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



## WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 5, 1951 and March 12, 1951

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

Middlesex, ss.

To Lawrence W. Chute, Constable, or any suitable person of the Town of Chelmsford:

## **GREETING:**

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the legal voters of said Chelmsford to meet in their several polling places, viz:

Precinct 1.	Town Hall, Chelmsford Center
Precinct 2.	Town Hall, North Chelmsford
Precinct 3.	Fire House, West Chelmsford
Precinct 4.	School House, East Chelmsford
Precinct 5.	Liberty Hall, South Chelmsford
Precinct 6.	Westlands School House

On Monday, the fifth day of March, 1951, being the first Monday in said month, at 12 o'clock noon, for the following purposes:

To bring in their votes for the following officers: One Moderator for three years One Selectman for three years One member of the Board of Public Welfare for three years One Town Clerk for three years One Town Treasurer and Tax Collector for three years One member of the Board of Assessors for three years One member of the School Committee for three years One member of the Board of Health for three years One Tree Warden for three years One Cemetery Commissioner for three years One Park Commissioner for one year, unexpired term One Park Commissioner for three years One Park Commissioner for two years, unexpired term Two Public Library Trustees for three years One Sinking Fund Commissioner for three years One Sinking Fund Commissioner for one year, unexpired term One member of the Planning Board for five years Constable for one year

All on one ballot

The polls will be open from 12 noon to 8 p.m. and to meet in the High School Auditorium at Chelmsford on the following Monday, the twelfth day of March, 1951 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act upon the following articles, viz:

ARTICLE 1. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray Town charges for the current year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town; and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary: or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue of the current financial year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money with which to meet unpaid bills of previous years; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-eight hundred ninety-four (\$3894) dollars to pay the Treasurer of the Middlesex County Retirement System, the said amount being the Town's share of the Pension and Expense Fund; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Overlay Reserve Account a sum not exceeding Five Thousand (\$5000.00) dollars to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee as provided in General Laws Chapter 40, Section 6; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Assessors to use a sum of money in the amount such as the Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation of the Commonwealth may approve as free cash, said sum of money to be applied in determining the tax rate for the year 1951; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Cemetery Commissioners to appoint any or all of the members of said Board as laborers to work in the Cemetery Department at the rate of one (\$1.00) dollar per hour; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Park Commissioners to appoint any or all of the members of said Board as laborers to work in the Park Department at the rate of one (\$1,00) dollar per hour or act in relation thereto. ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of purchasing two automobiles for the Police Department, said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12. In the event of an affirmative vote under the previous Article, to see if the Town will vote to transfer by good and sufficient Bill of Sale two automobiles now used by the Police Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand (\$3000) dollars to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14. In the event that an affirmative action is taken on the foregoing Article, to see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Excess and Deficiency Account six thousand (\$6000) dollars to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to the Excess and Deficiency Account; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of forty-five hundred (\$4500) dollars to be used for Chapter 90, Construction on Groton Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16. In the event that an affirmative action is taken on the foregoing article to see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Excess and Deficiency Account Thirteen thousand five hundred (13,500) dollars to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored upon their receipt, to the Excess and Deficiency Account; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand five hundred \$\$2500) dollars to be used for Chapter 90, Construction on Concord Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18. In the event that an affirmative action is taken on the foregoing Article, to see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Excess and Deficiency Account seventy-five hundred (\$7500) dollars to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, and reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to the Excess and Deficiency Account; or act in relation thereto. ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty-five hundred (\$5500) dollars for the purpose of purchasing two trucks for the Highway Department, such purchase to be made by the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 20. In the event of an affirmative vote under the previous article, to see if the Town will vote to transfer by good and sufficient bill of sale, two trucks now used by the Highway Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand (\$4000) dollars, or some other sum, for the purpose of continuing the survey and maps of the Town under the supervision of the Board of Assessors; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen (\$1500) dollars for the purchase of a sand spreader for the highway department, said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen thousand (\$14,000) dollars for the purpose of installing adequate lighting at the McFarlin School; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to take by eminent domain, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining parking area in Chelmsford Center, a certain area as laid out by the Selectmen and shown on a plan filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 25. If action on the foregoing article is in the affirmative, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate a certain sum for the purpose of grading and conditioning aforesaid lot for a parking area; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning By-Laws by adding a new section to Precinct 2 (North), a Business Area. "3. All of the land within the area bounded, Easterly by Church Street; Westerly by Princeton Street; and Northerly by land now or formerly, of Martin L. and Josephine M. Delorey;" or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Health by majority vote to accept the offers, and any amended offers, of the United States of America to make advances pursuant to Public Law 352, 81st Congress to the Town of Chelmsford for the preparation of an engineering report, plans and specifications for a comprehensive sanitary sewerage system for the Town of Chelmsford ;and to enter into any and all agreements and to do each and everything necessary or proper in order to obtain the payment by the United States of America of advances for said purposes or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize Mr. Edmund J. Welch, of the Board of Health, to act as the authorized representative of said Board, to furnish to the United States such information, data and documents as may be required, to take any and all other action as may be necessary to obtain the advances and secure the preparation of all necessary engineering report, plans and specifications for the above work, and otherwise to act as the authorized representative of the Town of Chelmsford in this connection; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Health by majority vote to approve the engineering report, final plans and specifications when completed and to furnish a certificate of such approval to the United States of America; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote that the terms, laborers, workmen and mechanics as used in the Workmen's Compensation Law found in Chapter 152 of the General Laws shall include all employees of the Town; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of paying a premium for insurance providing workmen's compensation benefits; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars for the purpose of installing a plumbing and heating system, water service and cesspool in the American Legion Quarters Post 313 on Gay Street, the installation to be under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1500) dollars for the purpose of having certain Town records microfilmed; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eighteen hundred (\$1800) dollars for the purchase of a three quarter ton pickup truck for the Fire Department, said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Fire Engineers ;or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen hundred (\$1400) dollars for the Fire Department for the purpose of making repairs and repainting former Engine 2 prior to its usage as Engine 4 at East Chelmsford; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectment to grant an easement to the Lowell Electric Light Corporation to locate a pole with wires and cables thereon on town land in the Crystal Lake Area; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to amend the sick leave by-law by adding the following: "The provision of this by-law which permits an accumulation of sick leave shall apply to employment prior to the effective date of this by-law".

ARTICLE 38. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Laws of Precinct 2 extending the business area on the westerly side of Tyngsboro Road in whole or in part from the present boundry northerly to and including the premises now of Mrs. Mabel A. Syvret at 112 Tyngsboro Road, the westerly line to be 200 feet from and parallel to the Tyngsboro Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 39. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Laws of Precinct 2 by designating as business area all or part of the land on the Easterly side of Tyngsboro Road from the present business area boundary northerly to Sleeper Street, the easterly line to be 400 feet from and parallel to Tyngsboro Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 40. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Laws of Precinct 2 by designating as industrial area all the land between the B & M R. R. tracks and the Merrimack River, bounded on the South by the Lowell City Line and the North by the Tyngsboro Line; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 41. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Laws of Precinct 2 by designating as industrial area all the land bounded by Sleeper Street, the B & M R. R. tracks and Wotten Lane and a line 400 feet from and parallel to Tyngsboro Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 42. To see if the Town will vote to widen Fletcher Street from Chelmsford to North Road and to erect a sidewalk along said Fletcher Street; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to secure by purchase or otherwise, a certain area of land in the Vinal Square Section of North Chelmsford, said land to be used for the extension of the parking lot located in said section; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 44. In the event of an affirmative vote under the foregoing article, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money to carry out the provisions of said article; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 45. To see if the Town will vote to change the closing date for the submission of articles for the warrant for the Annual Town Meeting from January 21 to January 15; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 46. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a firm of Engineers to revalue all real estate property located in the Town.

ARTICLE 47. In the event of an affirmative wote under the previous article, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of said revaluation.

