REPORT OF WELFARE AGENT

To the Honorable Board of Welfare

Gentlemen:

I submit the annual report of the Welfare Department for the year ending December 31, 1949.

The present staff is as follows:

The Board of Welfare and Bureau of Old Age Assistance hold regular meetings at which time all new cases are received and the necessary action taken.

During the year 144 new applications were taken, 22 of which were not approved—these figures include all categories of relief.

The following table is a brief comparison for 1949 over 1948.

From these tables it is readily seen that each year there is a substantial increase in case loads and expenditures, making the Welfare budget the second highest in the Town.

If my recommendations are followed for 1950, irrespective of administration, assistance will amount to \$198,000.00, not including Federal Grants anticipated, which are applied to expenditures as they are received and are in addition to the \$198,000.00.

This constitutes in anyone's method of calculating a "big business" and in order to maintain a "big business" and protect the interests of the Town, I firmly believe that an increased staff is absolutely necessary.

At the present time (since July 1) we are working under new Federal regulations relative to personnel and administration, which includes increased working hours, etc. In these regulations it is stated that a Welfare office carrying a case load of 250-350 must have a minimum staff of an Agent, 3 Social Workers and 3 Clerk-Stenographers by January 1, 1950.

Chelmsford now has a case load of 320 and a staff of an Agent, 1 Social Worker and 1 Clerk-Stenographer! What the Federal Government will do about this matter is not known.

A recent case review by the State Department of Welfare also showed that in order to do the work absolutely essential and in accordance with Federal regulations, we must increase our staff.

It has been recommended that the Agent act strictly in a supervisory capacity and should be relieved of routine details and more time should be spent on supervision. At present this is impossible as the work has to be done regardless of its nature, by what staff we have, in order to keep up to the tremendous volume.

I sincerely hope the townspeople will see that additional staff is a necessity, or else be prepared to take the consequences if and when Federal funds are withheld, for non-compliance with the rules.

The cost of the Town on any salary in this Department is really only $\frac{1}{2}$ as we receive approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ reimbursement from the Fed-

eral Government. This makes the cost of administration for this office lower than most any other department.

In closing might I say I have received wonderful cooperation from my staff and Board members—every one has been interested in operating a department which is a credit to the Town.

We welcome constructive criticism at all times and invite you to visit us at your convenience to really see how your welfare office functions.

May we solicit your support of your 1950 budget?

REPORT OF THE ADAMS LIBRARY LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Selectmen:

During 1949 the work at the Adams Library has been carried on much as in former years except that a few changes have been made to stimulate interest and improve our service to the public. The monthly exhibits under the direction of Miss Marjorie Scoboria have been much enjoyed. Books have been bought more frequently during the year so that the latest books were in the hands of the borrowers at a much earlier date. Every effort is being made to prepare the new books for circulation in as short a time as possible after they reach the library.

We bought 486 books this past year. Twelve more were donated. The donors were Mrs. A. G. Scoboria, Miss Marjorie Scoboria, Rev. J. H. Giunta, Dr. Anna Q. Churchill and Mrs. Alan Greenhalgh.

We have continued our service to other parts of the town. At West Chelmsford Mrs. Frederick Burne has received monthly deposits of 100 books. At the Westlands School Mrs. Helen Mills has taken charge of the deposits. In February Mrs. Edward G. Russell assumed the responsibility for the East Chelmsford service which had been discontinued in 1948.

Mrs. Helen Poland of the High School and Miss Margaret Griffin of the McFarlin have obtained deposits of books for use with their classes, thus bringing the school and the library into closer contact.

There has been a marked increase in circulation over last year as shown by the following statistics:

One event of special interest occurred during the year. In October the Merrimack Valley Library Association held its fall meeting at the Adams Library. Trustees and librarians from different cities and towns from Westford to Newburyport were in attendance. Besides the inspiration of the meeting, there was much to interest our visitors. They commented very favorably on our library building, our choice of

books and the exhibits. On that occasion there were three, the textiles from the Scalandre Museum in New York, antiques from the Chelmsford Historical Society, and the exhibit of Chelmsford glass loaned by Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Turner of Lowell.

In closing I thank the trustees and also the borrowers for their kindly cooperation throughout the past year.

REPORT OF VETERANS' BENEFITS AGENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

In 1949 the Veterans' Benefits Department aided 38 applicants, 10 of whom are classed as permanent applicants and 28 as temporary. This figure is an increase of 4 over 1948 in the permanent classification and an increase of 14 in the temporary classification. There were 5 cases investigated which were not approved for benefits.

This increase is due mainly to two factors, an increase in unemployment in this area and an increase in medical care for applicants.

