



This measure requires that elections of officers of labor organizations shall be held at least annually. Sixty days' notice of a regular election and twenty days' notice of an election to fill one or more vacancies are required to be given by public announcement at a regular meeting, by notice in writing to each member, or in any other adequate manner. Candidates to be voted for must be nominated by a paper signed by ten members filed at least thirty days before a regular election and at least ten days before an election to fill a vacancy.

The voting at such an election must be by secret written or printed ballot. Watchers appointed by nominating members and by union officers may be present during the voting and counting of ballots.

Coercion and intimidation of members in connection with an election is prohibited, and violations of the provisions of the measure are made punishable by fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than two hundred dollars or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days or both.

This measure prohibits the calling of a strike by a labor organization in any business or plant or unit thereof, except when authorized by the vote of the majority of all the members of the organization employed in the business, plant or unit thereof. Such authorization is to be expressed by a secret written or printed ballot at a meeting called for that purpose.

The Labor Relations Commission is authorized to make rules for the conduct of the voting. Within twenty-four hours after the voting the labor organization conducting it shall make a written report of the result to the commission which shall be a permanent public record. If no report is filed the vote taken shall be void and a person making a false report shall be guilty of perjury.

Coercion and intimidation of members of a labor organization in connection with such voting is made a penal offense.

QUESTION NO. 8: Is it desirable that the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

ARTICLE

Section 1. No person shall be elected to the office of the President more than twice, and no person who has held the office of President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of the President more than once. But this article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this Article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President, or acting as President, during the term within which this Article becomes operative from holding the office of President or acting as President during the remainder of such term.

Section 2. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress—be ratified by the general court?

REPORT TO THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS

The following is a report of the work done under Article 17 of the Special Town Meeting held May 17, 1948:—

The work was started at the intersection of North and Davis Roads, and a transit and tape survey made of the following area:

Bounded on the East by North Road; on the North by Old Westford Road; on the West by Westford Street and on the South by Locke and Davis Roads.

Auxiliary lines were run east and west on Davis Road and Grandview Road, thus giving us three complete polygons with which to compute the accuracy of our survey. Tape surveys were then made of all the parcels within these areas.

Another transit and tape survey was made of the following area:-

Bounded on the East by Westford Street; on the North by Old Westford Road; on the West by the Chelmsford-Westford Town Line; and on the South by Pine Hill Road. Auxiliary lines have been run East and West, subdividing this area into several polygons. These polygons have been computed and found to be within our limits of closure. The tape survey, however, has not been completed.

The field work was done and the plans drawn by Mr. Lester W. Ball under the supervision of the undersigned.

It is hoped that the voters will allow us to continue this work.

REPORT OF WELFARE AGENT

To the Board of Public Welfare:

I respectfully submit the annual report of the Welfare Department for the year ending December 31, 1948.

The organization of the Department was changed somewhat in January of this year due to the death of the Agent, George C. Hood.

The Board of Welfare organized with Raymond Greenwood as chairman and the Bureau of Old Age Assistance, comprising the three members of the Board of Welfare and Attorney John C. Donohoe, organized with Theodore Emerson as chairman:

Following the death of Mr. Hood in January, Miss Marguerite E. Hoar received a temporary appointment as Agent and in March received her permanent appointment.

In January a case review was undertaken by the State Department of Welfare, the results of which showed that the office was very much undermanned. With few exceptions the case review was satisfactory, but many recommendations for the best interests of the department were made by the State.

As far as is known, during this year all recommendations made were complied with and the department is functioning in a proper manner.

In February Mr. Quincy B. Park was appointed as Social Worker. 90% of Mr. Park's time is spent on re-visiting all cases. Following the home visit a complete case recording is maintained for every case. Each re-visit is a complete up-to-date history of the entire case and at the time of the visit the budget is thoroughly gone over and revised according to the present situation. In addition to this all cases are thoroughly reviewed by the Agent. We are required to make two visits a year on Old Age Assistance, four visits on Aid to Dependent Children, but more often it is necessary to make five or six calls a year. All new cases require an initial visit and our new cases are steadily increasing. Mr. Park has done a most satisfactory job of re-visiting and his employment has enabled the Agent to devote time elsewhere where it was badly needed.

