

SUPPLEMENT TO WARRANT FOR SPECIAL TOWN MEETING JANUARY 8, 1962

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS

To Ralph J. Pederson, Constable, or any other suitable person of the Town of Chelmsford:

GREETING:

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby requested to notify and warn the legal voters of the Town of Chelmsford to meet in the High School Auditorium at Chelmsford, on the 8th day of January, 1962 at 8:00 o'clock P.M., then and there to act upon the following articles, viz:

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING January 8, 1962

Moderator John J. Coughlin, Jr., called the Special Town Meeting to order at 8:08 P.M., in the Chelmsford High School Auditorium.

On motion made by Raymond J. Greenwood, Selectman, the meeting adjourned to the call of the Chair in the High School Gymnasium.

At 8:10 P.M., Moderator John J. Coughlin, Jr., called the adjourned meeting to order, he declared a quorum present. Mr. Raymond J. Greenwood, selectman, moved the reading of warrant be waived.

ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will adopt the following By-Law:

(1) Members of the several elected or appointed boards, committees, and commissions of the Town have a fiduciary responsibility to the electorate, and, therefore, must at public meeting of said board, committee or commission make a full and fair disclosure of any direct or indirect personal financial interest of One Hundred and Fifty dollars (\$150.00) or more, which they have, or may have, in any matter before the board, committee or commission which is to be decided by vote of said board, committee or commission, such disclosure to be made prior to the vote on the matter. (2) Furthermore, no member of any elected or appointed board, committee, or commission of the Town may vote for any matter or issue before it if he has, or may have, any direct or indirect personal interest of One Hundred and Fifty dollars (\$150.00), or more, in the matter to be decided by vote of the board, committee or commission of which he is a member. (3) The presence at a meeting of such an interested board, committee or commission member shall not be taken into account in determining if a quorum exists to permit a vote upon the issue or matter from which the interested member or members will, or may, possibly benefit. (4) Any member of an appointive board, commission or committee who violates any of the tenets of this By-Law is subject to removal from office by the official or board which appointed him: or act in relation thereto.

Under Article 1, Joseph B. Hagopian moved that the Town of Chelmsford adopt the following by-law:

(1) Members of the several elected or appointed boards, committees, and commissions of the Town have a fiduciary responsibility to the electorate, and, therefore, must at public meeting of said board, committee or commission make a full and fair disclosure of any direct or indirect personal financial interest of one-hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) or more which they have, or may have, in any matter before the board, committee or commission which is to be decided by vote of said board,

committee or commission, such disclosure to be made prior to the vote on the matter.

- (2) Furthermore, no member of any elected or appointed board, committee, or commission of the Town may vote on any matter or issue before it if he has, or may have, any direct or indirect personal financial interest of one-hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00) or more, in the matter to be decided by vote of the board, committee or commission of which he is a member.
- (3) The presence at a meeting of such an interested board, committee or commission member shall not be taken into account in determining if a quorum exists to permit a vote upon the issue or matter from which the interested member or members will, or may, possibly benefit.
- (4) Any member of an appointive board, committee or commission who violates any of the tenets of this By-Law is subject to removal from office by the official or board which appointed him.

Mr. Edward G. Marshall, Chairman of the Finance Board moved the substitution of the following motion:

That the Town vote to establish a Committee, to serve without compensation, to study the advisability of adopting a "Conflict-of-Interest" or "Code-of-Ethics" By-Law. Said Committee to report and make recommendations at 1963 Annual Town Meeting. Said Committee shall be selected as follows: One member to be selected by Board of Selectmen, one member to be selected by Planning Board, one member to be selected by Finance Committee, and four, at least one of whom must be a practicing attorney, to be selected by the Moderator. Said Committee shall select its own Chairman.

After an hour and one-half discussion on the substitute motion presented by Mr. Marshall a hand vote was taken. The tellers appointed by the Moderator were: M. Edward Riney, William E. Riney, T. W. Emerson, Leslie L. Dukeshire, Francis S. Sloan, Clarence DeCarteret, Brian A. Poynton, who reported the following count:

Thereby adopting the substitute motion.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will adopt the following By-Law: Any elected official of the Town of Chelmsford may be removed from office by the following procedure: (1) A petition shall be presented to the Town Clerk containing: (a) the signatures of registered voters equal in number to twenty per cent of the number of ballots cast in the election at which the official, whose recall is sought, was elected: (b) A statement of cause for seeking the removal, such statement to be retained by the Town Clerk and made available for anyone requesting to see it; and, (c) the name of at least one person who is to be a candidate for the office of the official whose removal is sought. (2) The Town Clerk shall verify the signatures on the petition, and if the sufficient number of valid signatures are affixed thereto, set the date for an election to be held not less than 25 days nor more than 35 days after the date the petition was received; except that if any other Town election is to occur within sixty days after the date of filing of said petition, then the required recall election shall be postponed to that later date. (3) The Town Clerk shall, in addition to other election notice requirements, publish notice of such election in at least one local newspaper once each week until the election

is held, such notice to be prominently displayed. (4) Any candidates other than those named on the removal petition may file their candidacy for office from which removal is sought by following the usual procedures for filing for Town office in Chelmsford. (5) The official named on the recall petition shall be considered as removed if any other candidate received more votes in the election than he does, and shall have no authority to continue to serve in his elective position after the results of the election have been certified by the Town Clerk. (6) The candidate who received the greatest number of votes will serve out the regular term of the removed officer. (7) No recall petition shall be filed against an official within three months after he takes office, nor within three months after a recall election which sought to remove him from office.

UNDER ARTICLE 2, Mr. Raymond G. Harrison moved that the Town adopt the following By-Law:

Any elected official of the Town of Chelmsford may be removed from office by the following procedure:

- (1) A petition shall be presented to the Town Clerk containing:
- (a) the signatures of registered voters equal in number to twenty per cent of the number of ballots cast in the election at which the official, whose recall is sought, was elected: (b) a statement of cause for seeking removal, such statement to be retained by the Town Clerk and made available for anyone requesting to see it; and (c) the name of at least one person who is to be a candidate for the office of the official whose removal is sought.
- (2) The Town Clerk shall verify the signatures on the petition and if the sufficient number of valid signatures are affixed thereto, set the date for an election to be held not less than 25 days nor more than 35 days after the date the petition was received; except that if any other Town election is to occur within sixty days after the date of filing of said petition, then the required recall election shall be postponed to that later date.
- (3) The Town Clerk shall, in addition to other election notice requirements, publish notice of such election in at least one local newspaper once each week until the election is held, such notice to be prominently displayed.
- (4) Any candidate other than those named on the removal petition who are automatically candidates in the recall election may file their candidacy for office from which removal is sought by following the usual procedures for Town office in Chelmsford.
- (5) The official named on the recall petition shall be considered as removed if any other candidate receives more votes in the election than he does, and shall have no authority to continue to serve in his elected position after the results of the election have been certified by the Town Clerk.
- (6) The candidate who receives the greatest number of votes will serve out the regular term of the removed officer.
- (7) No recall petition shall be filed against an official within three months after he takes office, nor within three months after a recall election which sought to remove him from office.

After some discussion The Town Counsel, Vernon R. Fletcher, ruled that this article was illegal: on voice vote, the motion was defeated.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to increase the Board of Selectmen to five members, each serving for a term of three years.

This shall be accomplished in the following manner:

At the regular Town elections in March 1962, three members of the Board of Selectmen shall be elected. Two of these shall be elected for terms of three years and one for a two-year term. Thereafter all terms of office shall be three years; or act in relation thereto.

UNDER ARTICLE 3, Mr. Frank X. Towle moved that the Town vote to increase the Board of Selectmen to five members, each serving for a term of three years. This shall be accomplished in the following manner: At the regular Town elections in March 1962, three members of the Board of Selectmen shall be elected. Two of these shall be elected for terms of three years and one for a two-year term. Thereafter all terms of office shall be three years.

