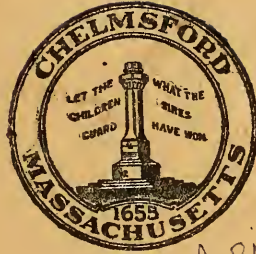

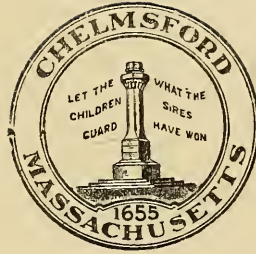

REPORT OF WELFARE AGENT

To the members of the Board of Public Welfare, Bureau of Old Age Assistance, and citizens of the Town of Chelmsford the following report of the Welfare Department activities for the year 1953 is respectfully submitted:

The present staff of the Welfare Department is comprised of the following named persons:

During the past year 100 applications for assistance were made, and after investigation by the Agent or Social Worker a total of 76 applications were approved and aid granted; 14 applications were denied due to ineligibility; 4 applications were withdrawn voluntarily; and at the present time there are 6 applications for Disability Assistance pending approval by State Medical Review Team, who have final decision as to eligibility for aid from this category of assistance.

35 applications for Old Age Assistance were approved.

11 applications for aid from Aid to Dependent Children funds were approved.

7 applications for aid from Disability Assistance funds were approved.

23 cases were aided with funds from General Relief program, and in most cases, provided for emergency assistance of a temporary nature.

Comparisons of expenditures from this category of assistance show a decrease from previous years in amount of \$1,018.29, despite the fact that more individuals were aided during the past year than during 1952. This is accounted for, to a large extent, by the short term of assistance required in a number of cases.

DISABILITY ASSISTANCE

This category of assistance was authorized by Legislative Action Nov. 1, 1951 and provides for reimbursement of 75% of amount of aid expended, from State and Federal funds.

There are 15 cases being aided from this category of assistance, and it is reasonable to assume that this number will remain as a minimum. Six applications are pending Medical Review Team approval and it is reasonable to expect that majority will be approved.

It will be noted that expenditures for 1953 were less than for previous year, also the case load was reduced from 20 to 15. The decrease in expenditures during the past year is due to a large extent to a smaller case load, also to decreased medical expenses.

It will be noted that two less cases were aided during 1953 than was the case in 1952. It will also be noted that a total of 16 more persons were aided than in the previous year. The decrease in cost is accounted for by resources of the recipient which included increased Social Security Survivors Benefits, payments received in accordance with Court Orders for support, and contributions from children who have completed their schooling and are providing income to their parents through earnings from employment.

The most important legislative change in Old Age Assistance law during past year was enactment of law requiring minimum payments of \$55.00 monthly to a recipient in a family group, and \$75.00 monthly minimum payment to a recipient living alone. Nineteen cases are being aided in Convalescent Homes or receiving equivalent care in own homes.

REIMBURSEMENTS TO TOWN TREASURER

Many of the citizens of the town have expressed an interest in amount of funds returned to the Town Treasurer from State and Federal reimbursement and from other cities and towns as reimbursement for aid to persons with settlement other than this town.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FIRE ENGINEERS

January 15, 1954

Board of Selectmen,
Chelmsford, Mass.

Gentlemen:

The Board of Fire Engineers herewith submits its annual report for the year ending December 31, 1953.

The past year has brought about some changes that the Board of Fire Engineers feel are for the best interest of the service and will eventually bring about a better understanding by all concerned.

The duties of Deputy to the Chief Engineer, formerly held by a Callman, were changed and assigned to a permanent fire-fighter. The duties of District Chief of the North company were also changed from a Callman to a permanent firefighter, as has been the case in the Center for some time.

Engine One was completely refinished the past year, bringing all our apparatus now to a very presentable appearance.

The West and South stations were painted one coat on the outside. A radiator was installed in the South station to insure against freezing the plumbing that had been installed the previous year. This radiator, plus other material needed for other stations, were removed from the Old Princeton Street School by authority of the Board of Selectmen.

The alarm system in North and West was repaired and modernized to some extent but a great deal more is necessary.

Apparatus in the Center was moved into the new station on August 1, 1953 and affords service to the whole department that the Town never had before.

The Board of Fire Engineers gave considerable thought to the 1954 Budget and feel this Department can continue to render the type of service the Town is entitled to under the Board's budget recommendations.

The Board of Fire Engineers decided against any further extensions of the fire alarm system, until what we have now, is modernized and put in a condition we can depend upon at all times.

The Board feels it is time steps were taken to have Town-owned quarters in North Chelmsford, and have requested the Selectmen to insert an Article in the Annual Warrant asking for a committee and funds to secure plans and specifications for a fire station for that section of the Town.

In conclusion, we wish to express our thanks to all concerned for their cooperation given the Fire Department in the Year 1953.

Swab Tests on Utensils	78

In this year swab testing of the eating and drinking utensils com-menced. The swab testing shows if the utensils have been sterilized properly. This test is extremely useful to both the owner of the estab-lishment and the Board's Agent in producing a better quality eating and drinking utensils.

Milk Sanitation

There are 30 licensed milk dealers in the Town of Chelmsford. Milk samples are taken each month from each dealer. Reports of find-ings are sent to the dealer. Also two pasteurization plant inspections are made per year.