It was recommended that a clerk be employed to handle the tremendous volume of typing, bookkeeping, preparation of payrolls, mailing of children's reports and all general correspondence. In March Miss C. Joan Reeves joined the staff and she is now employed on a permanent basis.

This year a new plan was formulated, whereby the office remains open continuously, during the working day, so that anyone may contact us at any time. I trust this has been beneficial to the townspeople whom we serve.

Tables showing all appropriations, receipts, and expenditures are given elsewhere by the Report of the Town Accountant, but I would like to point out a few figures as a means of comparision with the year 1947.

In addition to the above \$2,233.23 was paid to State Institutions for Chelmsford settled cases and \$3,917.66 to Other Cities and Towns, including Westford Infirmary, for Chelmsford cases.

It is apparent from these figures that the cost of Welfare, Aid to Dependent Children and Old Age Assistance is steadily increasing. Legislation in the past year granted an 8.3 increase to most cases, but not all types of cases were eligible.

With the high cost of living we can be sure to expect further increases and not decreases in all categories of relief for 1949. Your Welfare Department does its best to administer public funds in the best interests of the Town and its people, but actual costs of welfare are unpredictable. Appropriations are set at minimums and for this reason it is necessary to have special town meetings to transfer additional money. Unless appropriations are set much higher in the future, this same situation will arise, and if so, the Department head should not be subjected to criticism.

It is hoped that the taxpayers will continue to cooperate as they have in the past in approving our increased budget for 1949.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FIRE ENGINEERS JANUARY 1, 1949

Board of Selectmen, Chelmsford, Mass.

Gentlemen:

In accordance with the regulations of the town, we submit herewith our annual report.

During the year just ended, the town has been fortunate in that it has suffered no severe losses by fire, and we must attribute this, in part at least, to the exercise of greater care by the residents of this community.

The fire department now numbers seven permanent employees working 48 hours a week, supplemented by volunteer companies in each of the Center, North, East, West and South districts. The Westlands now has a skeleton force of five volunteers to provide additional man-power in the event of a fire in that heavily-built residential section, but it is dependent upon the Center for fire apparatus.

Among the improvements accomplished during the year was the installation of a central telephone switchboard, which replaced the individually-listed telephones in the various districts and which provided for a central control of firefighting activities. At the same time, it gave the town residents only one telephone number to remember in the event of an emergency.

The alarm whistle at the Center was improved by the installation of a modern air compressor. Fire apparatus has been repaired and kept in as good condition as possible. However, with the exception of Engine 3, in West Chelmsford, which was delivered early this year, all of the apparatus is old, and some is antiquated. The town cannot much longer defer the replacement of the present apparatus at the Center and North stations, using these two trucks to replace those in the East and South stations. The truck in East has outlived its usefulness and repair charges are mounting annually.

The Center, Westlands and North sections have far outgrown the existing fire alarm circuits and steps will have to be taken during 1949 to extend and enlarge the circuits; to install at least 10 new fire alarm boxes and, if housing development continues at the present rate, much more elaborate systems will have to be installed to provide adequate protection. The engineers are planning to gradually bring the various alarm systems into one unit to increase protection of property in all sections.

The major extensions in the various water districts this year have increased the protection greatly, for the districts have co-operated by placing hydrants along all new mains.

Further improvements in the department are being planned, but many of these cannot be completed until the town can see its way clear to provide moderately-priced and efficiently planned fire stations in the Center and North districts to house the type of apparatus and equipment needed to combat fires in these days when highly-inflammable oils and gasses are being generally used in dwellings for heating and cooking.

In conclusion, we wish to express our appreciation for the wholehearted co-operation given us during the year by the Board of Selectmen, other town departments, the men of our own department and for the support accorded us by the general public.

REPORT OF VETERANS' BENEFITS AGENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen

The Veterans' Benefits department expended in 1948 the sum of \$6,979.73 an increase of \$1,609.13 over the year 1947. This increase was due principly to a heavy increase in Medical Expenses, which by the way, accounted for over 20% of the total amount paid out. Another reason was that there was an increase of about 10% in the monthly benefit rates paid to veterans' and their dependents.