ARTICLE 48. To see if the Town will vote to accept Sections 19 and 24 of Chapter 114 with respect to certain records to be kept by the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Treasurer to place one half of the present "Sale of Lots and Graves" account and one half of future receipts from sale of the same in a "Cemetery Expansion Fund" Account to be invested at interest; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to transfer two hundred (\$200) dollars from the "Sale of Lots and Graves Account" in the Cemetery Department, said sum to be used for repairs to cemetery grounds and historic headstones; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of Swain Road as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 52. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing a portion of Swain Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 53. To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of Pine Hill Road as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 54. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purpose of reconstructing a portion of Pine Hill Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 55. To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of Leedberg Street, as laid out by the Board of Selectmen, and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto. ARTICLE 56. To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of Merilda Avenue as shown on a plan of said street duly filed in the Office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 57. To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of Bisson Street, as shown on a plan of said street, duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act-in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 58. To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of Frank Street, as shown on a plan of said street duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 59. To see if the Town will vote to accept a portion of Anna Street as shown on a plan of said street duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 60. To see if the Town will vote  $t_0$  accept Lynn Avenue as laid out by the Selectmen as shown by their plan and layout; or act in relation thereto.

AND YOU ARE DIRECTED To serve this Warrant by posting attested copies thereof at the Post Offices in the Center of the Town, South Chelmsford, North Chelmsford, and West Chelmsford, and at the School House in East Chelmsford, and the Westlands School House, thirty days at least before the time appointed for holding the first meeting aforesaid.

HEREOF FAIL NOT, and make return of the Warrant with your doings thereon to the Town Clerk at the time and place of holding this meeting aforesaid.

On a motion made by Charles D. Harrington it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00 for the purpose of making repairs and repainting former Engine 2 prior to its usage as Engine 4 at East Chelmsford.

#### Under Article Thirty-Six:

On a motion made by Carl A. E. Peterson, it was voted to authorize the Selectmen to grant an easement to the Lowell Electric Light Corp. to locate a pole with wires and cables thereon on the Town owned land in the Crystal Lake area.

# SPECIAL TOWN MEETING October 22nd, 1951

At a Special Town Meeting held on October 22nd, 1951, in the Upper Town Hall at Chelmsford Centre the following business was transacted: The meeting was called to order by Moderator John H. Valentine, who requested Town Clerk Harold C. Petterson to read the Warrant. On a motion made by Herbert M. Sturtevant, it was voted to transfer the sum of \$1,000.00 from the Highway Department, Maintenance Resurfacing Account, to the Highway Department, Construction and Reconstruction, Machinery Hire, Other account.

#### Under Article Seven:

On a motion made by Herbert M. Sturtevant, it was voted to transfer the sum of \$1,000.00 from the Highway Department Maintenance Resurfacing Account to the Highway Department, Maintenance Machinery Hire, Other account.

#### Under Article Eight:

### REPORT OF WELFARE AGENT

# **REPORT OF WELFARE AGENT**

To the Members of the Honorable Board of Public Welfare, Bureau of Old Age Assistance and Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford.

The following report of the Welfare Department is submitted:

The present staff of the Welfare office is as follows: Quincy B. Park, Agent Phyllis R. Brown, R. N., Social Worker Priscilla S. Johnson, Clerk Patricia A. Strombos, Clerk Theodore W. Emerson, Chairman of Board of Public Welfare and Bureau of Old Age Assistance.

During the past year 114 applications for all forms of assistance as administered by this office were received and thoroughly investigated by the Agent or Social Worker.

Forty-six cases were found to be eligible for payment of aid from Old Age Assistance funds.

Eleven cases were approved for payment of aid from Aid to Dependent Children fund.

Sixteen cases were transferred from General Relief rolls to newly authorized category of assistance designated as Disability Assistance.

Twenty-four applications for General Relief payments were approved.

Of total applications for all categories of assistance administered by this office, ninety-seven were approved and seventeen were denied for various reasons.

Comparisons of expenditures during past year and year previous shows an increase in amount of \$2,238.63. The major portion of this increased expenditure may be attributed to extensive hospitalization and illness by two recipients of this category of assistance. The total paid these two cases exceeded \$2,700.00. A second reason for increased expenditures resulted from transfer of sixteen cases from General Relief to newly authorized category of assistance, namely, Disability Assistance which increases monthly grants to some extent. As will be noticed in requested appropriation for General Relief, our payments from General Relief funds will be considerably reduced this year due to the new program of assistance in which the town will, receive approximately 75% reimbursement from State and Federal funds.

This is a new category of assistance that was authorized as of November 1, 1951. At the present time we are aiding 16 cases and all but one have been transferred from General Relief rolls to this category.

As mentioned under welfare the reimbursement that is received from the Federal and State funds is expected to be 75% of total money expended. As this category of aid has only been approved since November 1, 1951, it is very difficult to estimate, at this time, the amount of money required to administer this program or the number of persons who will be eligible to receive benefits.

Due to the re imbursable provisions of this category of assistance it is expected that the Town's share of total assistance rendered will considerably reduce the over all expenditure formerly paid from General Relief funds.

It will be noticed that while case load remains constant for past year and previous year, persons aided have been reduced by fourteen. One reason is due to three parents having been transferred to Disability Assistance payroll, thereby making the other parent eligible for reimbursement for the assistance given. A second reason is due to children having reached age beyond which they are eligible or are employed and are not being aided.

No general increase in this form of assistance is anticipated during present year.

Despite a slightly decreased number of persons aided it is expected that expenditures will be increased during this year due to changes in Old Age Assistance Laws.

Legislation enacted during 1951 has resulted in changes in Old Age Assistance Law which will result in increased expenditures in this form of assistance.

These changes are as follows:

Increase in the minimum monthly payments to person living alone from \$65.00 to \$75.00.

Increases to each person where living in family group from \$45.00 to \$55.00 each.

Increases in exemptions of legally liable children of recipients of this form of aid.

Increased rates allowable for convalenscent home care when required.

Increase in costs of ownership or rent allowances.

Another major change in Old Age Assistance Law provides that a lien be placed on real estate owned by recipient who receives payment after Jan. 1, 1952, for amount of assistance rendered. Such lien not to be collectible however until such time as recipient or spouse is no longer eligible for assistance.

#### MEDICAL EQUIPMENT CUPBOARD

This is a program that will provide without charge any resident

of the Town with medical equipment and sick room supplies necessary to their comfort while in their home.

This office has taken the initiative in formulating plans and of contacting various civic, social and fraternal organizations of the Town regarding the need for this service.

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We are pleased to announce that while this program is in its infancy, the following articles are available to anyone in need:

- 1 Hospital Bed
- 2 Wheel Chairs
- 2 Infra Red Heat Lamps
- 1 Diathermy Treatment Machine
- 2 Pairs Crutches

It is hoped that the present stock of articles will be considerably enlarged through additional donations by various groups and individuals who may wish to contribute toward this civic project.

To be of maximum benefit to those in need of this service it is hoped that the Medical Equipment Cupboard will be able to supply a greater variety of articles necessary in the sick room.

This service would welcome donations of toys, games, etc., for the use of children during convalescence or confinement due to communicable diseases. Such articles would be expendable and would require replacement at future date. Anyone interested in contributing towards the success of this program is invited to contact this office for more complete details.

In order not to conflict with the Medical Equipment Cupboard program, the members of the Board of Public Welfare have approved the purchase of three hospital beds. Previously hospital beds have been provided wherever needed upon a rental basis. It is expected that there will be a considerable saving effected by not having to pay rental charges.

At this time the Staff of the Welfare office would like to express their appreciation of the continued cooperation of all recipients of assistance. At various times very complicated problems have been presented and we all have found recipients most cooperative and willing and considerate in following the rules and regulations that this office is required to adhere to by State and Federal law.

This office would also like to express our appreciation to the Lions' Club and St. Vincent de Paul Society for their usual Christmas donations of Christmas baskets to numerous families throughout the Town.

### **REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FIRE ENGINEERS**

January 12, 1952.

Board of Selectmen, Chelmsford, Mass.

Gentlemen:

The Board of Fire Engineers herewith submits its annual report for the year ending December 31, 1951.

Great progress was made during the year in the long-range development program of the department, and if the program can be continued for a few years more, the Chelmsford Fire Department will rank with the best in Middlesex county, if not in the entire state.

During 1951, the fire alarm systems of North Chelmsford and West Chelmsford were linked, and an extension was made from the Center station to the East station to permit sounding of alarms in East from the Center, where the telephone switchboard is located.

In 1952, we are hoping to tie in the South alarm siren with the Center in the same manner as East now is tied in, and this will complete the long line extensions until such time as a central fire alarm system is installed. All of these lines will serve as part of a central system at that time.