Mr. Edward G. Marshall, Chairman of the Finance Committee moved as a substitution that the Town vote to establish a Committee, to serve without compensation, to study the advisability of making a change or changes in the form or organization of Town Government. Said Committee to report and make recommendations at 1963 Annual Town Meeting. Said Committee shall be selected as follows: One member to be selected by Board of Selectmen, one member to be selected by Planning Board, one member to be selected by the Finance Committee, and four, at least one of whom must be a practicing attorney, to be selected by the Moderator. Said Committee shall select its own Chairman.

On voice vote Mr. Marshall's motion carried.

On motion of Mr. Raymond J. Greenwood the meeting adjourned at 10:27 P.M.

Upon the completion of the 307th year as an incorporated town, Chelmsford is still experiencing its growth. The continued growth of residences and businesses points to a prosperous year in 1963. The satisfactory way in which the departments have coped with these problems of a growing town is a tribute to their offices.

The year 1962 has seen the completion of Interstate Route 495 through Chelmsford and together with Route 3 we are feeling the influence of these highways by the growth of business and industry.

The Police Department has outgrown the use of its quarters. A proposal for a new police station will be made at this year's Town Meeting.

Our Fire Department has a new ladder truck to add to the fine equipment being used at present. Near future plans are for a third fully manned station to take care of the tremendous growth in population of the South Row area and of the East section of Chelmsford, partially divided by Route 495.

The Board of Selectmen has had several joint meetings with the Planning Board and the Board of Appeals to see that all three Boards work more closely with the many problems that all three encounter. In this way, the Board of Appeals would not be as likely to be interfering with future plans of the Planning Board. It would also keep the Board of; Selectment aware of the ideas and plans of both other Boards.

The Highway Department's problems have grown with the many new developments and streets in the town. They are doing a fine job and still have a lot to do in the near future. If the fine people of our town will co-operate as they have in the past, we are sure that all these problems will be solved.

We had two new committees formed this past year. One was the Town Government Study Committee. The other was one to study public buildings, the need for added office space, repairs and related matters. We will have recommendations from both committees at the Annual Town Meeting.

In this report we have tried to outline some of the problems of our growing town and the action taken to date to cope with them. We wish to thank the Town officials and their departments for their co-operation and assistance during this past year. We hope that we have merited the trust and confidence placed in us by our fellow townspeople.

The Town Clerk is the Record Keeper of the Town. She records the action of each Town Meeting. The General Laws require that she make a record of each notice of a definitive plan presented to her by a developer. The Planning Board is required to notify her of their action on various plans presented to them. The Appeal Board must notify her of their action taken on various appeals heard by them. She is responsible for the conduct of all elections once the Polls are open and she must make final tally of all elections.

She issues marriage, hunting, fishing and dog licenses as well as birth, marriage and death certificates. For all of these licenses, the Clerk collects a fee. The fees are turned over to the Town Treasury once a month.

The Town Clerk issues registrations of all Gasoline Storage Licenses.

She also acts as Clerk of the Board of Registrars and Clerk for the Cemetery Commissioners. All Cemetery Records are in the custody of the Town Clerk who issues new deeds and bills lot owners for the Annual Care each year.

The Town Clerk's Office is open from 8:30 A.M. to 5 P.M. Monday through Friday and Monday evening from 7 P.M. to 8 P.M. for your convenience except June, July and August.

May I take this opportunity to publicly thank the Board of Selectmen for my appointment as Temporary Treasurer and Collector; and the Town's people for their confidence in me as manifested by the lack of opposition in the present election. I shall always try to merit this confidence.

ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING March 12, 1962

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Daniel F. Coughlin, Jr. at 7:43 P.M., who declared a quorum present, more than the prescribed 200 voters.

ARTICLE 1. To hear reports of Town Officers and Committees; or act in relation thereto.

UNDER ARTICLE 1:

The Moderator called for reports of Town Committees.

Mr. Clifford Hartley reported the final completion of the new High School and requested the new High School Committee to be discharged.

Mr. Raymond J. Greenwood moved the nomination of Thomas Mac-Kinnon for Varney Playground Commissioner who was duly elected.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Personnel, Wage and Salary Administration By-Law in Section 19 subtitled, "Hours of Work Shall Be As Follows": by striking out the language in paragraph III and inserting "For those occupying positions designated 'Public Safety Occupations' and within the Fire Department, forty-four (44) hours per week; Police Department, an average of forty (40) hours per week, scheduled in such a manner as the Head of such department may deem advisable."

UNDER ARTICLE 2:

Mr. John Kenney moved that the Town vote to amend the Personnel Wage and Salary Administration By-Law in Section 19 subtitled, "Hours of Work Shall Be As Follows", by striking out the language in paragraph III and inserting "For those occupying positions designated 'Public Safety Occupations' and within the Fire Department, forty-four (44) hours per week; Police Department, an average of forty (40) hours per week, scheduled in such a manner as the Head of such department may deem advisable." It was so voted.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Personnel, Wage and Salary Administration By-Law by striking therefrom the present Section 16 and substituting therefor the following Section:

16. Sick Leave By-Law:

"All permanent employees of the Town are allowed leave with pay due to sickness or injury from causes other than in the line of duty, or exposure to contagious diseases, for 10 days in any year exclusive of Sundays and Holidays. This sick leave is accumulative but not beyond a period of six years or sixty days exclusive of Sundays or Holidays. The first 30 days to be paid at full pay and the second 30 days to be paid at 75% of full pay. All employees who are absent because of sickness for a period exceeding three days shall present a Doctor's certificate to their Department Head upon returning to work in order to receive payment for sick leave.

UNDER ARTICLE 3:

Mr. Louis L. Hannaford moved that the Town vote to amend the Personnel, Wage and Salary Administration By-Law by striking therefrom the present Section 16 and substituting therefor the following Section:

16. Sick Leave By-Law:

"All permanent employees of the Town are allowed leave with pay due to sickness or injury from causes other than in the line of duty, or exposure to contagious diseases, for 10 days in any year exclusive of Sundays and Holidays. This sick leave is accumulative but not beyond a period of six years or sixty days exclusive of Sundays or Holidays. The first 30 days to be paid at full pay and the second 30 days to be paid at 75% of full pay. All employees who are absent because of sickness for a period exceeding three days shall present a Doctor's certificate to their Department Head upon returning to work in order to receive payment for sick leave. It was so voted.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Personnel, Wage and Salary Administration By-Law by striking therefrom the present Section 14 and substituting therefor the following Section: 14. Vacations:

Vacation leave shall be granted to full-time permanent employees of the Town subject to the following:

- a. Employees who have been continuously employed for less than 12 months but more than six months shall be granted one week vacation with pay.
- b. Employees who have been continuously employed for less than 10 years but more than one year, shall be granted two weeks vacation with pay.
- c. Employees who have been continuously employed for more than 10 years shall be granted three weeks vacation with pay.
- d. Vacations shall be granted by the department heads at such times as, in their opinion, will cause the least interference with the performance of the regular work of the departments. Vacations must be taken in the year in which they are due, and shall not accumulate from year to year.
- e. In the event of termination of employment which is caused through no fault of the employee, provided the employee has been in the continuous full-time service of the Town for at least one year, or by reason of retirement, the employee, shall be paid, or entitled to time off with pay, based on the scale above, for each full month since the employee's preceding vacation. In the event of the death of an employee, any accrued vacation pay shall be paid to his or her estate.
- f. Department heads shall identify all pay for vacations on the payroll in which such pay occurs.
- g. Employees who are eligible for vacation under these rules and whose services are terminated by entrance into the armed forces shall be paid an amount equal to the vacation allowance as earned and not

granted, in the vacation year prior to such entrance into the armed forces.

h. An employee shall be granted an additional day of vacation if while on vacation leave a designated Holiday occurs which falls on a normal work day.