We have six permanent cases as of December 31, 1948, a decrease of one for the year. We have fourteen temporary cases where benefits are paid for from one to ten months and two cases where medical and fuel benefits were paid.

There were five cases where it was found that they were not eligible for benefits after an investigation by the local agent and the State Department of Veterans Services.

The town lost a valued Librarian when Miss Ethel Wright died in April. Her friendly manner was a great asset to the library, and both Trustees and staff alike felt that it would be hard to fill her place. The Trustees were very fortunate, indeed, to secure the services of Mrs. Lester Ball as Librarian, at the same time adding Mrs. Fred Laton to the staff as Assistant Librarian. Mr. Robert Robey was chosen as Janitor, the position having been left vacant by the resignation of Mr. Ducharme. In December, once again, a change of Janitors was made when Mr. Richard Hoyle took the position.

The library building has been repaired and improved during the year. Slates have been replaced on the roof and fluorescent lights have been installed in the stacks. Arrangements for these exhibits are being made with various museums and private individuals.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Gentlemen:

The Planning Board held sixteen meetings during the past year. The increased number being largely due to sub-division work. There were eight new sub-divisions which required a public hearing for each one. In each case an approval was given in part up to the extent to which the subdivider has complied with the sub-division requirements. The extension of two of the older sub-divisions was approved; one in the Westlands and the other in the North Chelmsford section.

Most of the houses built in these sub-division developments are of a type and variety which will be a great asset to the town in future years as a source of tax revenue. There are three sub-divisions in the Westlands section where houses are being built at the present time, and one house has been built in another new sub-division in this section. In the Center section there are four sub-divisions where houses are now being built with some completed and occupied. There are three active sub-divisions in the North section, and one of these three was started a number of years ago. There are many attractive houses now located in this community. A number of good homes have been built on another sub-division in this same section during the past year, and what used to be a most unattractive spot has been developed into what will become a pleasant section in which to live. Also there are many single homes which have been built during the past year and these are distributed over many parts of the town.

There is a great need for a new set of building laws which are for the protection of the home buyer. The buyer of a new home has much with which to contend at the present time. The greatest difficulty being the extreme cost of everything which enters into the construction of a home. Also the present difficulty in procuring properly seasoned lumber (which is a factor responsible for the rapid depreciation in the value of some of the newly built houses) and the fact that some do not have proper foundation support. Many other short cuts are taken to attempt to reduce costs or to make a little more profit.

We can see no reason why a reputable builder should ever object to building law requirements. These laws are just giving the buyer of the new house the things that he has every right to expect. The Planning Board and the Board of Appeals have held a joint meeting with the Board of Selectmen in connection with the subject of new

building laws. As a result of this meeting, a committee was selected to draw up a <u>new building code</u>. This committee was composed of members from both the Board of Appeals and the Planning Board. The Committee attended to its duties and drew up what is believed to be an up-to-date building code. No further progress, however, could be made as there were no funds available for publication of the proposed building code. It is hoped that funds will be voted for this purpose at the coming town meeting and the new code will be adopted in the not too distant future.

It has been suggested by a few that the town should have more business zones but a casual survey by members of the Planning Board did not find much support for such a change. Business zones, to be practical, must be very close to the present sections so zoned. In the Center section there are only two vacant pieces of land which are located near enough for this purpose, and one of these vacant spots is very swampy and most of it would require a great deal of filling before a building could be placed on any part of it. The other vacant land has some very fine residences nearby and much objection to the infiltration of business would be raised by all who wish and believe that the home is a place for rest and quiet and some degree of privacy.

Milk and pasteurization plants were inspected several times during the year and found satisfactory.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR OF ANIMALS

December 31, 1948

Board of Selectmen,

Gentlemen:

As required by Section 19, Chapter 129 of the General Laws, a complete survey of all neat cattle, sheep, swine etc. was ordered by the Division of Livestock Disease Control of the State Dept. of Agriculture, in November.

This survey has been completed. A tabulation of the animals found in 149 stables follows: COWS 605, HEIFERS 73, CALVES 110, BULLS 28, STEERS 2, GOATS 52, SHEEP 14, SWINE 596, and HORSES 84.

