose of foreclosing tax titles held by the Town of Chelmsford.

UNDER ARTICLE 8.

On a motion made by Harold C. Petterson, it was voted to transfer the sum of \$4,500.00 from the Excess and Deficiency account to the account in the Highway Department called, Chapter 90 Work, to balance the amount to be contributed by the County of Middlesex and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, until such time as the said Commonwealth and County have paid into the Town of Cheimsford Treasury their respective grants.

UNDER ARTICLE 9.

In regard to this article of appointing a committee to investigate the advisability of purchasing voting machines, it was voted to dismiss this article.

UNDER ARTICLE 10.

On a motion made by Howard D. Smith, it was voted to amend the Zoning By-Laws by the addition of the following definition to Article 2 of said By-Laws;

Tourists Home: A domicile or private residence where rooms are rented to overnight guests.

UNDER ARTICLE 11.

On a motion made by John Dixon, it was voted to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of four persons to work with the Board of Fire Engineers for the purpose of obtaining complete plans, specifications, and costs of erecting two new fire stations, one in the Center and one in North Chelmsford; and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 to be expended by this Committee to procure said plans, specifications and costs, said Committee to make a full and complete report at a special Town Meeting to be called for that purpose. The Moderator appointed, John J. Monahan; Wm. T. Picken; Harold A. Fraser and T.W. Emerson.

UNDER ARTICLE 12.

On a motion made by Edward Hoyt, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the purpose of purchasing pipe and other necessary equipment to effect the installation of a hydrant to be located on the dump at the end of Jensen Street. Supervision of this work will be supplied by the Water District and the labor by the Town.

UNDER ARTICLE 13.

On a motion made by Warren McDonnell, that a special committee be appointed to consist of the Members of the Board of Health and six other citizens, one from each precinct of the town, to be nominated by the Moderator, to recommend a new site or sites for the Town Dump, which site or sites shall, in the opinion of the committee, be most suitable to and serve the best interests of all the inhabitants of Chelmsford, and report back its conclusions and recommendations at a Special Town Meeting to be called not later than July 1, 1945.

On this motion 221 voted No, and 195 voted yes. The motion was lost and the article defeated.

UNDER ARTICLE 14.

In regard to the appropriation of \$1,250.00 for the purchase of land

for a new dump, it was voted to dismiss this article.

UNDER ARTICLE 15.

On a motion made by Harry L. Shedd, Jr., it was voted that the Town of Chelmsford collect garbage throughout the town.

UNDER ARTICLE 16.

On a motion made by Harry L. Shedd Jr. it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the purpose of the collection of garbage to be under the jurisdiction and supervision of the Board of Health who shall have full and complete authority to make whatever arrangements they see fit to collect the garbage throughout the town.

UNDER ARTICLE 17.

On a motion made by Murtaugh Borrows, it was voted to accept the provisions of Section 120 of Chapter 94 of the General Laws,

UNDER ARTICLE 18.

On a motion made by Charles A. Pierce, to instruct our Representative to the General Court to advise the Town as to the legal steps necessary to consolidate the several water districts in the Town of Chelmsford into one, to be Town owned etc., it was voted to dismiss this article.

UNDER ARTICLE 19.

On a motion made by Raymond H. Greenwood, it was voted that the Moderator appoint a Committee of five persons to investigate the advisability of the Town paying a bonus to its citizens upon their discharge from the Armed Forces, said committee to report its findings at the next town meeting. The Moderator appointed as this committee, Wilhelm T. Johnson, George R. Morris, George L. Waite, Frank A. P. Coburn and Robert W. Barris.

UNDER ARTICLE 20.

On a motion made by Raymond H. Greenwood, it was voted to transfer the sum of \$2,000.00 from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Account.

UNDER ARTICLE 21.

On a motion made by Sidney Dupee, it was voted, to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account a sum of \$2,000.00 to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee as provided in General Laws, Chapter 4ρ , Section 6.

UNDER ARTICLE 22.

On a motion made by John H. Valentine, it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used by the Veterans Service Committee in the performance of its duties in rendering aid to veterans and ex-veterans of the Armed Forces of the United States.

UNDER ARTICLE 23.

On a motion made by John H. Valentine it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,750.00 for the purpose of settling suits and claims now pending against the Town.

UNDER ARTICLE 24:

It was voted to dismiss this article.

UNDER ARTICLE 25.

On a motion made by Warren Wright, it was voted that the Town vote to authorize the Board of Assessors to use a sum of money not in excess of \$25,000. as the Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation may approve as free cash, to be used in determining the tax rate for the year 1945.

At the conclusion of the meeting the Moderator stated that for the past sixty years the Town of Cheimsford had had but two Moderators, the late J. Adams Bartlett and himself, they both having served for thirty years each, the Moderator then thanked the voters for the privilege of having been allowed to serve in that capacity for such a lengthy period and on a motion made by Selectman Karl M. Perham, a rising vote of appreciation was given to Moderator Walter Perham.