Through the co-operation of the Civil Defense organization, a combination fire alarm-air raid warning whistle was installed in North Chelmsford, giving that section an adequate, modern audible alarm system.

During 1951 we also inaugurated an <u>emergency service</u>, utilizing a three-quarter ton pickup truck for which money was voted at the annual town meeting. This truck is equipped with radio, with firefighting and with emergency equipment and already has proven its value on many occasions. It gives the department an all-round emergency outfit which can be used at highway accidents, drownings or other non-fire emergencies without cutting down the fire-protection service in any of the five districts.

Also during 1951, the old Engine 4 at East Chelmsford was retired to reserve duty and was replaced with the former Engine 2 from North Chelmsford, after the latter had been repaired, repainted and modernized as much as possible. The reserve truck has been used on several occasions for non-fire work, such as pumping out Middlesex street in the area where lack of drainage resulted in minor floods after each heavy rain or thaw. Great progress also has been made in welding the five districts into one unit with all working together for the common end — a better protection set-up for the entire town.

The town experienced two serious fires during 1951 — the Emerson barn fire and the Spurr home fire. At both of these fires the volunteer members of the department spent long hours with their companies and won the plaudits of spectators for their effective firefighting work. The members of the Board of Fire Engineers join in praising these men who give up their time, their sleep and sometimes their days work, in order to help the handful of regular firemen in the protection of lives and property in town.

Fires at the two town dumps continued in 1951 to be a source of great expense to the department, and the Engineers ask that steps be taken this year to properly police these dumps, to provide hydrant service at the North dump and other measures be taken to reduce the drain on fire department finances now caused by dump and dumporiginated fires.

Under the mutual aid system, the Chelmsford fire department sent help to several towns in 1951 and called for and received help from Lowell, Tewksbury and Concord when it was needed.

Our big aim in 1952 is the construction of a simple fire station in the Center, to replace the antiquated, too small and poorly located shed now in use. As soon as the school department turns the Princeton street school buildings back to the town, we hope to secure one to be remodelled into a fire station for North Chelmsford, to provide town-owned housing for the apparatus there in place of the present rented housing.

In conclusion, we wish to express our thanks to the Board of Selectmen and to all other town officials and departments for the cooperation given us during the year.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

During the year this Board appointed Mr. Francis J. Brown to assume the duties of Health Agent, Sanitarian and Milk Inspector for the Town of Chelmsford. The performance of his duties started on June 1st.

### **CONTAGIOUS DISEASES**

The incidence of contagious diseases was low this year, particularly with regard to those types peculiar to childhood.

#### Anterior Poliomyelitis

Throughout the country this year the incidence of "polio" was much lower than 1950 and the epidemic year of 1949. Although many of the neighboring towns and cities reported cases of infantile paralysis, Chelmsford was lucky to escape without having one single case.

Pamphlets and booklets were obtained from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis concerning the precautions to take to prevent "polio", what to do when it arrives and all the known facts about the disease. This reading matter was left at various places throughout the town so that the people could gain a better knowledge of the dread disease, infantile paralysis.

#### **Pulmonary Tuberculosis**

Of all the communicable diseases, the hardest to overcome is tuberculosis. It is also the communicable disease that is the most expensive to the community and to the patient himself. Last year, this department spent over six hundred dollars for the hospital care of patients afflicted with tuberculosis. Added to this cost will be the amount levied by the county on the Town of Chelmsford for the deficit of the sanatorium at Waltham. This represents the cost to the taxpayers but it does not tell the whole story. It does not tell us the amount of money spent by the Welfare Department and other agencies for rehabilitation and also care of the dependents of persons ill with tuberculosis. It also does not show the loss in productive capacity of the patients which perhaps is around three thousand dollars a year.

This department is trying to exhaust every avenue of the discovery, prevention and spread of this disease. The greatest factor we know of to prevent the disease is the early detection of it. This is best done by chest x-rays and follow-up physical examinations.

We are carrying on a program of routine x-ray check-ups for food handlers.

During the year we checked on all old tuberculosis patients and their contacts and also new and suspected cases.

#### Diphtheria

This year we are happy to report that no cases of diphtheria were reported in Chelmsford. We feel that the immunization clinics carried on by this department, through the school nurse, plus the excellent work in prevention carried on by private physicians are showing desired results.

Much improvement was seen in food handling establishments this year.

In June the United States Public Health Service Code for Eating and Drinking Establishments was adopted by this department. It is the most complete and fairest code for restaurants in the country. It has been authored by experts in the field of sanitation.

July was the month that saw a complete survey of the eating and drinking establishments in the Town made. It was conducted by our sanitarian with the help of Mr. Karol Wisnieski of the State Health Department. The results showed that much would have to be done to improve the sanitary conditions in these establishments. After the survey, a meeting was called with the owners and managers of the eating and drinking establishments. At this meeting it was explained just what would be expected of the eating and drinking places under the new code. Reinspections of all establishments were made in September and again in November. Various new equipment had been installed in some places to improve sanitizing methods for the safer production of food and drink. On the second inspection the town average had risen 19 points.

In most cases the cooperation given by the restaurant owners and their help was excellent. Without this cooperation no improvement could have been made in the sanitary conditions of these places.

On November 26th, 27th and 28th a Food Handlers' School was conducted by the sanitarian with the help of Mr. Theodore Shepardson of the State Health Department. It was given with the idea of enlightening the food handlers not only as to what they should do as far as santation is concerned but also the reasons behind all of these rules and regulations.

Conditions in eating and drinking places are by no means where they should be and there is still much to be done. Additional educational programs and inspections are planned for the following year. It is hoped that these programs will not only further improve the sanitary condition of the eating and drinking places but that they will also keep the sanitary conditions on the high level that we hope to attain.

#### MILK CONTROL PROGRAM

There are 41 stores or other places of business that are licensed to sell milk in the Town of Chelmsford.

There are 28 licensed milk dealers that distribute their milk in Chelmsford.

There are two pasteurization plants in the Town of Chelmsford, both of which have been licensed by this Board. Since June two complete inspections have been made of these plants by this Board. An inspection of each place was also made by the State Dept. of Public Health. Both plants are, at present, installing new equipment so that they may turn out a better, cleaner and more healthful milk product.

In the Town itself, there are 43 dairy farms who send their milk to dealers who peddle in the town. All of these farms were inspected twice during the year. In most cases, conditions were found to be satisfactory. Recommendations were made where necessary.

If all of the milk producers that contribute to Chelmsford's milk supply were inspected, it would require visiting over 500 dairy farms and it would take you far up into northern Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont.

There are about 5,900 quarts of milk sold each day in the Town in door to door delivery. This figure does not include the milk bought in grocery stores or the milk that is consumed in restaurants. If these figures were taken into consideration, it could probably be said that the average consumption of milk in the Town is 2/3s of a quart per person per day. Without taking into consideration the grocery store and restaurant sales, the figure is well over a pint a day. This is very good when you consider that the average for the whole country is only a pint of milk per person per day.

#### SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEMS

During the year rules and regulations were adopted relating to the installation and cleaning out of sewage disposal systems. These rules and regulations require that no sewage disposal system shall be installed without obtaining a permit from the Board of Health. This was adopted so that these installations could be inspected by this Board. These systems were checked for size, construction, placement, possibility of causing pollution or sickness and suitability for the building they were to serve. It was impossible to inspect every installation because contractors and others building homes were not familiar with the new procedure and did not apply for permits. It is believed that about 95% of the installations were checked. Next year it is hoped that 100% will be possible.

Since June 1st this department investigated about 50 cases of nuisances of various types as shown by the above figures. It is well to note that by far the greatest majority of these were classified under sewerage complaints. Sewerage is a great problem in most sections of town. In most cases, it was found that the poor conditions were not due to poor installation or maintenance but because of lack of space, also because of the fact that the land available will take only so much water. Chelmsford is suffering from growing pains as far as its sewerage systems are concerned.