Recent tests for tuberculosis have been applied to all cattle in town and two reactors were found in one herd, the first cases of tuberculosis in town for several years. After these infected cows were slaughtered the stable was thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.

Thirty-one dogs that had bitten humans were quarantined, as required by law for a two week observation period and then released as no rabies had developed. Ten other dog bite cases were also investigated. Warning: Do not kill any dog that has bitten a person until you confer with your Inspector of Animals.

Five animals came into this town from outside the State, on permits, for Dairy purposes. These were checked and all were released as they were accompanied by proper health certificates.

All reports have been submitted to the Division of Livestock Disease Control.

REPORT OF THE FOREST WARDEN

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and Taxpayers of the town of Chelmsford:

The year 1948 turned out to be a very mild year in regard to forest and grass fires. The department answered 164 calls—one less than the previous year. There were 1624 permits issued for fires in the open; this being a greater number than the year previous. It is the wish of the Forest Warden that more people would become familiar with the laws governing fires in the open, for it is necessary to receive a permit for any fire in the open unless the ground is completely covered with snow.

A radio was voted for the department at the annual town meeting and this piece of equipment has helped to control fire loss and was instrumental in the department being able to refund a balance in the "Labor at Fires" appropriation.

On September 29, 1948, the pump used on the Forest Fire Truck became useless and had to be replaced. The portable pump, out of order for sometime, was also replaced at this time.

The department's equipment, excluding the truck, is in very good condition. There is more one and one-eight Forestry hose needed as well as Booster hose. These items are being included in the 1949 budget.

It was necessary to call on the Fire Department for help this past year, but in return the services of the Forest Fire Truck and equipment are made available to the Fire Department at all times.

The contract for collection of garbage was awarded to the lowest bidder at \$2,950.00 per year for a term of two years and eight months. This long-term contract was agreed on by the Board only after its validity was upheld by the Town Counsel. The Board of Health points with pride to the fact that in a period of three years, the garbage contract has been reduced from \$5,600.00 to \$2,950.00 per year; a saving of \$2,650.00 and at no sacrifice in service to the townspeople.

The Board adopted a law making it illegal to sell milk other than pasteurized or certified within the limits of the town. It became effective July 1, 1948. We sincerely believe our action was for the best health interest of our inhabitants.

The diphtheria immunization and booster clinic was made available to all parents who wished to take advantage of this health measure. The recent purchase of a Vim-Forsbeck syringe by the Board greatly lessened the time needed by the physicians in administering the innoculations.

Several consultations were held between the Board and District Officer of the State Department of Public Health. We appreciate the cooperation extended by the State Department of Health.

During the past year the full Board accompanied by a Health Physician made two inspections of public eating establishments within the town. We are soon instituting a regular examination of all food handlers serving the public. Chelmsford has many public eating places and we feel this protection is needed now.

The situation involving both Town Dumps became so acute during the past summer, the Board of Health was forced to make radical changes in caring for both places. As a result two new caretakers were employed on a full-time daily basis. The dump located in the Westlands has been equipped with a reduced take-off at the fire hydrant and a high pressure hose line adequate to cover the whole area is ready for instant requirement. Similarly, at the dump off Swain Road, North Chelmsford, extensive reconstruction and grading was necessary after which a regular caretaker was employed. We are pleased to report a great improvement in both locations involving a very moderate upkeep expense.

At this time may we call to the attention of our citizens that the responsibilities of your Town Board of Health are so numerous and exacting that the time is rapidly approaching when it will be impossible for elective members who are regularly employed elsewhere to cope with it. The overall function of an efficient Board of Health demands many field inspections of diversified nature along with routine investigations and office administration. The average citizen is probably more conscious of Public Health needs and abuses than any other service which is tax supported. Stricter laws and mandatory regulations are exerting extra pressure on the Board. The inevitable answer must be efficient overhauling to meet those demands. We feel that within a very short time your Board of Health will need field and office assistance.

We extend thanks to other departments and to residents of the town for fine cooperation during the past year.

I have been working on a Tuberculosis Re-Classification clinic visiting cases who have been on the records for a long time.

We have been getting things ready for a diphtheria Clinic to be held in the near future. The Board of Health has purchased a Vim-Forsbeck syringe for use in mass innoculations of any kind and we expect to use it as soon as attendance at the various schools improves.