I respectfully submit the report of Welfare Agent for the year ending December 31, 1945.

I have had the pleasure of serving as Temporary Agent for the entire year, and hope I may be given the privilege of continuing in this capacity during the coming year.

In June of 1945 the Soldiers' Benefits division was set up as a separate department under the direction of the Board of Selectmen and their agent, Gordon DeWolf, whose report can be found elsewhere. The following is a summary of all categories of relief under my direction:

The case load on Old Age Assistance remained throughout the year at practically the same number and we ended the year with a case load of 210 against 211 of the previous year.

The changes which were thought would become a law this year, especially in regard to children's liability to support, did not become effective but do go into effect January 1, 1946.

I have experienced the same difficulty in the past year in obtaining information required by the State from many children of Old Age Assistance recipients. Lack of cooperation from these children often results in unpleasant experiences for the recipients, which we would like to eliminate if possible.

Our expenditures are increasing as can easily be seen by the following table, not so much due to regular cash grants but to the many additional items to which the recipients are entitled, including doctors' service, dental service, dentures, glasses, trusses, etc. which are mounting considerably.

In addition to the above expenditures \$1/44.96 was paid to other cities and towns for cases with Chelmsford settlements.

For obvious reasons and in anticipation of lesser contributions from ohildren under the new law in 1946, it is felt that a very liberal increase in the Old Age Assistance appropriation should be made so that we will have sufficient funds for the entire year and not be forced to end the year with any deficit.

I call attention to the fact that we receive reimbursement from the Federal Government for 2 up to \$40 spent on each case, 2/3 from the State of the remaining settled cases and total reimbursement on State or unsettled cases. Out of the 210 cases aided in December, 1945, 33 were unsettled, 21 settled in other cities and towns. This means that Chelmsford is fully reimbursed for 54 cases and all but 1/6 of the remainder for 156 cases, which is about the average of every month during the year.

In order to expect this reimbursement, many detailed records and reports must be made and the department must conform to the requirements of both the State and Federal Government rules. To do this properly an adequate office force should be maintained and it is recommended that a permanent clerk be employed. As this and all other positions in the department are controlled by Civil Service regulations, the positions of the department must be made to conform to their rules, and we have experienced difficulty with this in the past.

I have received the full cooperation of the entire Board of Welfare, with Mr. Raymond Greenwood as Chairman and also the Bureau of Old Age Assistance, consisting of John Dusseault, Karl Perham, Raymond Greenwood and John C. Donahoe, and I wish to thank them for their sincere interest in the department at all times.

REPORT OF SLAUGHTERING INSPECTOR

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To the Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford;

Much time during the past year the planning board has devoted to special questions which have to do with the application of the goning by-law.

There has been considerable demand for the construction of sidewalks in the settled portions of the town, and this subject was considered from its many angles, especially if permanent sidewalks were established. Very few of our streets have been surveyed and permanent grades established, and because of this only a more or loss temporary sidewalk should be built until the final grades are set. One meeting with the board of selectmen was held in the fall, at which meeting the subject of sidewalks was taken up, and many points having to do with them were talked over, such as where they were most needed, the type of top material best to use, width, probable cost per yard, all of which led to the conclusion that some sidewalks should be constructed the coming season, if money is appropriated for this work at the March meeting. One meeting with the superintendent of streets was held last spring, at which time the subject of construction of sidewalks was discussed. The planning board feel that some new sidewalks should be constructed each year in the thickly settled parts of the town, and thus provide more protection from the rapidly moving traffic of the present day, especially those streets near the public schools, also the churches.

Preliminary plans for one new land sub-division have been submitted to the planning board during the past year, but the final plans are as yet not complete. Due to the great shortage of building material, and the even greater cost of the same, there will probably not be much new building during the coming season. From information received it seems that a simple four room cottage, or bungalow will cost about six thousand dollars to build under present conditions, and while there is plenty of money and credit available, the abnormal cost for construction at the present time and in the near future, is such, that the depreciation in value would be very great when real estate values gradually come back to normal in the next few years.

MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

During 1945, the same as previous war years, the work of the Middlesex County Extension Service was devoted to those projects which would help in the winning of the war.

The fact that Middlesex County farmers increased their production about one third over pre-war years is proof that everyone did his part in the food production program. Labor on farms was the critical factor in food production and a great deal of the time was spent on finding labor and making it available. In addition to local help foreign labor was imported from Jamaica and Newfoundland and prisoners of war were used on market gardening and fruit farms.

Selective Service Boards cooperated fully in the whole program by trying to allow men to remain on farms who were absolutely essential. The Extension Service checked these farms and made reports to the local Selective Service Boards.