The appropriation of \$7,000.00 voted at the last annual Town Meeting was exhausted by September and an additional appropriation of \$4,000.00 was requested and granted at a special Town Meeting in September.

During the year 83 home visits were made. On each new case copies of the veterans' discharge paper must be secured, also marriage certificate and birth certificates of children. Every case is checked with the Board of Probation in Boston for Court record, with all banks in this area for bank accounts, with the Division of Employment Security for Unemployment Compensation, with the Welfare Department for any record of aid, with the V. A. for pension, with the Board of Assessors for any record of property and where necessary divorce records are secured. There is a large amount of paper work with every case and in addition every case is checked by an investigator from the office of the State Commissioner of the Veterans Services in Boston. These safeguards are set up by the State Commissioner to make sure that all cases are worthy.

REPORT OF THE CHELMSFORD LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To the Board of Selectmen:

This was a particularly busy year for the Chelmsford Library Trustees, but it was also profitable because the Anna C. MacKay Memorial Library is now established and open for the service of the residents of North Chelmsford. The Trustees held twenty-six formal meetings during the year in addition to innumerable informal meetings relative to converting the Stewart MacKay house into a library.

At the Town Meeting in March, 1949, the town voted the sum of \$10,000 to cover the necessary alterations on the MacKay property. This sum paid for (1) new approaches to the building, (2) painting inside and out, (3) a sign on the front of the building, (4) new supports for the first floor, (5) removing some partitions and putting in others, (6) new electrical wiring and fixtures, including fluorescent lights, (7) new heating system, (8) new plumbing, including two new toilets, (9) refinishing some floors, (10) new book stacks, built-in book cases, librarian's desk, tables, chairs, Venetian blinds, and rubber matting.

When the remodelling was nearing completion, work was started on the sorting, moving, cataloging and arranging of books on the shelves. It was a gigantic task since about 11,000 books were received from the North Chelmsford Library Corporation and 600 new ones were purchased. This work was done largely by Miss Bertha Whitworth, Miss Anne Ballinger, Mrs. Lester Ball, Mrs. Fred Laton, and the Trustees, supervised by Miss Alice Cahill from the Division of Public Libraries of the Massachusetts Department of Education.

On November 17, 1949, the building was opened for inspection, with a committee from the North Chelmsford Parent Teacher Asso-

ciation serving refreshments to the 175 guests. One month later, on December 17, the building was opened for the distribution of books, with Miss Bertha Whitworth, librarian, and Miss Anne Balinger, assistant to the librarian, in charge. About 100 borrowers cards were given out during the last two weeks of December. The library hours have been set for Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Saturdays from 3 to 5 and 7 to 9, double the number of hours the North Chelmsford Library was open, and the Trustees sincerely hope the circulation will warrant the increase.

Meanwhile, certain improvements have been made at the Adams Library. The chimney, steps, and columns have been repaired. An oil burner has been installed in the furnace which heats George Hall, and the walls and woodwork of George Hall have been cleaned. Work was started on repairing the sidewalk, but winter weather interfered with the completion of this project. The dry summer caused irreparable damage to the lawns and one of the projects for next year will be to make a new lawn.

The exhibition case, which was installed in the reading room last year has been continuously filled with interesting and popular exhibits. Among these were:

Articles of historical interest loaned by the Chelmsford Historical Society;

Exhibits of school work by the McFarlin, Quessy and East Chelmsford schools;

Exhibits from Latin America, Ecuador and Peru, loaned by the New England Pan American Society;

Dolls loaned by Miss Janice Poland;

Indian relics loaned by Mr. Edwin Stearns;

United States stamps loaned by Mr. Winchester Dermody, III;

And a collection of glass made in this vicinity loaned by Mr. Clyde Turner.

In August the Trustees regreffully accepted the resignation of Mrs. George Peterson, a faithful worker throughout many years of service. Mrs. William Pickles was elected to replace her as Assistant Librarian.

In October the Merrimack Valley Library Association held its fall meeting at the Adams Library. The many librarians and Trustees who attended this meeting were very complimentary in their remarks about the library.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FIRE ENGINEERS

JANUARY 1, 1950

Gentlemen:

We are pleased to submit herewith our annual report for the year 1949.

The year has been one of steady progress, thanks to the co-operation of the town government and the voters who approved our appropriation last March.

During the year, we have been able to make many major improvements to our buildings, including new boilers at both the East and South Chelmsford stations, to reroof the South station and repair the roof of the Center station, along with other repairs of minor nature.

We also have been able to do a great deal of work on the fire alarm systems in the North and Center areas, to improve the whistle in the Center and to provide fire alarm boxes for several schools which were without this protection.