Illegal dumping is another problem of this department. It seems a shame that inasmuch as the Town provides two dumps for the disposal of rubbish that citizens continue to dump illegally on the property of others and on the roads and highways of the town. Another problem along the same line is the expense which the dumps have become to the town. They are not only a burden to the Health Department but also to the Fire Department and the Highway Department. The answer to this could be in a rubbish collection system—a system whereby the collector would be the only one to enter the dumps, or the answer could be in the awarding of a contract to a person or persons for the care and supervision of the dumps. Under this contract the successful bidder would be bonded and would be held strictly to the

terms of the contract which would include keeping the dumps in a condition satisfactory to this Board.

No nuisances had to be abated by taking court action.

#### **BIOLOGICAL DEPOT**

During the year a refrigerator was purchased. It was installed in the Board of Health office in the Town Hall.

This was approved by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health as a suitable station for the distribution of biologicals.

Among the biologicals kept in stock at the depot are the following: Diphtheria antitoxin (2 strengths), Schick tests, Tetanus toxoid (2 sizes), Triple vaccine (2 sizes), Typhoid Para A & B vaccine, Double vaccine (2 sizes), Smallpox vaccine (2 sizes), Sterile vaccination needles, Tuberculin (2 sizes), Silver nitrate and Immune serum globulin.

These serums are available, free of charge, to physicians for the treatment of Chelmsford patients. Formerly doctors had to wait days to obtain these biologicals. Arrangements have been made so that this station is open to physicians at all times.

#### SCHOOL INSPECTIONS

Since September two complete inspections were made of the schools in the town. During these inspections special attention was paid to the sanitary condition of the lavatory and the toilet facilities. The school cafeterias were also included in the inspections.

Conditions were found to be very satisfactory. There were no unsanitary conditions found at the time of the inspections. It is planned to make frequent inspections of the schools throughout the year.

#### KINDERGARTENS AND NURSERY SCHOOLS

The kindergartens and nursery schools in Chelmsford were inspected and licensed during the year. These are required to have the same facilities for the children as there are in the schools. Toilet facilities were checked especially along with adequate space, light, heat and ventilation. Children are required to be vaccinated before entering a kindergarten or nursery.

#### MULTI-PHASIC CLINIC

Next year this department hopes to conduct a multi-phasic or multi-diagnostic clinic. The purpose of this clinic would be to examine people, not only for tuberculosis, but also for heart disease, cancer, diabetes and other chronic diseases. No diagnosis would be made in this clinic but people would be referred to their family physicians for a confirmatory diagnosis on the positive findings of the clinic.

This clinic will not be conducted without the approval of the local physicians and their Medical society. It is this approval or disapproval that the Board of Health is now awaiting.

### NEW LABORATORY

To do a complete job of sanitation in the Town of Chelmsford, samples from restaurants, milk samples and water samples should be analysed frequently. Samples from all of the milk dealers should be done once a month. Restaurant samples should be taken at least every other month.

If we were to do this job of sample taking, it would cost at least nine hundred dollars to send the samples elsewhere to be analysed. Instead of doing this, this Board is asking for the nine hundred dollars so that it may be invested in laboratory equipment. This amount is not enough to install a full, well-equipped laboratory. It will take four or five years to obtain a complete laboratory. By the second year we hope to have enough equipment so that we can do a certain amount of laboratory analysis.

With a laboratory of this type much can be done to further protect the health of the town.

Milk could be analysed. It could be tested for the total amount of bacteria in a certain sample to see if it is of a safe drinking quality. The efficiency of pasteurization could be tested. Another test could be performed which indicates how carefully milk is handled after pasteurization. Equipment coming in contact with milk could be tested as to its sterility. Many other tests could be performed on the milk to assure the townspeople of a safe supply.

In eating and drinking places samples could be taken of the utensils that come in contact with food or drink to assure the people that they are not contaminated and that good dishwashing procedures are being used. Food could also be analysed to be sure that spoiled or "rotten" food is not being served.

Well water samples could be analysed for their purity for those people who still depend on this means of water supply.

This laboratory would be an added service to the Town—a service which this Board feels is needed. It is a step which many communities in Massachusetts have already taken or are planning to take.

#### EXPLANATION OF CHANGES IN THE 1952 BUDGET

Contagious Diseases—The amount asked for is considerably less than in previous years due to the fact that the Health Department will no longer be required to pay for the care and treatment of tuberculosis patients. This cost for care and treatment will be added to Chelmsford's assessment for the deficit of the Middlesex sanatorium at the end of the year.

Transportation for Sanitarian and Nurse—We are asking for more money for this account because of the higher taxes on gas, registration fee, increased insurance rates and the other increased costs of operating an automobile.

Meat Inspector's Salary—Formerly the meat inspector was paid \$125 a month. Some months there were no inspections made, especially during the summer. So that the Town will not be paying for work not done, the Board of Health has raised the slaughtering fees to one dollar for each animal slaughtered and the meat inspector will be paid one dollar for each animal he inspects. In this way the slaughtering inspector's salary will be paid for by the slaughtering fees collected.

Care of Dumps—This board is planning to call for bids in the spring on two separate items pertaining to the dumps. The first one is for the filling and leveling of the dumps and putting them in a good condition. For this item we are asking for \$500.

We then intend to call for bids for the constant maintenance of the dumps. In other words, the successful bidder will be required to keep the dumps in a neat, orderly condition at all times. For this item we are asking for \$2000.

The total of these items, \$2500, is less than the amount that was spent on the dumps last year by the Health, Highway and Fire Departments combined.

#### CONCLUSION

We, the Board of Health, were very happy to serve you during the past year. We hope that the steps toward the improvement of the public health in Chelmsford we took last year and the ones we intend to make in the coming year have met and will continue to meet with your wholehearted approval.

#### REPORT OF ANIMAL INSPECTOR

### REPORT OF ANIMAL INSPECTOR

Board of Selectmen:

My Thirty-seventh Annual Report follows:

The annual inspection of all neat cattle, sheep and swine has recently been completed and the list totals 567 Cows, 83 Heifers, 130 Calves, 28 Bulls, 14 Steers, 16 Sheep, 40 Goats, 591 Swine and 64 Horses, in 118 different stables.

The tuberculin test was applied to all cattle and eight cows were condemned for tuberculosis, all from one herd. This is the third successive year that reactors have been condemned but from a different herd each year. Previously there were several years when no reactors were found.

The infected stables were thoroughly cleaned, repaired and disinfected as required.

Eighteen cattle were shipped in from other states accompanied by the proper health certificates and all were released on identification.

Fifty dog-bite cases were reported and investigated; 41 were quarantined and later released as no rabies developed; the others were out of town or could not be found.

### **REPORT OF MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE 105**

## **REPORT OF THE MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE**

Middlesex County maintains an Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics for the benefit of all towns within the County. This service is available to all citizens, especially farmers, home gardeners, homemakers, rural youth and 4-H Club boys and girls.

The work is developed by an unpaid Board of Trustees who maintain a staff of agents at the headquarters at 19 Everett Street, Concord. The trustees appoint a director in each town to represent them in all phases of Extension Work or in a few cases towns elect a director and make an appropriation to help defray local expenses.

In addition to farm and home visits made upon request, local meetings are held or sectional or county-wide meetings or tours are helps available to everyone. A monthly bulletin is published, timely letters mailed on spraying, fertilizing, seeding, poultry problems, information to homemakers, boys, and girls' 4-H work or general community problems.

Some of the activities that took place last year in Chelmsford are as follows:

Educational work with the dairymen was concentrated on programs to assist the farmers in solving their problems of raising better roughage, disease control and milk marketing. Manuel J. Avila, H. M. Blackie, T. W. and J. P. Emerson, Charles Koulas, Walter F. Lewis, Sheehan Brothers, Albert R. Simpson, Howard A. Thayer and Edwin H. Warren enrolled in the Green Pasture Program, completed the program and received appropriate seals for their work. Some organization and planning work was done to make better contacts with smaller fruit growers in the Chelmsford, Westford, Dracut, Tyngsboro, Dunstable and Billerica areas. Chelmsford seemed to be the ideal center and two meetings were held at the Town Hall. One Twilight Meeting was held at Shuhany's fruit farm.