Stores licensed for sale of milk and cream are inspected for proper refrigeration and storage of the products.

Sewage Disposal

In 1953, 212 sewage system permits were issued. Most of these per-mits were for installation and construction of systems for new homes. The systems were designed for the type of soil in which they were installed, and inspections were made prior to the backfilling of them.

Nuisance Complaints

A breakdown of nuisance complaints is as follows:

There are 4 complaints, not abated which are in the process of being eliminated.

Not listed in the totals were complaints found to be without evidence of nuisance.

Other Sanitary Inspections

Other Sanitary Inspections included were schools, kindergartens, Convalescent and Nursing Homes. General sanitation and safety measures were the main items inspected.

NEW LABORATORY

In October the Health Department Laboratory started operating. The Laboratory is used in: (1) Milk supply testing, (2) Eating and Drinking utensils swab testing, (3) Private water supply testing.

Most of the tests done in the Laboratory are based on the amounts and types of bacteria. The following is some of the Laboratory equipment bought by the town for use in the testing:

Electric Steam Autoclave—used in sterilizing liquids.

Water Still—used to make distilled water, which is used in large quantities.

Electric Stove—used to sterilize glassware and the preparation of bacteria-growing media.

Incubator—used to grow the bacteria of the test samples.

Water Bath—used to hold media in liquid state, and used in certain milk tests.

Centrifuge—used in Butter fat testing of milk.

This new Laboratory has eliminated the cost of having sample testing done by the Nashoba Associated Boards of Health. The Laboratory has also made available further means of income by services to the Town of Dracut in their restaurant and tavern sanitation program. Similar arrangements for services are being negotiated with the Boards of Health of Billerica and Tewksbury.

GARBAGE COLLECTION CONTRACT

The Garbage Collection Contract for the period 1954 through 1956 was awarded to the McKennedy Bros. Riverneck Road, Chelmsford. McKennedy Bros. were the low bidders for the contract; the Board also felt that superior work had been done in the past by the McKennedy Bros.

The cost of the new contract exceeded the previous 3 year contract by about \$3,000 per year. This increased cost was caused partly by the enlargement of the number of collections, but mostly by the Mass. State law requiring the cooking of all garbage being fed to swine. This law was enacted to eliminate certain animal diseases.

RUBBISH COLLECTION

*semi-monthly
or
bi-weekly?*

In May the Rubbish Collection for the Town was started, with a semi-weekly pick-up by a two man crew. The Rubbish Truck bought by the town is a G M C with Gar Wood compaction type loader.

The rubbish collection, taken as a whole, has worked well. The collection crew, which has had short hours some weeks, has worked overtime other weeks, overtime for which they were not paid. Holidays and heavier rubbish pick-ups necessitated the overtime work. Average working hours balance out to a forty hour week over the period of the year.

The Board hopes to start a weekly rubbish pick-up, with permission of the voters. This can be accomplished by the addition of one more man to the rubbish collection crew.

NORTH CHELMSFORD DUMP

One of the Board's problems this past year was the Town Dump in North Chelmsford. Unrestricted, at random dumping, and out-of-town dumpers had made the town dump, at times, almost impassable to trucks and cars. Practically continuous bulldozing and cleaning of the dump was required, making maintenance extremely costly.

The Board felt that in order to have the Dump usable, it would have to be closed six days of the week; the open day for the Dump, Saturdays, to have a special policeman on duty, supervising the dumping.

In November this schedule was put in effect. The North Chelmsford Dump has greatly improved in dumping conditions.

This schedule of one day per week is by no means wanted by the Board and is also used only in necessity, and therefore temporary.

REPORT OF ANIMAL INSPECTOR

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my report of Animals from March 30 to December 31, 1953.

The annual inspection of all dairy cattle, sheep, swine, goats and horses has been completed and the list totals 533 cows, 157 heifers over one year, 185 heifers under one year, 19 steers, 33 bulls, 27 sheep, 19 goats, 495 swine and 69 horses in 91 stables.

The outbreak of Viscular Exanthema has been brought under control. A new law requiring a permit and the cooking of all garbage at 212°F for thirty minutes goes into effect January 1, 1954. A copy of this new law has been posted in the Town Hall by your inspector.

Three cattle were shipped in from other states accompanied by the proper health certificates and all were released on identification.

Forty-four dog bite cases were reported and investigated: forty-two were quarantined and later released as no rabies developed. The others were not quarantined.

I wish at this time to express my appreciation to the physicians, police and health officials for their fine cooperation in reporting the dog bite cases over the past year.

REPORT OF THE MIDDLESEX COUNTY EXTENSION SERVICE

The Middlesex County Extension Service is a publicly supported, educational institution to serve all the towns of the county in agriculture and home economics. In agriculture the work is developed county-wide under the direction of county councils made up of leading farmers in each of the main commodities as vegetables, fruit, poultry, dairying, livestock, and commercial flowers. A County Bulletin is mailed monthly to all cooperating farmers and timely information sent to anyone on request.

4-H Club Work is developed under a town committee and leaders, and the home economics work is available through a town director, organized groups, or direct requests. Your town director furnishes counsel to the Extension Office on the needs of the towns, services desired, or leadership needed.

Information and assistance were made available on the planning and operation of a poultry farm or enterprise covering the subjects of poultry housing and equipment, ventilation and litter management, brooding and rearing, marketing, and management for egg production.