Another improvement was the addition of 40-foot plus ladders for both the Center and North fire trucks. This is a major safety measure as it provides a means for the rescue of persons who might become trapped in any of the larger buildings in town. It is, of course, a poor substitute for a ladder truck or aerial ladder, but we realize that the cost of purchasing and operating either a ladder truck or aerial would too great for the town at present.

For 1950 we are asking additional funds for fire alarm improvements, with the purpose in view of establishing a moderate system that will provide full protection.

We also are asking again for funds to purchase a new piece of fire apparatus—a fire truck built for fire-fighting purposes and designed to last at least 20 years under the type of service it would provide in a town this size.

We sincerely hope that money will be appropriated this year for this purpose. Our present apparatus is getting old—in fact, some

of it is too old for economical maintenance—and our repair bills are mounting and will continue to mount until the old apparatus is retired.

In closing, we wish to express our appreciation to your board, to all other town departments and to the public as a whole for the whole-hearted cooperation given us during the past year.

REPORT OF FOREST WARDEN

To the Taxpayers of the Town of Chelmsford:

With all the extreme hazardous conditions this area experienced in the year, 1949, our town was very fortunate in keeping the loss by fire at a minimum.

The Department answered 183 calls for Forest or Grass fires, an increase of 19 calls over the previous year. Of these fires, only one reached a size of major proportion, it being off Graniteville Road in West Chelmsford. This fire was definitely set. It was started deep in the woods and was so located that until it had gained much headway could not be spotted by either the Robin Hill Observer or by the land owner. There was a brisk wind the day it started. Added to that, the town's only Forest Fire Truck was out of order due to a breakdown the day before. Therefore we were depending on State aid at that time and also the use of Engine 3 of the Fire Dept.

In the past year 1870 permits for fires in the open were issued an increase of 246 permits over the previous year. It might be well to state at this time that a recent change in the General Laws now states that a permit must be secured from the Forest Fire Warden before any fire may be lighted in the open at any time.

A great deal of assistance was received by your town from the State Dept. of Conservation in the past year. It being in the form of a manned piece of Forest Fire Apparatus whenever our needs required.

The equipment on our truck was greatly improved by the addition of an extra booster reel and hose. Old hose needs replacing this year, along with other equipment that has worn beyond repair. Frequently breakdowns occurred in the Forest Fire Truck last year and more are contemplated this year.

In closing, thanks should be extended to those men who were faithful to the Forest Fire Dept. in the past year for the tireless efforts they gave for the good of the service.

All dogs brought into town from outside the State must be accompanied by a health certificate approved by the State of origin showing that they are free from all symptoms of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases.

Only one permit has been issued by the State for shipment of dairy cattle into town during the year.

The Board of Health wishes at this time to thank its appointees for their interest shown in their respective endeavors.

This year the Board held a diphtheria booster clinic which was very successful by the number of children taking advantage of this clinic. The Board wishes to thank the School Committee and the Lowell Visiting Nurse association for their cooperation in this enterprise.

A Bacteriology station was arranged at Pages Drug Store for use by the doctors and approved by the State Board of Health.

This year has been an extremely busy one with many conferences being held with State officials concerning pollution of our local streams. The Board feels that in the not too distant future a sewage system must be instituted in this town. There isn't a stream, large or small, that is not being contaminated by human wastes.

The Board voted to put the plumbing inspection fees on a pay-as-you-go policy. Heretofore a fee was charged for the inspections and a larger fee was paid the inspector. Now both fees are equal, necessitating no money being taken from the Town Treasury.

A great many inspections were made throughout the town including public schools and dumps and found the conditions to be very good considering the amount of money that is allowed for these enterprises. A routine check up was made on the numerous restaurants, stores,

etc., and found the places to be of high standard in the majority of cases.

Once more it must be brought to mind that this town is growing very fast and additional help is imperative to keep this community free from any epidemics.

At the present time the Board is considering joining a Health unit which is imperative due to legislation passed in 1949 by the General Court. The policies of this Board has been one of judicious judgment and at this time no definite action has been taken. We are weighing the possibilities of two units, one of which we can join, before taking any definite action.

To those officers of other departments for their splendid help and guidance during the year, we extend our thanks.

REPORT OF THE VARNEY PLAYGROUND COMMISSION

To the Citizens of Chelmsford:

The commission has again this year, kept the expense of the upkeep of the Varney Playground and Edwards Memorial Beach at the lowest figure possible. We wish to inform you, at this time, that the cost of taking care of this property is going to be much more.

Owing to the sinking of the foundations of most of this property, it is going to require a major resurfacing which will involve quite a large expense. The beautiful granite arch that stands as a symbol to the donor of this property is in very grave danger of collapsing. We hope this will be taken care of in the near future, before it is too late.