The usual assistance was given, such as assistance to Victory gardeners, sending out information on spray schedules for fruit growers and market gardeners and keeping farmers informed as to the regulations on farm equipment, price schedules, especially for eggs and poultry, fruits and vegetables, and help with any emergency cases upon personal request.

With the homemakers of the county, food preservation and conservation in the home were the main projects. Information was given regarding successful methods of canning and freezing of fruits and vegetables as well as meats. Due to the severe shortage of clothing materials demonstrations were continued on clothing renovation, shortcuts in clothing construction and the maintenance of sewing machines. To help with general nutrition demonstrations were given in the best use of vegetables, cooking with a minimum amount of sugar and preparation of community meals.

Boys and girls were encouraged as usual to carry on 4-H Club work and developed such projects as food production, food preservation, clothing construction and meal preparation. This work was made possible only by volunteer local leaders and the active interest of local committee members and parents.

The Middlesex County Extension Service shares with other organizations, farmers, homemakers, young people, as well as those organizations interested in agriculture, the satisfaction of knowing that during war years for the most part agricultural products of the area were available in sufficient amounts so that there was actually no food shortage in any town within the county.

REPORT OF THE FOREST WARDEN

The Forest fire conditions prevailing during 1945 were less hazardous than in any previous year for some time, with the exception of the early part through April 20th; during this period several fires were extinguished in various sections of the town, that could easily have developed into extensive and expensive events.

Of 107 calls for the apparatus for the year only $\mu 5$ of these required extra help, the others being handled by your Warden.

Owing to the large numbers of incendiary fires in the Town in 1945 I think it advisable to include in this report a section of the Fire Laws, not generally known, which reads as follows:

Forest Trespass and Damage, etc.

G. L. c. 266-5. Setting Fire to Woodpile, etc. Whoever wilfully and maliciously burns or otherwise destroys or injures a pile or parcel of wood, boards, timber or other lumber, or any fence, bars or gate, or a stack of grain, hay or other vegetable product, or any vetatable product severed from the soil and not stacked or any standing tree, grain, grass or other standing product of the soil, or the soil itself, of another, shall be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for not more than five years or by a fine of not more than five hundred dollars and imprisonment in jail for not more than one year.

At such times when necessary I have received excellent and prompt cooperation from all the various units of the Fire Department and the Police Department, also a few individuals who are always ready and able, day or night to assist in emergency, namely: Mr Walter Edwards, Dist. Chief of West Chelmsford; Mr. Edward Hoyt, Asst. Engr. of Fire Dept and Dep. Warden Geo A. Parkhurst of the Centre.

Especially to the above mentioned and to all others who in any way helped to keep serious fires out of our Town, I extend my sincere thanks.

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

Annual Report of the School Committee

and

The Superintendent of Schools Year ending December 31, 1945

To the Citizens of Chelmsford:

At the regular meeting of the Chelmsford School Committee held on January 16, 1946 it was voted to accept the report of the Superintendent of Schools.

From August 1, 1945 through December 31, 1945 the Chelmsford School Committee has held 20 regular meetings and numerous conferences. Discussion of athletic and educational programs, inspection and study of school buildings, and a study of School business management have been major considerations at these meetings. The School Committee has worked to improve the educational facilities and to enlarge the opportunities for education for the youth of our town. We feel that these results are expected by the people, and are deserved by the school children. We also feel that these goals may be accomplished without undue tax burden.

The people of East Chelmsford, North Chelmsford and South Chelmsford have expressed themselves as desirous of maintaining all schools in these parts of the town. Thus increases in the school budget have become necessary.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Chelmsford, Massachusetts December 31, 1945

To the Chelmsford School Committee:

I am pleased to present this my first report of the Chelmsford Schools. The report is divided into the following major sections:

In presenting this record of our schools, I am not unmindful of the intelli-

GEORGE S. WRIGHT

Superintendent of Schools, Chelmsford, Mass. 1928-45

On July 31, 1945, Mr. George S. Wright retired as Superintendent of the Chelmsford Schools, ending a 17 year period of service and leadership in Chelmsford. July 31, 1945 is all the more noteworthy in that it marks for Mr. Wright the completion of 50 years of service as a teacher and administrator in New England. Mr. Wright began his career as an educator in Bridport, Vt. in the year 1895. After serving as a teacher in the upper grades in Bridport he was invited to serve in the High School in Spencer, Mass. Later, Mr. Wright moved to Bethel, Vermont where he served as Principal of the High School. After a number of years in the Town of Bethel, he became Principal of the High School in Northfield, Vt. Mr. Wright served as Superintendent of Schools in the City of St. Albans, Vt. for a period of 17 years. Before coming to Chelmsford he was Superintendent of Schools at Windsor Locks, Connecticut.