Specialized information on turkey and poultry health was made available through the 1953 Middlesex Flock Health Program. Walter F. Lewis and Vinson Reid were on the 1953 Extension Poultry Advisory Committee. Mr. Lewis served as secretary and T. W. Zabierek served as treasurer of the Middlesex County Poultry Association. Chelmsford members of the 1953 Middlesex Flock Health Program included poultrymen Arthur W. Howard, Walter Lewis, Romeo V. Noel, John Parkinson, and Philip St. Germain, and turkey grower, Meindert Schultz.

The Middlesex County Extension Service renders many services to the dairymen in this area. There are, in the county, herd testing facilities which include complete herd records, pasture, hay and silage production programs which aim at producing more and better roughage at a lower cost, and a soil testing laboratory where a complete analysis can be run to determine needed soil nutrients. Also, on application for membership, any dairyman has access to one of the best bull studs in the northeast for use in his own herd through the artificial breeding program.

Dairy leaders who have helped with the projects locally as well as county-wide have been Mr. Walter Lewis and Mr. Ted W. Emerson.

Fruit growers within the town have been very active in the county-wide projects. In addition to making farm visits within the town, information was obtained to assist in the general spray service that has been sent out to all growers. Shuhany Orchards, Albert Lupien, and Arthur Englund have assisted in the general fruit work.

The Chelmsford Garden Club has been very cooperative throughout the year and furnished an all-day program of interest to many garden clubs throughout the county. Mrs. Arthur Gibbs and Mrs. Arthur Bennett were among the leaders of the club helping with the program. It was greatly appreciated by others interested in home gardening and landscaping.

The projects of interest to homemakers have been Food Selection, Family Life, and Beginners' Sewing. Three groups participated in the programs on "Christmas Everywhere."

4-H Club Work in Chelmsford in 1953 featured clubs in gardening, dairy, soil conservation, clothing, foods, hostess, and girls' craft. Joseph Gravelle attended State Club Week at the University, a week of training in junior leadership.

County medals for Club work were won by Raymond Eno for dairy work, and Philip St. Germain for his agricultural record. Lorraine Eno won the Middlesex County Farm Bureau Cup for dairy work, and Anthony Alcorn won the Palm Grain Cup for dairy work. The spring exhibit was held in conjunction with the P.T.A. and was well attended.

Mrs. Philip St. Germain was the 4-H Town Chairman. Those leading groups were Mrs. Walter Lewis, Mrs. Raymond Eno, Mrs. Christy Pettee, Mrs. Carl Johnson, Mr. Carl Clark. Miss Barbara Enright from the Lowell Electric Company furnished leadership for Foods Club Work. Others assisting with the program were Miss Pearl Koulas, Mrs. Arthur Gibbs, and Mr. E. Carl Parmenter. 4-H Club members attended Camp Middlesex in Ashby and exhibited at the Middlesex County 4-H Fair in Groton.

REPORT OF THE CEMETERY DEPARTMENT

It is with pleasure that we, your Commissioners, can report again the progress that has taken place in the Six Cemeteries.

Since the re-location of the lots in Pine Ridge Cemetery, considerable work has been done to improve the general appearance, shrubs were set out at the end of the new single grave section, greatly improving this layout.

A catch-drain to take care of surface water, which was installed, will drain away water which formerly settled in the low side.

After scraping the roadways, they were oiled with two coats and sanded making the avenues much more satisfactory for citizens requiring the use of them.

For several years the Commissioners have been concerned with a real hazard existing in Pine Ridge Cemetery. The lone pine tree in the center of the Cemetery has developed a serious rot in the trunk. Since this tree is a land-mark, it is regrettable that it must be taken down before any serious accident occurs.

The Commissioners have learned the cost on taking this tree down, but would like the approval of the citizens regarding this cost.

Considerable work was done to improve the Fairview Cemetery on Main St. North Chelmsford.

Fourteen maple trees were set out to complete the row of trees along the wall, and replacing two inside the Cemetery proper.

A complete re-mapping of the two sections just inside the wall on each side of the center entrance was accomplished. This will be a single grave section along the wall on your left, the rest of this section will be uniform lots laid out in rows with a path on each side of the row.

In this layout the monuments will all be uniform in location. Also the Town will receive considerable more income from this uniform layout.

Considerable work is planned to paint the fence in West Chelmsford Cemetery, as it has long been in need of attention, also the summer house at the entrance is in need of repairs and painting.

South Chelmsford Cemetery needs a re-check of the lots and layout, which should be done to enable more permanent records to be made and checked to correspond with the maps.

The income from sale of lots and Perpetual Care is showing a great improvement, which was Four Thousand One Hundred and Seventy Five Dollars, on Perpetual Care, which is an increase of One Thousand Three Hundred and Sixty Four Dollars over last year. Your

Commissioners and the Town Treasurer are making every effort to increase the Perpetual Care funds. This effort will in time make your Cemeteries much more self supporting.

At the Forefathers Cemetery there has been erected a sign of the Cemetery, on the Littleton Road side of the Cemetery, which is made from slate and hangs on an arm from a post, and which was approved by the Historical Society.

With the help of you, our citizens, to see that we get what equipment is needed, your Commissioners and Superintendent will go forward with the Cemeteries in our town.