To overcome a great deal of highway wash which was destroying the property, we were granted \$300.00 by the Finance Board for curbing. This curbing was put in by the highway department during the past year, and we are in hopes that a likely sum will be granted again this year in order to give this property further protection.

The baseball diamond was used by the Varney A. A. and St. John's C. Y. O. teams, and the softball diamond used by the firemen and the Church league.

The Bath House, Beach, and surrounding area were kept in a very well managed order by our capable attendant.

We have been asked by numerous citizens to install life saving equipment, which we intend to do, with the approval and appropriation of the Finance Board.

Again may we stress the need of playground equipment for small children to be placed on the property surrounding the Bath House. No playground is complete without slides, swings, etc. for children.

The question of the tennis courts has been raised once more. At least one tennis court should be put into use this year.

Once more, we would like to bring out the point that these properties are used more than any other facility in the town, and that much can still be done to improve them.

Cooperation of both the doctors and townspeople is requested in order that all contagious diseases may be reported promptly.

The board has arranged to have a part-time clerk to answer telephone calls, issue licenses, keep reports, etc.

During the month of May a Diphtheria Booster Clinic was held at the Chelmsford town hall. Approximately 500 children received Booster doses of Diphtheria Toxoid. This was the largest clinic of its kind ever to be held in Chelmsford. Dr. Benjamin Blechman and Dr. Raymond Horan, Board of Health physicians, administered the toxoid.

The Board of Health and I conducted a sanitary survey of the schools and recommendations were made to the school committee. A survey of school health work as well as Board of Health work was made by the state. A restaurant survey was conducted among the eating establishments of the town.

Numerous other projects were undertaken by the Board of Health and these things will be listed in their annual report.

The Board of Health has been very active this year and I feel that much has been accomplished with their untiring effort.

There has been considerable comment about the town joining the Nashoba unit. A law was passed recently stating that within a period of ten years, the town must join a health union. The Board of Health and I have been studying the aspects of such a union pro and con, in order to find out what would be best for this town. In the final analysis it is entirely up to the townpeople themselves.

There are three possibilities, joining Nashoba, joining Lowell, or forming a new unit of towns in this area.

I hope that the townspeople will present their health problems to me in the future as they have in the past. I wish to thank the Board of Health for their kind assistance and guidance during the year 1949.

**REPORT OF THE
MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE
FOR THE TOWN OF CHELMSFORD—1949**

The dairy projects carried on during 1949 consisted of distribution of information relating to mastitis control in dairy cows. The 1949 Green Pasture Program, in which Manuel J. Avila, George E. Dailey, T. W. Emerson, Charles Koulas, Walter F. Lewis, William F. Roberts, Albert R. Simpson and Edwin H. Warren cooperated, endeavored to promote more efficient dairying. Cooperation was extended to the Dairy Herd Improvement Association, whose members include T. W. Emerson, and to the Selective Breeding Association. The Selective Breeding Association is organized to improve our dairy animals by the use of superior bulls through artificial insemination. General farmers and gardeners used the facilities of our soil testing laboratory.

Poultry projects conducted during the year included the Quality Egg Program, in which D. E. Corliss, Clifford A. Fisk, Arthur W. Howard, Charles Koulas, Walter Lewis, Philip St. Germain, Edwin H. Warren and Thaddeus W. Zabierek cooperated. Through this program poultrymen are assisted in improving their egg handling facilities and practices. Several poultrymen made use of the diagnostic service of the Poultry Disease Program in maintaining flock health during the year. T. W. Zabierek and Philip St. Germain remodeled their egg rooms. The 1949 Middlesex County Poultry Trade Show held in cooperation with the turkey and poultry associations of the county gave poultrymen an opportunity to see the latest in egg graders, automatic feeders and other equipment. Egg quality and efficient management were the themes of the event. Norman Bickford, William Buxton, M. F. Dooley and Meindert Schults are enrolled in the Turkey Marketing Program.

Interest centered around home furnishings and food preservation demonstrations presented by the Middlesex County Extension Service. Two slipcover demonstrations were given showing the new five-piece method. Chelmsford women gained many new ideas on canning and freezing from a food preservation demonstration presented by the state food preservation specialist.

A series of three food buying meetings helped the homemakers stretch the food dollar with hints on shopping and money-saving main

dishes. Two community groups were enrolled in the coat construction class. At the Christmas season, the Christmas Kit, a collection of easy-to-make items, was presented with supplementary printed directions. In addition to the regular programs, Chelmsford women are contacted through monthly service letters, and replies to individual mail and phone inquiries.