We need a clerk for answering the telephone and doing other clerical work.

The Board has ordered biologicals such as immune globulin, tetanus antitoxin, diphtheria antitoxin and others, to have on hand for the convenience of the local doctors at Page's Drug Store.

Let me add that I hope in the future, people will continue to refer their problems in public health to me as they have in the past. Thanking the Board of Health for their kind assistance and advice during 1948.

REPORT OF VARNEY PLAYGROUND COMMISSION

To the Citizens of Chelmsford:

We submit the following report on the activities of this Commission carried on during the year 1948.

We have done our utmost to keep the expense of this, your property, down as low as possible.

We know that the property under our jurisdiction is used by more people than any other parcel in town. Crowds of 1500 people use our bathing beach and bath house every hot Sunday, and an average of 500 each week day.

Our attendant at this place does a very good job, and has often been commended, to us on his work, We are very fortunate to have such a man in our department. The work here is tremendous and during the past year we granted a small tonic concession to a person who in turn helps our attendant in keeping the place respectable and clean

The Baseball Field is also quite a problem. There is a league or scrub game going on here every playable day of the summer season, and it requires a lot of work to keep this field in playing condition.

As no major repairs have been done on this field since its construction 15 years ago, it has deteriorated, so your Finance board, realizing this, granted us an extra \$250 to repair a portion of this during the past year, and we used same to a great advantage.

We feel if the same can be done for a few years it will save a major cost of 7 to 9 thousand dollars for complete repairs in the future.

There has been and still is a bad condition of Highway wash at the field, which we have tried to have corrected for the past 5 years. We have been promised several times that this matter would be taken care of, but as yet only a slight improvement has been shown by the Highway department.

The above mentioned condition costs you extra money each year which in our opinion is a waste of your money.

We feel also that small childrens playground equipment should be installed on the property. Many requests for repairs on the tennis courts have been received by us, but our courts are of clay construction, and it would require hours of daily labor to keep them in repair, and properly supervised, the cost is too great for us to assume.

Many complaints also have been received on the stumps in the water near our beach. We have no way of removing these, but would gladly assist any person or persons that would undertake this project.

We would like to stress once more, the fact that no other facility in the town receives as much use by so large a number of people as the Edwards Memorial Beach and Varney Playground.

Your Commission feels that much could be done to improve and expand the possibilities of this area but must await concerted effort on the part of the townspeople in fostering such improvement. Our appropriation only covers the maintenance of the property.

REPORT OF THE MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE FOR THE TOWN OF CHELMSFORD, 1948

The Middlesex County Extension Service is a county organization maintained to serve the various towns of the county especially in the field of agriculture and home economics.

During the past year three dairy farmers have been enrolled in the Dairy Herd Improvement Association in the Town of Chelmsford. Also, two progressive dairy farmers were cooperators in the 1948 "Green Pastures" Contest, Many farmers in the town were enrolled in the Middlesex County Selective Breeding Association, which has as its main purpose the making available to dairy farmers the service of superior sires.

Chelmsford is one of the largest poultry farms of the county and the poultrymen have taken an active part in all of the meetings held throughout the county. Walter F, Lewis is one of the outstanding winners in the "Chicken of Tomorrow" Contest with a white American breed. Many local poultrymen have availed themselves of the services of the county in meeting individual problems especially in flock management and disease control.

The homemakers of the town took an active interest in the Christmas Kit furnished by the Extension Service showing simple ways of making home-made gifts. Several meetings were held within the town on subjects such as "Color and How To Use It in the Home," kitchen arrangement, and clothing construction.

Of interest to 4-H boys and girls activities were carried on in clothing, canning, and agriculture under the leadership of Mrs. Carl Stanton, Mrs. Laura Marchildon, Catherine Vennard, Mrs. Gardner Spaulding, and Mrs. Percy Beardsley. Gail Pearson exhibited her dairy animals at the County Dairy Show and the County Fair, winning a First, Second, Fifth and Sixth

VETERANS' EMERGENCY FUND

Report of the Secretary

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and to Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford:

The Officers and Committee of the Veterans' Emergency Fund have had fewer meetings during the year of 1948 than the first year of operation of 1947. This has been due to the small number of cases which have been called to our attention and may be attributed to the economic conditions which have prevailed for the past twelve-month period.