Mr. Wright brought about many improvements in the Chelmsford Schools, and worked constantly for the welfare and improvement of the classroom teacher. In this, his year of retirement, his Christmas greeting took the form of a farewell and tribute of appreciation to the classroom teacher. Excerpts from this stirring tribute are repeated here. "The teacher in the classroom does not work as a scientist; she is an artist... She is cutting a gem of many facets, an intellect to be trained,

emotions to be brought under control, ideals to be instilled, appreciations to be developed, ambitions to be guided, the whole child in all his aspects. It is material valuable beyond price, a human soul."

Mr. Wright's many friends wish him health and happiness in the years ahead.

Projects and Problems

Administration

At the start of the school year there were only two telephones in the school system. One of these was located in the office of the High School Principal, and the other in the office of the Superintendent of Schools. The office of the school nurse and each of the seven elementary schools were without telephone service. In October telephones were installed in each of the elementary schools and in the office of the school nurse. This service has greatly facilitated the administration of the schools, has increased the safety factor in case of fire or accident, and has made the work of the school nurse more effective.

The continuing of a secretary in the office of the Superintendent of Schools has relieved this official of many clerical duties, thus affording increased time for consultation, supervision, planning, and other major problems of administering a school system.

The taking of the school census has revealed valuable statistics concerning the children in Chelmsford. Important among these statistics is the number coming of school age each year.

Personnel

While many factors must be considered in appraising the efficiency and effectiveness of teachers, training and experience are perhaps two aspects which are of outstanding significance. The following statistics indicate that Chelmsford teachers stand well in these respects.

School Costs

An analysis of school expenditures for the year 1945 is presented in the

section of this report which deals with school statistics. The analysis indicates that nearly \$158,000.00 was expended during the year just closed. In recent months there have been many requests for improved transportation facilities, for the establishment of kindergartens, for a physical education supervisor for girls, for new equipment, and for numerous major repairs to buildings. An additional teacher is needed in the High School. Teachers have asked for and should receive increased salaries. All these requests and needs will make it necessary to increase the school budget for 1946.

Concerning teachers salaries, a recent report prepared by the Research Division of the Massachusetts Teachers' Federation for the school year 1944-1945 indicated that among the 85 towns in Massachusetts with populations of 5000 or more, the town of Chelmsford ranked 85th from the top in average salaries paid to teachers, supervisors, and principals. Thus according to this report, Chelmsford teachers were the poorest paid teachers among the 85 towns in this group during 1944-1945. The adoption of a salary schedule with higher salaries for teachers, supervisors, and principals is strongly recommended.

On October 1, 1945, there were 1314 students in membership in the Chelmsford schools. These students were distributed among eight different schools (actually) in nine buildings) as shown in the tabulation in the section on statistics. In considering the problem of increased expenditures, it would be well to keep in mind the large number of separate school units and the consequent cost of operating such units for this number of students.

The Educational Program

Basic to all other considerations in our school system are the pupil to be educated and the program set up to make possible the accomplishment of his education. These two matters have been under constant study since the start of the school year. A physical education program for boys has been established; a school lunch room serving approximately 500 students each day has been set up; curriculum committees in three major subject fields have been organized; a testing program has been started; provisions have been made for greater school publicity; a study of the high school curriculum has been made indicating the need for more and varied educational offerings for students in this age group; and consideration has been given to the need for a pre-school clinic, adequate guidance programs, better visual aid materials, and the establishment of kindergartens.

The physical education program was inaugurated in September, 1945, when Mr. Patrick Pappalardo began his work as Supervisor of Physical Education for Boys. Mr. Pappalardo's work includes physical education instruction for boys from grades 7 through 12. In some of the smaller schools grade 6 is also included. The development of physically fit youth, and the consequent strengthening of good character are two of the aims of this program. Actual activities include testing followed by remedial work, group games, hygiene and organized athletics.

In order to improve our facilities for serving lunch to bus pupils and others who regularly stayed at school at noon time at the McFarlin School and at the High School, the McFarlin School gymmasium was converted into a lunch room. Some kitchen facilities already existed in the school. These were added to and the kitchen area enlarged. The gymmasium-assembly hall was converted into a lunch room.

Getting the lunch room started was a most difficult task for there was no available money to pay for new equipment, to defray the cost of enlarging the kitchen, and to pay the wages of employees. These problems were solved, however, and the solution provided a splendid example of school-community cooperation. Confererences and group meetings were held at which the problems were discussed. All

concerned cooperated in the common solution of organization problems. The Chelmsford Center Parent-Teacher organization was especially active and helpful. It raised and expended several hundred dollars for dishes, other equipment, and repairs. Other groups assisted and gave their support too. The South Chelmsford Parent-Teacher organization contributed fifty dollars.