There were 47 4-H Club members in Chelmsford with clubs organized in clothing, canning, child care and agriculture including garden, poultry and rabbitry with dairy club members combining with the town of Littleton. Gail Pearson exhibited her heifer at the Marshfield Fair. A 4-H Rabbit Show was sponsored in August. An outstanding exhibit of canned goods was held in South Chelmsford as a store window exhibit.

The services of the Middlesex County Extension Service, 19 Everett Street, Concord, are available to all citizens old and young interested in agriculture and home economics. A weekly agricultural broadcast is given on Station WBZ at 6:45 A. M. each Wednesday of general interest to local farmers. A monthly bulletin is printed covering all phases of Extension work and mailed to nearly all farmers within the town.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and to Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford:

The Veterans' Emergency Fund Committee has had a most quiet year during 1949 as far as meetings and payments from the funds on hand are concerned.

There have been no cases, called to our attention, which needed financial assistance during the past year. This has been due, undoubtedly, to the comparative stability of economic conditions affecting veterans of the Town of Chelmsford.

Instead of material help to Veterans, which is our immediate objective, the year 1949 has been one of "Building." By the word "Building" we mean the increase in funds by dividends and interest from funds on deposit at the Central Savings Bank and Middlesex Cooperative Bank in Lowell. This type of transaction during a given period is perhaps more desirable as it assures greater aid and assistance to worthy veterans in the future—if the economic conditions should happen to change—as the funds on hand would be greater due to additions through the years from interest on funds.

Your committee is proud to report that the total interest and dividends received during 1949 amounted to \$71.12 and now the fund is larger than when the committee was first appointed by the Board of Selectmen during 1947. This fact is most gratifying due to the fact that the Committee has aided one veteran and his family substantially and also has made an annual payment for the Bonding of the Treasurer of these funds. Even with these payments, our total funds now on hand are greater than when the money was turned over to the Town of Chelmsford by the War Salvage Committee.

Mr. Gordon P. DeWolf, Veterans' Agent of the Town of Chelmsford assists and advises the committee in calling attention to worthy cases, which because of certain conditions, can be assisted only partially by the Veterans' Benefits program. In the event of such cases, the Veterans' Emergency Fund is able to offer further assistance to these worthy cases.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the citizens of Chelmsford:

The School Committee wishes to report that during the period from January 1, 1949 to January 1, 1950 there have been 23 regular meetings and 15 special meetings. Several groups and individuals have come before the Committee at different times with their individual problems. The Committee is anxious to have parents come before them when they have information which will assist in the solution of a problem.

It has been the desire of the Committee to do some major improvements each year so that the buildings may be kept in a fair state of repair. This year the improvements have included:

- (a) Repairing the driveways of the Westlands school and the High school.
- (b) Painting the exterior of East school.
- (c) Painting the interior of the Westlands school.
- (d) Placing paper towels and soap dispensers in all the toilets.

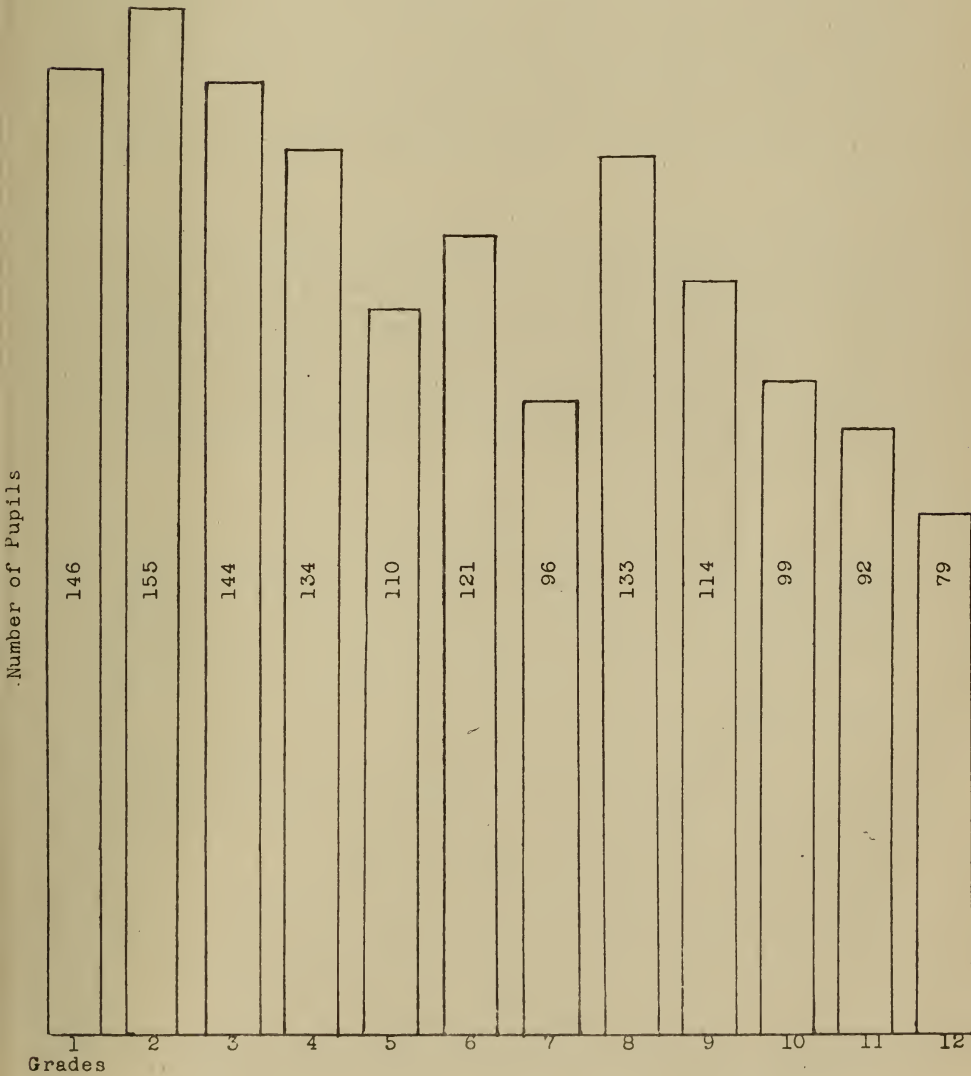
Our buildings are not new and will require more and more repair as the years go on.