As mentioned in the last annual report, our funds have been invested temporarily with an effort to raise the total amount by dividends and interest. Then, sometime in the future, when and if business conditions change, we will have a larger sum of money with which to work and, consequently, we may be able to give greater aid where it may be sorely needed.

One case was called to our attention during 1948 by the Veterans' Benefits Agent, Mr. Gordon DeWolf, and after investigation by Mr. DeWolf and the committee, it was felt that the applicant was entitled to assistance. In this case, we were able to pay the costs of certain hospital bills which amounted to a sizable figure and thus relieved a veteran of this obligation. This veteran had been in ill health for a period of some months and his earning power had been affected—thus the Veterans' Emergency Fund Committee were able to step in and assist this veteran substantially.

The Committee, as previously mentioned, still feels that assistance on the commodity basis, such as food, clothing, medicine, hospital care, fuel, etc, is the best method of payment and this procedure was followed during 1948.

The Committee has a representative in each precinct of the town and it is hoped that applicants for assistance will contact the member in his own precinct. The names of the members are listed as follows:

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Chelmsford for the period from August 13, 1947, the date of the previous examination, to July 21, 1948, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing town funds or committing bills for collection, were examined and recorded with the books and records of the town accountant.

The books and accounts of the town accountant were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were checked with the treasurer's books and with the departmental records, while the recorded payments were compared with the treasury warrants and with the treasurer's books.

The appropriation accounts were examined and all appropriations and transfers as recorded were checked with the town clerk's record of town meetings.

The ledgers were analyzed, the necessary adjustments resulting from the audit were made, a trial balance was drawn off proving the ledger to be in balance, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of July 21, 1948.

An examination was made of the town treasurer's books and accounts. The receipts as recorded were analyzed and compared with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer and with other sources from which money was received by the town, while the recorded payments were checked with the treasury warrants authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The cash balance on July 21, 1948 was verified by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks of deposit and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The payments on account of debt and interest during the period audited were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities and coupons on file.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the several trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the treasurer of the library trustees were examined. The income was proved and the disbursements were verified.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined. The tax title register was analyzed, the recorded redemptions were checked with the treasurer's record of receipts, and the tax titles on hand were listed and checked with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked. The commitments of town and district taxes, motor vehicle and trailer excise, and departmental accounts were analyzed and compared with the warrants for their collection. The cash book records of collections were checked with amounts credited on the commitment lists, the recorded abatements were compared with the assessors' record of abatements granted, the payments to the treasurer were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved to the controlling accounts in the accountant's ledger.

Verification of the outstanding accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The town clerk's records of dog, sporting, and miscellaneous licenses issued were examined, and the payments to the town treasurer and to the Division of Fisheries and Game were verified.

The surety bonds on file for the town officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the accounts of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined and checked to the treasurer's and the accountant's books.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, together with schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

While engaged in making the audit, cooperation was received from all officials of the town, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

At a meeting of the School Committee held on January 19, 1949, the report of the Superintendent of Schools was read and approved. It was voted to adopt the same as the report of the School Committee.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Chelmsford School Committee:

This report gives comparative statistics regarding the operation of the schools for the year 1948. If additional details are desired they may be secured at the office of the Superintendent of Schools.

The two buildings at the Princeton School are unsatisfactory for school use. They should be replaced by a new building properly located on a suitable school site. The town should select and purchase a suitable site, appoint a building committee, and appropriate money to cover preliminary plans at an early date as other school building needs will soon become essential. In planning a new school at North Chelmsford, serious thought should be given to future school needs in this area of the town. It would appear that, in the interest of good education, good economy and good town planning, the pupils from the Highland Area and the pupils who live near or are transported to the Quessy School would ultimately be housed in this new school unit.