UNDER ARTICLE 4:

Mr. Roger W. Boyd moved that the Town vote to amend the Personnel, Wage and Salary Administration By-Law by striking therefrom the present Section 14 and substituting therefor the following Section:

14. Vacations:

Vacation leave shall be granted to full-time permanent employees of the Town subject to the following:

- a. Employees who have been continuously employed for less than 12 months but more than six months shall be granted one week vacation with pay.
- b. Employees who have been continuously employed for less than 10 years but more than one year, shall be granted two weeks vacation with pay.
- c. Employees who have been continuously employed for more than 10 years shall be granted three weeks vacation with pay.
- d. Vacations shall be granted by the department heads at such times as, in their opinion, will cause the least interference with the performance of the regular work of the departments. Vacations must be taken in the year in which they are due, and shall not accumulate from year to year.
- e. In the event of termination of employment which is caused through no fault of the employee, provided the employee has been in the continuous full-time service of the Town for at least one year, or by reason of retirement, the employee, shall be paid, or entitled to time off with pay, based on the scale above, for each full month since the employee's preceding vacation. In the event of the death of an employee, any accrued vacation pay shall be paid to his or her estate.
- f. Department heads shall identify all pay for vacations on the payroll in which such pay occurs.
- g. Employees who are eligible for vacation under these rules and whose services are terminated by entrance into the armed forces shall be paid an amount equal to the vacation allowance as earned and not granted, in the vacation year prior to such entrance into the armed forces.
- h. An employee shall be granted an additional day of vacation if while on vacation leave a designated Holiday occurs which falls on a normal work day. It was so voted.

The proposed amendment imposes no new taxes but gives the General Court the power to pass an income tax at graduated or proportioned rates and is a change in the constitutional limitations now in effect on the power of the General Court to pass tax measures. The proposed amendmend would add a new Article to the Constitution of the Commonwealth by which full power and authority is granted to the General Court, in the alternative to the power and authority to tax incomes in the manner provided in Article XLIV of the Amendments to the Constitution, to impose a tax on incomes at rates which are proportioned or graduated according to the amount of income received, irrespective of the source from which it may be derived, and to grant reasonable exemptions, deductions and abatements. It further provides that any property, the income of which is taxed under the provisions of the proposed Article, may be exempted from the imposition and levying of proportional and reasonable assessments, rates and taxes as at present authorized by the Constitution, and that the Article shall not be construed to limit the power of the General Court to impose and levy reasonable duties and excises.

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Chelmsford for the period from May 17, 1961 to March 23, 1962, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. William Schwartz, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Chelmsford for the period from May 17, 1961, the date of the previous audit, to March 23, 1962, preparatory to a transfer of funds to the newly appointed temporary treasurer, and a recommitment of outstanding accounts to the newly appointed temporary collector, and submit the following report thereon:

The records of financial transactions of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined and checked with the records of the town treasurer and the town accountant.

The books and accounts in the town accountant's office were examined and checked in detail. The receipts, as recorded, were checked with the treasurer's books, while the recorded payments were compared with the treasurer's cash book and with the treasury warrants. The appropriations and transfers were checked with the town clerk's records of town meeting votes and with the finance committee's records of transfers authorized from the reserve fund.

An analysis was made of the ledger accounts, a trial balance was taken off proving the accounts to be in balance, and after the necessary adjustments resulting from the audit were made, a balance sheet, a copy of which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town as of March 23, 1962.

The books and records of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The cash book additions were verified, and the recorded receipts were compared with the town accountant's books, with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town, and with other sources from which money is paid into the town treasury. The recorded payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds and with the accountant's records.

The bank balances were reconciled with statements furnished by the banks of deposit, the savings bank books were examined and listed, and the final reconciliation of the treasurer's cash indicated that the sum of \$2,803.52 was due from him on March 23, 1962, which sum was paid into the town treasury by him on July 18, 1962.

The payments on account of maturing debt and interest were verified by comparison with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities and coupons on file. The outstanding coupons and payments in advance of the maturity date were listed and reconciled with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The records of payroll deductions on account of Federal and State taxes, the county retirement system, and group health insurance premiums were examined and checked in detail. The deductions were footed, the payments to the proper agencies and refunds to individuals were verified, while the balances, as shown on the individual employees' records, were listed and reconciled with the respective controls in the accountant's ledger.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the several trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the trustees were personally examined and listed. The income was proved, and all transactions and balances were verified by comparison with the books of the accountant.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined and checked. The amounts transferred to the tax title account were checked with the collector's books, and the tax titles and tax possessions on hand were listed, proved, and checked with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked in detail. The taxes, excise, and departmental accounts receivable outstanding at the time of the previous examination, together with all subsequent commitment lists, were audited and checked with the warrants issued for their collection and with the accountant's books. The collections, as recorded, were compared with the payments to the treasurer as shown by the treasurer's and the accountant's books; the recorded abatements were proved with the assessors' and other departmental

records of abatements granted; the transfers to the tax title account were proved; and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective controlling accounts in the accountant's ledger.

Further verification of the outstanding accounts was made by mailing notices to all persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town. Several replies were received claiming payment of the amount in question, and after investigation credits aggregating \$2,061.92 were posted to 33 accounts for which payment had been made but not recorded on the books, this amount being transferred to the final reconciliation of the treasurer's cash.

The detailed checking required to affect a proper reconciliation of the treasurer's and collector's accounts added materially to the time consumed in making the audit.

The financial records of the town clerk were examined and checked. The receipts on account of licenses, permits, recording fees, etc., were compared with the payments to the treasurer. The records of dog and sporting licenses issued were examined and checked, and the amounts paid to the treasurer and the Division of Fisheries and Game were proved. The cash balance on March 23, 1962 was proved by actual count of the cash in the office.

The available records of cash collections by the board of selectmen, the sealer of weights and measures, and the inspectors of buildings, wiring, and gas, as well as by the police, fire, health, highway, school, library, and cemetery departments, and by all other departments in which money was collected for the town, were examined and checked. The payments to the treasurer were compared with the treasurer's and the accountant's books, and the cash on hand in the several departments, including petty cash advances, was proved by actual count.

The surety bonds furnished by the several town officials for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the balance sheet, there are appended to this report tables showing reconciliations of the treasurer's and town clerk's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, tax title, tax possession, and departmental accounts, together with schedules showing the condition and transactions of the several trust and investment funds.

During the progress of the audit cooperation was received from all the town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

Police answered 3459 calls, served 555 summons for out of town Police Departments, recovered 29 stolen cars, found 118 business places unlocked, made 324 arrests. The four cruisers patrolled 255,014 miles in 1962.

The Year 1962 was a very busy year for your Police Department as you can see by the preceding statistics.

As the Town grows a greater demand is placed on the Police Department for various services, in particular the number of homes to be checked when residents are on vacation has grown at a rapid rate. This is a very important phase of police work and I urge all residents to notify the Police Department when they are leaving for vacation so that we may better serve you.

Heavy road construction is nearly at an end, the only work left to be done is the last section of Route 495 in Chelmsford across Carlisle and Gorham Streets.

The Town Building Needs Committee has recommended a new Police Station, which is sorely needed if we are to function as a modern Police Department. At the present time all our prisoners have to be transported to the Lowell Police Station, which is time consuming and takes one cruiser and two officers out of town to do this. In a new station we would have our own lockup and all the other facilities that would make us self sufficient.

The Auxiliary Police Band under the able direction of Sergeant Basil Larkin plans to continue the band concerts again this year as they have the past several years, which I feel brings a great deal of enjoyment to young and old alike.

At the present time we have thirty Auxiliary Police Officers, completely uniformed and well trained in all phases of police work, which they would be called upon to perform in case of an emergency. Sergeant Basil Larkin is in charge of the Auxiliary Police unit.

I wish to express my thanks to the Board of Selectmen and all other Town Officials and Employees and also to the general public for the excellent cooperation given to the Police Department during the past year.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

Upon comparing the records of the Fire Department for the four years that I have served as Chief, they reveal a steady increase in the number of calls requested of, and responded to by your Fire Department. During 1962 we answered 553 calls for assistance.

As the Town continues to grow, the demands on this department continue to become heavier, and more varied in nature. We are now called upon for services which formerly only a city department could supply.

Fire prevention and inspections take more of our time each year, and together with the complaints which we must answer has developed into a major part of our work.