The school buildings are only a portion of the up-keep expenditure which comes from the school budget. Another item of up-keep is the athletic facilities in all portions of town. We wish to explain to the people that all of these fields are used by adult groups as well as school teams. This is made necessary because the town has only one town playground — the Varney playground in North Chelmsford. Because these fields are used by other than school teams the problem of upkeep for them is greater than one might expect. If these fields are to be kept up more money must be used on them than has been possible recently. It is because the Committee realized that there are not enough playground facilities that the article regarding Tennis Courts appears in the warrant.

A much more serious problem facing the town is the increased enrollment in the lower grades. The following chart gives a picture of our present school enrollment. Estimates based upon statistical data for the nation, trends in the State, observation of our town and present elementary grade enrollments tell us that there will be increased enrollment through 1956 or 1957, especially in the lower grades.

ENROLLMENT BY GRADES

December 1, 1949



With an increase of 71 children in our school system in 1949, and with at least this number expected yearly for the next six or seven years we become aware that our elementary school enrollment will be large for some period of time. These facts bring us to the realization that school costs will rise for the next few years as the average cost per pupil is \$163.00. Costs will rise if we keep our schools of the same quality that now exists; costs will go even higher if we improve the quality of instruction. We must be aware that our present buildings cannot adequately house the expected increase. It is with this in mind that we wish to refer you to the paragraph on building needs included in the Superintendent's report and to call for your support of the articles relating to construction of an addition to the High School.

During the past year the Committee has voted to add an art instructor to the teaching staff of the school. It is the belief of the Committee that many boys and girls have artistic talent which, if discovered, could lead to promising fields of endeavor. Because we feel that other talents are being overlooked in our present High School curriculum we wish to add Home Economics and Manual Training. However, in order to do this more space must be available. Again we wish to refer you to the paragraph of building needs in the Superintendent's report.

The Committee has voted a \$200.00 raise for all elementary teachers beginning in September 1950. It is the belief that we must endeavor to develop a single salary schedule for the teachers of the town. The effort expended in the teaching of elementary grades is comparable to that expended in teaching High School subjects, therefore the remuneration should be the same. The salary increase has been limited to the elementary teachers in an effort to bring the two groups closer together.

While we must spend money cautiously, we must also recognize that our boys and girls are being prepared, through our schools, for a life which is becoming more and more complex. We must prepare them in every way that is possible for this future.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Chelmsford School Committee:

This report contains the customary statistics for comparative purposes together with information pertaining to the operation of the schools for the year 1949. Further details may be secured at the office of the Superintendent of Schools.

STAFF

Our teachers rate well when compared to groups of teachers in other towns of the State with respect to adequate training for teaching. With the exercise of judgment in the selection of replacements we can achieve an even higher standing.

Staff salaries are very low. With increasing enrollment in the elementary grades and insufficient graduates from our teacher's colleges adequate salaries must be given definite attention if we are to retain and secure necessary and desirable teachers during the next few years.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

Our textbooks situation is slowly improving as modern texts are purchased to replace those of old editions. Here again increasing enrollment slows down the normal progress. As soon as all pupils have adequate and up-to-date texts we can begin a system of regular replacements as mentioned last year.