Increased efficiency, flock health, greater breeding progress, and better marketing practices were the principal goals of the Extension Poultry Program. Efficient management practices and equipment were among the topics discussed at meetings of the Middlesex County Poultry Association, which is held at the Acton Town Hall on the second Monday of the month. T. W. Zabierek is secretary of this organization. Charles Koulas, Walter F. Lewis, Lupien Farms, John Parkinson and Meindert Schuts are enrolled in the Middlesex Flock Health Program, through which the Extension Service is attempting to help poultrymen and turkey growers to keep their flocks healthy. T. W. Zabierek is a member of the committee directing this program. Walter Lewis helped plan and presided at a series of breeders' meetings held by the Extension Service during the spring. He was one of 40 poultry breeders from the entire nation selected on the basis of their previous accomplishments in the Chicken-of-Tomorrow Contest to compete in the National Finals. His entry of White Americans was awarded third prize in the comprehensive scoring system. Mr. Lewis also competed in the 1951 Massachusetts Chicken-of-Tomorrow Contest. Rabbit breeders were given assistance through the Middlesex Commercial Rabbit Association, which meets monthly at the Extension Service "Schoolhouse" in Concord.

Mrs. Callie McEvoy, Mrs. Thomas Elliott, Mrs. F. V. Bale and Mrs. Frank Monsen are the Chelmsford representatives to the Women's Advisory Council. A three-meeting series on "New Ideas in Food Preparation" was well attended as well as a demonstration on Effective Windows. Chelmsford women also enjoyed the Christmas Gift Kit.

### **REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD**

To the Citizens of Chelmsford:

Thirteen meetings were held in 1951 by the board. Five petitions for land sub-divisions were received and passed. Two zoning changes were presented to the board and as a result of the above, seven public hearings were held.

One of the zoning changes presented was with regard to a rehearing by the Board of Appeals upon a refusal by them to grant a permit to allow a trailer camp in a residential district. We upheld their decision.

In Town Warrants, six articles were sponsored by the Board with regard to zoning law changes. They were changes from residential zones to business zones on both sides of Tyngsboro Road and on both sides of Littleton Road. Also from residential zone to industrial zone that area on both sides of the B. & M. R. R. tracks near the Southwell Combing Mill. We take this opportunity to thank the citizens for their foresightedness in realizing this need as we do. All six Articles were voted.

Two street re-locations were approved during the year.

Rules governing the gravelling and drainage of new streets were adopted after several conferences with the Honorable Board of Selectmen.

Finally, much work has been started on a new topographical map of the Town, so that in the future there will be some semblance of planning for the tieing in of street lines and drainage in nearby but separate sub-divisions. This will enable the Board to plan for an economical and proper sewage system if and when the Town ever votes for such. This map should be completed and in use early in 1952.

#### Gentlemen:

The Civilian Defense Committee herewith submits its Report of Progress for the Year 1951.

Supplementing the Report of a year ago, the Committee has made the following additions:

#### Medical and Health

We have been very fortunate in obtaining the services of Dr. David A. Latham to direct the activities of this unit.

Chelmsford was the first community to obtain a full list of Registered Nurses from the Division of Registration at the State House. According to this list, there are 104 Registered Nurses in our Town.

No doubt, there are other graduate nurses who reside in Town who are no longer registered. We would welcome the names of any such persons who might be available if an emergency arose.

#### **Emergency Shelters**

A survey has been completed of available spaces in publicly and privately owned buildings which could be used in case of emergencies as First Aid Stations, Bomb Shelters, Evacuation Shelters, etc.

#### Transportation

Through the cooperation and courtesy of the Assessor's Office, a complete list of motor vehicles has been assembled. Such a list would be used to provide emergency transportation. These vehicles have been grouped in accordance with the various Sections of the Town and according to type.

#### Water Supply

Realizing the vital importance of a sufficient water supply, the Committee is preparing a list showing the locations of privately owned wells which could be used in an emergency. We would welcome the names of all private owners who would care to place such facilities at our disposal.

#### **Emergency Housing and Feeding**

Whereas we intend to make use of the facilities of public buildings, school buildings and others which may be made available, we realize that an all-out emergency might require the use of private homes for 24 to 48 hours. These accommodations would be much more accessible for immediate use. We would be very glad to have private owners communicate with us indicating the extent to which facilities might be available.

#### First Aid Courses

Realizing the great importance of such training, we intend to institute a program, in cooperation with our Teaching Staff, which will make these services available to all who desire them.

It is rather difficult to gauge the progress of the Civil Defnese Program in our Town as compared to that of apparently similar communities. We feel that our progress is not only measured by positive accomplishments, but, in addition, by the number of instances where we have not acquiesced to expensive installations which might accomplish a doubtful purpose.

As in other communities, the Committee has been subject to constant pressure to make expensive installations and establish programs which require large sums of money. It has been our conviction that provisions should be made for basic fundamentals but that there was danger of setting up a top heavy organization which could collapse of its own weight and inertia.

The Committee has felt that no money should be expended on projects which would not make a direct contribution to the community in times of peace. In other words, we do not intend to measure the value of our progress solely in terms of tax dollars expended.

The Committee views with apprehension the state-wide and federal efforts which are being made to enlist the cooperation of citizens in the high-pressuring of our U. S. Senators and Congressmen to support a huge budget for national civilian defense; with a similar tendency in the case of the state budgetary requests.

Whereas we believe that reasonable expenses will be incurred, we would urge that a same approach be made to the whole program because the taxpayers are now being overwhelmed from all directions and should be given relief wherever possible. We must not become so obsessed with the threat of emergencies of all sorts that we will lose sight of the fact that military and civilian defenses are only possible if we remain economically strong.

To the Citizens of the Town of Chelmsford:

The Park Commission organized for the year with Gilbert **H**. Perham as Chairman, Robert C. Spaulding as Secretary and William W. Edge as the third Member.

Many improvements have been made in the past year. The North Common was improved so that now it is one of the best in the town. Approximately a ton and a half of lime and several hundred pounds of fertilizer were spread to improve the existing turf and grass seed was sown to fill in many bare spots. Through the cooperation of the members of the Board of Selectmen, the sidewalks around the North Common were hot-topped. These improvements will add much to this beauty spot in Vinal Square.

Work on the other parks was mostly the usual maintenance. An over-abundant rainfall made it necessary to continuously mow grass; thus some improvements planned were abandoned as the department was limited on funds. Several dead trees were removed. Flag poles were painted and re-roped where necessary. A near-hurricane in the month of March blew down two large spruce trees which were straightened up and given extra care throughout the season.

Through the continued cooperation of the townspeople, by granting more funds, a program to develop floral plots in our parks to further beautify them, should be well worth considering.

There were one hundred and twenty-three calls for the services of your Forest Warden against one hundred and seventy-one the previous year. The only major fire we experienced occurred on May 2nd in the Groton Road section. The source of the fire was the public dump off Swain Road. Many homes were endangered and all fire fighting resources of this town as well as aid from Lowell, Tewksbury and Concord were brought into play before the fire was brought under control.

Over two thousand permits for fires in the open were issued by the Forest Warden.

In closing I will remind our citizens that the law states: "That a permit shall be received at all times from the Forest Warden before any fire is started in the out-of-doors."

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Chelmsford for the period from October 20, 1949, the date of the previous audit, to June 27, 1951, and submit the following report thereon:

An examination and verification was made of the recorded financial transactions of the town as shown on the books of the departments receiving or disbursing money or committing bills for collection. The books and accounts of the town accountant were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were compared with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer and with the treasurer's record of receipts, while the recorded payments were checked with the treasury warrants and with the treasurer's records of disbursements.

The appropriations and transfers as shown on the ledger were compared with the town clerk's record of financial votes passed at town meetings and with the records of the finance committee.

The ledger was analyzed, a trial balance was drawn off proving the ledger to be in balance, and a balance sheet showing the financial condition of the town on June 27, 1951 was prepared and is appended to this report.

The books and accounts in the town treasurer's office were examined and checked. The cash book was footed throughout, the receipts being analyzed and compared with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer, with other sources from which the town received money, and with the town accountant's books. The recorded payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the disbursement of town funds.

The cash balance on June 27, 1951 was verified by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements furnished by the banks in which money is deposited and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The transactions of the several trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer, the selectmen, the treasurer of the library trustees, the insurance fund committee, and the veterans' emergency fund committee were verified, and the securities and savings bank books representing the investment of these funds were examined and listed.

The tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were listed from the records kept by the treasurer and all transactions pertaining thereto were verified and checked with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The records of deductions from employees' salaries for federal taxes and the retirement fund were examined and checked. The payments to the Collector of Internal Revenue and the county retirement system were verified.