Enrollment has increased in the first three grades in our elementary schools. A check of birth records and population growth indicates increase in enrollment will continue for some years. It follows, therefore, that the elementary schools will soon be crowded and the high school enrollment will be a problem about 1954. Parents will no longer accept schoolroom enrollments of 40 to 50 pupils as in former years and it would appear that the efficient and economical method of meeting this situation will be to provide a six-year high school thus relieving both the elementary schools and the high school by building in one location instead of several. By this method additional building at or near the high school could provide for housing grades 7 and 8 and give opportunity for creating facilities for libraries, shops, home making and other essentials necessary for an efficient and adequate education for the boys and girls of the town.

Our school buildings are not new and under present budget restrictions little can be accomplished except to maintain existing heating, plumbing, building and equipment facilities. This means that few, if any, major improvements are possible at this time.

The small increase in teacher's salaries granted for 1948 enabled to fill all vacancies with well trained teachers. It is hoped that further salary increases will make it possible to retain our good teachers and to provide for adequately trained replacements as needed. Well trained, efficient, and satisfied teachers are essential for a good school system.

Text books and reference books are fundamental for good school work. Budget provisions still cause a hardship to our pupils in this respect. In these days of rapid research and industrial development, it is unfortunate that it is necessary for our pupils to use books that are more than eight to ten years old. The best school practice calls for an annual replacement of about one-sixth of our text books each year.

It would appear that progress has been made in the overall education of our boys and girls, in the morale of the teaching staff and in public relations in general. The cooperation of pupils, teachers, parents, and citizens has been fully appreciated.

Mrs. Mary Mogan and Mr. Patrick Pappalardo resigned, Mrs. Mogan because of the ruling concerning married teachers and Mr. Pappalardo to accept a position elsewhere. Miss Shirley Emmons and Mr. Joseph Nolan are teaching in their places.

The following is taken from a report given by Mr. A. Russell Mack from the Massachusetts State Department of Education:

PROPOSED REGULATIONS FOR THE APPROVAL OF HIGH SCHOOLS IN MASSACHUSETTS

"Regulations for the approval of high schools first appeared in 1915 and were printed in the Annual Report of the State Department of Education in 1914-1915. These were last revised in 1933. In the belief that these regulations should be further revised, Proposed Regulations were presented to Principals' and Superintendents' Discussion Groups throughout the State, and were presented in the Report of the Committee on the New in Education, two years ago at the January, 1947, meeting of the Association.

"These Proposed Regulations have been revised, and at present are before the State Board of Education for their approval. It may be said that already they have accomplished a certain degree of success by the consciousness of all principals and superintendents in their objective—improvement of secondary education. The big feature of the last revision is proposed introduction of a Class AA which would recognize those high schools where superlatives obtain, giving an objective for other schools to improve their offering to secondary-school youth. Important rulings tantamount to certification of newly employed teachers, a longer school day, a positive program of physical education and health, a lowering of the pupil-teacher ratio from 30:1 to 25:1 are other features. Check lists for both Class AA and Class A are included."

If we wish to give our youth an education that will fit them to compete with others of the same age today, we will have to make many improvements. We do not like to be old fashioned in our mode of living. It is far more important that we keep up-to-date in education.

A study of those proposed regulations shows too many defects in our high school.

MUSIC

Miss Littlehale

The fundamental basis upon which we believe the music program should operate is briefly this: that music is the natural heritage of every child, regardless of his talent for it, and that the school's business is to offer opportunities for every child to participate in the many phases of music. The music program which was put into effect last year was built with the above premise in mind. As the program has been developed, marked interest has been shown by the pupils in many of the grades. And here, I wish to give credit to those teachers who have so loyally helped in carrying out the program. The children now have a much better basic foundation upon which to build their musical future.

Rhythm Band instruments have been purchased by the larger elementary schools. These bands have a decided effect upon the children as they give every child a chance to participate in a musical experience. Those children who have difficulty in finding their singing voices feel that they too have an important part in every music lesson. It is hoped that all schools will soon incorporate Rhythm Bands in their music program.

Several schools have purchased a music magazine called "Keyboard Jr." and are using it as a basis for their seventh and eighth grade work in music appreciation.

This year in the High School two periods are given to general chorus work for which credit is given. The other two periods are given to those girls who are interested enough in music to work without credit. This special Girls' Glee Club combines choral work and music appreciation.