The lumch room opened on October 1, 1945 offering complete lunches for fifteen cents. This low cost lunch was made possible by assistance received from the Federal-State Community Lunch Program. For each complete lunch served, the Community Lunch Program paid seven cents. Thus, the lunch room actually received twenty two cents for each of these lunches. This fact and the decision of the School Committee to operate the lunch room on a non-profit basis have made possible the sale of a complete lunch--hot dish plus bread and butter and milk - at such a low price. Approximately 500 boys and girls are served each day from 11:15 A.M. to 12:30P.M.

After organization plans were complete Mrs. Irene Emerson, a graduate of Simmons College and a former teacher of Household Arts, was selected to carry on the actual management of the lunch room. Her duties included: the selection and supervision of a staff of workers, the buying of supplies, the planning of memus, the keeping of records and payrolls and the making of monthly reports to the School Superintendent. Thus, the lunch room and its personnel form a unit of the school system under the direct control of the Superintendent of Schools.

Under the careful management of Mrs. Emerson, the lunch room is now operating at no cost to the town. All wages, food costs, and incidental expenses are met from income received from the sale of food and from the Community Lunch subsidy.

The cooperation of parents, teachers, pupils and workers in the successful completion of this project is most sincerely appreciated.

Another project of great significance is the development of curriculum committees. Early in October three such committees were organized to study methods and materials in the fields of English, Social Studies, and Mathematics. Each committee includes representatives from all grades from 1 through 12. Committees meet monthly with interim conferences of the committee chairmen and the Superintendent of Schools. Major problems being studied are: the teaching of reading, subject matter content, the selection of textbooks, and the coordination of the work in the three fields in the various schools.

In September all first grade children were tested to obtain data helpful in carrying out the teaching process. Similar tests will be given to all students before the close of the present school year.

The testing program now under development will include:

- Tests of mental ability for all students.
- Achievement tests at the end of the school year for all students.
- Vocational aptitude tests for High School Students.

Each school principal has been asked to help make parents better acquainted with our schools by reporting school news regularly.

An examination of subject offerings in the High School indicates that students have only two choices of program. A pupil may take a program in preparation for college, or he may take a program in preparation for commercial work. This latter

program is mainly concerned with preparation for secretarial and bookkeeping positions. There are no provisions for those who, by interest and aptitude, are unsuited to the programs now offered.

The youth of Chelmsford have as many and as varied interests as youth in other communities, yet the real interests and needs of only a small segment of our High School youth are now being met. Instruction in shop work for boys, household arts for girls, and agriculture for boys would do much to meet the needs of our youth.

Action is now being taken to make possible the establishment of an agricultural program to begin in September 1946. The State and Federal governments will provide two thirds of the cost of the instructor's salary if the program is established. Approval must first be obtained from the Massachusetts Division of Vocational Agriculture in the State Department of Education. It is also necessary for the town to vote to adopt vocational education at its regular town meeting if the program is to be established. The financial assistance provided by the State and Federal governments is shown in the following table.

lst year 100% of instructors salary in advance is provided by the government

2nd year 75% of instructors salary is provided in advance by the government.
25% of instructors salary is voted by the town. Two thirds of this 25% is returned to the town by the government at the end of the year.

3rd year 50% of instructors salary is provided in advance by the government.
50% of instructors salary is voted by the town. Two thirds of this 50% is returned to the town by the government at the end of the year.

4th year 25% of instructors salary is provided in advance by the government.
75% of instructors salary is voted by the town. Two thirds of this 75% is returned to the town by the government at the end of the year.

5th year 100% of the instructors salary is voted by the town. Two thirds of this 100% is returned to the town by the government at the end of the year.

The arrangement for the fifth year is continued as long as the course is offered.

The establishment of shop courses and household arts will require additional building facilities.

School Plant

The School Committee has invited the State Department of Education to make a study of our schools. It is hoped that the results of this study can be made public during 1946.

Chelmsford is organized on the 8 - 4 plan, that is, the elementary schools are eight grade units, and the high school is a four year unit. There are seven elementary schools and one high school. The relative size of these schools is shown in the tabulation in the section on statistics. Four of the elementary schools have fewer than 100 pupils each this year. One, the South School, has only 34 children in a total of six grades, (this year).

With the exception of the Westlands School, all school buildings are in need of major repairs. A partial list of repairs includes: painting inside and outside, improved lighting (at East Chelmsford two classrooms have only one light each), and improved toilet facilities. A typical example of building needs is indicated in the condition of the MoFarlin School. This school has not been painted inside or outside for more than 17 years. The cast stone around the building needs to be pointed up, and many new sets of window shades are needed.

The Princeton Street School is so old and outmoded that it should be replaced with a new school. The Princeton Street School consists of two separate buildings, one of which was used in the Civil War. The water pipes in the older building must be drained of water on cold nights, and salt placed in the toilet bowls, to prevent freezing. Although the buildings are only approximately twenty feet apart, each has its own heating plant. It is recommended that plans be drawn up for a new school to replace the two buildings now used For the Princeton School. Action by the Town to actually erect the new building to take place at a later date.