The books and accounts in the collector's office were examined and checked. The taxes and motor vehicle and trailer excise outstanding at the time of the previous audit and all subsequent commitments were audited and compared with the assessors' warrants. The cash receipts as posted in the commitment books were compared with the cash book record of collections, the abatements were compared with the assessors' record of abatements granted, the payments to the treasurer were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved with the controlling accounts in the accountant's ledger.

The records of departmental accounts receivable were examined. The payments to the treasurer were verified, the abatements were checked, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the accountant's ledger accounts.

Verification of the outstanding tax, excise, and departmental accounts was made by sending notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The town clerk's records of sporting, dog, and miscellaneous licenses were examined and checked. The payments to the Division of Fisheries and Game were verified by comparison with the receipts on file, and the payments to the town treasurer were compared with the treasurer's cash book.

The surety bonds of the officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

The work of the treasurer and collector, as well as of the town accountant, has been performed in an accurate and efficient manner thereby facilitating the work of the audit.

The records of cash receipts of the sealer of weights and measures, of the police, fire, health, school, and library departments, and of all other departments wherein money is collected for the town were examined and checked, the payments to the treasurer and the cash on hand being verified.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment funds.

During the audit cooperation was extended by all town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the legal voters of said Chelmsford to meet in their several polling places, viz:

On Monday, the third day of March, 1952, being the first Monday in said month, at 12 o'clock noon, for the following purposes:

To bring in their votes for the following officers:

One Selectman for three years

- One member of the Board of Public Welfare for three years.
- One member of the Board of Assessors for three years.
- One member of the School Committee for three years.
- One member of the Board of Health for three years.
- One Cemetery Commissioner for three years.
- One Park Commissioner for one year.
- One Park Commissioner for two years.
- One Park Commissioner for three years.

Two Public Library Trustees for three years. One Sinking Fund Commissioner for three years. Three members of the Planning Board for five years. One Constable for one year. All on one ballot.

The polls will be open from 12 noon to 8 p.m., and to meet in the High School Auditorium at Chelmsford on the following Monday, the tenth day of March, 1952, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, then and there to act upon the following articles, viz:

ARTICLE 1. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be required to defray town charges for the current year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as its agent in any suit or suits which may arise during the current year, with authority to settle and adjust claims or demands for or against the Town; and to employ counsel whenever in their judgment it is necessary; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue of the current financial year; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money with which to meet bills of previous years; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Thirty-Seven and 87/100 (\$4,537.87) dollars or some other sum to pay to the Treasurer of the Middlesex County Retirement System, the said amount being the Town's share of the pension, expense and Military service funds; or act in relation thereto. ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or some other sum to be used as a Reserve Fund at the discretion of the Finance Committee as provided in General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 6; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 8. ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from Available Funds the sum of Twenty-Nine Thousand (\$29,000.00) dollars or some other sum to a Stabilization Fun in accordance with Section 5 (b), Chapter 40 of the General Laws; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to sell at private or public auction the old hearse presently garaged at the Tool House in the Forefathers' Cemetery, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to sell all the metal junk that belongs to the Cemetery Department, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars or some other sum, for the purpose of extending the water main to the North Chelmsford Dump and for the installation of a hydrant at the North Chelmsford Dump, or act in relation thereto. ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase approximately eight (8) acres of land fronted by 412 feet, more or less, on Boston Road between that land now owned by Daisy Day and by Daniel J. Hart and wife, said land to be reserved for the future expansion and needs of Town Buildings or municipal areas, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15. In the event of an affirmative vote on the preceding article, to see if the Town will vote to appropriate or transfer a certain sum of money for the purpose of the said article, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a certain sum of money for the purchase of two automobiles for the Police Department, said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen, or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 17. In the event of an affirmative vote under the previous article, to see if the Town will vote to transfer by good and sufficient Bill of Sale, two automobiles now used by the Police Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a committee of five to study the provisions of Section 5, Chapter 798, of the Acts of 1951 with respect to payroll schedule, work schedule, sick leave, time off, schedule of minimum and maximum wages and schedule of increments or steprate increases for Town Employees, such committee to be appointed by the Moderator and such committee to file a report and make such recommendations as it deems proper prior to December 1, 1952, said report to be filed with the Town Clerk and read at the first special town meeting after said date; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Section 6B of Chapter 40 of the General Laws. The provision of said section is, "6-B—Uniforms for Police and Firemen. A city or town which accepts this section may appropriate money for the purchase of Uniforms for members of its Police and Fire Departments."; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 20. In the event that the above article is accepted, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) dollars for the purchase of Police Uniforms.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Road Machinery Fund the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) dollars or some other sum, for the purchase of a Chain Saw for the Tree Warden's Dept., said purchase to be made under the supervision of the Tree Warden; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 22. In the event of an affirmative vote under the previous article, to see if the Town will vote to transfer by good and sufficient Bill of Sale, one Chain Saw now used by the Tree Warden's Department; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept Wotton Road as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) dollars for the purpose of reconstructing Wotton Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept Cedar Street Extension as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand One Hundred

(\$1,100.00) dollars for the reconstruction of Cedar Street Extension; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept Brentwood Road as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Two Hundred (\$1,200.00) dollars for the purpose of reconstructing Brentwood Road; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will accept Miner Avenue as laid out by the Board of Selectmen and shown by their report and plan duly filed in the office of the Town Clerk; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred (\$700.00) dollars for the reconstruction of Miner Avenue; or act in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Sixty (\$560.00) dollars for the payment of land damage claims incurred as a result of highway and sidewalk construction on Boston Road; or act in relation thereto.

#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the citizens of Chelmsford:

At a meeting of the School Committee held on January 16, 1952, it was voted to approve the report of the Superintendent of Schools for the year 1951.

During the fiscal year of 1951 the School Committee held twentyfour regular meetings and thirteen special meetings. It has participated in all meetings of the North Building Committee, the High School Building Committee, and the "Needs" Committee. During the year these committees have had thirty-two meetings.

We expect contracts will have been awarded for the construction of the new North Chelmsford School before the Annual Town Meeting. The "Needs" Committee is working on further plans to provide for much needed facilities for the elementary schools.

It was necessary to secure an additional classroom for the Mc-Farlin school and one of the High School classrooms was taken for this purpose. An additional teacher was employed in the High School in order to expand the guidance program.

A Driver-Education program has been instituted in the High School and early in 1952 an automobile will be made available for active Driver-Training.

The Committee endeavors, within budget limits, to keep the school buildings in good repair. During the year the roof at McFarlin School has been replaced with a 20-year bonded roof and an additional section of the High School roof has been replaced in the same manner. The classrooms and corridors in the newer portion of the High School have been painted. Again the varied colors add much to usability and appearance.


Increasing enrollment in the elementary schools is and will continue to be a serious problem until adequate building facilities are ready for use. We are indicating by a chart, the actual problems faced by Chelmsford as the present enrollment advances one year at a time. This situation is made more serious by a steady increase in the number of pupils entering Grade I and the steady immigration that affects all grades.

Plans for next year include additional interior and exterior painting, further roof replacements and plumbing and heating problems.

We have endeavored in this report to give you a general idea of our activities to indicate some of the needs of the schools, and to urge your liberal support in maintaining adequate schools for the boys and girls of the Town of Chelmsford.

Our elementary schools are operating with overcrowded classes and staff increases must keep pace with mounting enrollments. Since similar conditions are prevailing in most other communities, it will become increasingly difficult to retain and to recruit adequately trained teachers unless Chelmsford maintains a salary schedule at least equal to those schedules operating in towns which are comparable in population and financial ability. Teachers salaries in Chelmsford are at a low level.

Our teachers, as a group, are well prepared through education and training for teaching. They are worthy of greater consideration and support.

#### BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

Adequate tools are essential for efficient workmanship in all lines of endeavor.

Little by little we are making progress in keeping our textbooks up to date and in replacing worn copies. When enrollments are more stable we hope to change texts in the basic subjects every five or six years.

We are using a minimum of school supplies which like all other commodities have increased in costs. However, up-to-date school practice demands that book learning be supplemented with many other related activities involving educational supplies.