Your Commissioners and Superintendent wish to express our thanks to the Board of Selectmen and all other Town officials and Departments again for their splendid cooperation given us during the year.

DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS' SERVICE

To the Board of Selectmen

During 1953 the Veterans' Agent investigated twenty new applications for Veterans' benefits which were approved by the State investigator. There were four more applications where the settlement was found to belong to other towns or cities.

A total of 31 cases were aided to the amount of \$11,782.00, an increase of five cases and \$1,672.00 over 1952. The case load in January 1953 was ten and in December 1953 was seventeen.

Medical bills amounted to 40% of total expenditures. This is due to the fact that most of the applicants are in the upper age brackets and in poor health. The average age is fifty four.

Three recipients died during the year and one acquired a settlement in another town and the case was transferred to that town. Ten cases were temporary lasting from one to six months.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

At the 1953 March elections a new member was added to the Planning Board in the person of George R. Dupee, replacing Clifford M. Babson who did not seek re-election.

During the balance of the calendar year the Board held sixteen meetings, eleven sub-division hearings, and one zoning hearing. At which we approved ten new subdivisions, twelve portions of larger subdivisions, approved nine plans for lots on accepted streets, and disapproved three lots on accepted streets. We disapproved two subdivisions after heated controversy at public hearings. The Board approved but one street re-location.

At the annual Town Meeting we recommended, and got approval from the people that the land on both sides of Chelmsford St. at the Lowell line be changed from single residence area to business area and the Town so voted. Since that time a large super-market and a candy manufacturing concern have neared completion of new buildings on this land. This is certain to affect the taxpayers in a beneficial monetary way.

A map of all the precincts and streets in town has been obtained at a much lower figure than was quoted before Town Meeting so that a substantial amount is to be turned back into the Town treasury from our budget allowance. This master plan shows not only the residential and business areas but shows all new subdivisions and streets that are still "on paper" rather than in actual form.

Many hours have been spent on the present by-laws in an attempt to bring them up to date. Some of the major recommendations we are asking for at Town Meeting are regulations on auto trailers being used as residences, larger lot areas and frontages, stricter control of loam stripping, more stringent definitions of lot sizes in general residential areas, and setback rules for roadside stands and gas stations.

The Commonwealth of Mass. passed new legislation this year whereby every lot that is to be registered at the Registry of Deeds must be approved by the Planning Board. This means a tremendous increase in activity and meetings of the Board. At the same time it will increase the secretary's paper work to a point that we are recommending that the secretary be paid a yearly salary consistent with the work required by the job.

At this point the Board would like to thank our secretary Mr. Arnold C. Perham who is resigning from the Board after fifty consecutive years spent in public office in Chelmsford. It will be impossible to find a man to replace him who will know the laws that govern the actions of a Planning Board. The Town owes this man a great debt for the many weary hours that have been spent searching titles, searching for abutters to new subdivisions so that he could notify them by mail as to the public hearings, the many letters that he has had to write through the years, the constant stream of calls at his door for advice or the stamping of plans for a subdivider. All these years at all these jobs at not a penny cost to the Town of Chelmsford. We repeat that the Townspeople can never repay him his services.

For several years the Civil Defense work in this town has been operated on a minimum cost basis, with a view to providing equipment for the police and fire departments which is of use at all times and would be vital in the case of an emergency such as an enemy attack.

We are carrying out this program again in 1954, provided the town will agree to this plan. In all emergencies, the first responsibility rests with your police and fire departments. Both are organized to meet emergencies, are trained in the work which must be done and are used to working as a unit. In a war emergency, they would become the nucleus of a much larger defense unit.

In order to carry out this work in 1954, we are asking for an appropriation of \$1425 which would provide for the continued maintenance of a state police teletype set-up, over which comes all information concerning air raid alerts etc., and for the purchase of a mobile

radio for the police, to replace one now 10 years old, and for the purchase of another portable light plant which would come under the jurisdiction of the fire department.

We hope that a war emergency never will arise, but by maintaining the teletype service, improving our radio communications hook-up and providing another self-powered lighting plant we will be improving the equipment of both departments and at the same time will be becoming better equipped if an emergency does arise.

In 1953 we received from the State five large boxes of Medical Supplies, and fifty-four Litters which are stored at the Fire House for any emergency.

Gentlemen:

More calls were answered the past year than in any one year for the past three. The records for the Year 1953 show 174 calls answered. In some cases, these calls were responded to by companies of the Fire Department. The policy of the Forest Warden being; that under certain circumstances governed by weather conditions, the amount of property exposed in the fire area and distance traveled; it is in the best interest of good fire protection to have the nearest apparatus available respond on the initial call. Followed by the Forest Department's truck which has equipment most adapted for grass and brush fires.

Requests for permits for fires in the out-of-doors, (which are necessary under State regulation) have increased this past year.

More people have become familiar with the so-called "burning index", as used by the Massachusetts Department of Conservation in its effort to reduce forest fires. As a result fewer requests for permits have been received when the index reading is thirty-five or higher.

In closing, I wish to thank all, who in any way have assisted the Forest Warden in carrying out his duties.