The present High School structure does not permit the setting-up of courses in shop and household arts. In addition, the gymnasium-auditorium is actually only an auditorium, and is gradually being ruined by continued use as a gymnasium. Shower room facilities adjacent to the gymnasium are hopelessly inadequate. The solution to all these problems would seem to be in the erection of a Junior High School next to the present High School building. This new building would provide for grades 7, 8, and 9, would provide facilities for shop work and household arts; would include a new gymnasium with adequate locker room facilities; and would contain a modern cafeteria. It would be close enough to the High School so that all these facilities could be used by pupils in both schools. It is recommended that plans be drawn up for a new Junior High School. Action by the Town to actually srect the new building to take place at a later date.

Closely related to building needs is the problem of improvement of school grounds. Of major importance is the development of suitable playing areas at the site of the McFarlin and High School buildings. Much study of this problem has already been carried out by the Athletic Committee. It is recommended that action be taken to carry out the recommendations of these groups in 1946.

Special Reports

To the Superintendent of Schools,

Physical Education in the Chelmsford Schools

Fundamental purpose of the Physical Education Program: We are presenting a program which we hope will show in the progress of the individual pupil and in his interest in achieving and maintaining a personal high standard of physical fitness. A medical examination is required before a boy is allowed to participate in physical education.

In grades six, seven and eight, an informal program is being carried out which we expect will develop physical fitness and health and teach the fundamentals of major and minor sports. The boys in these grades have been tested for postural defects, and a certain amount of time will be given to correctives. The fundamentals of hygiene will be taught in the grade schools.

The lack of space and equipment in the grade schools is not conducive to the best physical education program, but each school is being given the best program possible with what is available. It would be advisable in the future to give the P.F.I. Test in the grade schools.

The program in the High School is determined by the use of the Physical Fitness Index Test which points out the needs of the individual. Taking the school by and large our results show a definite need for developing arm strength. At the present time the test can not be completed until the arrival of apparatus which has been ordered.

Although in the High School every boy has physical education five periods each week, the High School locker room and shower facilities are not adequate.

The P.F.I. Defined: The Physical Fitness Index is a measure of physical condition. It is calculated by dividing one's achieved Strength Index by a Norm for one's sex, weight, and age, at the time of testing. The average individual less than 21 years old will have a P.F.I. of about 100. Others less than 21 years old will have P.F.I.'s varying from about 40 to 200.

What P.F.I.'s Indicate: Individuals with Indices above 100 will have greater physical and mental endurance and precision of movement than those with lower scores. That is, they will be able to keep going longer, more efficiently and at greater speeds, and recuperate faster from fatigue or illness. They will be able to do more work in a given time than others of the same sex, weight and age whose P.F.I.'s are lower.

What Low P.F.I.'s Indicate: The lower the P.F.I. the greater the need for special exercise, diet, and advice by physicians and physical educators. Low P.F.I.'s are the results of physical defects, improper food or eating habits, improper exercise, emotional disturbances, or other physical or mental strains or drains or injuries. Individuals with P.F.I.'s below 85 to 90 ought to engage in supervised remedial activities or rest daily, until their Indices are 100 or higher. Otherwise they are likely to decline steadily in physical fitness to even lower levels.

Comparisons: Repeated P.F.I. tests are of inestimable value in determining whether one is gaining or losing in physical fitness and therefor whether one's corrective regime is adapted to one's needs. Many cases are on record of obscure defects and wrong habits, which escape the attention of physicians and physical educators, being discovered through comparison of P.F.I. records. It is easily possible for individuals of almost any age to raise their P.F.I.'s from 40 to 100%, with a proportionate increase in physical fitness, power for service and personal happiness.

Intramural Program: Lack of space and equipment governs the individual grade school intramural activities. The following is a list of activities which we will participate in this Winter subject to circumstances at each school:

At the High School we have 21 intramural basketball teams and three round robins are now in progress. We also intend to give boxing, wrestling, volleyball, and ice hookey if an area adjacent to the High School is flooded.

Everyone is elegible to participate in intramurals regardless of scholastic standing.

Athletics: We had 37 football candidates in September. All those that remained elegible scholastically were carried for the remainder of the season, with the able assistance of Coach Murray Hicks. The football team which represented Chelmsford this Fall displayed the cooperation, self-sacrifice, and good sportsmanship which is expected of our varsity teams.

We will continue with both boys and girls basketball teams. This year Chelmsford will compete in the Lowell Suburban Basketball League.

The following is a report of the activities and work of the School Nurse. The School Nurse is Agent of the Board of Public Health and works cooperatively with the school.

To the Superintendent of Schools,

All pupils have been given physical examinations by the school physicians, Drs. Arthur G. Scoboria and Dr. J. E. Boucher. Those boys participating in athletics were given more rigid examinations.