#### SCHOOL PLANT

The peak of elementary school enrollment has not been reached. Our elementary school buildings are completely in use and we have one elementary class in the High School building. Next year it will be necessary to provide a room somewhere for an additional class for grade six in connection with McFarlin School. Also there continues to be the possibility of the need for an additional room in grade one at both Princeton and McFarlin. By September 1953 the new North School should be ready for use and in the meantime the Needs Committee will have made progress in providing for increased facilities in connection with the McFarlin School.

This year we have 20 rooms out of a total of 41 rooms in our elementary schools with more than 30 pupils per room and half of the 20 rooms have 35 or more pupils per room.

Buildings are being maintained with respect to physical and safety factors and some permanent improvements are made gradually to those buildings not soon to be replaced.

#### LOOKING AHEAD

The North Building Committee will have secured bids on the new elementary school before the Town Meeting and no doubt the contracts will have been awarded. This school should be ready for use in September 1953.

The new Needs Committee has recommended that changes at the High School wait until increasing enrollment becomes a greater factor in the High School. In the meantime this Committee is focusing its attention on increased facilities at the McFarlin School. The needs at this school have been previously mentioned.

Cooperative action on the part of citizens, parents, School Committee, teachers and pupils is essential for a good school program in any community. We hope more progress may be made during the next school year in this respect.

Again I thank the School Committee and others who have helped to make a better school program for the youth of Chelmsford.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

#### Mr. Conrad

Education has been defined as a life-long process of adjustment on the part of the individual to the culture in which he lives. This process of adjustment has become increasingly difficult as the simple requirements of a primitive culture has been expanded into the complex necessities of a mechanized society which threatens to destroy itself. To keep step with this dynamic culture, educational institutions have developed a highly complex educational system.

The learning process has not changed, but the selection of subject matter from our vast and constantly growing cultural heritage and the presentation of this subject matter to pupils in a logical and systematic manner have become our prime concern.

My last report called attention to some of the more significant trends in secondary education, especially as they relate to the interests, aptitudes, and vocational plans of our particular school population. Because of our limited facilities, it has not been possible to realize in our school program all the new courses we believe desirable. It has been possible, however, to introduce full courses in civics, consumer math, applied chemistry, and applied science, as well as to revise the content of our courses in modern problems and economic geography. Half-year courses have been introduced in consumer education and business law, and our driver education classes are being continued with the hope that they will be supplemented by driver training courses in the spring. It is my belief that these courses are highly valuable, since they help prepare students to become competent members of the comunity. While no adequate educational program can neglect the educational needs of pupils with special aptitudes and abilities, neither can it overlook the needs of pupils with more limited capacities. Our adjustments in program are the results of a sincere effort to meet the widely varying educational needs of our total pupil enrollment.

<u>Our guidance program</u>, started last March, has expanded under the qualified direction of Mr. Campbell, who has been relieved of one class so that he is free to spend fifteen periods a week interviewing, testing, and securing and distributing guidance information. The guidance program is initiated in the firm conviction that it is an effective means of providing for individual differences and of administering to all the aspects of a youth's development—physical, social emotional, vocational, and recreational. Thus far this year, the guidance counselor has on record two hundred and seventy-six interviews. Twenty groups, arranged according to curriculum, have had guidance meetings devoted to curriculum orientation and vocational interests. Seven outside speakers have given talks on vocations, schools, and scholarships. Two organized field trips have been conducted to hospitals, and two to colleges. Three motion pictures on the subject of occupations have been shown. Three classes have been given mental maturity tests, and many pupils have taken interest inventory tests. Two hundred twenty catalogs and books on colleges and special schools now constitute a guidance library, which is available to any pupil at any time. However proud we are of this early record of accomplishment, we realize increasingly that more time must be devoted to guidance counseling, and that the work must extend into the grades if we are to develop an adequate program.

We are fortunate in our audio-visual aids. The Class of 1951 presented a tape recorder to the school, and money from the students' fund has supplied a micro-film projector. We have added an electric typewriter to the equipment of the commercial department, and in addition we have arranged to use for three months a dictaphone, which will give our commercial students the opportunity of working with some of the latest in office equipment. It is my hope to have in the near future a school sound system.

Of our 1951 graduating class of seventy eight, twenty-four are attending higher institutions of learning, and of this number three are receiving substantial competitive scholarships.

The need for a more comprehensive report to parents and the increased need for more factual information on pupil progress resulted in our adopting new report cards and new cumulative record cards for the office, The changing of our marking system from five to four periods a year enables us to offer half-year courses.

This year we should like to establish a library-study hall, as modern methods of teaching and the need for training pupils in the use of books for recreation and efficient habits of work-type reading make it necessary to have a library easily accessible to all pupils. Newer teaching methods call for many and varied materials and supervised study and unit assignments increase the demand for reading materials.

I should like to emphasize once more the fact that the schools belong to you and will be what you make them. They will be good when you take time to study their needs carefully and conscientiously, and they will fail when you neglect them. Let us remember that our accomplishments and gains must be won through the combined efforts of the School Committee, the Superintendent of Schools, the teachers, and the Citizens of Chelmsford. From all of you I ask cooperation, and to all of you I again pledge my best efforts.

#### MUSIC

### **Miss Littlehale**

The music program has continued to grow under the fivefold program as set up in last year's report.

1. Singing:

This area of experience is one of the most important as this will be the one most likely to be carried into adult life. The program is designed not only for the very talented pupil but everyone.

2. Listening:

This too is very important area of experience as the people of America become more and more listeners and less and less active performers. In days past, in many instances, every member of a family either played or sang. Now, people are more inclined to listen than to perform. Our program is designed so that the student may become a more intelligent listener and therefore get more enjoyment out of music.

3. Responding Rhythmically:

A sense of rythm is native to all of us but in some cases it has to be developed. This is done through the experience of swinging, marching, and dancing to the songs they learn. Certainly, the child who has learned the intricate steps of a square dance or some national dance has gained both in coordination and . poise. There also has to be complete group harmony which carried over into adult life should be very helpful.

4. Playing:

This area could be greatly enlarged, but due to limited time the Music Department can do little more than start the child on his way with the experience of playing in the Rhythm Band. From there, it jumps to the excellent work done by the High School Band. The ideal should be a tie-up between the two areas of experience.

5. Creating:

Under this area of experience new words have been added to songs which the children already know, songs have been written to a given set of words, dances have been worked out, and singing games have been played.

This is a wide program and can be carried out only through the cooperation of all concerned.

The Square Dance Contest was in March, the trophy going to the Princeton Street School. This group was chosen to perform on a television program and came in second. The Lions Club, which gave the trophy, should be proud of the grand spirit which they have created by their gift.

The "special" glee club of the high school presented in the fall a highly entertaining operetta. Not only was the singing before an audience helpful, but poise was also developed in those taking part. During the operetta a fashing show was put on by a Lowell store. The Glee Club has sung for numerous clubs and organizations during the year. One of which, the Lowell Philharmonic Orchestra concert, gave the members a good deal of satisfaction. Not only did they join with members of glee clubs from Lowell, Dracut, and Tewksbury, but they presented one number alone. The supervisors of the Greater Lowell area feel that this type of concert can be very worth while and hope that it will become an annual affair. Many communities sponsor such concerts thereby giving the people an opportunity to show the same interest in High School Vocal music as is shown in other activities.

In February, two boys, Allan Walker and Winchester Dermody attended the All State Festival held in Worcester. They both received great inspiration from the experience of singing in a large chorus under an inspired conductor. This is a thrill never to be forgotten.

On December 30, the Glee Club visited the Bedford Veterans' Hospital where they gave a full hour entertainment.

In the spring the Annual May Festival was held. This year's May Queen was Shirley Proulx. This is a singular honor in that it is given not for popularity alone, but for excellent scholastic ability. The pageant was entitled "United for Freedom and Peace." This festival is a sincere effort on the part of the Music Department to show the people of Chelmsford a cross section of the work done in both the grades and in the high school.

In April I attended the Eastern Music Educators Conference held in Atlantic City. At these conferences not only do I receive helpful ideas, but I feel inspired to rededicate myself to my work as a Music Educator.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank those people of the town who have helped immeasurably by their interest and cooperation.