We continue to use our manpower to good advantage by maintaining all our equipment and our five stations, and also by doing our own clerical work, and extending and repairing our fire alarm system.

During 1962, a 75' Aerial Ladder Truck was delivered to us, and put into service immediately, thus bringing to a successful conclusion our efforts to secure this piece of equipment.

Recommendations for the future include a new pick-up truck to replace our old one which is 12 years old, and which I will request this year, and another permanently manned Fire Station which will be requested in the near future.



I would like to congratulate and thank the men of the department, both regular and call firefighters, for continuing to maintain the high standards of courage and ability that have always been shown in the past.

I also wish to thank the Town Officials and Employees of other Departments for the cooperation given to the Fire Department during 1962.

This year, thirty-four new streets or 6.61 miles of road were accepted.

The installation of drainage pipe was completed on Middlesex Street which has alleviated a serious flooding condition that has existed for many years. A metal steel pipe, 90 feet long, ½" in thickness, and 30" in diameter was placed under the Boston and Maine Railroad tracks by the boring method. Three catch basins and a pipe arch, 13" x 22"—52 feet long were also installed. The installation of this pipe has worked very satisfactorily and the drainage situation has been greatly improved.

Other drainage projects completed are as follows:

Aberdeen Road—200 feet metal pipe, 236 feet 18" R.C. pipe, 34 feet $13" \times 22"$ pipe arch installed

Walnut Road-80 feet 18" R.C. pipe installed.

Graniteville Road—80 feet 12" pipe replaced, 200 12" pipe, 1 catch basin installed.

Riverneck Road, at Forrest St.—270 feet 12" pipe, 4 catch basins installed.

Mill Road, at Vincent Street—348 feet 12" R.C. pipe, 2 catch basins installed.

Mill Road, at Boston Road—1356 feet 12" plain pipe, 60 feet 12" R.C. pipe, 5 catch basins, 1 manhole installed.

Priscilla Avenue—400 feet 10" pipe, 1 catch basin installed.

Robin Hill Road—40 feet 12" metal pipe, 42 feet 40" x 65" pipe arch installed.

Proctor Road—30 feet 12" metal pipe installed.

Acton Road—136 feet 15" concrete pipe installed.

Other construction projects included hot topping of 2500 feet on North Road from Town Way to Claude Road; excavate, reshape and hot top intersection of Graniteville Road and Richardson Road; 200 feet of Class I bituminous concrete on Graniteville Road.

Twenty-five hundred feet of Class I bituminous concrete was laid on Middlesex Street and Acton Road as the Chapter 90 Maintenance project. The Chapter 90 Construction project proceeded on schedule with the complete installation of the drainage system. Twenty-one hundred feet 12" R.C. pipe, 1000 feet 15" R.C. pipe, 260 feet 24" R.C. pipe and 23 catch basins and 13 manholes were installed. A new culvert was installed across Old Westford Road at School Street. Miscellaneous work included the removal of 30 trees, removing and resetting 500 lineal feet of stone wall. In the spring of 1963 this section will be excavated and realigned to reduce the severe curves and improve sight distances. A new gravel foundation will be placed and a Class I bituminous concrete pavement will be placed over the gravel surface.

New equipment purchased this year include 1 waste collection truck, 2 tractors, one 2 ton dump truck and one catch basin cleaner.

The usual oiling of streets, brush cutting, installing of street signs, sanding, snow plowing and snow removal, drainage and general maintenance was performed throughout the year.

I wish to thank the townspeople for their kind consideration and co-operation and the Police Department for notifying the department of dangerous conditions on the roads during the winter months.

To the Citizens of Chelmsford:

Three major projects have occupied the time and energy of the Conservation Commission during 1962. Our efforts to secure land for conservation purposes have continued; our conservation education program has been advanced, and a considerable amount of work has been done in cooperation with the Planning Board and the master planner on preparation of certain parts of the new master plan for Chelmsford.

The Conservation Commission was established primarily to acquire land for conservation purposes, either by purchase of the land or by donation from any individual. Three major parcels were considered for purchase in 1962. One property, in West Chelmsford, was finally disapproved because it would have been too expensive to develop as a recreation area. Two properties in the Center section were investigated, but no agreement could be reached with the owners.

Our educational program was continued, featuring articles in the local newspaper and a special program. It is the intention of the Commission to have articles on conservation appear in the local press throughout the year. On April 27 our first Conservation Night was presented. Two outstanding conservation films were shown, and Mr. Egbert Hans gave a truly inspiring address on the importance of adequate water conservation practices in today's growing communities. Unfortunately attendance at the Conservation Night was disappointingly small.

The Conservation Commission was asked for information and its desires concerning some aspects of the new master plan for the Town. We made every effort to supply all the data at our disposal.

The Conservation Commission earnestly requests the assistance of the townspeople in learning of land that may be acquired for conservation usage. We sincerely hope that we shall again be supported in our request for an appropriation for the Conservation Fund. We invite the general public to attend our meetings and to cooperate with our programs.



CEMETERY COMMISSION

The Cemetery Commissioners submit the following report for the year 1962.

The past year was the busiest ever from a standpoint of accomplishments, lot sales and interments.

The erecting of the Douglas Memorial Gateway (at no cost to the town) at Pine Ridge Cemetery was a major factor in the beautification of this cemetery.

The \$1,000 gift from Mr. George Barris purchased wrought iron fencing which tied into the Douglas Gateway.

The drainage system with four catch basins was installed and the new road was opened to traffic for Memorial Day. Road edges were graded and seeded. The large section on the left of the new road was filled in and a large triangle at the fork of the road was graded and seeded, awaiting the erection of a flagpole this spring. This flagpole is a gift to the town by the Chelmsford Box 7 Association. A large new four grave section was developed.

In the Hart Pond Cemetery many trees were removed and four of these large hemlocks were transplanted into Fairview Cemetery.

A new water system was installed in Riverside Cemetery.

A continuous program of general improvements to roads, buildings and turf was carried out in all town cemeteries.

A total of 93 interments were made, as follows:

Year 1962 was a busy one for the Chelmsford Planning Board. A great many definitive plans were submitted for final subdivision approval pursuant to law. These followed preliminary plans first submitted prior to the Town Meeting March 20, 1961 adopting the Acre Zoning By-Law. By submitting their preliminary plans prior to that meeting they protected their rights as subdividers to the smaller size lots then required. It has taken all this time to finally resolve all these plans but it is now about completely done.

The Town Engineer position recently created has proven of great benefit to the Board in both supervision and control of subdivision layout as well as follow-up on contractors in their performance.

At the Annual Town Meeting March 12, 1962, under Article 34, the Town voted to become a member of the Lowell Regional Planning District. The committee serving this district which constitutes delegates from each member community has been appointed and Cheimsford has assigned its representative. The first organizational meeting has been held and the overall effects of the committee to coordinate the planning of the various communities in the region is about to get moving.

Perhaps most important of all the work the Chelmsford Planning Board has done in the past year is that on the Master Plan. Our professional consultants, The Economic Development Associates, Inc. of Boston, were hired on November 21, 1961 and their contract runs for a period of twenty months thru July 20, 1963. However, most of the work has been done this past year in preparation for our intended presentation and proposal at the Annual Town Meeting in March of 1963.

On January 22, 1962, the Planning Board adopted a new set of subdivision rules and regulations. These rules set forth clearly the procedure in subdivision of land as well as setting standards for physical layout and construction of municipal services. It defines the responsibility of subdividers and standardizes the legal forms attendant to subdividing.

On August 27, 1962, during a regular Planning Board Meeting, the Board voted to further augment these rules and regulations by requiring all plans to show in full the adjacent or abutting land under the same ownership, thus allowing all subdividing to be seen in overall perspective.