- (d) This by-law shall not be applicable in the case of emergency, or when no competition exists or in the case of services of an official or professional nature or services performed by employees of the Town.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the citizens of Chelmsford:

The School Committee wishes to report that during the fiscal year of 1953 they held thirty-five official meetings as well as several other informal meetings for the purpose of keeping in close contact with our school affairs. Several groups and individuals have appeared before the Committee from time to time with various problems and inquiries. We encourage such an interest on the part of parents and at all times are anxious to assist in the solution of their problems as they relate to our schools. The members of the School Committee also serve on the North Building Committee and the Center Building Committee and, in furtherance of these duties, attended thirty-two meetings.

In keeping with the Committee's policy of maintaining the school plant in the best possible manner with available funds, several major repairs and improvements were made. One of the two boilers at the McFarlin School was replaced. An unsightly and dangerous condition between the McFarlin School and High School was remedied by grading and seeding the entire area, installing new walks and erecting a fence to prevent cars from entering this area. A catch-basin and pipeline were installed at the Westlands School playground to take care of a perennial surface water problem. It was necessary to provide Lunch Program facilities at the Highland School as a result of using this school for seventh and eighth grade pupils from the McFarlin School. Late in the year, the Committee voted to purchase an intercommunication system for the High School, an action which had long since been delayed for lack of funds. In addition to these major projects, many other routine maintenance repairs were made.

The new North School was opened for use in September and was immediately filled to capacity. At a special Town Meeting held in March, the Town voted the sum of \$850,000 for the construction of a new twenty-four room elementary school in Chelmsford Center. Construction of this school was begun late in the summer and, by the end of the year, work was progressing at a satisfactory pace. We hope to have this school available for use soon after the beginning of the school year, 1954-1955. With its opening and the transfer of seventh and eighth grade pupils from all parts of the town to the McFarlin School, the overcrowded condition of our present school buildings will be considerably alleviated. With our school enrollment increasing so rapidly, however, and with no immediate relief in sight, we must make early plans to further meet the pupil-housing needs and, at the same time, maintain a high standard of education.

Your Committee was sorry to lose the services of Ray Pike, Jr. who was forced to resign in September because of business reasons. Mr. Pike had been a member of the Committee since March, 1952. At a joint meeting of the School Committee and the Board of Selectmen, Arthur S. Russell was elected to fill this vacancy until the annual town election in March, 1954.

The Committee wishes to assure the townspeople that we are constantly striving to improve the caliber of education available to the boys and girls of Chelmsford and, at the same time, to keep our school facilities in as good condition as possible. We are grateful for the cooperation we have had in the past year from the citizens of the town and trust that the same good relations will continue to exist in the year ahead of us.

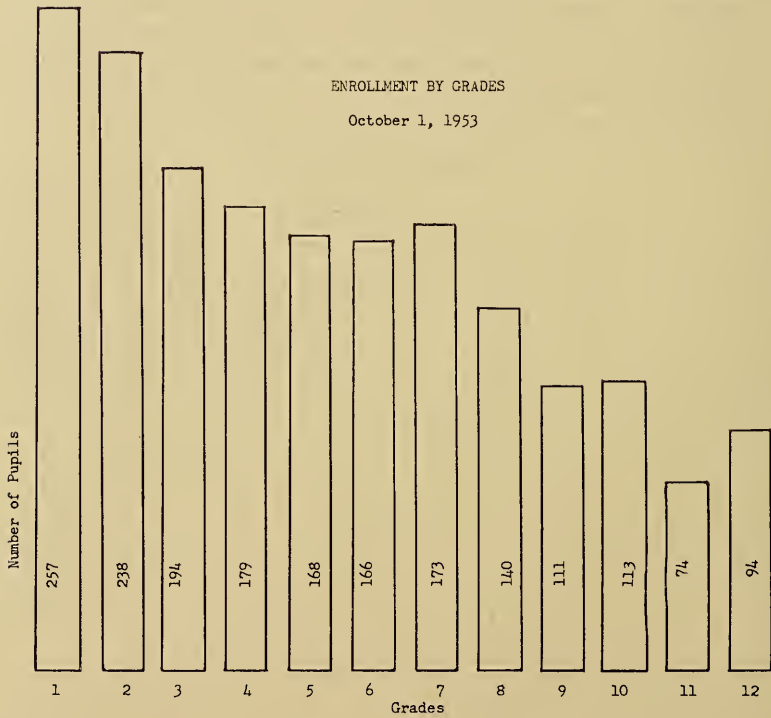

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Chelmsford School Committee:

This report includes the usual statistical data and tables for comparative purposes together with general information pertaining to the operation of the schools for the year 1953. Further information or details may be secured at the office of the Superintendent of Schools.

STAFF

The opening of the North School and the increase in enrollment in all schools necessitated the addition of six new teachers. This gives us a teaching staff of 71. As a result of resignations we had ten teacher replacements. For the last three years we have had an average of ten replacements per year or a total of thirty replacements in three years.

Our teaching staff ranks high with respect to education and training yet low in salaries in comparison with towns of comparable size and wealth.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

Tables in this report indicate birth rate and immigration continue annually to increase our enrollment thus causing increased demands for books and supplies over and above the normal needs.

The basic needs are being met even though we are far from an ideal plan of text book replacements.

SCHOOL PLANT

Opening of the new North School made possible the closing of the two Princeton School buildings and the Quessy School. Pupils who formerly were housed at the Highland School attend the new school.

The North School with its new and modern equipment has given pupils and teachers the incentive and tools for improved teaching.

Increased enrollment at McFarlin School made necessary the use of the Highland School for grades seven and eight. Two rooms at the High School are still used by McFarlin pupils.

Some pupils who normally would attend the Westlands School were again transferred to the McFarlin School. The cooperation given in connection with the above mentioned transfers has been thoroughly appreciated. In fact, most parents have demonstrated an excellent spirit in helping to meet the difficulties involved while adequate housing is being provided for our pupils.

The school buildings to remain a permanent part of our school plant are being maintained in good condition with some improvements made annually.

LOOKING AHEAD

During the next school year the new Center School will be completed for use by the McFarlin and East pupils in Grades 1-6 together with any excessive enrollment in those grades at the Westlands School.

When the Center School is ready for occupancy all pupils in grades seven and eight can be housed at the McFarlin School and the six-year High School plan can begin to operate.

Chelmsford has made an excellent start in plans to adequately house the pupils of the town but the end is not in sight for national figures indicate that there will be 30% more pupils in our schools in 1960.

Plans need to be started soon to provide proper education facilities long needed for grades seven through twelve as well as to be ready to meet crowded conditions in those grades. It is essential that such facilities be ready for occupancy in September 1958. They will be sadly needed before that date.

A glance at the enrollment chart for October 1953 should leave no doubt in the mind of any citizen regarding the urgency of this item.

The people of Chelmsford have cooperated in our efforts to satisfactorily meet and solve the many problems of the year. A continuation of this spirit will result in improved education for the children of Chelmsford.

HIGH SCHOOL

John T. Conrad, Principal

In my recent reports I have stressed the philosophy which underlies modern education. In this report I should like to stress the scholastic and activity programs at Chelmsford High School.

Changes in the physical properties of the school have been few, and the courses of study remain much as they have been. I repeat for serious consideration my recommendation for a school library, adequate lighting facilities, much needed industrial arts and domestic science courses, increased facilities for visual aids, and a modernized science laboratory.

The tasks that young people face today are the same that young people have always faced: (1) preparing for home and family life, (2) preparing for an occupation, (3) preparing for citizenship, (4) developing moral and ethical values, and (5) understanding and accepting themselves. These tasks do not change, it is true, but the complexities of the world in which they must be achieved change tremendously. These expanding complexities create hazards unknown to earlier generations, hazards so grave that they make imperative re-evaluation of the school program.

The activity program, planned expressly to meet pupils' needs, plays an important part in helping them face their tasks. All activities are carried on under teacher supervision during a scheduled activity period or at the close of the school session. In addition to athletic teams, we sponsor the following groups: cheerleaders, band, majorettes, and glee clubs; classes in driver education and driver training; science, press, art, gymnastic, visual-aids, and study clubs; Junior Red Cross; National Honor Society; and Student Council. Unique among these groups is the Student Council, members of which are elected by the student body to help plan, supervise, and schedule school activities. This program is the result of urgent and compelling new requirements in the educational field. While it is not advisable to revolutionize our entire educational program, it is advisable to readjust and amplify, and to search for new and broader ways of enlarging the individual's capacity to cope with his problems.

The activity program plays a vital role in modern education. Surveys reveal that extra-class activities stimulate scholarship and that students hold them in high regard. This attitude of students is not surprising, since the program embodies many of the requisites for appeal to youth. It offers a wealth of opportunity for self-expression. It provides abundant experience in leadership. It com-

bines a wide variety of social, mental, and physical activities. In natural, wholesome ways it arouses interests and reveals aptitudes. It develops skills, hobby interests, sportmanship, appreciation, enthusiasm for creative experience, and character. It is a significant answer to the critical problems of juvenile delinquency.

Although we have an excellent activity program, our major concern is, of course, scholastic achievement. Chelmsford High School has an A rating; many of the faculty hold advanced degrees, and all are conscientious in attending county and state conventions and are co-sponsors of an in-service training program. A proper pupil attitude toward scholastic achievement is constantly encouraged. The school publishes an honor roll and administers standard tests. Scholastic requirements are demanded of Student Council members and members of the National Honor Society. The National Honor Society conducts after-school "help sessions" for college preparatory students. The principal and guidance director hold conferences with all students, and special consultations are required of students who receive warnings or who fail. Prizes and scholarships are sponsored by the Booster Club, Newsweekly, Chelmsford Teachers' Association, American Legion Post No. 212, and the North Chelmsford Parent-Teachers Association, and it is my earnest desire that more and larger awards be granted to Chelmsford students.

A good school cannot be achieved by accident, disunity, inertia, or isolated effort. It stems from the harmonious and high-minded devotion of townspeople, teachers, superintendent, and school committee. In so far as one of these fails, the school suffers. I shall continue to give my best effort to the cause of successful secondary school education in Chelmsford, and in this high endeavor I invite the support and the cooperation of every citizen.

MUSIC

Miss Littlehale

The music program is developed under the following five points: Singing, Listening, Rhythm, Playing, and Creating.

This year two points were especially stressed.

Singing:

Singing is the basic activity in any well rounded program of music education. Music and childhood go together.

The 7th and 8th grade Glee Club which was started last year has been divided into two groups this year. One at the new North School and a Girls' Glee Club at the Westlands. Both groups sang

at the Union National Bank during the Christmas season. Both clubs deserve a good deal of praise.

Responding Rhythmically:

A great deal of work is carried on in this area of experience. In the lower grades particularly, free rhythmic response is one of the basic means of getting children to sing and play as a group. It creates a sense of balance and freedom that leads to self-realization which is the principal purpose of both play and music in the education of young children. From this start we go into the work of the rhythm band. The parents who were privileged to hear the fourth grade rhythm band at the recent Christmas program saw the extent to which this activity can be carried. The ultimate in rhythmic response and coordination is shown by the fine work done by the square dance classes. The square dance contest is only a part of the program. Anyone who has had anything to do with the semi-finals will testify to the hard work of choosing a finals team as the majority of students do an excellent job.

Last years winner was the McFarlin school square. They and the individual winners from each school were taken to Worcester to the New England Folk Fetsival.

In May was held the annual Spring festival. This year the entire program was done by the elementary schools. I was glad to see so many parents and friends at the festival and wish to thank them for their continued interest in the music program.

The instrumental music program in both the elementary grades and high school has progressed very well this past year.

I am especially pleased with the interest in the elementary schools, as this is the area in which one must build continually if a successful high school program is to be had. One factor which has helped greatly is of course, the new North School, as it has enabled the various supervisors to work with a very large segment of the children in the town, under one roof. A very good percentage of the pupils have started on instruments and the interest has held very well. This group, along with other children studying instruments at the Highland, Westlands and East Schools comprise what should prove to be an excellent future high school band and possibly even an orchestra, as there appears to be some interest in other instruments such as flute, violin and others.

If the interest in the elementary schools continues as it has, it

certainly would be feasible to some day start a junior band, if conditions for such a program were satisfactory. This type of unit would create even more interest, maintain that interest and would establish an excellent feeder system for the high school band.

The high school band completed a very successful fall season. The band played at all the football games and with the assistance of Miss Hehir's baton twirlers and cheerleaders carried out various drills and formations for half time entertainment. We are now getting ready for the Annual Spring Concert and have the material for an excellent program to offer the audience.

The band again this year played Christmas Carols for the various shut-ins throughout the town and then enjoyed a banquet at the North Congregational Church.

My one regret this year is the fact that we are losing quite a few band members who are graduating. However, that is to be expected and it naturally means we must maintain a good elementary school program.

There has been a large enrollment in the high school Glee Club this year and this unit is working hard to join the band in the Spring Concert so as to provide a more complete and satisfying program of music.

ART PROGRAM

Originality may be developed through encouragement and guidance by helping children to increase their powers of observation in the basic art elements of line, form, color, texture, light and dark and evaluating the work of others. Through observation, as well as experience, we can build a capacity for appreciation. By constant exposure to the best work of man and nature, an understanding and appreciation of these visual forms will come. To become aesthetically sensitive to these products will prepare the child for a fuller, richer life.

At any time, at any age, recognizing and guiding the talented is of utmost importance and responsibility. Encouragement and guidance are needed, but above all, understanding is vital. We sometimes criticize, negatively, a child's drawing, without realizing that his drawing is based on how he, as a child, sees and interprets the objects, or experience, from his own viewpoint and at his age level. We offer constructive criticism. Imposition of adult standards only tend to inhibit a child, squelching his creative ability so that he no

longer wishes to express himself graphically. Only through constructive criticism, sound judgment and careful guidance can we help the child to interpret and express his thoughts.

The high school art program is planned for those who are interested in an art career as well as those who wish to enjoy art as a hobby. The course is so planned as to provide a good foundation for both groups. Projects are carried on in such various media as water color, clay, textile paint, charcoal, fingerpaint, pencil and wax crayons. Some of these projects are lettering, painting, sketching, decorating, advertising and craft problems.

The high school children participate in other activities as well as those scheduled in the art program, for we are called upon many times during the year to make posters, signs and advertising displays for the various events which take place in the high school, to decorate the school for such seasons as the Christmas holidays, to assist and advise in the decorations for the school dances and the planning of the year book.

To appreciate more fully the works of others, and to understand better how to tackle certain problems, movies and slides are shown. However, the best understanding comes about through actual experience-

This year, a new course has been introduced for those who are more mechanical minded. These people may elect technical drawing, which is a course giving a basic understanding of the handling of mechanical instruments and basic mechanical drawing.

In the elementary schools, we seek a basic understanding of various media, such as clay, papier mache, water color and tempera paints, wax crayons and scrap materials. The latter is used in different ways as the children are shown that many things can be made from articles and scraps which normally might be thrown away.

New methods of using different media are tried. For the first time we are introducing silk screening.

Correlating art with other subjects has been very successful for we have carried out two and three dimensional projects which help to stimulate more interest in, and better understanding of the particular subject.

Again, I would like to emphasize the importance of constructive criticism. We must not impose adult standards of graphic interpretation on the child. He sees as a child and he will draw as a child. Let us not destroy his creative urge. Let us not inhibit him with adult interpretations. Let him see, let him do, and let him enjoy as a child for he will grow mentally as well as physically, and when he does, he, too, will see things and interpret them as an adult.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Boys—Mr. Ciszek

Physical Education in the town of Chelmsford is concerned with developing in each student the larger muscles of the body. Strength, coordination, endurance, good posture, skill and cooperation are the main objectives of the program.

Skill drills in the various sports are emphasized in the elementary schools. During the winter months basic gymnastics and tumbling stunts are taught. Skill in the following sports are stressed in the elementary grades: basketball, baseball, football, speedball and volleyball. To help facilitate the teaching and learning of the skills involved lectures, movies, demonstrations and written tests are utilized.

This school year a basketball league made up of four schools will provide competition in this sport for the seventh and eighth graders.

The high school program is also planned to develop the larger muscles of the body as well as develop the mental alertness that is required in taking part in athletics. The mediums used to attain these objectives are skill drills of various kinds, demonstrations and movies. The sports program consists of football, speedball, volleyball, relays, gymnastics, softball, tumbling, pyramid building and apparatus work.

Recreation is provided the high school students through the extra curricula program which consists of a basketball league, gymnastic club and volleyball league.

The annual field day program is the climax to the physical education program.

Girls—Miss Cordingley

This past year has seen quite a change in the physical education program. Last year the first four grades had a thirty minute period every other week. The periods for the other grades were a little longer, ranging from thirty to forty minutes a week. These were far from ideal periods. Due to the increased enrollment in our schools, it has become impossible to cover every grade in town. The first three grades have been dropped from the schedule. Physical education is just as important in these grades as in the upper grades. The only way these children can be taught physical education now is by the classroom teacher. Because of the decrease in the number of classes, it is now possible to visit each grade every week, and also to increase the time allotment.

Facilities and equipment have also improved. The North School has given us an excellent gymnasium for our classes, instead of holding them in classrooms, corridors, and basements. The only schools which now present a problem during the winter months are East and Highland Avenue. However, the new center school will eliminate this problem.

Activities for the fourth grades include relays, team games, lead-up to team games, games of higher organization, rhythms, and simple folk dances. In the schools where the equipment is available simple stunts and tumbling are taught. In the fifth and sixth grades more team games are introduced. Other activities are relays, lead-up games, rhythms, folk dances, stunts, and tumbling. In the seventh and eighth grades team games make up most of the program. Field ball, soccer, kickball, and softball are the main ones. Also skills are improved on, and basketball lead-up is stressed. Relays, games of higher organization, stunts, and tumbling are continued.

A softball league will be conducted in the spring for the girls. In the future, I hope it will be possible to start a basketball league similar to the boys program.

In the high school, the girls have two forty-five minute periods a week. Here the emphasis is on team sports. Besides deriving physical benefits the girls learn cooperation, sportsmanship, and teamwork. The team sports taught are field hockey, field ball, basketball, volleyball, softball, and relays. Also included in the program are marching, gymnastics, posture work on the parallel bars, and tumbling.

The extra-curricular program in the high school is improving each year. The girls are now offered two varsity sports—field hockey and basketball. In the spring softball is played on an informal basis. This year there will be intra-mural basketball games for the girls who do not play on the school team.

There were a few changes made in the Field Day program last year. The high school boys and girls presented demonstrations in marching, gymnastics, tumbling, and relays. It is hoped that these demonstrations can be developed each year.

HEALTH

From the records of the past year the following statistics have been compiled. From these items one can see what is routine for your school nurse during the school year.

Immunization clinics were held in March and April in all schools by Dr. Blechman and Dr. Barry. There were 60 children to receive their first immunization from Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus. 950 children received booster shots for Diphtheria and Tetanus. At a clinic held in April both doctors vaccinated 70 pre-school children.

There were 400 children taking advantage of the Dental Clinic. However this was discontinued after September in the absence of the dentist.

The high school health program was carried on this year with talks by dentists, physicians, and a state nutritionist and tuberculosis field worker. Various talks and movies were given by me on health also.

The health program in the elementary schools consist of discussions vital to the physical well-being of the child. Movies and film strips related to health are shown and booklets and posters distributed.

The high school students were given the opportunity to take a test for Diabetes. This was done in conjunction with a talk by Dr. J. Bradley Varnum on this disease. It is hoped in the future more students will take advantage of this test.

In September the high school juniors and seniors as well as all the towns teachers were given chest X-rays. This was done through the cooperation of the Middlesex Health Assn.

There has been a clothing depot set up this year. From this collection needy children are supplied. I have been assisted in this work by several members of the McFarlin P.T.A.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

With the opening of the North School in September we noted an increase in the number of children who are taking advantage of the hot lunch provided in our schools through the School Lunch Program. From the beginning of the school year in September through December, 40,272 hot meals have been served to students and 55,287 half pints of milk have been consumed by children in addition to those served with the hot lunch.

We offer only the "A" lunch and "C" milk as designated by the Federal Government which means that each lunch includes 2 oz. of protein, 2 teaspoons butter or margarine, 1 slice enriched bread, $\frac{3}{4}$ cup vegetables and/or fruit, $\frac{1}{2}$ pint whole milk. This provides from $\frac{1}{3}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ the daily nutritional requirements of the child.

We are able to offer these luncheons at a low cost to the children because of the National School Lunch Act of 1946 which provides financial aid as well as foods which are classed as abundant commodities.

Our workers are women who have had or now have children in our schools and so are especially interested in the very fine job they are doing. Each person connected with the School Department—School Committee, Superintendent of Schools, principal, teacher, parent and child makes his contribution to the operation of the program and to each we are most grateful for his cooperation.