# ART

#### Mrs. Collard

"When the artist is alive in any person, whatever his work may be, he becomes an inventive, searching, self-expressing, creature. He becomes interesting to other people . . . Art is simply a question of doing things well." — Robert Henri. With this thought as my guide I have carried the program of the art department into the studies of water color, principles of design, pencil sketching, crafts, paper sculpture, and decorating for the various social functions throughout the year.

In January grades five, six, seven, and eight had an extensive study of the principles of design while the lower grades did free hand drawing.

We helped carry out the observance of the holidays in February by making valentines and appropriate drawings for the patriotic holidays.

In March the high school classes made the backdrop for the Talent Show. Later in the Spring the same classes prepared the art exhibition which was seen at the Music Festival.

A few of the seniors in the high school worked hard on the design for the cover of the year book and the illustrations.

In September we started the school year with a poster contest in grades three and four. It was for the promotion of Fire Prevention Week and prizes were given by the Chelmsford Fire department.

In October many high school students worked diligently on floats for Booster Day.

One of the most enjoyable projects was the preparation for Christmas in the high school. The decorations were enjoyed by both faculty and students.

Besides our regular class work, the art department is very actively involved in decorating for the many social functions.

I feel that all the grades have made great progress in the field of art during the first year of the art department.

# PHYSICAL EDUCATION Boys — Mr. Ciszek

Education is interested in bringing about changes in the human organism that are not only useful but desirable. There is nothing in the nature of human beings in general, that is inherently good or bad. Some tendencies of the individuals do need curbing; others need direction into proper channels to meet the needs of a changing civilization; and it is through the modification of these tendencies of the boys of Chelmsford that the writer has a cue to content selection, motivation, and methods of directing learning in physical education.

Teaching implies learning, and thus there can be no teaching if there is no learning. Therefore, if physical education is educational, and it is, it follows then, that physical education, the same as general education, is interested in bringing about useful changes in human conduct through the education of the physical, and the education of the individual through the physical, so that the integrated personality may result.

The physical education program presented by the writer is divided into three distinct phases; high school, grammar school, and extra curricular activities. The program is designed to fit the characteristics and the needs of the various age levels involved.

The grammar school program is divided into two distinct teaching age levels and, therefore, conditions demand two types of activities. In the fifth and sixth grades the characteristics and the means used to meet these characteristics are: height and weight increasing-posture is emphasized; heart and lungs are equal to height and weight—sustained activities are given in the form of long relay races and contests; muscular strength is not equal to the growth—stunts which build strength and develop muscles are presented; coordinations are improving—more skill activities in the various sports are taught; team or game age — baseball, football, speedball, soccer, football baseball, and other games are played under constant supervision; attention span is greater — intricate rules of the various games are explained.

The seventh and eighth grade students possess different characteristics and the needs resulting from these characteristics are met with coordinating activities. The characteristics and the activities presented to meet them are as follows; rapid growth of height and weight, especially the extremities — various skill drills in the major sports are repeated several times; heart increases in size, the walls grow faster than the valves — distance of running and time of games is decreased; team loyalties — team games are presented at every opportunity; hero age — since the teacher is the idol of a great many children at this age, the writer has attempted to be a good model physical, mentally, and socially; lack of confidence — because of this characteristic, success activities are inserted into the program as often as possible.

To supplement the activity periods and in order to give the seventh and eighth grade students a better understanding of themselves as human organisms, various lectures are given during the winter months. The subject matter covered in these lectures includes the heart and circulation of the blood; the eyes, ears and nose; the muscles and their function in the human body; the care of bruises and sprains and the prevention and care of colds. Charts, movies, models and other supplementary materials were made available by Mr. Bradley, The American Red Cross, and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. These materials were very helpful to the writer in presenting the lectures. The physical education program in the high school is designed to prepare the students for their post-graduate days. Strength and agility of mind as well as body are required to live a successful life. Activities with carry-over value are also presented whenever it is feasible to do so. In order to meet the aforementioned needs, the physical education program in the high school consists of vigorous settingup exercises; tumbling; pyramid building; heavy apparatus work; basketball, baseball, football, speedball and volleyball games, and other activities designed to help the students have full control of their body weight in all situations and to develop neuromuscular coordination.

The extra-curricular program consists of baseball and basketball leagues in the grammar school and basketball, baseball and bowling leagues in the high school. All students are encouraged to take part in these activities.

#### Girls — Miss Cordingley

In the past few years, physical education has become an important part of our country's educational program. Its aim and objectives are many. Physical educators today emphasize the physical, social, emotional, and recreational development of each pupil.

To carry out these aims and provide a well-rounded program, we included various types of activities. In the first two grades the children must learn simple skills, such as throwing, catching, skipping, etc. Games of low organization, story plays, mimetics, rhythmical activities, and simple relays are taught. In the third and fourth grades work is advanced. Story plays and mimetics are dropped, games of higher organization are added, and the fundamentals are advanced. Folk dances are started at this age level. Segregation of the boys and girls is started in the fifth grade. The program is graded more, and though the same activities are included, everything is on a higher level. Seventh and eighth grade girls have games which serve as a lead-up to the highly organized team sports which are taught in the high school. They also receive instruction in rhythms, posture exercise, and relays. In the spring softball will be conducted for the older girls.

In the high school the program consists mainly of team sports. Field hockey, volleyball, and basketball were taught during the fall and winter, as well as conditioning exercises. In the spring, field ball, softball, posture, and some rhythm work will complete the program.

Extra curricular activities have included basketball and field hockey. This was the first year of the latter sport, but I feel as if a good start has been made. Also, we hope to form a bowling league in the spring, as well as an intramural softball league.

Class periods in the elementary schools are twenty minutes for the first four grades, and thirty minutes for the upper four. In the high school, the girls have two forty-five minute periods.

#### HEALTH

#### Helen M. Jewett, R. N.

Briefly, the daily routine of your school nurse is to visit a different school each morning and remain at the office of the McFarlin School each afternoon. Home calls are usually made after school hours. This procedure brings forth all phases of school nursing which might occur. I have shown in detail in another paragraph the work accomplished this past year. It has been my intention to arrange a schedule whereby I can be reached at all times. A call to the McFarlin School, even though I am not there, is relayed to me. For this system, I am grateful for the cooperation of the principals and teachers.

For the first time in Chelmsford, a health program was set up in the high school. This consists of periodic talks and movies by accepted health authorities.

Physical examinations were done in all schools between September 18 and 26 by Dr. Blechman and Dr. Boucher, your school doctors.

Audiometer (hearing) tests were done in all schools by Mrs. Milan, and those who failed were retested by me.

Immunization clinics were held in April and May in all schools. Pupils and pre-school children were given booster shots for diphtheria and tetanus by Dr. Blechman and Dr. Horan. There were 729 children who received these shots.

In June a vaccination clinic was held at all schools for pre-school children with Dr. Horan and Dr. Blechman administering.

The week of June 18 to 23 I attended a work-shop conference on child health at Simmons College.

A dental clinic has also been established. At the present only the pupils at the McFarlin School are attending. It is hoped that the other schools will be able to use this clinic, but at present transporting pupils to and from the doctor's office in the Center section creates a problem. Your school nurse cannot spend her time on this kind of transportation. Examinations at McFarlin School were done by Dr. Yarid. Miss Barbara Desmond, dental hygienist from North Central Health District. examined pupils at Princeton, Highland Avenue, and the Westland Schools.

I have spent considerable time with the S P. C. C. Social Worker from the Nashoba area and our own town welfare worker on different families for the betterment of home conditions. Clothing has been generously donated by our townspeople to help these conditions, and I assure you it has been gratefully received by those less fortunate than ourselves.

# SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Few developments are making such gratifying headway as the movement to give the school dining room its place in our public educational system. America is finally recognizing the wealth in potential brainpower it has been tossing away because of malnutrition of too large a percentage of our younger generation.

In the present days of high prices it is especially important that children obtain needed foods in the school lunch, as some may be receiving fewer of these in meals at home. It has been found in surveys conducted in another state that children had better health and gained weight as a result of participating in a school lunch program. In our own program approximately 350 pupils are served daily in the "Type A" or hot lunch program and 750 pupils in the "Type C" or milk program.

Although we cannot cater to individual tastes, we are endeavoring to provide the best meals possible at the present minimum price. Even with the help of government commodities and reimburesments, high food prices prevent us from serving the variety of foods which we realize some people would like and expect us to have.