General supplies are well and economically managed by staff members. However, a wider variety of materials can receive little attention at this time other than those materials necessary for the use of the proposed art teacher.

TESTS

Ability and achievement of pupils have been checked by means of standardized tests. Results indicate our pupils have normal ability and compare favorably with pupils in other school systems with respect to academic achievement.

SCHOOL PLANT

Heating systems and plumbing are antiquated and expensive as well as inefficient to operate in most schools. Many of the buildings

are old and, in fact, obsolete for school purposes. The furniture, for the most part, has seen better days. All together our school plant is expensive to operate.

A program for improving these conditions should be adopted at an early date.

LOOKING AHEAD

There has been no change in the need for a new school at North Chelmsford. The following factors are evident:—

1. The proposed site has been eliminated from further consideration at this time.
2. There is no unanimity of thinking with respect to a site that could be approved by the School Building Assistance Commission of the State.
3. Many of the residents of the Highland Avenue and Quessy sections view with suspicion any proposed plans for a new school at North Chelmsford.
4. Residents of other sections of the town hesitate to force a decision in such a situation.
5. A new school at North Chelmsford would in the last analysis serve but a small portion of our total school enrollment.

In view of the above it appears to be wise to redecorate the two present buildings and allow local thinking to crystalize before exerting further efforts to establish a new school in the North Section of the town.

The most serious defect in our total school system is the lack of educational opportunities available for pupils in grades seven and eight and in the high school. It is proposed that we proceed at once to do something about this situation.

The first step to be taken is to provide a new building near, or an addition to, the high school. Such building together with the high school would house all pupils in grades seven and eight as well as all pupils now in the high school. We would then have a six-year High School which could adequately provide the educational needs of the upper half of our pupil enrollment. At the same time the present elementary schools could then house the expanding enrollment in the first six grades for a few years.

This proposed Six-year High School plant should include adequate

provisions for the following activities which are now entirely lacking or not properly provided:—

1. Library
2. Home Economics
3. Industrial Arts
4. Physical Education
5. Cafeteria
6. Auditorium
7. Adequate heating plant

The town must soon look to the future of its schools. This plan can go far in providing both needed space and improved educational opportunity.

Some of the factors in favor of immediate action along these lines are:—

1. A suitable site is available and is now owned by the Town.
2. This site is acceptable to the School Building Assistance Commission. This insures liberal financial assistance.
3. It would favorably affect all pupils of the town in grades seven through twelve.
4. It has equal importance for the people of all sections of the town.
5. It is a sound plan educationally.
6. The town has long since outgrown a classical type high school.
7. It appears to be an economical method of solving the problem for pupils in grades seven through twelve.

The foregoing proposal offers an opportunity to citizens of Chelmsford to actually do something about the present high school program. Here is a chance to do a real job in providing for the needs of our boys and girls.

The consideration and cooperation of the School Committee, citizens, parents, teachers and pupils in meeting the many school problems of the year have been a source of satisfaction. Our boys and girls are worthy of continued thought, care and financial expenditure.

Over 35% of the pupils who entered our high school as freshmen in the above five classes dropped out before graduation. There are various reasons why these pupils left school before they received their diplomas. Probably the principle reason why over 200 pupils did not remain in the school for the four years is because it did not have anything to offer them that they were interested in. The pupils who are in Chelmsford High School at the present time were asked what they would like to study that is not in the present courses of study. In answer to this question, 79 indicated that they would like to study art, 140 domestic science, 116 manual training, and 105 automobile driving. This questionnaire was signed by the parents which apparently indicates that they approve these selections.

In the schools where these courses are taught, more pupils complete the four years work, better scholastic work is done, pupils are happier and make better citizens both in school and in life after school. Eventually these subjects will be offered to the girls and boys of Chelmsford High School. Why not do it so that those who are in school now can profit thereby?

MUSIC

Miss Littlehale

In this, my third annual statement, I am pleased to report that the Music Department is now functioning smoothly and systematically. The work in the grades is progressing along the lines set up in the course of study which I worked out in a postgraduate course at Boston University.

With few exceptions the entire school system is now standardized in regard to textbooks. In the upper grades I have introduced two small magazines, "Keyboard Jr." and "Young Keyboard Jr." These we find are of great value in stimulating interest in music appreciation.

During the year we have shown several films—"Rhythm is Everywhere" introducing rhythm patterns for small children; "Sounds of Music" illustrating the characteristics of musical sounds; "Story of the Violin" portraying the evolution of the violin and related string instruments. As I have been recently appointed one of a committee of

three to work in conjunction with the State Department of Visual Aid I shall be in a position to bring to the Chelmsford schools the latest and best in films.