In addition to our new rules and regulations, to date we have completed our new base map, topographical map, existing land use map, neighborhood analysis study, population study, recreation and conservation study, vacant land analysis, sewerage study, drainage and run-off study, and future land use study. Throughout the fall we have been working steadily on our proposed new zoning map and zoning by-law. In September, the League of Women Voters cooperated with the Planning Board and ran a public opinion survey sampling approximately five hundred households throughout Chelmsford. This was done to determine how the Town felt about our growth, zoning, municipal services, needs, and problems so that we might incorporate them as far as possible into our new zoning proposals.

Preliminary conferences with the various agencies and Boards in the Town have been held relative to our new plan and after the first of the year and prior to our March 1963 Annual Meeting, formal hearings will be held with these same groups as well as in the various precincts of the Town so that everyone might become thoroughly acquainted with our plans.

TREE DEPARTMENT

Tree planting consisted of 128 new trees. Some replacements for previous removals and others where most needed. In addition to these purchasd by the town, a mutual agreement between this department and our local electric power company was made. Due to the necessary removal of trees for construction of new power lines the town was compensated by this company at a rate of \$20 per tree. This money made possible the purchase and planting of another 54 trees this year.

In addition to the regular pruning, removing, and maintenance of trees, this year we have provided a new service. Roots of trees removed are ground out, ten inches below grade in areas abutting public walks, parks and where unsightly or dangerous. At the end of this year over 100 roots of various sizes were removed.

I wish to extend my thanks to the Police and Fire Departments for their usual co-operation with this department in regard to emergency night work.

I wish at this time also to acknowledge and thank Mr. R. W. Barris of East Chelmsford for the beautiful 30 ft. spruce tree, given by him to this department for planting at the North Chelmsford Fire House to serve as a permanent community Christmas tree for that section of town.

DUTCH ELM

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

During the past year there was a marked increase in the number of measles among children and a noticeable increase in the number of Infectious Hepatitis cases. There was the usual number of other childhood diseases consistent with the previous years. Two Tuberculosis patients were admitted to the Sanatorium during 1962. There were numerous dog bites and one bat bite, none of which indicated rabies infection.

GENERAL ENVIRONMENTAL SANITATION

During the past twelve months a total of 186 permits for sub-surface sewage systems were issued by this Department. Final inspections were made on the newly installed sewage disposal systems. Numerous nuisance complaints were investigated by the Health Agent. These complaints are increasing in proportion to the population increase. Bacteriological analysis of water samples (potable and bathing areas) were performed routinely. Pasteurization plants, restaurants, trailer camps, nursery school and grade schools were inspected.

PROPOSED STUDY OF COMPREHENSIVE PLANS FOR TOWN SEWERAGE

At the annual March Town Meeting the Board of Health is recommending that the article on comprehensive plans for the study of Town Sewerage be adopted. The Survey or comprehensive plans would not cost the Town money until such time as the actual construction of a Sewerage System is begun. The Federal loan for this study would be interest free. The total cost for the construction of the Sewerage System can only be determined after the completion of the study. The Sewerage problem is of great concern to the Town and has been for some time. Now, with the polution's abatement in general, a matter of local interest as demonstrated by the Merrimack River Valley Pollution Abatement Commission, this matter should come before the people at the Annual Town Meeting.

SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

Our town, due to the increased population and opening of new schools, now has three school nurses. Even with three nurses it is difficult to carry on a complete health program at any school, because the total number of pupils per nurse is still very high. Each nurse is to visit at least two buildings daily.

We now have three school physicians, and will be able to complete our physical examinations earlier in the school year, which will allow for more time in the follow-up work.

Diptheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough Clinics were held in March, April and May, and also a Smallpox Vaccination Clinic in May. X-Ray Clinics were held during 1962 with 400 participating.

Last May and June we started our Polio Sabine Oral Vaccine Program for pre-school and grade children. A Salk Vaccination Clinic was conducted in June for adults and children beyond the first grade. In November Flu Serum was given by Dr. Benjamin Blechman to all Town employees who desired this protection.

Our Vision and Hearing Program is a full time job with a technician for both tests. The nurses do the follow-up work on the results of these examinations.

We are now planning our Sabine Vaccination of all the population. All school children will be given the vaccine in the classrooms, and a clinic will be held in January, February, and March for everyone nineteen years or over. We hope that everyone in town will take advantage of this opportunity by taking the three doses, which will provide life time immunity.

TOWN FOREST COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Chelmsford:

During 1962 more work was done in the Thanksgiving Ground Forest, which presently is getting the most use of any of the areas.

A long, triangular-shaped trail, marked with small circles of green paint, was cut from the playground at the northeast corner of the forest to the parking lot at the northwest corner on Gary Road; and thence southwesterly to the Great Rocks and on to Russell Mill Pond at the point where River Meadow Brook flows into the pond near the Carlisle line. From here the trail comes back to the playground along the shore of the pond.

Many dead and worthless trees (mostly white pines) on the slope above the playground and the end of Janet Road, have been removed to make the main entrance to the forest more attractive.

In some spots in the northern part of the forest the heavy growth of young white pines that is coming in under the oaks has been thinned or eliminated so as to preserve vistas and open areas along the trail.

Fires are allowed only in the established fireplaces at the campsites along the pond and then only with permission from the Fire Department. Nevertheless, last spring a fire started in a brush pile by some young boys burned several hundred square feet near the pond. Fortunately the high wind that was blowing was in the direction of the pond. Had it been blowing into the forest a far larger area would undoubtedly have been burned.

East Coast Builders have made a very satisfactory parking area at the end of Janet Road and graded the adjoining playground. The seeding of the playground was done too late in the summer to get a satisfactory catch of grass so there has been considerable erosion on the slope down to the pond. To fulfill their agreement with this committee, the builders will have to fill the gullies and reseed part of the area. They must also level off the Gary Road parking lot and cover that area with small pebbles.

CHELMSFORD INDUSTRIAL AND DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION — 1962

Members:

During the year 1962, the commission lost one of its valued members, Mr. George Whitaker, through death. Mr. Whitaker gave to the commission both wisdom and experience, his advice and presence will be missed greatly.

Two of the high spots of the year were the opening of the Accuracy Reytron Electronics, Inc. plant in October at our industrial complex known as the Golden Triangle, and the opening of the J. M. Fields store in November.

During 1962 your commission investigated and followed up on twelve (12) prospects from ten (10) communities expressing a desire to relocate. Your commission has received many inquiries about Chelmsford, some from as far away as Chicago. Many were from the types of industry which we believed would not be desirable in town, such as a rendering works, a dog and cat food processing plant, etc. Your commission wishes to continue to seek out the type of industry we are now attracting to our town along the same line as we have at the Golden Triangle, Junction of routes 3 and 129. We are certain that the day is not too distant when more such industries will locate within the borders of our town. Alpha Construction Co., who has developed the Golden Triangle and our industrial park has purchased more industrial zoned land to expand our industrial complex.

The atmosphere in Chelmsford towards this type of industry appears very good, our financial structure is sound, our educational system is excellent. (With the Belvidere School relocating at Chelmsford and an expansion to their facilities we have added another asset to our town). Our public services are the best for miles around. We now have a branch of one of the leading banks in the area operating in town, along with other excellent banking establishments who have been with us over the years. They are ready and willing to give us their assistance and advice in our endeavor to attract and help the industrial growth of Chelmsford. Our closeness to the institutions of higher learning, our suburban atmosphere of living, our churches of all denominations, — building and planning for the future, are the things which industry looks for when they wish to expand or build.

The atmosphere is very good, the town has far more assets than debits, your commission is ever on the alert for prospects. Your commission while enthusiastic in its actions, nevertheless will apply restraint where we believe the best interests of the town would not be served.

We on your commission feel from talks with business men and women that industry is not necessarily looking for give-away programs. The majority are willing to pay their fair share of the tax load. A receptive attitude by the towns people for industry to locate in town, on land already zoned for industry, in a town which has the assets stated above meets the basic requirements of most industries. Chelmsford's future looks bright and in the next few years we should come into our own, industrially.

Your commission meets on the fourth Thursday of the month at the Center Town Hall and welcomes all to attend.

CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen:

CUBAN CRISIS FOCUSED NEED FOR STRONG CIVIL DEFENSE

The need for strong action to improve local Civil Defense activities became very evident during the recent Cuban crisis. The realization of this fact resulted in cities and towns within the Commonwealth making advances in organization and gaining support from within the communities.

Local government leaders, with but few exceptions, were quick to recognize that Civil Defense was an integral segment of community management and merited support seldom forthcoming in the past.

The presence of nuclear weapons in such proximity to our shores proved to be the impetus needed to bring into sharp focus situations which were known to exist but about which little could be accomplished without a citizenry awakened and enlightened to the dangers of possible devastation from enemy shores. Apathy towards Civil Defense was dissipated in many quarters and a healthy search for knowledge regarding the program developed.

That these dangers are still very much apparent, although to a possible lesser degree, was stated by President John F. Kennedy when he decorated fliers for their photographic missions over Cuba. The President remarked: "The danger certainly is not past . . . we shall continue to live in crisis and danger certainly through this decade."

The need of strengthening and training of each individual Civil Defense organization within the Commonwealth is paramount. While the intensity of the crisis may have waned, the seed which spawned it is still just off our shores, and will remain ever dangerous though it's claws may have been somewhat clipped.

As you know, there have been three emergencies in as many years. We have been fortunate indeed, that events did not take a different turn.

"There is much to be done for our self-protection by each community. Having been reminded that we want and need all practical protection against nuclear attack, let us recognize that effective preparation takes time and effort during the quiet periods. Let's get on with this work, even when the threat fades and there is little appetite for the dismal subject of survival."

"We owe this to our country. It makes us a tougher nut to crack, and that makes war less likely."

The Cuban crisis in many respects brought to mind the necessity of a review of our past programs, and a chance to look forward to the future to adequate planning should the occasion arise. We believe our program for 1962 has shown some progress in the right direction.

- 1. The Civil Defense plan for public schools is being formulated by the Superintendent of Schools as a result of joint planning with the Civil Defense Director and staff, with particular emphasis on evacuation and school shelter.
- 2. Minor changes in the Chelmsford Operational Plan were made to bring it up to date, to enable Chelmsford to participate in matching funds.
- 3. The Radio Hams under the direction of Melvin deJager have participated in several state tests for communications. They have held regular monthly meetings at the C.D. communications center in the Town Hall.
- 4. The auxiliary police under the direction of Sgt. Basil Larkin have nearly completed their headquarters building in the rear of the Town Hall. Regular meetings are held each Monday evening, and the group has been used on many occasions for extra traffic duty.
- 5. A large quantity of literature has been distributed to many persons throughout the town on fallout shelters, and a number of family shelters have been constructed as a result.
- 6. First aid nurse technicians classes are to be reactivated in the near future, as this program was very well accepted during the last classes conducted by School Nurse Helen Jewett, R.N. and her assistants.

It is obvious that we have to plan to bring our house in order in the years to come, and your C.D. organization will welcome any suggestions from the townspeople.

We wish to thank all the town officials for the splendid cooperation we have received in the past.

PUBLIC LIBRARIES

As each succeeding year means increased demands upon library services your library staff inaugurates such change and additions that seem advisable. Comparative circulation figures at the Adams Library are some indication of the growth of library use. 1958, circulation 39,424; five years later, 1962, circulation 83,478.

State library standards concerning increased library hours, salaries and book appropriation have been met this past year. This makes this town eligible for state aid if the town so desires.

Recently, through the efforts of the library trustees, a "Friends of the Library" group has been formed. The trustees have also published the first issue of "Your Library," a publication designed to keep the people of Chelmsford informed on library news.

The reference department is showing growth and improvement and boasts its own room at the Adams Library. This branch of library service can not readily be measured. However, the increasing number of students using this facility are evidence of the need and appreciation of this service. Summer reading clubs and occasional story hours for children are now institutions at both libraries.

Charging machines are now being installed. During this transition we have been most appreciative of those who have given volunteer help in the reprocessing of all the books. I would like to especially mention the Girl Scout troops under the leadership of Mrs. John S. Chase, Mrs. Robert Clough, Mrs. Victor B. Holder and Mrs. C. Richmond Page.

A word of thanks is also due to the many who have given books and periodicals to the libraries and to the Chelmsford Garden Club for the monthly floral arrangements in each library.

The Board of Registrars holds six sessions for registration of voters, one in each precinct preceding every election. All sessions in all precincts, except Precinct 1, Chelmsford Center, are held from 7:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. The final day of registration, the session is always held at the Town Hall, Chelmsford Center, from 12 noon until 10 p.m. Naturalized citizens must bring their final papers in order to become registered voters.

To vote in all elections, a person must be:

- 1. A citizen of the United States
- 2. 21 years of age or more
- 3. A resident of Massachusetts for at least 1 year on Election Day
- 4. A resident of Chelmsford for at least 6 months on Election Day
- 5. A registered voter, qualified before the Board of Registrars and signed the official list.

Registration is permanent. Once registered as a Chelmsford voter a citizen may vote in all elections as long as he continues to maintain a residence in Chelmsford except if a voter changes his name, either by marriage or by court action, or moves to another precinct, he must register again.

A Board of Registrars, under state law, has charge of the registration of voters. They prepare the annual Register of Voters divided according to Precincts and listing the voters by street address and with political party designations. This Register of Voters is used at the polls at elections.

The 3 Registrars are appointed for a 3-year term by the Selectmen on a bi-partisan basis. The Town Clerk is an ex-officio member of the Board.

THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NEEDS AND BUILDING COMMITTEE

The Elementary School Needs and Building Committee herewith presents its report to the citizens of the Town of Chelmsford for the year ending December 31, 1962.

The Committee presently has had four assignments: to attend to the final completion of the addition to the North School; to attend to the details relating to the construction of the South Row School; to attend to the planning and construction of the addition to the High School; and to prepare recommendations on the Junior High School needs.

NORTH SCHOOL ADDITION

This building is now in its second year of occupancy and has proven to be an excellent building in all respects. The guarantee period has now expired and the final papers will be processed with the School Building Assistance Commission.

SOUTH ROW SCHOOL

Construction of this building met with general delays. Consequently, its occupancy had to be postponed until about the middle of January. The final grading, loaming, and seeding of the ground will not be completed until spring.

The building is an excellent one and should prove to be one of our finest elementary schools. "Open House" is planned for the citizens of the Town as soon after occupancy as is possible. The \$140,000 grant received from the Federal Government under Public Law 815 for the furnishings has made possible many educational innovations.

HIGH SCHOOL ADDITION

The contract for this addition was signed last August 28, 1962 and construction started the following week. Excellent progress is being made on its construction. The Committee has every reason to believe that this building will be ready for occupancy in time for the opening of school next fall.

JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL NEEDS

The Committee in accordance with instructions voted at the annual town meeting has conducted a study of Junior High School needs and submits the following report:

At the outset a study of our school population and birth statistics for the past ten years was made. This study made it most evident that from the standpoint of economy, and of efficiency in school management and education, the problem of school housing would have to be faced on all school levels — elementary, junior high school, and senior high school.

From the standpoint of present numbers in the schools and the estimated factor of new enrollment as a result of births and families moving into the town during the past ten years, it is an inescapable conclusion that our elementary schools, even with the new South Row School and the three old wooden four classroom buildings, would fall short of meeting the needs of the town by 1965.

At the same time, it is equally evident that the existing junior high, the present seventh and eighth grade set-up, would overfill the old high school and the McFarlin buildings now being used to house these grades.

Looking further ahead, it was found that by the end of 1967, the new high school with the fourteen room addition now under construction will require another addition.

From these facts we concluded that there are two courses of action open to the town.

One is to start immediately on the construction of another 24-room elementary school, which would cost in the vicinity of \$1,000,000; start an addition to the old junior high school which would require in addition to classrooms an entirely new heating plant, a large gymnasium, and a large cafeteria at a cost well over another \$1,000,000, and prepare for another addition to the high school which, because of the need for enlarged core facilities would cost far more than the one now under construction.