Last Spring, programs were given by all the Elementary Schools. Many of the schools have begun work on operettas which are to be given in the coming Spring; and which give promise of being even better than those of last year.

In April, the High School gave an evening of entertainment consisting of music and a short musical play. It was enjoyed by both participants and the audience.

The customary Christmas Concert was given. It was gratifying to see the wholehearted cooperation and interest shown by the students.

Your music supervisor extends to all parents and friends of the schools a cordial invitation to visit any of her classes.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Boys-Mr. Nolan

The prospectus of physical education is in accordance with general education, that is, the best development, attained through all body activities on a play level, which conform to the physical, mental, and social welfare of the individual.

This plan assists in the correction of defects, the knowledge of good and desirable activities, and the appreciation of good health.

The program in the grade schools is held two periods weekly and covers grades five to eight. We have formed two basketball leagues to create activities after school hours. Trophies will be awarded to the two leading grammar school teams. I am endeavoring to create baseball leagues similar to the basketball leagues.

The general scope of physical education, in our grade schools, covers the following phases:

- 1. Games and contests, seasonable games which conform with age and development of the boy.
- Hygiene, which endeavors to assist in protection of health and aid in correctives.
- 3. Calisthenics or free exercises,
- 4. Self testing activities, these assist coordination, strength, perserverance, flexibility, determination, and self assurance.
- 5. Correctives, activities, that assist the individual or groups.
- Tests. Every boy will have his arms, legs, hands, and feet checked.

The high school students have two periods a week. Students who participate on a school team, are not allowed to take physical education during such participation.

The aim includes the development of safety and recreational skills, social environment and qualities, and organic growth and physical development.

These aims are achieved by covering the following:

- 1. Calisthenics or free exercises.
- 2. Hygiene
- 3. Games and Contests
- 4. Rhythmics
- 5. Physical fitness test

A Field Day will be planned for a day in June. Every grade of all the schools will participate.

Girls-Miss Keith

Physical Education provides an opportunity for promotion of vigorous normal growth through a range of activities such as games, sports, dancing, and athletics for development of good posture. Through these activities the students have an opportunity to develop sound attitudes, habits and knowledge of wholesome living.

In the elementary schools the program covers grades one to eight for the girls and grades one to four for the boys. Their activities include rhythms, story plays, imitation of animals, singing games of low organization, hunting games, and team games.

The girls in the high school have two forty-five minute periods per week with such activities as: hygiene, stunts and tumbling, folk dancing, basketball, softball in their seasons, and activities leading up to these skilled sports.

All children were given physical examination by Drs. J. E. Boucher and Benjamin Blechman.

I am very much interested in building up a Health Education program and wish I had more time to devote to it. I could use the services of another nurse to help with investigations and medical follow-up throughout the town, and a clerk to keep records and files.

Dental Caries is still the most common defect found among school children. Fluorine treatments have been introduced in various parts of the State. This is still in the experimental stage, however.

I have had several successful consultations with Dr. Burke, State Health Officer, Miss Thomson, State Public Health Nursing Supervisor, Miss White and Dr. Cobb, Director of the Nashoba Unit, Miss Almeda King, Nutritionist, Miss Mary Leonard, T. B. Health Educator, and others.

There has been an increase this year in Chelmsford and all parts of the State in the number of cases of Measles, Chickenpox and Scarlet Fever.

Parents are urged to keep their children home from school if they are ill and consult their family physician, if necessary—an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

The teachers and principles have been kind and have cooperated with me in matters of public health. They have helped immensely in referring to me children with early symptoms of disease.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

The School Lunch Program comes under the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Education and is considered an important part of the school system. This year the State Department of Health has taken an active interest in the program. Each month the Massachusetts State-wide School Lunch Advisory Committee, with Anna A. Kloss as Chairman, meets at the Brandis Vocational School in Boston. Items of business are taken up and there is an opportunity for discussion of topics presented as well as problems of general interest to managers.

Our Federal Aided School Lunchroom now serves five schools, the High School, McFarlin, Quessy, Princeton Street and Westlands Schools. All the food is prepared in the McFarlin School kitchen and is transported in thermos containers to the other schools. We were the second school in the State of Massachusetts to use the Community kitchen idea, Haverhill being the first.