As a part of rhythmic study square dancing has been introduced in the upper grades. Aside from building better social values through teamwork this activity helps in establishing self control and coordination.

The seventh and eighth grades in one of our schools had a surprise visit from a woman well known in the field of music education. She was much impressed with the quality of their singing and with the spirit in which the dancing was done. The teachers also had their share of complimentary remarks.

The work in the grades is beginning to show results in the High School. The Glee Clubs who formerly were interested only in unison singing are showing marked improvement in part singing. I am especially pleased to note the increased number of boys participating.

A group from the High School recently gave a program of choral music at the Unitarian Church.

The Christmas program which was presented at the High School assembly was enjoyed by the audience and by those who participated.

In a recent conversation with the State Supervisor of Music I was gratified that she approved of the type of operettas that I gave in the Spring, operettas which incorporate the children's school activities.

It is my aim to present when feasible a music festival in which all the schools will participate.

Again I most cordially invite parents and friends to visit any of my classes.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Boys — Mr. Nolan

The general scope of physical education conforms with general education, that is, to attain the best development through all body activities.

This plan motivates one to realize the value of good health, and realize the importance of good and desirable activities.

We have two periods a week in the grammar schools. A program similar to last year will be maintained. There is a basketball league for all the grammar schools. This will be concluded with a play-off for the championship and runner-up. Trophies will be awarded to

the champions. A similar league will be conducted during the baseball season.

The general aims of physical education in our grade schools covers the following phases:

1. Calisthenics or free exercises.
2. Seasonable games which conform with age and development of the boys.
3. Hygiene.
4. Safety programs.
5. Correctives, activities, that assist the individual or groups.

High school students have two periods a week. Any one on a varsity squad does not participate during such sport.

A field day is to be conducted in June for the high school students.

Special emphasis is placed on these boys so that they will have proper organic growth, physical development, and proper posture.

This is attained by covering the following:

1. Games and contests.
2. Hygiene.
3. Calisthenics.
4. Rythmics.

Girls — Miss Keith

In Physical Education we are striving to emphasize development of the whole child physically, mentally and socially. This we do through teaching calesthenics, games and contests, rhythemics and hygiene.

Each child in the Elementary School has 20 minutes per week for Physical Education and the upper grades have 30 minutes per week. In the Spring the girls in the upper grades have a softball league with play-offs for the championship.

The High School Girls have two periods per week. Volleyball, basketball and softball for after school activities. In the late Spring the schools participate in a Field Day.

HEALTH

During July of this year as a result of a joint meeting of the School Committee and the Board of Health a survey was made by the State Public Health Supervisor, Miss Glidden. She spent two full days with your nurse, during which the entire health program was discussed and records examined. At the conclusion of this study many recommendations were made, namely that there be another full time nurse and a clerk to carry on the health work. It was decided also that the nurse should refrain from taking sick children home and that this problem be placed under the principal's jurisdiction in each school.

The nurse was also not to take patients to Waltham, the feeling being that she should have a more definite time schedule in the various schools. This schedule has been drawn up by the Superintendent of Schools Mr. Jeffords, approved and is now in effect.

All children have had their ears examined by a new pure tone Audiometer. This was done by a teacher, Mrs. Purzel. The Audiometer was loaned to us by the State.

Each child has had his physical examinations performed by the school Drs. J. E. Boucher and Benjamin Blechman. In December the State made another survey of health conditions, etc. during which time your nurse had conferences with Mr. Jeffords and Miss Brooks and a member of the State Department. They made a sanitary survey and examined records. In order to improve our existing program, it was deemed necessary to secure more funds for health personnel and equipment.

I would like to see a good Health Council formed this coming year if possible.

In conclusion I will say that I feel all the school health personnel have been kind, considerate and cooperative, working toward the end or rather basic goal namely that the school health program be based on the needs of the child.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Irene H. Emerson

As school people are concerned with the complete education of the children and with the effective use of the whole school day, it is essential that maximum use be made of every experience which has educational significance; thus, the educational objectives of the school lunch program are twofold: to feed children and to use the noon period as a part of the educational program. The school lunch program offers educational experiences which should be utilized by the entire school staff.

A school lunch program which realizes its full educational possibilities contributes to the conviction that health is a way of living, and through the cooperation of home, school and community makes its contribution to improved health and physical fitness of the individual and thus to community health.

Our school lunch program includes both "Type A," which is the hot lunch program, and "Type C," the milk program. Five of the schools participate in "Type A" and seven in the "Type C."