The second course of action is to build a 1200-pupil junior high school immediately, in order that it might house not only the 7th and 8th grade pupils at the outset but elementary pupils as well. This building will eventually be able to house the 9th grade when the high school becomes overcrowded. In other words, it would cushion the impact of increased enrollment at all levels. The cost of such a building would be in the vicinity of \$2,500,000, in our opinion.

Another alternative, which your committee did not seriously consider, was gradually to put the entire school system on double sessions. This, of course, would be the eventual result if housing facilities fall short of enrollment.

On the basis of the fact that during 1962 housing permits numbered only one-fifth of those in the previous year, we believe that there is a leveling off in the growth of the town. This may be permanent and it may not be. No one can tell at the moment. If this is permanent over a period of four or five years, the extra housing in the proposed junior high school will take care of the enrollment at the elementary level by leaving the old high and McFarlin schools for this age group.

After considerable study of all factors entering into the school housing situation in Chelmsford, your committee recommends that the town take the necessary steps to embark upon the construction of a 1200-pupil junior high school immediately and has prepared the following article for your consideration at the special town meeting to be held in the High School Auditorium, Monday, January 7, 1963, 8:00 P.M.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from some account the sum of Seventy-Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500.00) to be used by the Elementary School Needs Committee for the purpose of securing preliminary plans, specifications and cost for the construction of a Junior High School and for such additions or alterations as may be necessary to renovate the old High School and the McFarlin School buildings for elementary school purposes.

Favorable action on this article will enable your School Needs Committee to begin architectural planning and cost estimating in order that plans and specifications for the new building may be presented to the Town as early in the year as possible.

The Committee also decided to ask for a small sum incorporated in the total amount to study the costs and to plan for work necessary at the old high school and McFarlin buildings on Billerica Road to make them suitable for elementary usage.



The School Committee of the Town of Chelmsford herewith presents its report for the year ending December 31, 1962, to the citizens of the Town.

This report has been prepared to provide the citizens of the Town with a description of progress in areas important to the operation of the school system and to provide some insight concerning new needs which result from growth and change.

Steadily increasing pupil enrollments and changing educational standards continue to impose new problems and requirements on our educational system.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Over-all school enrollment continues to increase sharply and will continue to do so until the current building rate levels off. The following table, in addition to showing the rapid population growth over the past years, is also the basis of some specific predictions of the school system's future size and, consequently, future needs.

Attention is called to the report of the Elementary School Needs and Building Committee published in this Annual Report of the Town and to its specific recommendations which the School Committee recommends that the citizens of the Town follow. Its non-school committee members: Mr. Cristy Pettee, Chairman; Mr. Philip E. Campbell, Secretary; Mr. Charles D. Harrington and Mr. Howard E. Humphrey, are to be commended for the outstanding work which they are doing.

SCHOOL PLANT

The South Row School is scheduled to open about the middle of January. For those pupils who are housed in temporary quarters or over-sized classes, it should be an exhilarating experience to move into their own new building.

Construction of the addition to the Senior High School is moving ahead on schedule. The expected date of completion has been set tentatively for early summer. The opening of these new facilities will avoid the possibility of double sessions in the high school next fall.

It is now abundantly clear that the unusual immigration of students into the lower grades will cause a shortage of classrooms in both the elementary and junior high school areas by September of 1964. The report of the Elementary School Needs and Building Committee indicate, in some detail, the future building problems faced by the Town. The building of a new junior high school would cushion the impact of increased enrollment at all levels. It is the hope of the School Committee that the Town will take action at the Special Town Meeting in January to appropriate an amount sufficient to secure preliminary plans, specifications and cost for the construction of a junior high school building and for such additions or alterations as may be necessary to renovate the old High School and McFarlin School buildings for elementary school purposes.

The construction of the proposed junior high school building will fill the gap in educational facilities that now exists between the elementary and high school areas. Thus, the educational needs of students with differing levels of abilities will be taken care of better. In addition, this will provide solutions to such problems as the heating system, limited gymnasium facilities, inadequate cafeteria facilities, covered way between the two buildings, etc. Action on these problems was deferred because of the cost involved. It is the desire of the School Committee not to expend money on items which are classified as "temporary" until final action can be taken as to the best utilization of the old High School and McFarlin School buildings.

STAFF

The number of teachers in our system continues to increase in response to the growing pupil enrollment as indicated by the following table:

In common with other communities, Chelmsford continues to feel the pressures being generated by the universal competition for qualified and competent teachers. The supply of trained teachers continues to fall short of a rapidly expanding demand, and the result has been a continued upward movement in teaching and administration salary schedules.

The School Committee recognizes and approves the work of the administrative and teaching staff which is striving constantly to improve the quality of education and the encouragement of high standards within the school system. Because of the work of these people, the Chelmsford schools have gained a respected position for providing children with a broad, sound, and well-balanced education.

IN-SERVICE TRAINING

The School Committee provides in-service professional courses planned around specific subject areas to meet the needs of teachers on the job. This action was justified for two reasons: (1) Changes that have occurred in basic subject content and (2) Curricular changes that require extended knowledge on the part of the teachers.

In mathematics two courses have been available. Professor J. Franklin Fitzgerald of Boston University is completing a course in Modern Math for all Junior and Senior High teachers. The course emphasized the School Mathematics Study Group (SMSG) Program. In addition to such exploratory work, teachers are given ample opportunity to develop activities, experiences, and materials for use in their classrooms.

Professor Fitzgerald has also started a course in Modern Mathematics for all elementary school teachers. These teachers, too, are given ample opportunities to develop related activities, experiences and materials for use in their own classrooms.

Next fall, a course in the Language Arts is planned for the elementary teachers. This important subject area includes reading, oral and written language, spelling and handwriting.

In-service courses are an important investment in education that will benefit the children of Chelmsford. The "released time" which is

allowed for these in-service programs allows a greater period of time for the teachers to work together. This is necessary if each teacher is to be kept informed about the program in other grades and schools about the context of courses and about methods of instructions.

CURRICULUM

Our purpose of education remains the same — to emphasize quality education in order to challenge the intellectual skills of every student. Thus, the four major educational areas continually receiving specific study and attention are Curriculum and Content of Courses, Quality and Effectiveness of Teaching, Recognition and Encouragement of Students, and Development of Intellectual Leadership.

EDUCATIONAL TELEVISION

Educational closed circuit television is now stimulating supplementary instruction to many of the classrooms in science, social studies, guidance and music.

Educational TV will improve the quality of education in the school system to a great degree. It is making possible many different kinds of improved learning opportunities which could not otherwise be provided for the children in the school system. In terms of increased efficiency in the use of personnel, materials, and resources — including better, fuller use of existing and future school plant — the Town's investment in its closed circuit television facilities is, to a large degree a self-liquidating investment.

Television is enabling administration to regroup a large number of pupils for a "team-teaching" approach, thus taking a greater advantage of individual teaching talents, skills, and abilities, and making better use of visual aids, instructional materials, and physical resources. It will make it possible to substantially reduce over-all work load and planning load for a large number of teachers, thus providing more available time to these teachers for more careful and thorough lesson preparation.

IN GENERAL

Reading, the first of the traditional three R's, still continues to be the first concern of our elementary schools. However, reading in schools cuts across all subject matter and is no longer an isolated school subject. Content subjects involve many new mental concepts to be gathered from the text each day. Our classroom teachers are constantly alert to see that children are learning to read with meaning. Most noteworthy is the stress placed on the teaching of phonics and the necessary development of the student's word power. With the rapid changes in our world of today, and as understanding and interpretation become increasingly important, schools must also train children to become critical readers.

Earlier exposure to mathematical concepts is general through all twelve grades. In the elementary grades, arithmetic is taught in meaningful and thought-provoking situations. Emphasis in teaching is upon the development of meaning, accuracy, and speed in both oral and written



computations. Quantitative, directional and positional ideas in time and space are being developed, even in the primary grades. Experimental work employing the Cuisenaire Rod System is being carried on in one of the elementary schools.