In March the Chelmsford High School was x-rayed by the State Department of Public Health in spite of the fact it was difficult to obtain films. The T.B. Committee paid for having this done.

There is a great deal of clerical work to be done. Statistics are showing that more and more records are required. At present I take some of the work to the High School but this is not altogether a satisfactory arrangement as much of the work is of a confidential nature.

A telephone has been installed in my office and I would like to thank the members of the school committee as it has proven to be a great time saver.

I was asked to dispose of some Civilian Defense materials such as gauze, bandage, splints, etc. I outfitted six boxes as First Aid kits for the various schools.

In closing I should like to thank Dr. Handy and members of the School Committee for their assistance during the year 1945.

MoFarlin School Cafeteria

I am pleased to submit the first report of the McFarlin School Lunchroom. Our appreciation of the financial assistance from the Center Parent Teacher Association which made the opening of the lunchroom possible should be mentioned here together with our thanks to the South Chelmsford Parent Teachers Association, the Scelmekatchamo Club and the Westlands Improvement Association.

During October, our first month of operation, we served in twenty one days 6633 hot plates and 9850 bottles of milk together with soups, sandwiches and desserts. A total of approximately 500 students are served daily at the present time.

The McFarlin School Lunchroom is operated in connection with the Federal Community Lunch Program and serves teachers and students of the High School in addition to the grade school. With better facilities which we hope will become available we look forward to a continuation of our initial success.

Report of the Athletic Advisory Committee

We are pleased to submit the first report of the Athletic Advisory Committee for the Cheimsford Schools.

The Committee was organized in February 1945, and has held monthly meetings since that time.

The Board has devoted its' time and efforts to the improvement of athletics, and the development of a physical fitness program in all the schools of Chelmsford.

After interviewing a great many candidates, the Committee recommended to the School Board the appointment of Mr. Patrick Pappalardo as Physical Education Director and Coach. The School Board approved this recommendation and he began his duties as such at the opening of the school year. A Physical Fitness program was inaugurated by Mr. Pappalardo in all the schools, which while in its' infancy, gives promise of great benefit to all the students.

The Committee was instrumental in procuring the loan of the bleachers used at the games, buying Physical Fitness Index Equipment, parallel bars, and football equipment needed for the season.

A sum of money was appropriated to erect basketball boards in the elementary school yards where space is available, and for volley ball equipment where space for basketball is not available.

Money has also been set aside for the purchase of basketball jackets for the High School team, climbing ropes, and rings for the High School Gym Class.

The Committee gave \$150.00 to the High School Band for uniforms and voted to pay the balance still needed which is approximately \$300.00

At the present time the High School Athletic field consists only of a football field that faces directly into the sun. The pupils of the Chelmsford High School deserve and should have adequate facilities to participate in such activities as football, baseball, track, and hockey. Additionally, there are no bleach ers available for the convenience of spectators at any of the athletic events staged at the High School. It is the future aim of this Committee to correct this condition. A ways and means committee has been appointed to look into the possibility of having a suitable athletic field for the High School and the McFarlin School.

We wish to express our appreciation for the hearty cooperation of the School Committee, Supt. of Schools, High School A.A., Civic Committee, Police Dept., Dr. Scoboria for attending in an official capacity at the football games, Faculty Manager, Lowell Alumni Association, Board of Selectmen, and Superintendent of Highways.

We also extend our thanks to the advertisers and boosters of the program.

We invite any suggestions from Citizens of the Town that might enable us to better the athletic conditions in the schools of Chelmsford.

According to a report from the Department of Education of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, Chelmsford High School has had the

honor of being approved in Class A positively since 1918 and proably since 1916.

What Happens to Our Graduates

Thirty-five boys and thirty-one girls were graduated from Chelmsford High School on June 13, 1945.

Eleven of these young people entered colleges, two entered preparatory schools, one is a post-graduate in Chelmsford high and one is taking a nurse's training course.

Sixteen boys have joined the armed forces of our country.

Seventeen of the graduates of the commercial department are employed in office work. Ten of these former pupils passed the civil service examinations and are now on civil service apppointments.

The other graduates are working in various occupations in stores, factories and at home.

School Statistics

The following pages of statistics reveal information about school organization, membership, class size and school size, the extent of retardation in the grades, the trend in growth of the Chelmsford schools, expenditures and credits for the calendar year 1945, growth in school costs for the five year period begining in 1941 and ending in 1945, a comparison of State and local expenditures, and a list of graduates for the school year 1944-45.

The following are some significant observations:

- 1. Assuming that 30 pupils is a reasonable size for a class in the elementary schools, it can be seen from the statistics shown that 26 out of 38 elementary grades or grade combinations enrolled fewer than 30 pupils each during 1944-45.
- 2. The age-grade tables for boys and girls show the extent to which there is a condition of overageness in each grade. Children generally finish grade 8 in their 14th year. They generally finish High School in their 18th year.
- Chelmsford schools increased slightly in enrollment from 1935 to 1939, but steadily decreased from that year to 1945.

- 4. School expenditures have increased each year for a period of severaal years. These increases have been mainly in the cost of instruction, janitor service, and in operation and maintenance.
- 5. A comparison with the state average shows that expenditures in Chelmsford, however, are below the state averages in most respects.



The usual routine business of this department was handled throughout the year and it is the opinion of the members of the board that they have attended to these matters to the best interests of the townspeople; they also feel that their appointees have done likewise.

Our expenditures have not exceeded our 1945 appropriation.

Parents are requested by the Board to cooperate with the physicians and school nurse. If children are sent home from school it is for their own good as well as for the health of their schoolmates.

Children absent from school 5 days or more must have a "certificate of health" from one of the health physicians. Miss Simpson has been working hard with the members of the board in securing a high standard of health for the entire town.

The mass X-ray Projects in our fight against tuberculosis were conducted successfully at Chemsford High School. As we go topress, plans are being made for mass X-Raying of the Geo. C. Moore Scuring Mills and the Southwell Wool Combing Co. We wish to thank the Chelmsford Tuberculosis Committee for their support and co-operation.

The contract for the collection and disposal of garbage was awarded to C. J. Harvey. The townspeople seem to be very grateful for this service and many notes of praise have reached this department.

We have received many inquiries from nearby towns relative to the merits of this service.

Several conferences concerning health topics with State and County officials have been held by your local board.

The Board is presenting at the Annual Town Meeting an article calling for an appropriation to cover the services of the Assistant Meat Inspector during busy periods at the slaughtering houses. We also have another article stating that a certain fee shall be levied upon each head of cattle to be slaughtered. This is a suggestion by the State Department of Public Health and all cities and towns are urged to accept it. The members of the Board wish for favorable action on these two articles by the voters.

Our meetings are open to all citizens of the town.

To those officials of other departments for their cooperation during the year, we extend our thanks. Respectfully submitted

REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS

Board of Selectmen Gentlemen:

The work of this department has proceeded as usual during the past year, under orders of the Division of Livestock Disease Control of the State Department of Agriculture.

During the latter part of the year the tuberculin test was applied to 902 head of cattle in 102 stables and no reactors were found. This is the sixth successive year that no cattle have been found affected with tuberculosis. Owners of herds that were not tested last fall are requested to notify the Animal Inspector.

15 head of cattle and I bull have been shipped into town from without the State, on permits issued by the State Dept. All were released when identified by the proper test charts Several hundred cattle were shipped into town from other states (with permits) for immediate slaughter, these were trucked to a neighboring town.

A Virus Disease, that may attack man, although it mainly attacks horses and mules, is now the object of Veterinary research. It is known as Equine-Encephalomyelitis and the Bureau of Animal Industry has had reports of more than 500, 000 cases since 1935, in the United States, with a large percentage of deaths in animals not vaccinated. This disease is spread by the mosquito and if mosquito control becomes practical with widespread use of D.D.T. it may help to reduce such losses.

30 Dog bite cases have been reported by the Police, Doctors and Health Authorities. All were investigated. 21 Dogs were quarantined for observation.. All were released after a period of 14 days as no rabies developed.

Owners of dogs which have bitten humans are requested not to kill them until inspection has taken place, by your Animal Inspector and he has advised regarding the proper procedure.

Several requests for information about dairy cows coming from State authorities, have been investigated and reported.

He shall have and exercise all the powers and discharge all the duties conferred or imposed by statute upon engineers in towns except as herein provided, and shall appoint a deputy chief and such officers and firemen as he may think necessary, and may remove the same at any time for cause and after a hearing. He shall have full and absolute authority in the administration of the department, shall make all rules and regulations for its operation, shall report to the selectmen from time to time as they may require, and shall annually report to the town the condition of the department with his recommendations thereon; he shall fix the compensation of the permanent and call members of the fire department subject to the approval of the selectmen. In the expenditure of money the chief shall be subject to such further limitations as the town may from time to time prescribe.

43. Chief to Act as Forest Warden -- The chief of the fire department shall act as forest warden in all such towns, and shall have authority to appoint deputy wardens and fix their compensation subject to the approval of the selectmen.

44. Effect of Two Preceding Sections on Firemen under Civil Service -- The two preceding sections shall not effect the tenure of office nor apply to the removal of permanent and call members of fire departments in towns which have accepted chapter thirty-one or corresponding provisions of earlier laws. Said sections shall not apply to cities;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred (\$300) Dollars for the purpose of employing a Meat Inspector; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE /LL.

To see if the lown will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Hundred Fifty(\$1050) Dollars or some other sum for the purpose of purchasing an automobile for the police department, said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

APTICLE 45.