Modern mathematics and algebra are being introduced in the junior high school curriculum. This will enable these students when they are high school seniors to be ready for a full year of work in an area of mathematics which is not now a part of the curriculum.

Several high school classes are using the School Mathematics Study Group approach with much success.

All courses of study are being very closely coordinated as elementary, junior high and senior high principals, coordinators, and department heads work to develop programs for the entire Chelmsford School System. An increasingly effective science program, which will include an additional science course in the high school curriculum, is one accomplishment of this group of school administrators.

Other areas presently under study are French, English and Social Studies.

The "team teaching" room in the addition to the High School will be used to combine classes for lectures and demonstrations by members of the various departments and will enable us to provide many different kinds of improved learning opportunities as well as increased use of personnel and resources.

Reports of the elementary principals and supervisors reveal varied procedures in challenging the "fast learning" children with positive results being realized. Rather than try to make individuals conform to a standard pattern, we are attempting to challenge every child in terms of his own unique abilities. Team learning, specialties, and other activities to provide for children at all ability levels are beginning to be much more common in our elementary grades.

Administrational leadership, combined with effective, cooperative work on the part of the teachers and supervisors, has been the basis for educational progress. There is a close relationship among all school personnel.

CORRECTIVE SPEECH PROGRAM

For the first time, we have the services of a full-time speech therapist in the elementary grades. As most of the minor speech difficulties show a gratifying response through a speech improvement program, emphasis has been placed on this type of program with the therapist guiding the classroom teacher. The most serious speech difficulties are handled directly by the speech therapist or, in extreme cases, referred to other agencies. This new service while gratifying to parent and teacher is most valuable to the child concerned.

ENRICHMENT COURSES

Summer School Sessions and Saturday Morning Classes continue to be both popular and self-supporting. These classes are planned to provide an opportunity for enrichment and serious study, not to serve as a tutoring or a "cramming" period.

GUIDANCE

It is interesting to note that 51% of last year's graduating class at Chelmsford High School have gone on for further education. This percentage ranks high in the State.

Test data analyses continue to be used to identify weaknesses and strengths of the instructional program.

In order to guide students into the right courses, to evaluate the abilities of students to take these courses, to spot the under-achiever and to help him find the causes of the underachievement, and to help him to realize his potential, we have a staff of five professionals—three in the Guidance Office at the High School and two in the Guidance Office at the Junior High School. Great care has been taken to provide a sufficiently flexible pupil placement program.

Throughout the year, conferences are held by admissions officers from various colleges who meet with interested students for the purpose of orientation and explanation of admission requirements.

Chelmsford High School is one of the 1,500 testing centers for College Entrance Examination Boards in the United States. While it is primarily set up for our Chelmsford students, it does accommodate others from the surrounding areas.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

In the pursuit of our goal of providing facilities and curricula for all of the children and the recognition that every child is important, the Chelmsford School System has gained recognition for its classes for the mentally retarded children. To a large measure, this fact must be attributed to the teachers of these children who, in addition to their patience and skill in working with the handicapped, are dedicated to their profession.

At present there are thirty-seven children enrolled in four separate classes, one at the Steadman Street School, one at the Westlands School, and two at the Junior High School. As the children progress to the classes at the Junior High School, a class must be established at the Senior High School level which would provide a suitable work-study program to aid them in developing useful skills and the ability to gain employment in the future.

SPECIAL NOTE CITIZENS COMMITTEE

The Citizens Advisory Committee, established last year and serving as a study group for the School Committee, has contributed much toward the establishment of a better educational system in Chelmsford. Its fifteen members have completed their first two projects which have been accepted by the School Committee.

The first project, a study of the need for an Adult Education Program resulted in the adoption of an evening program of education by the School Committee. The Adult Education Program offers courses in two areas: namely, Vocational and General Education. The Vocational courses offered are: Basic Sewing, Advanced Sewing, Cake Decorating, Knitting, Furniture Refinishing, and Slip Covers. The General Education division offers courses in: Beginning Typing, Advanced Typing, Shorthand, French, Art, Investments, Woodworking, and Public Speaking. At the present time, there are over 425 adults enrolled in this program. Mr. Frederick G. Bardsley, Assistant Superintendent of Schools, is Director of the program.

The second project was the compilation and distribution to the teachers in The Chelmsford Public School System of a Community Resource Manual. This manual consists of a list of over 90 residents of Chelmsford who are willing to come into the classrooms and present a talk or show slides on such subjects as: Science, art, travel, vocations, foreign languages and hobbies. These presentations are used to supplement and enrich classroom teaching.

CAFETERIA

The School Lunch Program has shown considerable growth this year. Cafeteria receipts totaled \$107,969.32 with an additional \$45,350.32 reimbursed from the State and Federal Funds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1962.

FEDERAL FUNDS

Chelmsford Public Schools are presently receiving several types of Federal Funds which are to be used for the direct improvement of the school system. Under Public Law 874 which provides financial assistance for these local educational agencies upon which the Federal Government has placed financial burdens determined under the provision of the Act, Chelmsford received \$59,710.00.

Under Public Law 864, commonly known as the National Defense Education Act, Chelmsford received on a matching basis \$17,738.21. These funds were received for projects submitted under Title III, "Enrichment and Strengthening Math, Science and Foreign Language," and Title V, "Improving School Guidance Programs." These Projects, prepared in cooperation with department heads, supervisors, principals and School Committee were designed to strengthen the science, math, and foreign language areas.

These funds have made possible the "Language Lab" in the Junior High School, television and special equipment for the improvement of science and mathematics, and materials and special services for the Guidance Department.

To a large degree these Federal Funds have made possible the great improvement in the educational standards of the Chelmsford School System as one of the criteria for a good school system are the materials and aids used in its instructional program. This has been accomplished through the use of these funds without any direct effect on the tax rate. Without this aid, it would have been most difficult to have attained our present high educational standards.

The Town again was most fortunate to have received \$140,000.00 under Public Law 815 to be used for equipping the new school. This grant had made it possible for the school system to receive furniture and equipment, especially designed for today's teaching. The children and teachers are most fortunate to have the type and kind of equipment which will make conceptual learning less difficult.

IN MEMORIAM

PATRICK J. WELCH, Head Custodian at the North Elementary School was accidentally killed on September 8, 1962. His untimely death put an end to a career dedicated to the services of the children of Chelmsford, a career in which he earned the respect and affection of all — children — fellow workers — parents.

IN CONCLUSION

During the past several years a conscientious attempt has been made to improve school and parent communications. Special bulletins, schedules of special events, and other items of parent interest have been sent home or published. School-parent activities included: PTA meetings, Parent Orientation meetings, Open House, Science Fair, Parent Conferences, Annual Play, Talent Show, Music Concerts and special elementary programs. Excellent attendance at these affairs indicated strong parent interest and appreciation of the overall school program. Throughout the

year many individual conferences have been held by parents with teachers, guidance counselors and administrators. It is a definite policy of the school to encourage these individual conferences.

We are grateful to all who have assisted us in any way—all Town Boards and Committees, the Police, Fire and Highway Departments, the Parent-Teacher Associations, the School Building Committee, the Citizens Committee, and all interested citizens.

This report should not close without a word of appreciation for the devotion, professional alertness and competence of the personnel. Chelmsford schools form an enviable physical environment, but without the personnel, there could be no schools. Chelmsford's schools have a reputation for excellence as evidenced every year by the new families moving here because of the educational advantages. Maintaining and improving this quality is the responsibility of the personnel of the school system.

BUDGET ANALYSIS

This year's proposed budget again reflects the growth in school population as well as improved teaching services. The impact of the current building in the Town is reflected in the provision, among others for an additional 26 teachers.

The School Committee shares the general concern over the fact that adequate support of our public school system appears to involve the imposition of an increasingly heavy burden on our local tax structure. This concern has prompted us to attempt every possible economy in operations which does not threaten to impair our present educational standards or facilities. We still consider it our duty, however, to work for the continued maintenance and improvement of our standards.

A summary of income and expenditures of the Chelmsford Public Schools for the year 1962 and the budget recommended for 1963 follows:
